Largest, Fastest Ship Afloat Arrives In New York After Bold Dash Over Atlantic

Talk Of Finnish, Red Peace Heard

Russia Reportedly Cites Terms For Armistice In War

With "Red Duster" Union Jack proudly flying at her mast, Britain's new \$28,750,000 liner Queen Elizabeth—largest, fastest ship afloat—arrived within the safety of New York harbor waters today at the end of her bold dash 3,000 miles across the Atlantic.

The 85,000-ton liner's secret voyage from Clydebank, Scotland, was hailed by Britain as proof of her mastery of the seas. Drab-painted and her interior still unfinished, the Queen Elizabeth slipped away from home Saturday, thousands of persons in Britain knew but did not tell until the liner was nearing New York, where it was believed she would stay for the duration of the war.

Britain considered the liner's secret maiden voyage a reply to the Nazi exultation when the German merchant flagship Brenner reached home safely after a wartime dash from New York to Britain.

Talk of peace through an armistice in the Russian-Finnish war was heard persistently in Stockholm, though there was no official confirmation. There was a basis for the belief.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 7.—(AP)—The majority of a special House committee asked Congress today to replace the three members of the National Labor Board. Chairman Smith (D-Va.) proposed the action and 16 companion amendments to the Wagner Labor Act in behalf of himself and four other committee members who disagreed with the majority. The suggested changes, Smith said, were not intended to affect the fundamental principle of collective bargaining but would define the work of the body more clearly and eliminate the cause of some of the dissatisfaction expressed about the present board.

### Cancer Control Is Attacked In Different Manner

NEW YORK, Mar. 7.—(AP)—  
Virgin birth biology's newest laboratory miracle, is being used to study the role of heredity in cancer.

The new step against cancer, second largest cause of death from disease in the United States, was disclosed yesterday by the American Society for the Control of Cancer, in answering questions put by the National Association of Science Writers.

Virgin births have already been successfully accomplished in laboratories with rabbits, rats and mice. The principle appears applicable to all mammals.

It is done in two ways. One is to transplant fertilized ova from mated females to a virgin, the latter giving birth to the young. The other completely omits the male sex. Virgins give birth to normal young, from unfertilized ova, which merely have been stimulated with chemical irritants.

For the cancer research, ova of cancer-free mice are transplanted to virgins of a cancer-hereditary strain. This furnishes new methods of separating the hereditary from the environmental causes of cancer. Both are mysteries at present.

Dr. Clarence C. Little, of Bar Harbor, Maine, managing director of the society, said that probably a hundred different experiments are possible. This is believed to be the first practical use of the mammalian virgin birth discovery.

Some of the new experiments are under way in the Roscoe B. Jackson memorial laboratory at Bar Harbor.

Another new development announced today is move toward coordinating the work of the now largely isolated American cancer researchers.

It was suggested that this might speed up possibly by a large part of a century the hoped-for discoveries in cause and prevention of cancer. Dr. Frank B. Jewett, head of the Bell Telephone Laboratories, explained the industrial science cooperative methods, and told cancer experts that their problem is probably more difficult than anything in industry.

He said the Bell Laboratory employs about 6000 persons. In all American cancer research there are less than 2000 workers.

With the industrial science example in mind, it is planned to offer the coordinating job to the American Association for Cancer Research, oldest cancer organization in this country, started in 1906 and now numbering 400 members.

The report stated that another problem, whether blondes are more subject to skin cancer than brunettes, and the whole subject of how much over exposure to sunlight and to ultra-violet rays causes cancer is to be studied by the national cancer institute.

Diet was declared to be probably important in the prevention of cancer but seemingly less important in treatment. Little is known yet about diet and cancer, the report stated. It pointed out that Kanematsu Sugimura, of Memorial Hospital, New York City, has demonstrated that rice bran extract can prevent experimental liver cancer in rats.

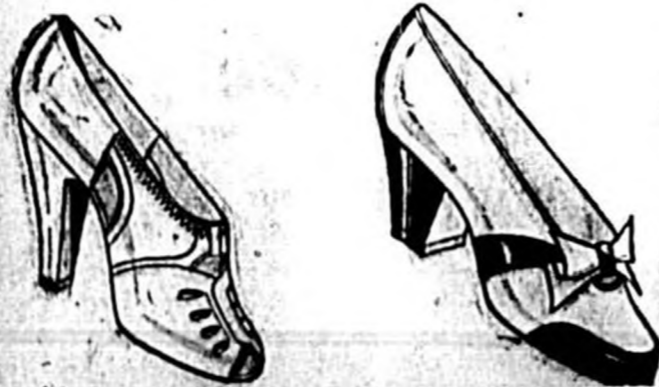

Subversive Activities

Martin Dies, who has been doing some pretty good work in Washington uncovering various communistic activities, has come to Florida to investigate un-American activities down here. Heading straight for the millionaire's playground on the lower East Coast, he announces "I can't talk about it much, for it is quite a delicate situation, but we have reports about communists down here."

He is accompanied by James Steedman, investigator for the House committee, as well as by Mrs. Dies and their two children, Bobby and Jackie. While one may naturally wonder why a hunt for communists should lead to the most exclusive resort in America where glamour girls, actresses, and millionaires desert themselves on sunny beaches and generally regarded as fertile fields for subversive activities, perhaps Mr. Dies is combining business with pleasure.

There have been reports from Miami that a certain J. Edgar Hoover who also felt the urge to investigate Miami during the unbearable cold weather in the North, was seen most of the time on the golf links where perhaps he was expecting to find Chicago racketeers, machine-guns in hand, behind almost every bunker. At the exclusive hotel where he stopped the only public enemies you would expect to find would be millionaires.

Another winter visitor who has found Miami Beach a delightful spot in which to operate during the bad weather up North was the head of the United Mine Workers of America, Mr. John L. Lewis. We doubt if he found many coal miners to organize at the \$35-a-day hotel where he and his family were stopping, but perhaps for the moment he confined his activities to creating a union for "Retired Millionaires and Disgruntled Playboys."

There is something a little bit incongruous about the leader of the CIO movement sitting down in the luxurious dining room of an exclusive hotel, right in the very midst of bejeweled ladies and their very wealthy men, to eat his soup and caviar while an expensive orchestra is playing the sweet strains of anything but the "Internationale" or "The Volga Boatman." Hardly the place for a sitdown strike.

And yet it is strange how many people manage to combine business with pleasure on their trips to Miami Beach. If a man wants to investigate communists, he goes to Miami Beach. If he is looking for racketeers, he searches the Beach hotels. If he wants to organize coal miners, where better to start than Miami Beach? Especially in winter, when the warm sun soothes the Golden sands, and the waves lap hungrily at the curving shore.

The Census Problem

The New York Times is not particularly alarmed over the questions being asked by the census takers. What bothers the Times is the census opposition which has been characterized by such tactless comments as that of the lady in Washington who said that Congress had better start a plan to enlarge jail accommodations throughout the country to shelter the millions of people who will refuse to answer census questions.

"It is not wise to say such things," says the Times, "because it only puts ideas into bureaucratic minds. Before the country is aware, there will be a government survey of penitentiary accommodations. A serious shortage of prison cells will be discovered, and will be traced primarily to neglect by the States and local communities. Federal aid will be invoked, and Washington will be asked to contribute two dollars for new penal institutions for every dollar expended by the States, etc."

"And in the 1960 census some of the questions which the American people will have to answer may be: '477. Have you ever been in jail, and how often? 478. If the answer is Yes, do you think it has done you good?'"

"Today of all times it is odd to have a storm of protest break out against a few impertinent questions by the Census Bureau. If there is anything which the American people have learned to do with a smile in recent years it is to answer questions. It comes as naturally as breathing and eating. The motto of the age might well be the name of that popular little book of ten years ago, 'Ask Me Another.'"

"The nation in this period has been polled, quizzed, questioned, sampled, tested, surveyed, studied, mirrored, epitomized, analyzed and psychographed to a well, we must not be carried away by the swift rush of the argument into untruth. The nation has not been quizzed and tested and polled to a frazzle. On the contrary, it seems to thrive on the process and to ask for more."

"If this may seem to be a sadly frivolous treatment of a very serious problem, let us close on a serious note. Perhaps the good done by answering the Paul Fry questions will outdo the harm, if any. People with real designs against American liberties don't need any census information. They have their own body of wisdom and knowledge. But accidents may happen, and even an ideologist may now and then learn from a set of real figures."

Senator Smith Suggests Hull For Nomination

WASHINGTON, Mar. 7.—(AP)—Senator Smith of South Carolina came out strongly yesterday for Secretary of State Hull for the Democratic presidential nomination, saying Hull could end all strife within the party.

"A presidential boom is rapidly developing around Hull," Smith said. "It's about as near a real American Democrat as we've got in public life."

Smith has been a bitter critic of the Roosevelt administration and has threatened "to take a walk" from the party if it nominated President Roosevelt for a third term. His backing of Hull attracted attention on Capitol Hill, especially in view of predictions by some Democrats that Hull would win support from all sections of the Democratic party.

Smith denied vigorously, however, that he was in any way "bolting" the party. He said that President Roosevelt had said Hull would be a good choice for the presidency. A article by Ernest Lindbergh in the New York Times said that Smith's backing of Hull was a real test of his loyalty to the party.

"TOO LATE TO CLASSIFY"

By RUSSELL KAY

Countless millions of American citizens, seeking entertainment, flock daily to motion picture theatres. Today these folks see the finest motion pictures produced anywhere in the world, for American producers have led all others in this respect, and their productions are presented to the public at popular prices.

Like all other industries, the motion picture industry is subject to strict governmental censorship and regulation while producers themselves have enforced codes for the protection of the industry and the public.

Among the 85,000,000 theatre patrons in this country, but very few have any knowledge of how films are distributed or released. Their only concern is to see good pictures at popular prices.

Large producers of better grade films have found block booking to be the most practical and economical method of handling distribution to theatre operators and through this method, they have been able to offer higher grade pictures and provide them at a price that permits the theatre operator to show them at popular prices.

Were they forced to market one at a time or sell them at auction sales, costs would mount to where theatre patrons would find themselves called on to pay higher admission charges with the probability of poorer quality pictures.

Congress has before it for consideration at this time, a bill designed to prevent producers from contracting for block bookings. Its passage would not only be detrimental to the picture industry, but it would soon reflect itself in the box office where you and I would be called on to pay more to see poorer grade pictures.

The Neely bill, as it is called, would eliminate block booking and blind buying, which in terms means the purchase of a group of pictures at one time or the purchase of pictures which are being produced but which the buyer has not seen. The bill is being lobbied by a group of independent operators who claim that picture houses able to buy blocks at wholesale prices have an advantage that is unfair.

They further claim that in the purchase of blocks, they are required to take some films they do not want that are objectionable and of poor quality, but a check of the contracts in use by the major reputable producers, reveals that this is not true, as a clause permits the buyer to reject up to 25 percent of such

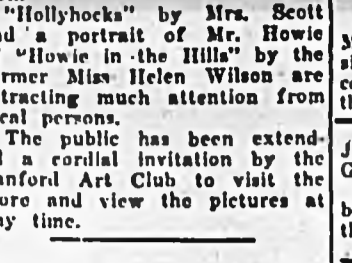

Sooty Mold May Be Removed By Oil Emulsion

CAINEVILLE, Mar. 7.—Unsightly sooty mold on leaves of navelina and grape jasmint bushes may be removed by spraying them with an oil emulsion or solution of common laundry soap and water, Dr. A. N. Tisot, State Experiment Station entomologist, said.

tomologist. The sooty mold, Dr. Tisot explained, is a fungus that grows in a sweetish liquid given off by whiteflies and scale insects. As these insects are quite common on gardenia and cape jasmint bushes in Florida, the appearance of this unsightly mold has been reported by many home-owners. To rid the bush of the mold and to prevent damage to the leaves, he said, the leaves should be washed thoroughly, particularly the under sides, where the whiteflies or scale are located, he said. Killing the insects will eliminate the mold. It will return, however, after a while and another spray application will be necessary, he said.

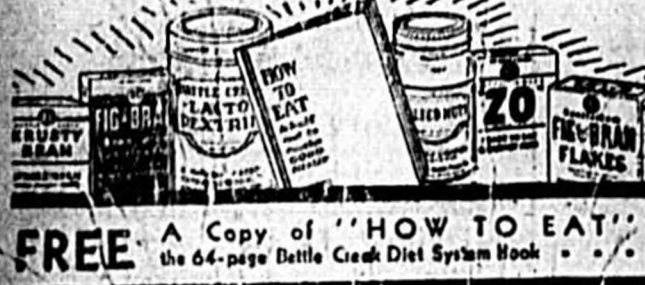

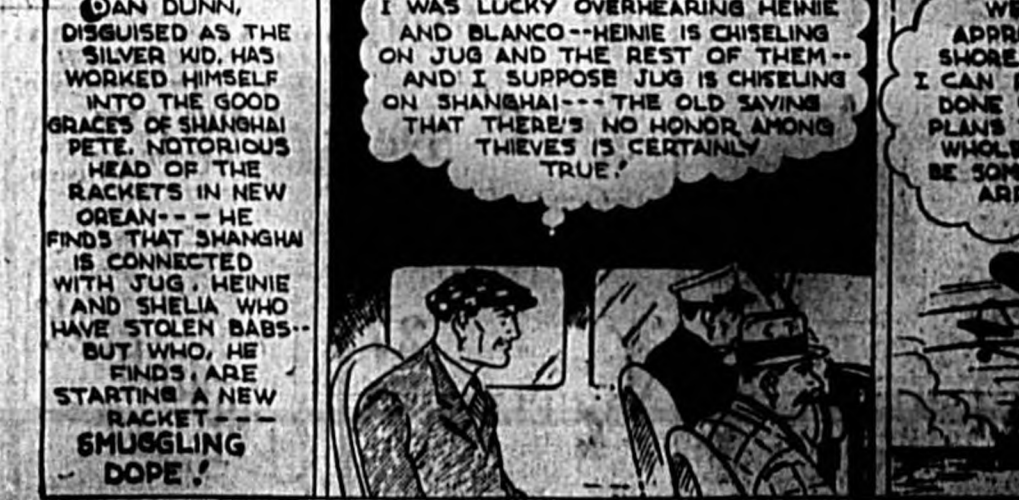

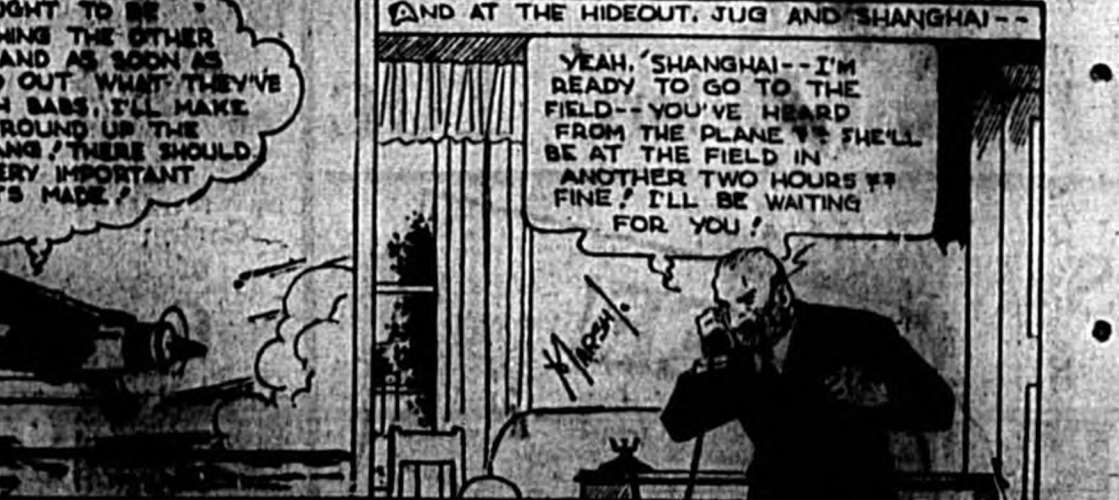
