World MoneyCenters Officials Say Time Is React FavorablyTo Order Lifting Ban On Credit Transfer

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14 .- (AP) Observers read hints of orthodoxy, stability and confidence in the future of the dellar yesterday between the lines of a treasury order removing all restrictions from transactions in foreign exchange. Although the move had little if

any reflection in the day's currency quotations, treasury officials were leased with the reaction expressed in world money centers, where the view was taken that it represent an advance toward normal condi-

The order removed a requirement that all purchasers of foreign exchange obtain the permission of the treasury, a consent readily given in all cases. It substituted only a condition that all future purchases in excess of \$5000 be reported to the federal reserve
