STETSON MAKES READY FOR ITS HOMECOMING

Tampa-Hatters Grid Game To Be Feature Of Elaborate Fete

DELAND, Nov. 13. — With John B. Stetson University's annual Homecoming just around the corner, the City of Deland, and the University itself, are in a fever of activity as preparations go forward for the observance of the occasion on Nov. 16-17.

Stetson last year observed its "Golden Jubilee" anniversary, but this year's celebration prom-

pted at the local school. A large attendance of old grads is in prospect because of the opportunity afforded to meet Dr. W. S. Allen, widely known southern educator, who assumed the presidency of John B. Stetson University some months ago, as well as to see in action what is regarded by many as the best football team that has been turned out by head coach H. H. McQuillen in many years.

A line on the true worth of the Hatters eleven can be arrived at on Homecoming Day since they are pitted against the "Spartans" from Tampa University who last year defeated the Hatters 8-0.

While it is impossible to outline in full the various activities that will form a part of the Homecoming celebration, a thumb nail sketch of the two day program is presented below for the information of the public:

On Friday, Nov. 16, the high lights of the day will be the Homecoming play, "Smilin' Through," presented by an all star cast drawn from the ranks of former Stetson players, and the Theta Alpha Phi Alumni banquet which will be held at Eastwood Terrace.

Saturday, Nov. 17, is ushered in with the Phi Alpha Delta Fraternity breakfast, which is also to be held at Eastwood Terrace, and will serve to bring together a group of the most brilliant members of the legal profession in the state, including Attorney-General Cary D. Landis, Attorney General of the State of Florida, who will preside as toast master, and Governor Dave Sholtz, himself a graduate of the law school at Stetson.

A program has been arranged commencing at 10 o'clock, which includes the introduction of the student Mayor, Amory Underhill, by Boyce Esch, president of the student body. The student Mayor will, in turn, speak a word of greeting to the returning alumni and introduce Dr. W. S. Allen, University president.

Dr. Allen's response, the introduction of William S. Fielding, president of the Alumni Association, Fielding's response, and the presentation of musical numbers by the 60-piece Stetson band are included in the program.

A parade at 11 o'clock, in which floats from the University will move through the downtown streets, and a series of luncheons arranged by the various fraternities, concludes the morning activities.

The football game, which gets under way at Hulley Field at 2:30 P. M. will claim attention of the visiting throng during the afternoon, and the Alumni banquet, which will be presided over by President Fielding, furnishes a fitting climax to the day's activities.

Early responses being received from members of the Alumni group throughout the state, indicate a banner attendance this year, and distinguished guests who have signified their intention to be present include: Governor Dave Sholtz, and members of his staff; H. S. Duncan, Treasurer; Cary D. Landis, Attorney General; Sam Parco, prominent Miami jurist; John D. Harris, St. Petersburg, president of the state bar association.

Fort Myers Area Continues Upgrade

FORT MYERS, Nov. 13. — Citrus prices showed a slight improvement last week but too late to influence shipments with a result that only 13 cars of grapefruit and oranges rolled out of Lee county while the truck farmers were busy moving 36 carloads of peppers, tomatoes, eggplants and cucumbers. This brought the season's movement of citrus to 223 cars, not including truck line sales, and 43 cars of winter vegetables.

Peaches brookings were heaviest shippers with six cars of tomatoes and three cars of mixed eggplant and peppers. John Hugh Kinsey found a ready market for three cars of fancy tomatoes in New York, Boston and Chicago. Biggar and Biggar shipped two cars of cukes and a mixed car while the Genac Packing company moved five mixed cars and sold another car of tomatoes to local buyers.

The Lee County Packing Company shipped two cars of grapefruit, two cars of oranges and a mixed carload. The Kingston Packing Company was content to move two carloads of grapefruit, the Furen Packing Company three mixed cars of oranges and grapefruit while the Boltek Packing company rolled three cars of citrus and two cars of vegetables.

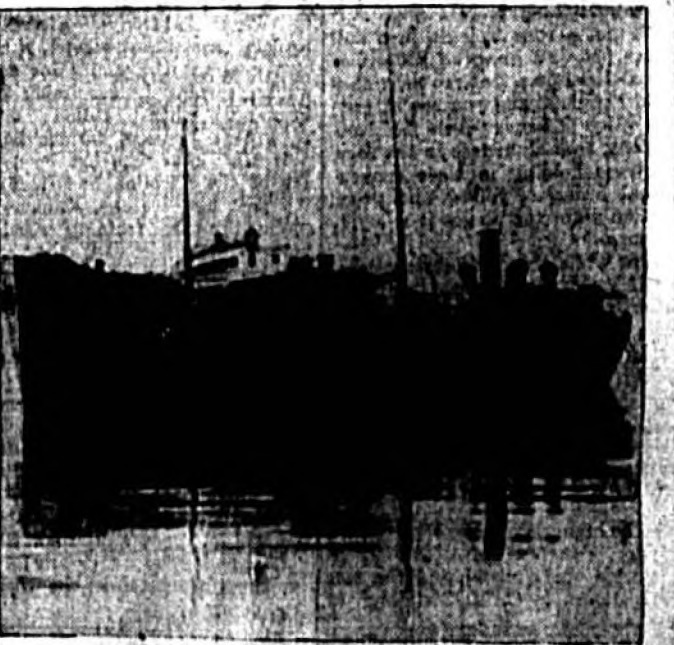

Vegetable Growers Of Wauchula Area Busy With Shipping

WAUCHULA, Nov. 13.—Rains over the past week-end helped the vegetable crop throughout this section considerably and as a result the growers are reporting increased yields. During the week the shipments increased and at the same time, with colder weather reported throughout the North, prices also advanced. Yesterday cukes, fancy, brought \$2.25, while the choice brought around \$2.00, with plains from \$1.00 to \$1.50; eggplants from \$1.25 to \$1.35, and squash \$2.00 for yellow and \$1.25 for white.

Shipped out during the week were six cars of cukes, six cars of mixed vegetables, two cars of peppers, five cars of citrus and one car of tangerines. Total car shipments out to Wednesday night were 24 cars of cukes, five cars of peppers, six cars of mixed vegetables, two cars of eggplants and 13 cars of citrus.

During the past week nearly as much went out by truck, some trucks going as far as Boston, Mass., in the East, and to Detroit, Mich., in the North Central states. Hucksters from Tampa and Miami are here daily for vegetables.

The cool weather, which has prevailed during the present week, will tend to color the citrus crop, and by the last of next week the local packing house will be running full time with an average of 18 cars going out each day.

The rains were also beneficial to the strawberry plants and growers report that the plants are looking fine. The acreage planted in Hardee county this year will about equal that of last season.

ACTION ON EXPORTS PLEASES

World Money Centers React Favorably To Order Lifting Ban On Credit Transfer

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14. (AP)—Observers read hints of orthodoxy, stability and confidence in the future of the dollar yesterday between the lines of a treasury order removing all restrictions from transactions in foreign exchange.

Although the move had little if any reflection in the day's currency quotations, treasury officials were pleased with the reaction expressed in world money centers, where the view was taken that it represents an advance toward normal conditions.

The order removed a requirement that all purchasers of foreign exchange obtain the permission of the treasury, a consent readily given in all cases. It substituted only a condition that all future purchases in excess of \$5000 be reported to the federal reserve banks.

In some quarters, the action was interpreted as a strong indication that no further devaluation of the dollar is in immediate contemplation. If such a step were in mind, it was argued, the treasury would be tightening, not relaxing the flow (Continued on Page Two)

HOME OWNERS LOAN AGENCY CLOSES DOORS

Officials Say Time Is Near When Private Business Can Take Over Its Functions

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14. — One of the government's foremost money lending agencies closed its doors yesterday against new loan applications reporting the time was near when private business once more could take over its functions.

The Home Owners' Loan Corporation, with more than a million unanswered applications on file, announced the \$1,200,000,000 remaining in its coffers would fill about 400,000 of these requests and that it would take no more. Originally the corporation had around \$3,000,000,000 with which to aid beleaguered home owners in meeting mortgages.

From the White House coincidentally came authoritative indications that no additional funds would be asked from Congress. Thus the HOLC would end its lending life about next March.

Body Of Girl Missing Since Sept. 19 Discovered Near Her Home In Nashville

NASHVILLE, Nov. 14.— (A.P.)—Attorney-General Carlton Loser announced after a conference with a physician and dentist today that the body found on the outskirts of Nashville yesterday "is that of Dorothy Ann Distelhurst."

Saying that "the child was murdered," the statement issued by the Attorney-General argued that "while the corpse is in such a state of decomposition as to render identification by those who knew the child impossible, every other fact in connection with the matter points to the conclusion that the body is that of the Distelhurst child."

The nude body of the little girl was found yesterday on the Davidson County Tuberculosis Hospital grounds in a shallow grave, and today Dr. Herman Spitz pathologist, and Dr. Leonard Pogus, children's dentist and orthodontist specialists in their respective professions, after a careful check of the teeth reported identification "a certain and positive."

Dr. Pogus had filled the child's teeth shortly before she disappeared last Sept. 19 on the way home from a kindergarten, and said he recognized the filling in a (Continued on Page Three)

WHERE MOVING FORWARD!

\$500,000 FREIGHT RATE REDUCTION HANDED GROWERS

Slash Applies On All Citrus Moving Into Northern Markets

TAMPA, Nov. 14.—A reduction on freight rates on Florida citrus to Northern markets, similar to a temporary reduction allowed last year, and worth almost \$500,000 during the season to Florida growers, was announced yesterday by L. D. Aulis, traffic manager of the Florida Citrus Exchange.

The reduction last year was 12 cents a hundred pounds with a minimum of 44 boxes in the shipment. This year the same cut was allowed but with a 400-box minimum.

The difference in the minimum for shipments is worth much to growers, because the ordinary carload is about 360 boxes. There was some difficulty in getting 441 boxes in a car, but 400 boxes can be shipped without much difficulty.
