

The new step against cancer, second largest cause of death from disease in the United States was disclosed yesterday by the American Society for the Control of Cancer, in answering questions put by the National Association of Science Writers.

Virgin birth has already been successfully accomplished in la-

virgin birth has already been secessfully accomplished in laboratories with rabbits, rats and mice. The principle appears applicable to all mammals.

It is done in two ways. One is to transplant fertilized ova from mated females to a virgin, the latter giving birth to the young. The other completely omits the male sex. Virgins give birth to normal young, from unfertilized

normal young, from unfertilized ova, which merely have been stimulated with chemical irritants. For the cancer research, ova of cancer-free mice are transplanted to virgina of a cancer-hereditary strain. This furnishes new methods of separating the hereditary from the environmental causes of cancer. Both are mysteries at Both are mysteries at

Dr. Clarence C. Little, of Bar Harbor, Maine, managing direc-ter of the society, said that prob-ably a hundred different experi-

menta are possible. This, is be-lieved to be the first practical use of the mammalian virgin birth discovery.

Some of the new experiments are under way in the Roscoe B. Jackson memorial laboratory at Bar Harbor.







Virtually all genuine tourists abandoned the Balkans months ago, but Bucharest seems to be at the height of a tourist sea-

The capital swarms with foreign diplomats, agents, business men, newspaper correspondents,


