

A few years ago the "Green Revolution" was under attack from critics who felt it was an oversold success story that was falling flat on its

This year rumblings of the same complaint are being voiced as country after country, where food shortages were supposed to have been wiped out, have checked in with massive requests for help in preventing hunger or near-

The truth is that the Green Revolution is really just beginning. More spectacular impacts than have already been achieved in some areas are likely in the future - including the United

There are new crops coming that will be equally as eye-popping in their potential as any that have already been introduced.

The Green Revolution is the popular name applied to sensational advances in crop production achieved around the world when new high-yielding varieties of wheat, corn and rice were introduced in developing contries during the late 1960s.

These were improved varieties of hybrid corn, the new Mexican dwarf wheats developed at the U.S.-supported Cimmyt Institute near Mexico City, and the high-yielding rice strains produced with U.S. backing in the Philippines.

When planted under favorable soil, climate, water and fertilizer conditions the new wheat produced increases in yield of up to 200 per cent. And even when applied under less than ideal conditions India reported a yield increase of 55 per cent in 1972, West Pakistan of 40 per cent, Nepal 33 per cent and Tunisia 95 per cent.

New rice yields were equally inpressive. Per acre returns have been running 35 per cent above the 1962 norm in Philippines, 67 per cent better in West Pakistan, 25 per cent better in Indonesia and 12 per cent better in India.

Other Thoughts

No telling how many successful Americans first explored the rewards of free enterprise with a neighborhood lemonade stand. The experience of those San Francisco teen-agers who tried to go into the lemonade business makes us wonder where a would-be capitalist breaks in these days.

The grubstake used to be a bag of lemons, a bowl of sugar, a pitcher and a cake of ice. San Francisco now demands a \$7,500 fee for a "catering" license -

The problem involved is regional - the serious erosion of beaches and bluffs along the southern and southeastern shores of flood-level Lake Michigan. But floods along the Mississippi or in northeastern Pennsylvania also are regional. And the way national agencies respond to these matters is of real consequence to us all.

I chose the Michigan problem because I know it firsthand. as a property owner and beach user in the area for nearly 30 years. I also have a friend, R. Lee Wood of Lakeside, whose lakefront home property next door to what was formerly mine is directly threatened. Prior correspondence makes clear that SBA's decision rests upon the professional judgment of the Army Corps of Engineers. Key elements in the quoted paragraphs are the words "continued erosion" and "eighty (80) foot bluff." If they represent the considered findings of the corps as they affect Southeastern Michigan in the area I know, then the engineers in question should get into some other business. They are totally wrong. And with their gross error, the whole SBA argument for the area collapses pathetically.

The bluff at Wood's and my former shoreland never has been higher than 25 to 30 feet. There are places nearby where it is less than 20 feet. On this June 22, I stood at a bluff edge no higher than that, barely a mile north of Wood's Except for 1928-30, I saw Lakeside in all summers 1919

through 1972. In 53 years, bluff heights changed little. As for erosion, it has never been "continuous." Had it been. Wood's house and others still standing would be gone. Early 1950s high water cut deep, brought down sea walls. beach stairs, trees, some houses, great clumps of clay bluff Yet from the late 1950s until about 1968-69, receding waters opened a beach to widths 125 feet or more. Gradually new high water reduced it. But when I saw it last Dec. 8, it was still 30 feet wide. In three weeks, it was gone. Wonder what experts were looking at all those years?


