#### Foreclosure blamed on SCEA

SANFORD - A west Sanford couple sued the Seminole County Expressway Authority Wednesday, claiming the road agency brought on a foreclosure suit against them.

Christopher and Janet Bullet, who bought a home about 500 feet west of Upsala Road on March 27, 1987, claimed that SCEA's reserva-tion of land east of Interstate 4 on Oct. 28, 1987 for the Seminole County Expressway prevented them from selling their home. Their home lies in the right-of-way reservation path.

The couple also claims the reservation rendered them incapable of of making their mortgage payments, according to the couple's complaint. Barnett Bank subsequently foreclosed on the home in "early, 1990." The sult. states. The couple is sceking an unspecified amount of damages.

'This case is a little unusual because the plaintiffs don't even own the property anymore and they're still claiming damages," said expressway attorney Lonnie Groot, Groot said the Florida Attorney General's Office will defend the anthority.


The paying was completed in November. Residents will be assessed either \$378 in one payment or a total of \$483 over five years for the project.

## Judge finds pinups are harassment

JACKSONVILLE - A federal judge says pornography and nude pictures posted in the workplace can be considered sexual harassment — a ruling which feminists are calling significant.

U.S. District Judge Howell Melton ruled that 30 nude and semi-nude pictures displayed at Jacksonville Shippards Inc. sexually harassed Lois Robinson, a female welder who brought the complaint in 1986. "I'm glad the judge recognizes

that pornography is a form of harassment," Robinson said in a statement released by her attorney. She declined to talk to reporters.

The pictures were mainly contained on tool-supply company calendars. Melton found that women at the shipvard were affected by "sex role spill-over," where evaluation of female workers was based more on sexual worth than performance.

"A pre-existing atmosphere that deters women from entering or continuing in a profession or job is no less destructive to and offensive to workplace equality than a sign declaring 'men only,'" Melton wrote in his opinion, released Friday.

The decision found thatRobinson was the victim of both verbal and visual sexual harassment, it describe 30 pictures, including a photo of a woman's public area with a spatula pressed on it. Other pictures included a nude woman bending over with her buttocks and genitals exposed and a frontal view of a nude female torso with the words "USDA Choice" written on it.

"Our hope is that it's going to be an extremely influential decision." said Alison Wetherfield, director of the legal program at NOW, and one of Robinson's two trial attorneys.

# County vows to cut garbage pickup rates

SANFORD - Seminole County officials pledge garbage rates will go down later this year, even if residents will have to pay "by the bag."

"We're going to get the rate as low as we possibly can," said Gary Cinder, director of the county environmental services department. "People will get a significant

Last October, hundreds of restdents protested when countytranchised haulers raised their rates, which had averaged from \$7 to \$12, to the \$13.80 cap allowed by the county. The total number of subscribing households dropped from about 83 percent of all homes to about 70 percent, Cinder said.

Next year, county garbage officials want to begin mandatory

corporated residents to help end roadside and woods littering and help keep track of the amount of garbage produced and recycled by residents. Residents would be billed once a year along with taxes for the service.

Officials said mandatory collections assure greater participation in recycling programs and remove the incentive to litter since residents have to pay for the service whether they use it or not.

#### meeting Chambers hold historic

SANFORD - The executive director of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce said Wednesday he is pleased with the cooperation shown between members of his organization and the Greater Seminole County Chamber of Commerce Tuesday.

In what has been called a historic first, the members of both chambers' government committees met Tuesday to determine if they have common issues they wish to promote to state lawmakers. Using a four-item slate endorsed by Sanford chamber leaders, the two committees endorsed two items and agreed to consider two others.

"It went very well." Farr said. "Everybody was very receptive to the idea. It was the first time we have approached a subject on a united basis. It is not important that

we don't agree on every topic. But on those that we do, we all will have a stronger voice.

But Farr said the joint committee meetings did not represent a merger of the two groups. He said the joint committee recommendations will be taken to each chamber's board of directors for ratification. If both chambers approve the positions. they will be presented to lawmakers as joint priorities.

Farr said the joint meetings do not suggest the two chambers will eventually merge

The two committees agreed to seek state revenue equity for Seminote County schools and local Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services programs. State school and HRS revenues per person are much lower for Seminole County than most other counties in the state, local officials have said.

The two groups failed to reach a consensus on whether non-aviation businesses at Central Florida Regional Airport should be given similar tax breaks offered to aviation businesses. The groups agreed to take up the issue again next Tuesday.

The two groups also did not reach a decision on whether Seminole County should be represented by a single Senate district or more. Rep. Art Grindle, R-Altamonte Springs, serves on a House committee consisdering the issue. He has said the county would be best served by one senator representing the majority of the county, answerable to residents of a single county, rather than two

or more. The groups will consider the senate seat issue at a later date. Farr

#### Firm works overtime on Patriots

ORLANDO - Makers of the Patriot air-defense system are working overtime and in double shifts to fill orders following the missile's apparent success in the Gulf War, a Martin Marietta spokesman said Wednesday.

Since the war erupted, Saudi Arabia has been the first to strike up a deal for Patriot missiles. One purchase worth \$513 million has already been approved by Congress, and a buy worth more than \$1 billion is awaiting approval, said Doug McCurrach, spokesman for the Orlando company.

The air-defense system has enjoyed considerable success in

intercepting Iraqi Scud missiles fired at Saudi Arabia and

Ratheon Co., based in Lexington, Mass., is the prime contractor on the system while Martin is the prime subcontractor, building the electronics for the motor and warhead sections and assembling the missile.

# Allies intensify air campaign

DHAHRAN, Saudi Arabia - The allied air war is changing targets, aiming now to crush Saddam Hussein's tactical backbone, including his elite ground forces and supply

lines to occupied Kuwait.

During the war's first week, allied warplanes flew more than 12,000 missions - combat and non-combat combined - in a relentless campaign to destroy such strategic targets as radar installations and nuclear and weapons plants.

Now the U.S.-led coalition wants to pick up the pace, perhaps flying 3,000 missions per day if skies are clear, allied sources say. With clear skies over Iraq on Wednesday. American sources said they hoped to obtain

week's bombing damage in Iraq and Kuwait. The information will help commanders select targets for the days ahead but also decide whether a ground offensive is days or weeks away.

"Some very important decisions rest on those damage reports," said a British armored division officer, whose unit is moving closer to the border. "The whole timetable depends on them." He spoke on condition of anonymity.

Like the Americans, some Royal Air Force pilots also are getting new targets. British Tornado warplanes are expected to return to the skies to bomb from medium altitudes after a week of flying vulnerably low to drop runway-busting bombs on Iraqi airfields.

"We have changed the nature of the targets over the past day or so," said RAF Group Capt. Bill Hedges. "We have assumed damage to the airfields is sufficient."

Iraq's air force generally has refused to fight the allies' huge fleet of warplanes. Gen. Colin Powell, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, told reporters in Washington on Wednesday that there have been 19 or 20 doglights but that only one U.S. plane appeared to have been lost in air combat.

The U.S. contingent is led by F-117A stealth bombers, F-111 fighter bombers, F-15E "Screaming Eagles," the workhorse B-52Gs and carrier-based A-6 "Intruders" and F-14 Tomcats.





## **Minorities** debate role in Gulf war

WASHINGTON - As a U.S. military force heavily weighted with blacks faces the prospect of ground combat against Iraq. many blacks on the home front are opposing a war they say puts too much of the burden on them.

"I don't think it's our fight," says Damu Smith, leader of the African American Network on

the Persian Gulf Crisis.
Other blacks differ, some of them strongly.

"Let us knock off the hypocritical, self-serving lament for the black soldier as a special victim," said Milton Morris, vice president for research at the Joint Center for Political and Economic Studies, a black think

"Black soldiers are proud professionals serving their country by choice ... not cannon fodder." Morris contended this week.

Frances Murphy, editor of the Washington Afro-American, which opposed going to war, said the newspaper is running an editorial saying: "War changes things. Once we go to war, we are Americans like everybody else, and we have to pull together.

# White House takes issue with war coverage

WASHINGTON - The White House is asking the press a question that government asks at times like these: Whose side are you on?

After several days of skirmishing with reporters look-ing for more details about the effectiveness of allied bombing in Iraq, the administration opened a counterattack

Wednesday.

It accused reporters of unnecessarily negative coverage and suggested that one of the

country's most respected war correspondents had become a

conveyor of propaganda. "I don't know why you're so intent on proving massive fail-ures of some kind," President Bush's spokesman, Marlin Fitzwater, told reporters while complaining about a report broadcast by Peter Arnett of Cable News Network.

"We must point out once again that any reports coming out of Baghdad are in effect coming from the Iraqi govern-ment." Fitswater said, auggesting that Arnett's reporting was

"I think it's fair to the Ameri-can people to know that when they hear these reports, exactly what it is they're seeing." he

In his report, Arnett, the only Western reporter permitted by Iraq to remain in Baghdad, said that in August he toured an Iraqi facility that manufactured baby formula. He said he had been taken back after the allied bombing started and found the facility in ruins.

"The machinery inside was a molten pile. The intact signboard at the entrance to the factory read 'Baby Milk Plant' in

English and Arabic," Arnett

The American military responded vigorously to the suggestion it had targeted a civilian facility — the only place in Iraq. Arnett said he had been told, capable of producing infant formula in a country that has been subjected to a five-month embargo.

'I can assure you our targeting is strictly limited to military targets," Lt. Col. Mike Scott told reporters in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia.

DAYTONA BEACH - A woman suspected in the serial slayings of seven middle-aged men has told police how she posed as a hitchhiker to lead one victim to his death, according to

affidavits. Alleen Carol Wuornos, 54, was arrested last week charged with first-degree murder in the death of 52-year-old Richard Mallory of Clearwater.

She's suspected in six other slayings occurring over a 13month span beginning in late 1989, mostly along the 1-75 corridor in north and central

In affidavits filed this week in Volusia Circuit Court, Wuornos told investigators she was picked up by Maliory on Dec. 1, 1989, while hitchiking in the Tampa Bay area, and said she alone killed and robbed him.

Wuornos shot Mallory four times with a .22-caliber handgun before searching his pants pockets and hiding his body under a carpet in a wooded area off U.S. 1 in Volusia County, according to the affidavits.

She then went home and told her roommate and former lesbian lover, Tyria J. Moore, "she killed a guy today," the records

Moore, 28, is to be a witness for the prosecution. She has not been charged in any of the killings, authorities said.

According to the affidavita, Moore told investigators Wuomos earned her money as a prostitute and that she left their Daytona Beach home Nov. 30, 1969, "to obtain a customer."

The next day, Wuornos came home with Mallory's 1977 Cadillac. The car was used to help the couple move to a new residence.

That night, Wuornos told Moore she had killed Mallory and covered his body with a carpet, records show.

The car, found abandoned near Ormond Beach, was analyzed by the Florida Department of Law Enforcement and found to contain blood stains suggesting Mallory was shot as he sat in the driver's sout.

Detectives learned Mallory had been traveling with luggage, a briefcase, a gold watch, two cameras, and a radar detector. But none of the items were found in the abandoned car. However, five days after

Mallory was killed, Wuornos went into a Daytona Beach Pawn shop and pawned his 35mm Minolta camera and a radar detector for \$30, affidavita show.

# Missing

Between 1987 and 1988, 7 million children turned up missing in America. But this time the pictures of missing children will not end up on milk cartons or flyers. More likely, the picture of at least some of their "parents" will turn up on mug shots at a federal prosecutors' office. For these children never existed, except on a federal tax return.

As a result of the new income tax requirement that taxpayers report the Social Security number of all dependents age 1 or more, 7 million children who were claimed as dependents on tax returns for 1986 disappeared by the time taxpayers filed their 1987 tax forms.

According to the Internal Revenue Service, about 20 percent of those disappearing were children who had been claimed as dependents by both parents after a divorce. But most were children who never existed. Of the taxpayers who claimed four or more children in 1986, there were 68,000 who claimed none the following year. There were even 11,000 taxpayers who claimed seven or more children in 1986 but none in 1987. Many of these folks have had their returns audited and paid fines and penalties. Others can expect to hear from the government any day now, some from federal prosecutors.

To many taxpayers it has seemed a bother to head to a federal office to get a Social Security card for a toddler. But for their bother, honest taxpayers at least have the satisfaction that the dishonest are now paying more of the taxes they owe — \$2.9 billion a year worth — and that some will pay for their imaginative feats of procreativity in court.

## Plugging gaps in nuclear safety

In many parts of the country, the wastewater, discharged from an oil field gr. a fertiliser plant may be many times more radioactive than would be permitted from a nuclear power plant. But no standards have been set for radioactive wastes from most industrial sources, even though the risk they present is just as great as those from a power

Ever since World War II, nuclear regulators at the federal level have focused their attention on protecting people from the synthetic radioactive materials produced in weapons and power production. All too often it has turned out that their commitment to enforcing those standards left a lot to be desired. But at least there was a formal recognition of the risk.

With the exception of uranium mining,

however, regulators have largely ignored the potential hazards associated with exposure to naturally occurring factores. As a result, those who work in basic industries involving naturally radioactive soils such as phosphate mining, fertilizer manufacture, oil and gas production and some kinds of coal-fired power plants, may unknowingly receive the same dose of daily radiation as someone working around a nuclear reactor. And the effect on the surrounding environment may not be monitored at all.

Some leaders in the mining and oil and gas industries argue that the solution for that imbalance is to lower the standards for nuclear power plants. But in view of the multibillion-dollar bill that the taxpayers are facing for such laxity at the national weapons plants, less stringent stndards are certainly the wrong way to go.

Instead, state and federal officials are beginning to develop ways of plugging some of those gaps. The Environmental Protection Agency is is unching studies to determine how much radiation workers are actually exposed to in these industries and what effects it has had - the first step toward new regulations.

As government agencies probe deeper into the nature of these radiation risks, they may well find it necessary to review what the safe limits for exposure should be. There's evidence, for example, that some forms of prolonged low-level exposure may not be as dangerous as previously supposed, although other scientists contend the any exposure above normal levels is potentially harmful. The point is that wherever science ultimately sets the standards, they need to be enforced uniformly.

country something infinitely more preassured supply of Middle Eastern oil: It will restore our confidence in America as a great nation.

For the "lesson of Vietnam." in the eyes of many Americans, was that this country was a punctured balloon, incapable of defeating in battle a gaggle of pajama-clad Communist guerrillas. Even the Korean War, 20 years further back, had ended with a truce on the 50-yard line. Only those whose memories encompassed World systematically pulverising Saddam Hussein's War II could recall a major military operation

from which the United States had emerged



# Will Saddam be put on trial?

WASHINGTON — However long the war in the Persian Gulf, and whatever the methods of fighting, there doesn't seem to be much doubt about the outcome. A host of observers agree that the allied military coalition has quickly demonstrated it has the competence necessary to force Saddam Hussein's army out of Kuwait.

The question is, will the victory be complete? That is to say, will it extend over Saddam himself? There is a pagging concern that the

That is to say, will it extend over Saddam himself? There is a nagging concern that the iraqi strongman will eventually try to wiggle out of a personal disaster; he may sue for peace, for instance, on the condition that he is left alone at the head of his government.

The Kuwaitis any this would not be acceptable. Officials at the U.S. State Department generally agree. The two groups claim the allies are not battling the Iraqi people so much as they are battling the belligarent iraqi leader, and he must therefore answer for the devastation he has brought about in the Middle East.

One solution: Try Saddam for war crimes. A State Department officer says Saddam could be brought up on the same charges that mared Nazi commanders at Nuremberg, after World War II; and a Kuwaiti leader in Washington adds that the trial would serve a dual purpose: It would be good for the world and bad for Saddam.

Saddam.

The Kuwaiti leader is Dr. Hassan AlEbraheem. He directs an extle group called
Citizens for a Free Kuwait. He says he does not
normally wish ill on anyone ("it's not the Arab
way"), but the Baddam case is different: "He
does not deserve sympathy, and he must not
escape. He must be made to face some kind of
justice."

Certainly there is pienty of precedent for war crimes justice. The rules of conflict are among the oldest in existence with respect to international law. The Old Testament ferbids the combat destruction of fruit trees, to illustrate; and the ancient Indians condemned the killing of warriors who were asleep or paked.

naked.

Not that the rules have always been followed. There's scarcely an army in history that has been free of war crime wrongdoing. Even armies in the United States. Americans have broken the faith from Andersonville to Wounded Knee, and, more recently, some of them participated in shameful atrocities during the Vietnam War.

Still, the rules are yenerable and enforcesble. And for the most part they have been formalized. The Geneva conventions in this regard began in 1864, due in part to the ghastly deportment in the U.S. Civil War; and most modern states have officially accepted the adopted accords guiding conduct during engagements.

engagements.

The accords prohibit crimes against peace on the one hand and against humanity on the other. Soldiers may not mistrest POWs,

employ toxic weapons, attack undefended settlements or dwellings, violate family honor and integrity, or confiscate private property;

and they must treat non-combative innocents with civility.

Kuwait's Al-Ebraheem says Saddam has violated almost all of the above. He claims the Iraqi has laid waste to his Emirate: "He has

sent his bullies to take over our homes. He has raided our institutions and our treasures. He has also tortured our people, women and youth; that by itself shows the blood on his hands." And the Kuwaiti

says Saddam is not alone. Many of his aides may likewise be candidates for post war adjudica-tion. Saddam's cous-in is the governor of occupied Kuwait. and various Iraqi dip-lomats may be im-plicated, because the rules of war bind everyone, civilians in cluded, to appropriate behavior during hostilities.

Further, the rules spell out who may administer the justice. And the victims' rights here are virtually uncontested. A State Department officer says the United States would not get involved in a Persian Gulf war crimes tribunal, in all likelihood, and thinks the business would be left to the Arab allies, notably Kuwait.

## U.S. overlooking possible terrorists

WASHINGTON - U.S. law enforcement officials scrambling to stop terrorist attacks before they happen may have overlooked a hole in their lines of defense right here on American soil — student terrorists. Iraq's Saddam Hussein repeatedly hinted

that a clandestine war waged by terrorists would follow any attack by the United States on Iraq. Airports beefed up their security as did border inspectors.

But there is little that can be done about Saddam loyalists who are al-ready in the United States legally.
More than 5,000

lragis are currently in the United States on student vises. Not all Iraqi students are terrorists-in-theminding their own business and agonizing about the unwanted war, just as Americans are.

But if there was one tragi in the Unit-ed States on a stu-dent visa who had more than exams on

the mind, the Immigration and Naturalization Service would be hard pressed to find out about it. In many cases, the INS doesn't even know if the people here on student visas are really in school. Ever since the Iran hostage crisis of 1980, universities have been re-

crisis of 1980, universities have been required to submit quarterly reports on the status of their foreign students. But those reports are spotty, outdated and unreliable.

A high-level INS source told us in 1989 that the INS had tried to find Libyan students after the U.S. bombing of Libya, but "the system was so corrupted we couldn't use it."

When Iraq invaded Kuwait in August, the INS ordered a search of its computer data base looking for Iraqia living in the United States. The information from the search was apparently passed on to the FBI.

apparently passed on to the FBI.

But it probably didn't come close to covering the territory. "It's virtually impossible for us to track that many people. Each of us would have to follow a hundred students," INS spokesman Duke Austin told our reporter Paul Parkinson. Even if the INS and the FBI could find all of the Iraqia living in the United States, it's questionable whether they could, or should, do anything with that information. The American respect for the rights of the individual, even the foreign individual, runs deep. Americans get nervous about threats of terrorism, but they also get nervous when the FBI starts knocking on doors.

#### Recessionary effects said widespread

WASHINGTON - In every section of the country, Americans are feeling the effects of the recession as unemployment rises. unsold homes sit vacant and factories shut down production

That picture of broad-based economic weakness emerged in the latest nationwide survey of economic conditions done by the Federal Reserve's 12 regional banking districts.

"The level of economic activity appears to be declining in most districts." the Fed said in releasing the survey Wednesday. "The Persian Gulf situation is frequently cited as a key determinant of both current and future economic activity."

The bleak survey results, along with comments by Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan, bolstered financial markets Wednesday as investors voiced hope that the central bank will move soon to push interest rates lower in an effort to revive the lagging economy.

#### NASA plans daring telescope repairs

WASHINGTON — NASA is weighing a daring plan to fix the nearsighted Hubble Space Telescope in 1993 by fitting four instruments with pairs of mirrors the size of postage stamps.

The plan, worked out by a panel of engineers and astronomers, would require three six-hour spacewalks by a team of astronauts. They would replace the telescope's main camera and install a box the size of a telephone booth to carry and deploy the corrective mirrors for three other instruments.

The telescope, launched with great fanfare last April from the space shuttle Discovery, was designed to detect starlight that has traveled for billions of years and events that occurred close to the Big Bang believed to have created the universe.

Soon after the Hubble went into orbit, scientists discovered the main mirror was ground to the wrong prescription and that the telescope's view of the universe was blurred.



#### Tanks called out in fatal riots

BAMAKO. Mali - The government has deployed tanks in the streets of the capital after two days of unrest that it said left two people dead. Witnesses and a human rights' group said five

people were killed by soldiers.

The government in this North African nation also said Wednesday that 35 people were hurt. The Malian Association for Human Rights put the number of injured at more than 100.

#### Soviet troops seize warehouse

VILNIUS, U.S.S.R. - Soviet troops have seized Lithuania's central paper and dye warehouse, while the president of the rebellious republic is asking that soldiers be withdrawn from buildings taken in a Soviet crackdown.

The most recent Soviet takeover in the Lithuanian capital on Wednesday came despite a piedge a day earlier by President Mikhail S. Gorbachev to restore peace in the restive Baltic

One way to reduce the average annual cost to residents county officials are considering is to allow only one or two bags or cans of garbage to be collected under the base rate. Residents with more garbage would buy tags to be placed on those additional containers that would enable them to be collected. Any extra containers without a tag wouldn't be picked up, Cinder said.

Under the current nonmandatory program, residents can have up to four garbage containers picked up twice weekly for the monthly rate. Cinder said some haulers already offer a tag program. Under the mandatory county program, the tag charge would be set by the county along with the annual collection rate.

diligent recyclers and offer savings to the elderly or one- or two-person households that would generate less garbage than a family with children, Cinder said.

Even if larger houselholds put an extra bag or two out, the monthly cost may be lower than \$13.80, Cinder said.

Providing discounts to people who take their own garbage to the county dump or transfer station may prove more difficult, Cinder said. Those residents now haul their own garbage for \$2 a load, regardless of the amount, Cinder said. The selfhoulers will still be encouraged to recycle, a cost of \$2.15 per month. Offering those residents a special rate may be difficult to administer, he said.

Special rates for low-income residents might also be difficult. Cinder said. Proving those people are indigent is one problem, he said. Offering them monthly billing to reduce cost impacts become costly to do, driving up the monthly cost, he said.



TALLAHASSEE — Republican gains in voter registration make it time to abolish the second primary election in Florida, one of only 10 states that still hold runoffs.

Rep. James Hargrett, D-Tampa, and Sen. Rich Crotty, R-Orlando, plan to sponsor a bipartisan bill in the spring legislative session to drop the runoff.

"I believe this is a relic from the past, It's a

holdover from when Florida did not have a two-party system." Hargrett said. Secretary of State Jim Smith, also a Republican, supports the idea. Democratic Oov. Lawton Chiles has made campaign reform a top priority but hasn't tabeli' a firm stand on elimination of the

The measure would end the second primary, or runoff election, held between the primary and the November general election. The runoff, which costs some \$3 million every two years, is no longer needed because of big Republican voter registra-

tion gains. Hargrett said. The runoff is held between the two highest vote-getters whenever no candidate gets more than 50 percent of the vote in the first primary. Under Hargrett's bill, the party nominations would be won by the candidate who got the most votes, whether that person topped 50 percent or

House Speaker T.K. Wetherell, D-Daytona Beach, said this could be the year to eliminate the

"The only way you can shorten this process is you've got to eliminate the second primary," he said. "You've got Lawton way out front, for election reform. I don't know if it will shake out."

Black-political leaders, including the Rev. Jesse Jackson, have long criticized runoits as diluting the voting power of minorities. In Georgia, the U.S. Justice Department has filed a closelywatched lawsuit claiming that state's runoff deprives blacks of a chance to elect candidates of

"Runoffs do discriminate against blacks, I think that has been a historical fact," Smith said when the lawsuit was filed.

Florida voters took part in the October 1990 runoff, compared to 23 percent in 1988 and 24 percent in 1986.

"I see a real need out there to make elections cheaper and cleaner. We need to improve voter participation wherever we can," he said.

# Rehabilitation often helps stroke victims

my speech, suffered double vision and had a paralyzed right leg. Now 80 percent of my speech is back, and if someone holds my hand, I can walk some - even though I have problems with balance. Can you offer any advice?

DEAR READER: Thanks to your body's healing properties, your hard work and the efforts of your doctor, you seem to be recovering exceptionally well from your stroke. When a stroke occurs, a blood clot becomes wedged in an artery supplying nutrients to part of the brain, leading to sudden disruption of nerve function that causes weakness and/or difficulty speaking. In most cases, this is permanent: Function does not fully return, and patients are left with a handicap.

Nonetheless, through physical therapy and speech therapy, other healthy nerves and muscles can often be re-trained to compensate for the deficiencles: Strength, coordination and speech may return, although rarely to the same level that existed before the stroke.

DEAR DR. GOTT: At the age of 24, I'm having trouble with migraines. I've tried changing my diet and avoiding stress. A friend indicated that because I broke my nose when I was 11, this could be related. Since my gense of smell is also distorted. can there be a connection between the migraines and a possible buildup of scar tissue or

nose polyps?

DEAR READER: A nasal fracture 13 years ago, scar tissue and nasal polyps are implausible causes of your migraine head-aches; such headaches are due to circulatory imbalarices in the brain covering. Dietary restrictions and stress reduction are not particularly effective in preventing or treating migraines.

However, you might be helped

DEAR DR. GOTT: Two years by various medications, such as ago I had a stroke in which I lost propranolol. a medicine that prevents spasm of arteries in the brain. You should be examined by a neurologist, because headaches have causes other than migraine and you need a

When you respond to partner's takeout double over an opposing opening bid, it is normal to jump in a suit with 9 or 10 points, not as a forcing bid but only to tell partner that there may be a game if he has something extra for his takeout double. It is important for a defender to take note when this does not happen. In today's deal, South bid only one spade when North doubled. When North continued with one no-trump, theoretically showing 18 or 19 points, South mentioned his other suit. North bid two spades, and South, assuming that North had a better hand. went right to game. Declarer won the opening lead with the king of hearts and led the 10 of spades. West ducked. When another spade was led, West took the ace. Since South had

shown up with the heart king and (by inference) the spade queen, West correctly assumed that South could not also hold the ace of clubs. (He would then have jumped to two spades as his response to North's takeout double.) So West played king of clubs and a club, and got a ruff to set four spades. Declarer made it too easy for West. If declarer had won dummy's ace of hearts at trick one and then played king of spades. West might not have been able to read that his partner held the see of clubs. And what if South held the ace of clubs anyway and had made a terrible underbid originally? Then West had lost only an overtrick and never was going to set the hand.
