## Florida Employees To Receive \$153,000 In Back Salaries

ATLANTA, Aug. 15.—(AP)—The state of Florida led Georgia and South Carolina in payment of sub-standard wages during the past fiscal year.

The Federal Wage and Hour Public Contracts Division reported that almost \$300,000 in back wages has been ordered for almost 10,000 employees in the three states.

Florida led with \$153,000 for 4,253 employees. Georgia was second with \$100,000 for almost an even 4,000 employees. South Carolina was third with \$45,000 to be paid to 1,300 workers.

## Jews In Holy Land Plan To Strike Sunday

### Action To Be Taken In Protest Of Deportation Of Immigrants To Cyprus

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16, (AP)—President Truman has announced that he may ask Congress to pass a special legislation permitting the entry of European refugees—including Jews—into the United States.

JERUSALEM, Aug. 16, (AP)—Sunday will be a big day in the Holy Land—not just from a religious standpoint—but because on Sunday the National Jewish Council has called for the start of a non-co-operation program.

This action will amount to a strike in protest against the deportation of Jews from Palestine to the Island of Cyprus. Britain has decided to hold firm in its policy to stop illegal immigration of Jews from Europe into Palestine. Consequently, British military forces throughout the Holy Land are doubly on the alert. They not only have the task of enforcing the immigration blockade but also they are faced with the threat of a general Jewish uprising in Palestine.

Word has been received from the Jewish city of Tel Aviv that approximately 200 illegal Jewish immigrants landed in that area during the night and disappeared before they could be apprehended. In Jerusalem, young Jewish men have been sentenced to death for a bombing raid several weeks ago on the Hatta railway shops. Four young Jewish women received life sentences on the same charges.

When the sentences were pronounced, the defendants sang the Jewish hymn of nationalism.

Palestine today appears to be waiting for the major developments expected Sunday when Jews are expected to begin a non-co-operation strike. Whether it will be violent, or in the form of Gandhi's non-resistance idea, remains to be seen.

## 15 Persons Killed As Result Of Riot Today In Calcutta

CALCUTTA, Aug. 16, (AP)—At least 15 persons were killed today and 250 injured in fighting between Moslems and Hindus in Calcutta. A British dispatch put the death toll at 25, but not confirmed.

The riots broke out during a Moslem League demonstration against the British plan for Indian independence.

The league—the second largest political party in India—called a nationwide strike for today. Shops and markets closed and business and industry halted. Some houses and cars which tried to operate, were stopped by Moslems.

The casualties resulted from fighting in various parts of the city despite the efforts of leaders of the Congress party, the Moslem League, and the Communist party to maintain order.

## Nationalist Troops Fight Off Red Attacks

PEKING, Aug. 16, (AP)—Chinese Nationalist troops say they have fought off nine large-scale Communist attacks against one of the few government outposts in the outer defense of Tungting. According to Chinese dispatches, the Communists threw their full strength into the assault, moving 20,000 troops from southwest of the besieged town to reinforce the attack.

The Catholic newspaper Social Welfare says 100,000 Communist troops have pushed westward to within ten miles of the capital of Chungking, after capturing the town of Lanfang.

### FINAL BITES

LONDON, Aug. 16, (AP)—Final rites were held today for the noted British author and historian, H. G. Wells, who died last Tuesday in London. In a brief obituary, novelist J. B. Priestley described Wells as a man whose word was light in a thousand dark places. Only a few relatives and friends attended the service. Wells' body was cremated.

SIX JAPS HANGED SINGAPORE, Aug. 16, (AP)—Six Japanese war criminals died today on the gallows of Changi Hill in Singapore. Among them were two Japanese officers who were convicted of murdering an American pilot at Saigon.

## U.S. Moves To Fight Against Higher Prices

### Justice Department Investigating Artificial Meat Shortage, Price Fixing

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16, (AP)—The Justice Department today stepped into the fight against higher prices. An investigation is being made of price fixing and artificial meat shortages—with an eye to anti-trust prosecution, if necessary.

A Justice Department official working on the study disclosed that since OPA meat controls were strengthened by Congress, the department has received many complaints of various illegal trade practices. A good many of them have come from within the industry, which shows that meat handlers know on the illicit operations and wish to have no part of them.

Besides the meat study, the department is looking into a large number of complaints of price fixing agreements on other items no longer controlled by the OPA. The Justice Department official declined to name these industries, but the items specifically exempted from price control along with meat are dairy products, fuel, soybeans and cottonseed.

The cruise in New England waters will be the first official vacation for Mr. Truman since he entered the White House.

LISBON, Portugal, Aug. 16, (AP)—Eight American men were steamed into Lisbon harbor yesterday. The fleet includes the giant aircraft carrier Franklin D. Roosevelt. It is taking a Mediterranean cruise which possibly may end with joint maneuvers with the British Navy.





**TO FRY CHICKEN**

Young chickens of any size may be fried. The usual frying site is  $\frac{1}{2}$  to  $\frac{3}{4}$  pounds. Chickens under  $\frac{2}{3}$  pounds are usually quartered for frying. Chickens over  $\frac{2}{3}$  pounds are disjointed and cut up to give 11 or 12 pieces. When cut up for frying see that each piece has its section of skin to prevent meat from drying.

**To Fry:**

1. Rub season salt flour into pieces. For each pound of chicken blend 1-2 teaspoon paprika,  $\frac{1}{2}$  teaspoon salt and 1 teaspoon paprika in  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup flour. Save any left over flour for gravy.

2. Heat enough fat in a heavy skillet to give a depth of about  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch, using an inverted fat. A drop of water should sizzle when temperature of fat is just hot enough.

3. Start meat pieces first, allowing less meaty pieces in between as chicken browns. Avoid crowding; use two skillets if necessary.

4. As soon as chicken begins to brown, about 10 minutes, reduce heat and cook slowly until tender, 30 to 60 minutes, depending on size of pieces. Cover tightly as soon as it is a light brown.

5. Turn 2 or 3 times with spoon or fork and spoon brown to cook evenly. Avoid piercing with fork.

6. Add 1 to 2 tablespoons water before covering, especially if pan is heavier than 3 pounds.

7. Uncover last 15 minutes to crisp skin, if desired. The fat and precooked heart, gizzard or neck may be basted and browned with the chicken the last 15 minutes.

8. Lift fried chicken to hot plate. Prepare gravy by mixing meat cream with pan drippings.

**To Test:** Cut thickest part of any piece to the bone. The meat should cut easily and no pins

Two  $\frac{1}{2}$  to  $\frac{3}{4}$  pounds young chickens, cut in half, necks, gizzards, hearts.

1 large onion

1 clove garlic

1 teaspoon sugar

1/2 teaspoon dry mustard

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon garlic salt (optional)

1/2 teaspoon black pepper

1/2 teaspoon cayenne

1/2 clove garlic, Worcester sauce

1/2 cup tomato juice

1/2 cup beer

3 1/2 cups water

1/2 pound mushrooms (optional)

Lay chicken skin-side down in shallow open pan. Add sliced onion, gizzard, hearts and garlic. Pour in water to fill pan about  $\frac{3}{4}$  to 1 inch. Add moderately hot beer to cover. Bring to boil, turn over and add water. Water should be reduced about half.

## Canal Hearing To Be Held Tomorrow By U.S. Engineers

Higgins Anticipates  
Large Attendance  
At Meeting To Be  
Held At Mayfair

United States engineers from the Jacksonville district will hold a preliminary hearing at 1:00 o'clock tomorrow afternoon at the Mayfair Inn to consider the matter of flood control, stabilization and navigation on the waters of the Upper St. Johns River. This program will include revival of a St. Johns River canal project to divert flood waters and for navigation.

The Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, representing the proponents of the proposed improvement, will serve a luncheon to those attending the meeting at 11:45 o'clock. This will be served in the dining room of the Mayfair Inn.

Edward Higgins, manager of the Chamber of Commerce, today states that he has had acknowledgement from people interested in this waterway and other waterway proponents throughout the state and expects a very representative crowd. The public is invited to attend the hearing starting at 1:00 o'clock in the Mayfair Inn.

Local interests are proposing that the government cut a 12 foot deep, sea level canal from Puzzle Lake on the St. Johns River with a lock at a point near Titusville, so that the canal will be available for navigation.

A proposal for a canal at this location was disapproved by the Engineers in 1939 on the ground that there was insufficient justification for the expenditure of funds. Since that time, however, Congress has passed laws that will allow the consideration of flood control and water stabilization as a contributing factor in the cost of this work. It is believed by local interests that the benefits to accrue from the combination of flood control, water stabilization and conservation, together with navigation, will justify the proposal.

The St. Johns River rises in the marshes around Lake Wilmington, commonly known as Blue Cypress, and flows north a distance of 297 miles to the ocean near Jacksonville.

The tremendous annual rainfall over this large area, concentrated for the most part during the summer, causes a rise of as much as 10 feet in the Puzzle Lake section of the St. Johns River Valley. This flood condition lasts approximately six months, after which the opposite conditions prevail and the water is drained off of the river. Then the water is exceedingly low for the same length of time.

It is the plan of the United States engineers to drain canals or overflows to take care of the excessive flood waters during the flood season, and also to provide locks, dams, or riffles at various points along the river so as to permit boats to hold the water up during the dry periods.

The St. Johns-Indian River canal is one of the canals proposed to carry off flood waters. Details of plans for the water control project will be worked out by the engineers and the operation of the plan will be under the supervision of the United States Government.

Another Critical Factor Looms In Chinese Civil War

PEIPING, Aug. 19. (AP)—There are hints today of another critical development in the civil war in China. A spokesman for the Communists declared that the armies of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek are planning an attack on Red headquarters at Tsinan. The purpose of the attack, the Communist spokesman asserted, would be to divert the Red offensive aimed at Tatung.

The Communist official went on to say that Chinese government leaders also are planning retaliatory attacks on the Red military base of Kalgan, and on the Communist stronghold of Changchun in Jehol province. Meanwhile Chinese newspapers said that the battle for Tatung had reached a climax, with Communist forces only three miles from that city.

## Death Toll In Calcutta May Be Over 3,000

Less Disorder Is Re-  
ported In Various  
Sections Of City;  
Hysteria Prevails

CALCUTTA, Aug. 19. (AP)—The city of Calcutta today resembles something out of a nightmare. It now is four days since the Moslems and the Hindus began their crazed rioting and although there is less disorder in some sections of the city, hysteria still prevails. Sporadic shooting continues. Every once in a while, wild cries ring through the streets. Perhaps as many as 3,000 corpses have been counted.

In addition, several thousand persons are wounded. The authorities are frightened by the possibility of a fearsome epidemic. Murder, pillaging, and looting have been rife during these four catastrophic days. The Calcutta Fire Department answered more than 400 alarms yesterday. Houses, factories, boats have been burned. There are all sorts of stories about sadistic crimes. Calcutta's stores still are closed and the food situation is getting worse. The already desperately hungry Indians can see fruit, vegetables and eggs rotting in the barricaded stores and on railroad platforms.

Refugees from every section of the city, the biggest in India, continue their frightened trek to rescue stations, police headquarters, and hospitals. They have so jammed these places that hundreds have been sleeping in hallways. As almost inevitably happens, the poorer sections of Calcutta have been the scenes of some of the worst atrocities. Police blotters show that hundreds of men, women, and children were butchered or burned to death in what is known as the Butcher or treatment areas.

The Moslem and Hindu differences over the British offer for Indian independence, hinted at Friday's Moslem demonstration, is the reason for the rioting. The Moslem League is against the British plan because it would give the Congress party — which is controlled by the Hindus — considerable control. The Moslem demands for Pakistan — or an independent Moslem state — were turned down by the British.

Greece objected to a statement in the preamble which stated that Bulgaria took an active part in the war against Germany. The Greek delegate asserted that Bulgaria switched sides in the last minute; that Bulgarian troops could have cut the retreat of the German armies but didn't begin to move until the end of August, 1944.

The only time Bulgarian troops were active, Bulgarian troops were active, was when they fought along with Germany. Spurring the delegate in his denunciation was Bulgaria's claim last week to the Greek territory of western Thrace.

Australia branded the Greek's remarks as being out of order while Britain and Russia said Bulgaria ought to assume her point of view before discussion started on the treaty article by article. The argument was enough to halt all actual discussion of the treaty.

## Tension Mounts As Reports Of Imminent Full Scale Offensive By Jews Circulate In Palestine

British Reported To Be Ready To Beat Down Any Uprising With 50,000 Troops

JERUSALEM, Aug. 19. (AP)—Reports of an imminent full-scale Jewish offensive continued to circulate in Palestine today as thoughtful Jewish leaders urged the people to exercise calm restraint. But tension remained high, with the British described as ready to beat down the rumored nation-wide rebellion with 50,000 troops.

This was the picture in the Holy Land after 21 hours of violence and rioting, capped by the explosion of two bombs in a British transport carrying illegal immigrants to Cyprus Island.

Looking back at the disturbance, however, moderate Jewish leaders said they believed a reasonable solution was possible.

The British, the world's most powerful colonial power, have been trying to impose their will on the Holy Land, but instead of taking over the country, that mass-hunting for power, big leader paid off, and on a sudden, thoughtless instant, the people, he added, are rejecting his leadership and turning away from violence. This crowd, he said, reflected the mood created over the death sentence imposed on 18 members of the Irgun Zvai Leumi, the underground army, in January.

A sharp warning against the execution was broadcast over the radio and the Jewish community leaders said that at the moment the terrorists were being held incommunicado as the military radio put it. He would be killed.

Predictions of a full scale Jewish uprising were made today in the British press. One paper (the London Daily Graphic) said the call to arms was expected to day here and the often over-zealous British police force would start some attacks on public buildings and police stations. The paper said that

the British were cracking British officials in Palestine.
