TOKYO, August 15 (AP)—The disabled American liberty ship, Joseph Aspin, is wallowing in a heavy sea about 200 miles off Saigo on the Japanese island of Kyushu. The United States destroyer Goodrich is standing by but rescue attempts are being hampered by the rough waters. The destroyer is trying to take the liberty ship in tow, assisted by a Japanese tug. Florida Employees To Receive \$153,000 In Back Salaries

ATLANTA, Aug. 15 (AP)—The state of Florida led Georgia and South Carolina in payment of sub-standard wages during the past fiscal year. The Federal Wage and Hour Public Contracts Division reported that almost \$300,000 in back wages has been ordered for almost 10,000 employees in the three states. Florida led with \$153,000 for 4,253 employees. Georgia was second with \$100,000 for almost an even 4,000 employees. South Carolina was third with \$45,000 to be paid to 1,800 workers.

Let-Downs Plague From '76 To '46

NEW YORK—If present-day shortages, inflation threats and unrest are giving you a hangover after the glowing expectations nurtured in war years, you can reflect upon the let-downs which have recurrently beset the U. S. for a time after every preceding major conflict. When peace came in 1781, the victorious colonists faced a chaotic business depression and rampant political ill that dogged them for six years. Taxes were higher than they had ever been under British rule and there was very little money to pay them with. Foreign currency or state notes were used, and it had mostly come to rest in the pockets of a few. Poverty stalked the cities;

development of the finest race
horses the world has ever known.

Welcoming The Brides

Many communities these days have a chance to demon-
strate practical international goodwill to newly arrived
residents, the foreign-born brides of ex-GIs. They come
from France, Tunisia, New Zealand, China, England, Al-
giers, Ireland, Belgium, Norway, Iceland, Italy, Poland,
Australia. Some will experience great homesickness, but
the majority will adjust themselves to the country which
has always absorbed people of other lands.

In many cities and towns parties are being staged for
the brides to welcome them and give them an opportunity
to meet other young men from far away. Newspaper and
magazine pictures of these newcomers show them
a good looking lot, a fact that will make their neighbors'
reception of them all the more cordial.

American soldiers seem to have been pretty good
pickers. The brides' letters back home, reporting local
friendliness, will be a basis for round-the-world good
feeling for the United States as important in many ways
as the more formal conferences of official diplomats.

Wanting To Know

"Curiosity," they say, "killed a cat." The alleged

possible. Cats, in spite of all their cleverness, have fre-
quently been known to get themselves into unnecessary
trouble, apparently because they wanted to know some-
thing they were not quite sure about.

But all the curiosity of all the animals in human or

of human beings. If proof were needed, the enormously
difficult and expensive quest for knowledge of the be-
havior of an atomic bomb would surely settle the argu-
ment.

Man is the animal which, above all the other ani-
mals, WANTS TO KNOW. He is so eager to acquire
knowledge that scientists have named him "Homo Sapi-
ens" or "Man the Knower." Speaking in general, he al-
ways wants to find out what is going on near and far,
and to store the facts in his memory.

That is what has put him where he is in knowledge
and mental power, above the other animals. And the
tremendous quest for understanding about atomic energy,
perhaps the most wonderful of the instruments used by
man, is one of the most striking examples in all human
history.

Shaw At Ninety

The world's most interesting 90-year-old who re-
cently entered that select group on July 26 is G. B. Shaw,
playwright, novelist, essayist, Socialist, vegetarian and
utterer of opinions on all sorts of subjects, some of the
opinions being sound and all of them witty. So well has
Shaw blown his own trumpet that, with the death of
President Roosevelt, he became perhaps the only man
whose mere initials are familiar around the world. GBS
means one man and one man only.

How has Shaw attained this great age? This ques-
tion, asked of all oldsters, has probably been propounded
to Shaw. An explanation as likely as any to come from
the lips is the statement he authorized for the English
Who's Who: "Recreation: anything except sport."

How To Fry Chicken

Young chickens of any size may be fried. The usual frying size is 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 pounds. Chickens under 2 1/2 pounds are usually quartered for frying. Chickens over 2 1/2 pounds are disjointed and cut up to give 11 or 12 pieces. When cut up for frying so that each piece has its section of skin to prevent meat from drying.
1 Rub seasonings and flour into pieces. Put each part of chicken in a 1 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1/2 teaspoon salt, and 1 teaspoon paprika on 1 cup flour. Shake any left over flour on to pieces.
2 Heat enough fat in a heavy skillet to give a depth of about 1/2 inch, using any oil or fat. A drop of water should sizzle when temperature of fat is just hot enough.
3 Start each piece first, skin-side down, in hot oil. Fry for 10 to 15 minutes, depending on size of pieces. Cook to just as soon as it is a light golden-brown.
4 As soon as chicken begins to brown, about 10 minutes, reduce heat, and cook slowly until tender, or 20 to 30 minutes, depending on size of pieces. Cover tightly as soon as it is a light golden-brown.
5 Turn 2 or 3 times with spoons or fork and spoon to brown to cook evenly. Avoid piercing with fork.
6 Add 1 to 2 tablespoons water before covering, especially if pan cannot be covered tightly or if bird is heavier than 3 pound.
7 Uncover last 15 minutes to crisp skin if desired. If not, and pre-cooked, heart gizzard or neck may be floured and fried with the chicken the last 15 minutes.
8 Lift fried chicken to hot plate. Prepare gravy by mixing milk or cream with pan dripping.
To Test: Cut thickest part of any piece to the bone. The meat should cut easily and no pins

Barbecued Chickens

Barbecued Chickens
1 1/2 to 2 1/2 pound young chickens, cut in half necks, gizzards, hearts, 1 large onion, 1 large garlic, 1 1/2 teaspoon sugar, 1 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon paprika, salt, top 1/2 pound, 1/2 teaspoon black pepper, 1/2 teaspoon cayenne, 1 table spoon. Wash and dry chicken.
1 1/2 egg, tomato juice, 3/4 cup vinegar, 3/4 cup water, chicken livers, 1/2 pound mushrooms (optional).
Lay chicken skin-side down in shallow open pan. Add sliced onion, gizzard, hearts, and garlic. Pour in water to fill pan about 3/4 to 1 inch. Cook moderately hot over a low fire, or 1 hour, turning once. Chicken should be reduced about half.
Seasoning: 1/2 cup sugar, mustard, salt, pepper, garlic and cayenne in sequence. Add Worcestershire, tomato juice, vinegar and water. Heat to boiling and pour all sauce over chicken. Baste chicken with

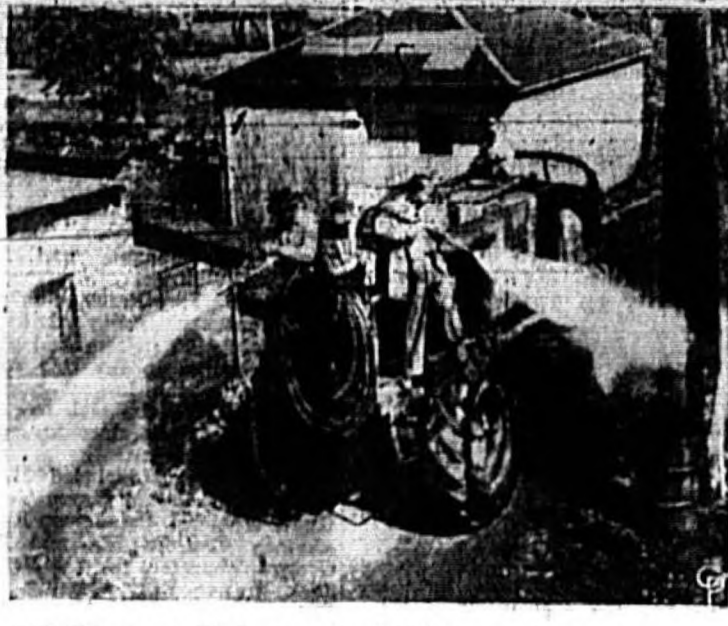
Arkansas University Has 17 Year Old Prof.

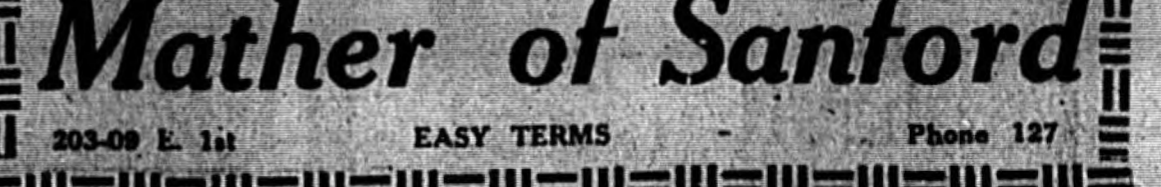
