Deputy Dibona is watching you

The Seminole County Sheriff's B.A.T. Mobile will be in action tonight, and so will Deputy Mark Dibona... Dibona is the MVP of the county's

DUI patrol.

He's had a better year than Mark McGwire. Pitchers didn't fool McGwire too often. And drunks don't fool Mark Dibona.

Big Mac slammed 70 home runs. Deputy Dibona sent 80 to the slammer for DUIs - and his season isn't over.

Tonight, Dibona figures to add to his total.

He'll be one of 50 law enforcement officers from 10 agencies working what's known as the Mobile Saturation Patrol. Drunk drivers have a good chance of running into this force if they're out between the hours of 9:30 p.m. and 3:30 a.m.

Thanksgiving weekend, authorities say, can be the bloodiest of all weekends for accidents caused by drunks. For the past 10 years, the Sheriff's Office and those from each of the county's municipalities have made Friday after Thanksgiving their shopping day for DUIs.

"Individuals can make the decision if they want to drink - that's their business," said Chief Deputy Steve Harriett. "If they want to drink and drive, that becomes our business. Everyone is responsible. If you're going to drink, get a designated driver. This isn't the night you want to be driving drunk."

The Lake Mary Police Department Lt. Dave Guildford said, is coordinating tonight's operation. There is no checkpoint. No designated area where Mark Dibona and what's known as the Wolfpack may be lurking.

"We'll be everywhere," Guildford said. "No one's going to circle a known checkpoint."

Harriett said he'd be satisfied if not one DUI arrest is made tonight. From experience, he knows better. There are going to be arrests. There may be a parade of drunks brought to the B.A.T. Mobile at the county jail.

"I can't give away all the secrets to catching drunk drivers," Harriett said. "Some are pretty obvious. Going too fast. Going too slow. Going from lane to lane. Failing to signal when turning. Anything erratic."

The best way to avoid contact with Mark Dibona and the DUI posse tonight is to either stay at home or to drive as if your life and the lives of others depended on your sobriety. Don't mess with these guys. Be thankful you've been warned.

Bargain seekers begin to deck the halls of the malls

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Many who were so thankful Thursday arose early today to binge at the shopping mall. Retailers are counting on this frantic binge to continue until Christmas Day.

Some area store managers expected as many as 10,000 shoppers for today alone. Bargain seekers were lined up before daybreak to be the first through the doors. Wal-

Mart got the biggest jump, opening at 12:01 a.m. Most mall stores opened at 7 a.m.

"This is the day we can gauge how the season will be," said Mark Slonim, the manager at the JCPenney at Seminole Towne Center. "If we have a good day it will carry over. If it's a bad day, it won't be a good season."

In the first two hours today, Slonim said his store was jumping with business. Greeters gave the first 2,000

Suspects flee after pointing gun at manager

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS - A shopper became enraged, pointed a gun at a store manager, and fired it in the air Wednesday after getting followed to her car by employees of Babies R' Us, who suspected she had been shoplifting.

Nobody was hurt in the incident at the store at 708 W. State Road 436, which began inside with a confrontation between employees and four women, police said.

An employee recognized the four women as having previously shoplifted at the store. Employees followed the customers as they walked through the store, police said.

The women became aggravated and struck an employee in the face, Altamonte Springs Public Information Officer Greg Nelson said. Employees followed the women outside the store.

Nelson said the police should have been called to prevent the incident from escalating.

"They should have called us as soon as they had the suspicions," Nelson said. "That's hard to say from hindsight. They confront customers every day. I'm sure they don't expect a customer to pull out a gun. Still, we should have been called before they did call us."

Ex-bank employees charged with fraud

LAKE MARY - Police are investigating the theft of more than \$200,000 worth of property, with two former employees of First USA Bank in Lake Mary arrested for using inactive account numbers to create new credit cards for themselves and their friends, police said.

Amil Ahmed Bashir, age unknown, of Daytona Beach, and Crystal Jones, 21, of Altamonte Springs, are charged with multiple counts of credit-card fraud and grand theft.

Both suspects were booked into the John E. Folk Correctional Facility, with bail set at \$10,000.

Police said the cards were used to purchase cars, furni-

ture, vacations, cruises, computer equipment, and other items, police said. So far, police have recovered more than \$200,000 worth of property. This includes a car worth approximately \$30,000, another worth \$15,000, and approximately \$75,000 worth of computer equipment, Lake Mary Police Department Captain Sun Belfiore said.

Belfiore said he expects investigators will make more arrests in the case.

"The property is worth a lot more than \$200,000," Belfiore said. "We've recovered four cars. We're still actively working on the case. We expect to make at least a couple more arrests. I can't say who or when right now."

Police charge woman with embezzling

Office manager Judith Lynne Smith was charged with forging 128 business and personal checks from her Sanford employer, Canterbury Concepts Inc.

SANFORD - A Sanford woman was arrested Tuesday for embezzling more than \$83,000 from her employer, police said.

Judith Lynne Smith, 42, admitted to Sanford police she forged 128 business and personal checks from her employer. Smith is a former office manager at Canterbury Concepts Inc. at 511 Central Park Drive in Sanford.

Smith told police she was the store's office manager from June, 1993 until resigning on Nov. 16. She said she embezzled the money to pay bills, because she was in financial trouble, police said.

Smith is charged with 128 counts of uttering a forged instrument, one count of grand theft of property exceeding \$20,000 but less than \$100,000, and one count of scheming to defraud property valued in excess of \$50,000.

Smith bonded out of the John E. Folk correctional facility Wednesday for \$7,000.

Dick Holsboech, president of Canterbury Concepts, reported the embezzlement of more than \$83,000 to the police on Nov. 20 and turned over the 128 forged checks. He told investigator Tony Esoff that Smith was not authorized to sign for any of his accounts.

Holsboech said he never authorized Smith to sign his name to documents, or to pay her personal bills with company checking accounts.

Holsboech told Esoff he suspects there is an additional \$17,000 worth of forged checks that have not been recovered.

Banks are still researching Holsboech's accounts. Holsboech told Esoff, the police report said.

In the store's parking lot, one woman pulled a handgun out of a car and pointed it at a manager, Nelson said. She fired a shot into the air before the four women fled in two cars, police said.

Managers at Babies 'R Us would not comment.

On a separate yet related note, Nelson said Project Safe-car begins today for the Altamonte Springs Police Department, with enhanced patrols of

malls and shopping centers to protect customers from car thefts and robberies.

"We've been doing Project Safe-car for 12 years," Nelson said. "We drive through parking lots, rolling up windows and locking doors. We leave a note in the car stating what we found, and reminding people to keep the vehicle locked. The information officers record is given to me, and I track how many vehicles are left un-locked."

Record numbers to travel on roads

TAMPA - A record 33.6 million Americans are expected to travel 100 miles or more from home during the holiday weekend, according to AAA Auto Club South.

The volume is nearly two percent higher than the 33 million Americans who took a trip during Thanksgiving last year, officials said.

AAA Auto Club South estimates 27.7 million motorists plan to travel by automobile, light truck or recreational vehicle, up two percent over the 27.2 million motorists who took a trip last Thanksgiving.

Another 5.9 million will travel by airplane, train or bus, also a 2 percent increase from 5.8 million last year.

The Southeast will generate the greatest number of auto travelers with 7.2 million, followed by the West, 5.4 million; Midwest, 5.3 million; Great Lakes, 4.9 million; and Northeast, 4.9 million.

Sixty-three percent of holiday travelers expect to stay with family and friends, while another 23 percent plan to stay overnight at a hotel or motel. Other lodging plans include: cabin/condo, 4 percent; camper/trailer/RV/tent, three percent; other, one percent; and don't know or no overnight stay, six percent.

Cities and towns/rural areas top the list of destinations, with 35 percent of travelers going to each, other destinations include oceans/beaches, 11 percent; mountains, eight percent; lakes, six percent; state/national parks, two percent; theme/amusement parks, two percent; and other, one percent.

Avoid overspending during the holidays

The credit card issuers have announced plans to spend over \$150 million on advertising, special promotions and appeals this coming holiday season urging more credit card spending. Retailers and big ticket manufacturers (appliances, furniture, electronics and automobiles) will spend an additional \$250+ million urging consumers to apply for newly introduced credit cards and then spend extravagantly by using them.

According to the Wall Street Journal, 70 percent of Americans have no money left over after paying basic expenses every month. As food, energy, housing and other costs push higher, it makes it more difficult for consumers to keep up, much less get ahead. This could mean even more credit card buying than last year, both for basics and holiday gifts.

It seems to be especially hard for some people not to be an over-spender during the holidays because of an emotional need to express love, appreciation, friendship, etc. By employing better spending techniques, however, people can help eliminate overspending and keep from getting over-charged with plastic this holiday seas. Here are some useful spending tips and ideas for holiday shoppers:

1) Create a written plan for holiday spending and gift giving a month or two in advance. Include possible gifts, dollar amounts, and alternative choices.

2) Establish spending limits for gifts for each person on your list and start looking for bargains.

3) If it has been a challenging year financially, you need to shrink your holiday gift list. Begin by talking with those you exchange gifts with, perhaps suggesting not exchanging gifts or mutually observing much lower dollar-limits on gifts.

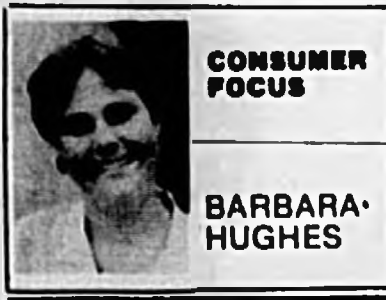
4) Separate shopping trips (when making a purchase) and resist taking cash, credit cards, or a checkbook on the shopping trips.

5) Wait for those sales! Increased food and energy costs this year could bite into holiday sales, so sales and clearances could come earlier than usual.

6) Watch the advertising and sale flyers for items you intend to purchase.

7) Ask retailers when the items you are interested in buying are coming on sale. Most retailers will reveal sale dates because they don't want you to shop their competition.

8) Sometimes shopping later

in the season (for smaller gifts, wrapping and accessories, etc.) will allow you to take advantage of clearance sales. It will often yield lower prices overall. If holiday sales are sluggish, discounts and clearance sales will appear earlier this season.

9) Liquidators, buying clubs, and factory outlet stores usually offer lower prices.

10) Bulk buying with other family members or friends can also yield savings.

11) Spend cash and avoid using credit cards. Charge cards tend to promote indiscriminate spending. Credit card users often say they had no idea how much they spent on the holidays until the credit card bills arrive in January of February of the next year.

12) WARNING: Credit cards have a message: SPEND! 13) Sometimes writing checks can get out of hand especially when you fail to record each check or calculate the balance after writing a check, often resulting in overspending.

14) Giving gifts to adults on New Year's Day is very special. You can really take advantage of all those after-Christmas sales.

15) Consider gifts that don't cost a lot of out-of-pocket money. Giving a card to a young family which entitles them to emergency baby-sitting time, for example, will result in savings for both families. Laundry or shirt-ironing for a bachelor, a bimonthly sigh-seeing outing or gardening, housecleaning, and car washes for grandparents are useful and often much needed gifts.

16) If considering a part-time job over the holidays, perhaps working for a department store or other major retailer, you could economize with an employee discount in addition to getting early information about upcoming sales.

17) At office parties and other holiday functions where you might be asked to provide a gift, suggest that instead of gifts, bring canned food for the homeless or disadvantaged.

18) Save more on holiday greeting cards and postage by sending only to those in your life you won't see over the holi-

days.
19) Make more of your gifts at home. A freshly baked loaf of bread, cookies, desserts, etc. are always appreciated. Also arts, crafts, needle-work, or a collage of photographs.

20) Instead of giving money, especially to younger children, give U.S. Savings Bonds. They cost one-half of the face value, will not be immediately spent, encourage savings, and, because they are interest bearing and tax free until redemption, the gifts keep on giving.

21) Gift wrapping of larger gifts and incidentals can be done cheaply. It is easy to economize; give a card with a photo of the larger gifts; use newspapers, magazines, grocery and shopping bags as gift wrap, or reusable gift boxes, etc.

Abby, I love my husband and am not contemplating divorce or anything like that, but I'm grossed out by his refusal to wear underwear.

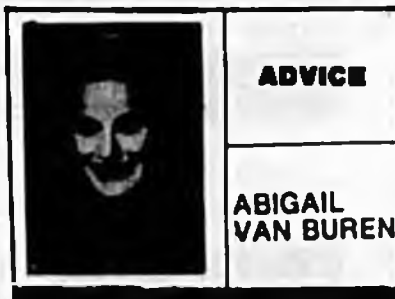

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Historical Society raises funds to restore gazebo at Lakeview Cemetery

SANFORD - At the recent meeting of the Sanford Historical Society, Alicia Clarke, curator of the Sanford Museum, presented the program entitled "Journeys to the Heart of Darkness: Henry Sanford and the Congo".

She prefaced her talk with the information that the museum has a world class collection of General Henry Sanford's papers; people from all over the world contact the Sanford Museum for information about him and also the people he came in contact with. For instance, there are over 100 letters written to General Sanford from African explorer, Henry Stanley.

General Sanford spent about 30 years in a diplomatic post in Belgium. When King Leopold II came to the throne, Sanford believed that he was a great humanitarian as was Leopold, so he helped him with his organization that would pursue making the Belgian Congo a free state. Many years later, he realized that the king was setting up a dictatorship.

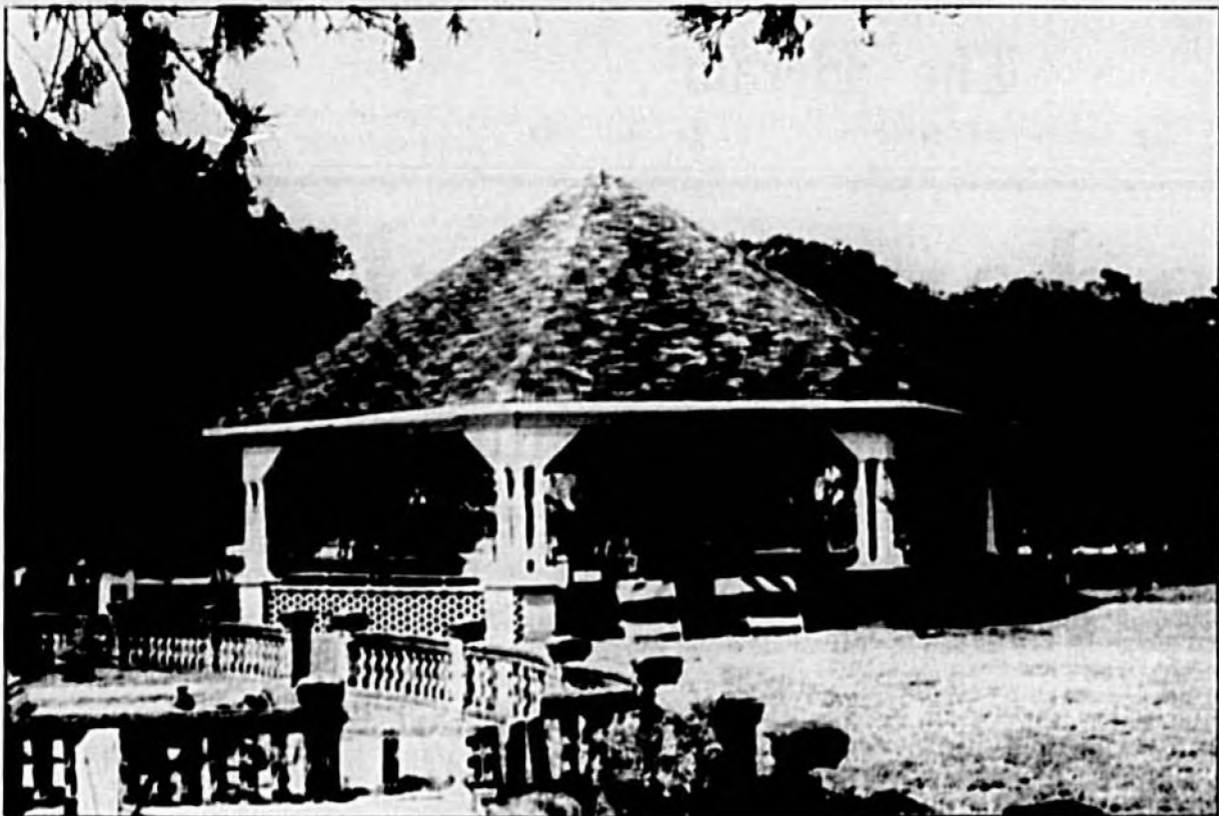
After founding the city of Sanford and losing money here, Sanford began looking for investment possibilities and one he pursued was investing in the ivory trade in the Congo. He formed the Sanford Exploring Expedition for this purpose. He also thought people here could be employed over there, not really realizing the primitive conditions and other hardships in the Congo.

He had the Florida, a riverboat, built in Europe to send to the Congo. Not knowing the terrain, he had it shipped there in heavy crates. Lt. Taunt, who was hired to meet the crates, had to spend 12 days dragging the crates over mountains to Stanley Pool. Later the boat was stolen by Henry Stanley.

General Sanford never went to the Congo himself, but in his dealings there he met or corresponded with several notable people connected with the Congo. Among these were Joseph Conrad whose book, Heart of Darkness, mentions Henry Sanford in his notes in the back.

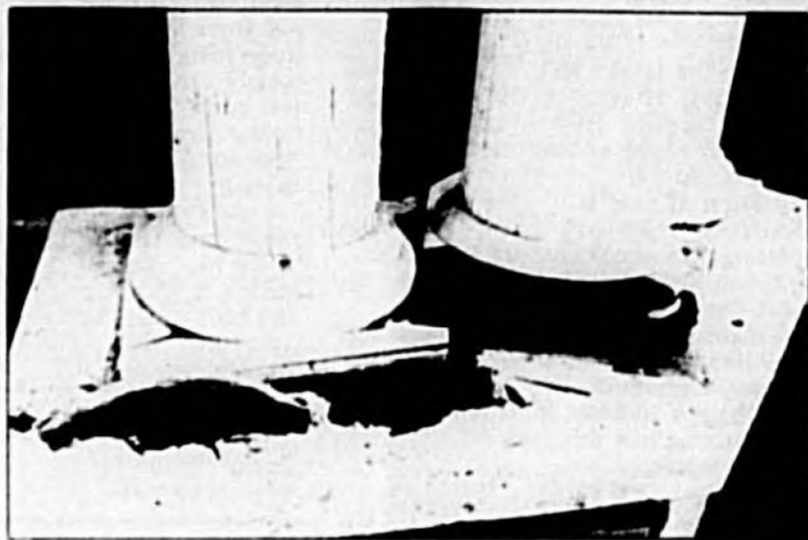
Others were Herbert Ward who later became a sculptor, Sir Roger Casement, who was knighted by the British, and William Hearshall who later came to Sanford and has a street named for him here.

Those donating to the cause will have their names inscribed on a plaque to be mounted on the restored gazebo.

The 1999 calendar sales are going well, but more members were encouraged to check them out to sell. These may also be purchased at the Sanford Mu-

seum or at Knights Shoe Store. The former zoo's Monkey Island is on the cover.

The Society's annual Holiday Reception will be held Thursday, Dec. 3 from 4:30 to 6:30 p.m. Members are encouraged to attend and to bring a friend to enjoy the fellowship, delicious refreshments and door prizes.

The Ixora Garden Club will decorate the Museum for Christmas this year and will also provide a Christmas tree which will be planted later. It was recalled that the Ixora Club did the landscaping for the original Museum building in 1957.

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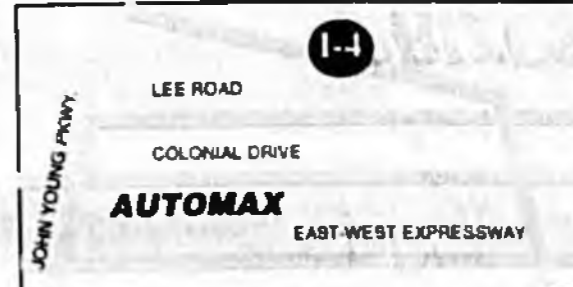

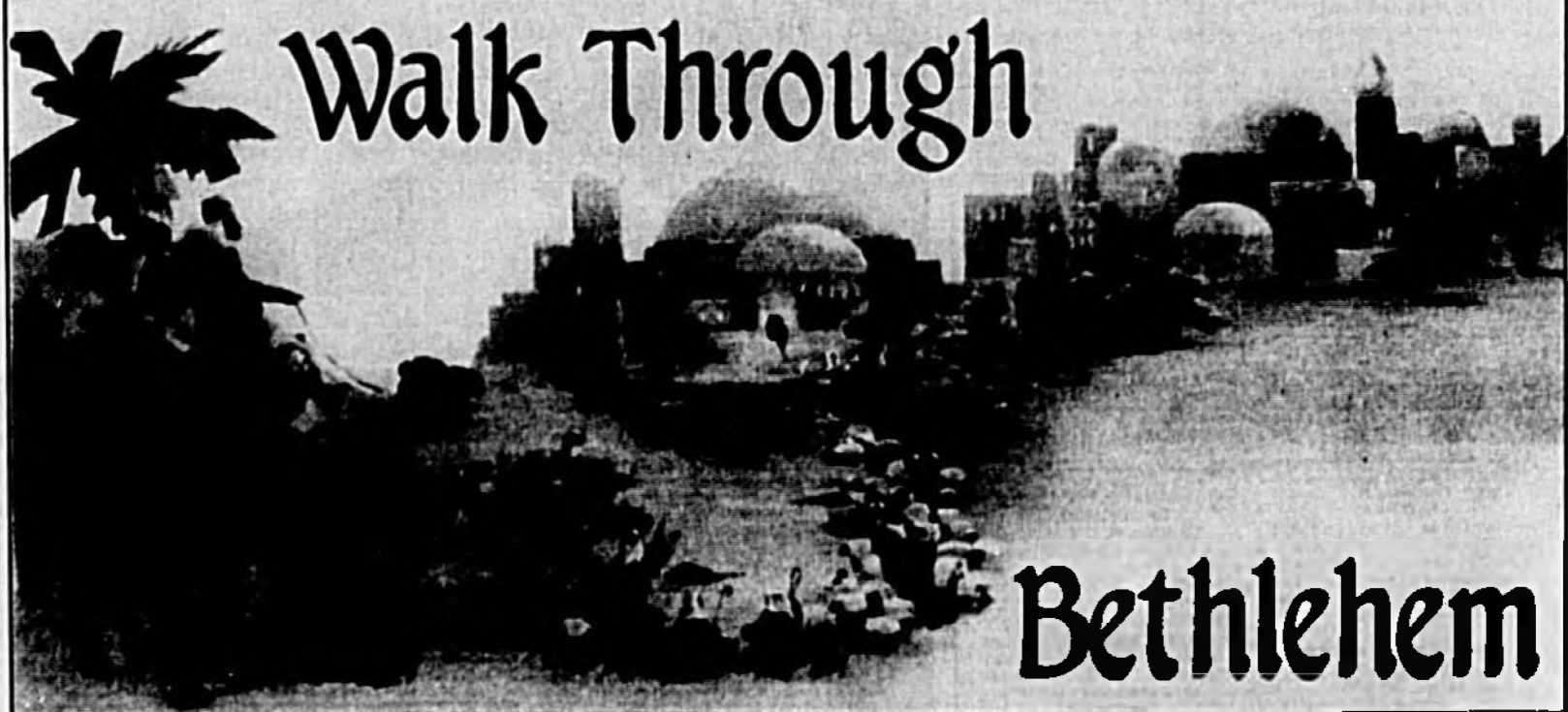

Longwood church recreates Jesus' birthplace

LONGWOOD - First Baptist Church of Longwood will be the sight for another year for "Walk Through Bethlehem." One may encounter the sights, sounds and customs of a time long ago and experience the time of Christ in a unique and special way.

In its fourth presentation, members of the church have also made available the tour in Spanish and for the hearing impaired. The cost is unbeatable at a free admission price.

According to Gerald Robison, publicity chairman for the church, there are over 300 cast members with 30 booths or scenes. Last year a synagogue was added.

The congregation is also excited about the fact that more than 150 new members were added to the church because of this event in 1996. There were 365 decisions to live for Jesus just after the tour two years ago. Last year's tour was also very successful for God's kingdom.

The attendance two years ago was more than 11,000 and last year the attendance was over that amount even with many rainy nights. Planners for the activity expect from 12,000 to 20,000 this year.

"We've increased the booths and scenes and added more guides," Robison said. "There are over 32 coordinators, one or

more for each booth. There are two to three people manning each booth. Those people are illustrating a way of life that would have been present at the time of Christ's birth. We've tried to make it as realistic as possible by our research. We don't allow people to wear glasses, wrist-watches or tennis shoes. Jake and Ruth Brain are the head coordinators and co-chaired the walk. Susan Reel was in charge of the staffing.

Other statistics and trivia surrounding the Walk Through Bethlehem were cited. The city covers over 20,000 and is over 250 feet long and 100 feet wide. The walk has been enlarged since last year. Over 12,000 square feet or two square yards of cloth covers the walls with over 300 four by four posts and 14,000 feet of two by two lumber used inside the city.

"We used 10,000 square feet of black plastic on the roof with palm fronds screwed down because everything must be secured and the city must be protected from the rain and other elements," Robison said. "Approximately 100 gallons of paint was used. Over 300 pounds of 25,000 pieces of paper in the form of flyers, brochures and tickets have been distributed.

"Comically at least 100 beards were grown by men for the tour and over 215 lunches for workers have been served while our worker, Norma, has made mil-

lions of revolutions back and forth with her golf cart delivering items needed."

Robison assured those interested in attending that 50 angels are standing guard to watch over the city. The Longwood Police Department has provided officers to handle traffic control and assist when needed.

Shepherds, Roman soldiers, a tax collector, census taker, salt seller, fish salesman, basket weaver, brass and metal workers, vegetable and fruit sales people, ones weaving and dyeing clothes and those selling animals are just some of the people one will encounter on their journey. An inn, carpentry shop and numerous other places of business will also be represented. Before departure one will experience three empty crosses, the stone rolled away from the tomb and the ascension of Jesus.

The Walk Through Bethlehem begins Dec. 4 from 6 to 9 p.m. It will also continue Dec. 5 from 2 to 9 p.m., Dec. 6 from 2 to 9 p.m., Dec. 11 from 6 to 9 p.m., Dec. 12 2 to 9 p.m., and Dec. 13, 2 to 9 p.m.

The church is located at 891 East State Road 434 in Longwood, one block west of U.S. Highway 17-92 and four miles east of Interstate-4.

This is my "religious custom" and my right to practice it is protected by the First Amendment. It's not necessary for me to suppress my beliefs in deference to those of different choices. That was never the intent of "embracing" diversity. If suppression is a requirement of being politically correct, than I choose to be incorrect.

If you and your family celebrate something other than Christmas—enjoy. As for me and my family, we intend to keep the "X" out of Christmas. Frosty, Rudolph and Santa can stay at the mall. The main character in our Christmas celebration is Jesus.

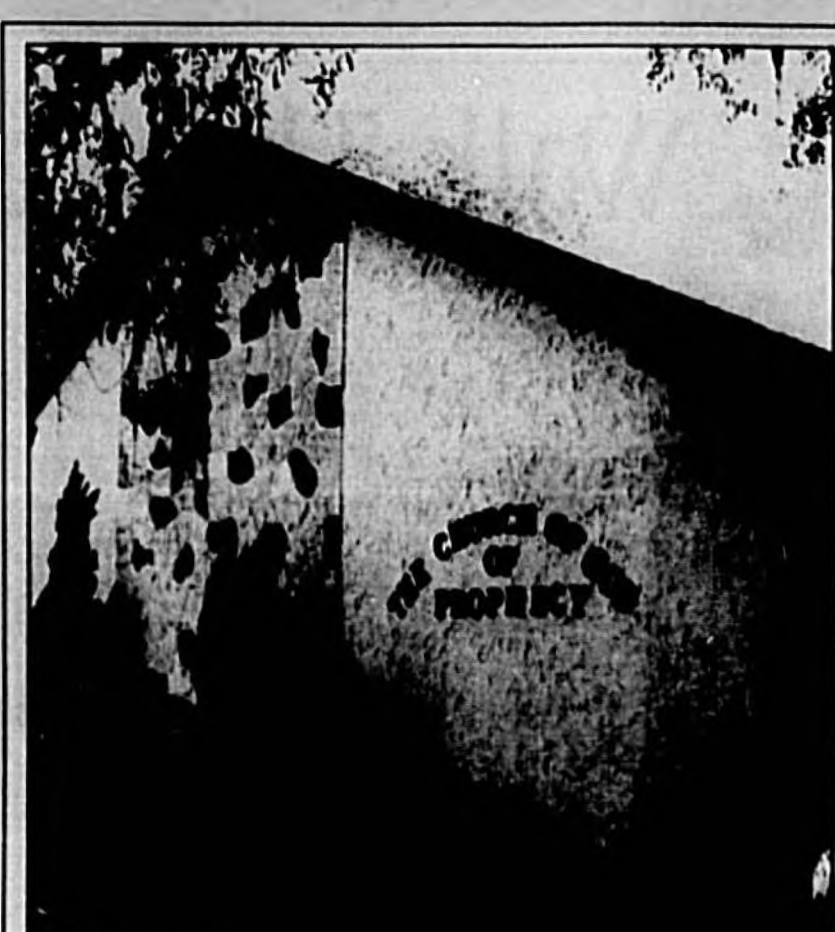

There are times when partner's bidding isn't perfect, getting your side to the wrong spot. And who is always the declarer? Right — you. Well, it is your chance to save the partnership. And one critical aspect of that is concentrating on the task at hand when the dummy appears. Don't sit there grinding your teeth, telling your partner in your mind — or, even worse, aloud, which keys in the opponents to the disaster in the making — what you think of his efforts. Try to find a way to make the contract you are in.

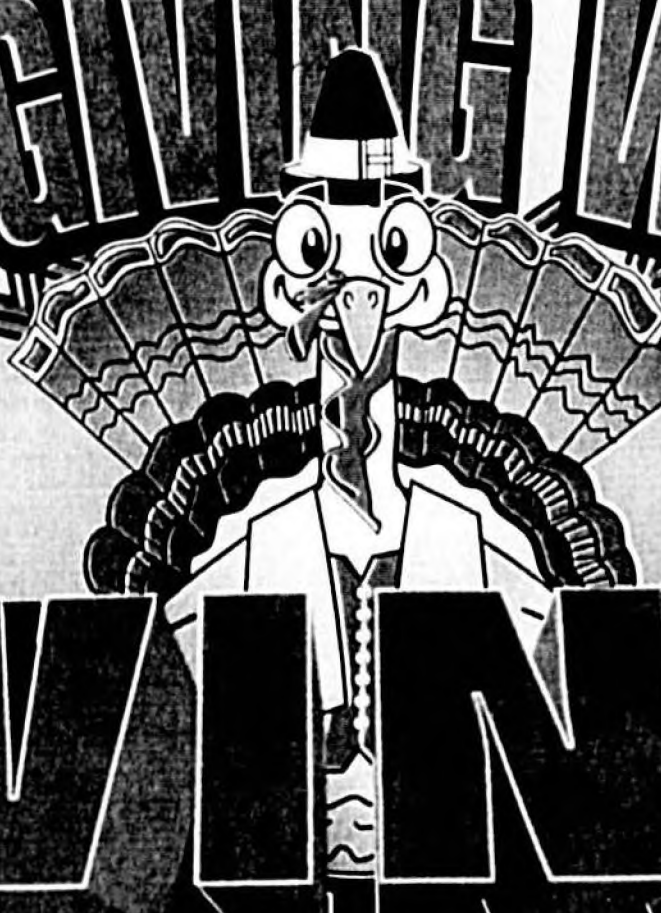

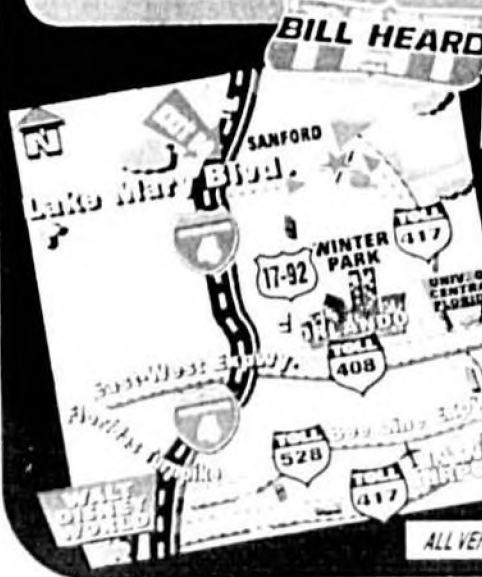
