'71 Economy Pace 'Dropping' '72 Will Be 'Very Good Year'

WASHINGTON (AP) — With faint signs of a turnaround showing, the nation's economy is expected to pick up in 1972 after the fading months of 1971 still suffering with substantial slack, a new government report shows.

The Federal Reserve Board said Monday that industrial production advanced by 2.6 percent in September after dropping sharply in the two previous months.

At the same time, the pace of home building, one of the economy's strongest sectors, slackened after a strong August showing, the Commerce Department said.

Neither report excited administration economists. Although they welcomed a rise in industrial production, they said the strong production upsurge they seek has yet to take place.

President Nixon and his economic advisers have predicted the economy will put on a strong showing in the last three months of the year, leading the way to a "very good year" in 1972.

Industrial production rebounded in September primarily because of a recovery of output in the steel industry, the board said. But it added the steel industry is still slack ridden, with production of raw steel showing a decline in the first part of October.

Although the key industrial production index increased, it was still 6 percent below the high recorded in the middle of 1969. The index, however, was 3 percent higher than last November's low point, when the 1970 recession was at its deepest level.

The administration is hoping Nixon's new economic moves, including restoration of the investment tax credit, will spur output of the nation's factories, mines and utilities.

The board said production of consumer goods and business equipment increased in September while defense output declined.

Auto production remained at previous levels. The Commerce Department said housing starts in September reached an annual rate of 1,938 million units, seasonally adjusted, down from the August rate of 2,235 million units.

The administration said one reason for the drop was that housing starts may have been artificially high in August, reaching a level that was hard to maintain throughout the remainder of 1971.

But Dr. Harold Passer, assistant commerce secretary for economic affairs, said 1971 was "the best housing year in history," reaching, he said, the administration's goal of two million housing starts this year.

Teenage Smokers On The Increase

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government reports a slight increase in teen-age cigarette smokers at a time when the number of adults with the habit decreased sharply.

Compiling the latest figures, it estimates the number of smokers between 12 and 18 years of age at four million in January 1970, up one million in two years when the population for the group was less than a million.

The report makes no effort to explain the increase but analyzes the characteristics of the teen-agers also smoke. It says they are not regular smokers and have not become regular smokers and says:

"While there are many factors in the environment of a child that influence his taking up, or not taking up the smoking habit, the one that has by far the most influence is the smoking behavior of those around him."

The lowest level of smoking is found among teen-agers who live in households where both parents are present and neither smokes, and who have older brothers and sisters, none of whom smoke, the report says.

The report was prepared by the National Clearinghouse for Smoking and Health, a branch of the Health, Education and Welfare Department. It is based on surveys made in January 1968 and January 1970.

It estimates that in 1970, 18.3 percent of boys 12-18 were regular smokers, up from 14.7 percent in 1968. For girls the figure is 11.9 percent in 1970 and 8.4 percent in 1968.

Tampam, 24, Held In Askew Threat

TAMPA (AP) — A 24-year-old Tampa security guard was being held under \$25,000 bond in the Hillsborough County Jail today on charges he threatened bodily harm to Gov. Reubin Askew, a source in the Governor's office has confirmed.

Donald R. Bell was arrested at his Tampa home, said the Tallahassee source, after his residence was stalked out by agents of the Governor's office and the Florida Department of Law Enforcement.

The spokesman, who refused to be identified, said Bell was arrested last Thursday and charged with threatening bodily harm and extortion in a 14-line letter dated Oct. 13. The source said the letter, containing no grievances against Askew, was received in Tallahassee Oct. 14.

Police records indicated Bell worked as a guard for Advance Securities, Inc.

Askew traveled to Tampa three days after his office received the one-page, hand-written communique. The spokesman said the Governor had been fully briefed on the letter's contents before he went to Tampa but no charges were made in the Governor's schedule as a result of the threat.

The Tallahassee source thereby confirmed a report by the Tampa Tribune published in today's edition. The newspaper said the letter had been traced through a return address.

The Tribune also reported that about a half dozen such letters have been received since Askew took office last January.

Commissioners Endorse Customs Station Here

County commissioners passed a resolution supporting efforts to establish a U. S. customs station at Sanford Airport to serve foreign carrier flights to and from Central Florida.

Commissioner Sid Vihlen noted the inconvenience which would be caused to visitors to this area from abroad if there were no customs service here. There are U. S. Customs stations located at Jacksonville, Tampa, and Palm Beach and all in-60-m-in-g of out-going foreign flights must clear through one of these stations.

"Because of anticipated increases in air travel to and through the Sanford airport, it would seem expedient to establish a customs service here in Central Florida," said Vihlen.

In other action, the Commissioners agreed to pay one-sixth of the cost of modifying the traffic signal on Semoran Boulevard at Maitland Avenue, Altamonte Springs, provided it is allowed salvage rights to equipment and parts.

The City of Altamonte Springs has refused to share the cost of this modification. The County says it is the result of the construction of a Center by Knott on the north side of the intersection.

According to Altamonte Springs officials, the county and state have sole responsibility for traffic controls on all state roads, primary and secondary.

Commissioner Al Davis said, "I want to go on record as opposed to the county paying a share in the signal modification costs. I do not believe the County should subsidize private business."

Advance Payment Sought For Study

County Planner, David Farr, representing the East Central Florida Planning Council which includes Orange and Seminole County, presented a request for advance payment of \$2,500 for the U. S. Geologic Study.

The water problem is not just the only one of inconveniences for the residents of Lake Harney Acrettes as septic tanks at four of the seven homes have become large ponds with depths up to 10 feet. The road leading into the subdivision was platted and had to be accepted by the county but the county did not accept the roads into a maintenance program and they have turned into "wash-boards."
