### City Hall burglarized

SANFORD - City Hall was burglarized Monday but apparently nothing was taken said police this morning.

Police Lt. D.H. Whitmire said the break-in was

discovered at about 11:30 a.m. Monday by a Sanford Herald employee.

Whitmire said police found a pry-bar had been left in the first-floor lobby entrance, apparently to allow re-entry. Inside, police found doors leading to the second floor had apparently

been forced open with the pry-bar.

A K-9 search of the city offices revealed a toolbox had been left next to a safe. The toolbox contained a drill, hammers and wedges. The safe had not been opened, said Whitmire. Nothing else in the offices had apparently been disturbed.

'Apparently, they couldn't get in the safe and had left to get more equipment," said Whitmire. An investigation is continuing.

### 26 killed in state over holiday

TALLAHASSEE - A man trying to walk scross one of Miami's busiest highways was struck and killed by a passing car, bringing the number of people killed on Florida roads this Labor Day weekend to 26, authorities said

Carlos Rivillas, whose age and address were unknown, was killed when he was hit by a car on State Road 836 in Miami at 4:50 a.m. Sunday.

Six of the other 25 deaths were alcoholrelated, and 13 of those reported by 6 p.m. EDT involved people who were not wearing scat belts, Love said.

Four other pedestrians also were killed since the three-day holiday weekend began at 6 p.m. Friday. The holiday period was due to end at midnight Monday.

# Tax decrease aired

# Residents get first stab at county budget tonight

SANFORD - Seminole County residents will have their first stab at the county's proposed \$233.7 million budget proposal and property tax decrease tonight.

The county will hold the first of two hearings at 7 p.m. in the county commission chambers. The

final hearing will be held Sept. 29.

The county proposes to lower the present countywide tax rate of \$5.70 per \$1.000 of taxable property to about \$5.42. The reduction would save the owner of a \$100,000 home \$11 from the current tax bite of \$427. The owner of \$75,000 home would save about \$14 from the

Unincorporated residents will see a much

smaller reduction of their fire and road tax from \$2.87 per \$1,000 to \$2.88. Many unincorporated residents will see a reduction of less than \$1 on that portion of their tax bill.

The tax bill could be even lower for several thousand residents throughout the county because county property apparaisers deducted a depreciation amount from homes, said apparaisol

# Animal rescue efforts continue

SANFORD - A Humane Bocicty of Seminole County emergency animal care center near atorm-ravaged Homestead was nearly closed this weekend, but society director Diane Albers said she has received support to keep it open from the state and the U.S. Army.

Albers said south Dade County veterinarians have fought to close down the hospital and animal food distribution center set up Aug. 29 in a vacant Ponderosa Steakhouse restaurant. The cen-ter has been supplied with food and supplies donated primarily by Seminole County residents and animal care organizations.

# Political races are on in three cities

SANFORD - Political qualifying time begins tomorrow morning in Sanford. Qualifying is already underway in Lake Mary and Long-

Each of the three municipalities will have three city commission scats on the ballot. Lake Mary and Longwood will have their municipal elections during the general election on Nov. 3. Sanford holds its city elections on Dec. 8.

In Sanford, the qualifying period begins at the start of business at the Sanford City Hall, 8:30 a.m. Sept. 9. and concludes at noon, Nov. 3.

### Sanford

Three commission jobs will be on the ballot: Mayor and Commission seats for districts 1 and 2. Qualifying cost to run for Mayor is \$234. and for a Commission seat, \$195. The Mayor's annual salary is \$3,600 and Commissioners annual salary is \$3,000. Terms are for four years.

Mayor Bettye Smith has already announced she intends to seek re-election to her third term. Sanford businesswoman Sara Jacobson campaign for election as Mayor.

District 1 Comissioner Lon Howell said he plans to run for his second term. So far, only Sanford resident Bob Church has indicated he plans to seek election to represent that district.

District 3 Commissioner Bob Thomas plans to seek re-election. Thomas has already served two terms and would be seeking his

Sanford's political qualifying time ends at noon, Nov. 3.

Qualifying papers are to be filed at the office of the City Clerk, at the Sanford City Hall, 300 N. Park Ave.

### Lake Mary

Three Commission scats will also be on the Lake Mary Nov. 3 ballot this year. Mayor, and Commission scats for districts 1 and 3.

Filing fees in Lake Mary are \$97 for a Commission candidate and \$115 to run for Mayor. Commissioners carn \$4,800 per year. The Mayor's salary is \$6,000 per year. Terms are two years in length.

# County may prohibit late-night boating

SANFORD - Today, Seminole County commissioners are set to consider a new noise ordinance that will prohibit all late-night boating

on local rivers and lakes. The provision to prohibit boating between the hours of 11 p.m. and 6 a.m. was sought by County Com-missioner Jennifer Kelley. Violators of that and other provisions in the ordinance face fines up up to \$500 or a 60-day Jall term.

Kelley sought the boating pro-hibition in response to Lake Harney residents who have complained about airboats roaring up close to their homes in the early hours of the morning. The residents say the noise from the airboats wake them up and the airbonters shine lights in their bedrooms. Kelley said she sought only to limit late-night airboating, but was told by county attorneys she could not restrict one type of boat.

Kelley said some boaters may still

violate the ordinance if it's approved, but it should serve to curb the bothersome activity.

"It's a step," said Kelley. "It won't solve the problem. But it will help." Kelley suggested airboaters who are out in the early morning hours to gig frogs may hunt on the north side of the take in Volusia County where there are no homes.

Kelley said she has heard from three airboaters opposed to the

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### Chiles seeks more hurricane aid

TALLAHASSEE - Gov. Lawton Chiles headed to Washington today to lobby for federal spending of \$6.7 billion to \$9 billion for Hurricane Andrew recovery costs other sources won't reimburse, he said.

We know that total damages from the storm are probably going to be over \$20 billion, but some of that will be covered by

insurance and other means," Chiles said before departing.

As Chiles was heading north, President Bush was announcing in Washington that he will ask Congress for \$7.6 billion in emergency aid to clean up and rebuild from Andrew.

It was not immediately clear how that package would match with Chiles' list of needs.

In meetings with Florida's delegation and other congressional leaders. Chiles said he'll push for \$1.7 billion to \$2 billion in reimbursements from the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

That would repay some state expenses for things like debris removal, emergency security steps such as use of police and National Quard, and repairs to water and sewer systems and roads, he said.

Other federal funds he seeks include \$2 billion to \$3 billion for loans to damaged small businesses, \$2 billion to \$3 billion to redevelop the economy of the damaged area, and \$1 billion to rebuild Homestead Air Force Base, Chiles said.

He said the federal government also bears a 75 percent share of grants of up to \$11,500 to eligible individuals and families for damages and costs not covered by their insurance or other

assistance programs.

### Chiorine leak causes evacuation

GAINESVILLE — Chlorine gas activated by a leaky water pipe forced 500 students to evacuate from the University of Florida football stadium and a 12-block area of dorms and academic buildings Monday.

The leak in a pipe used to pump water into the campus pool turned a five-pound can of hypochlorite powder into gas at about 5 p.m., said Stuart Schwartz, a spokesman for Gainesville Fire Rescue.

Students including football players who had been practicing outside the stadium were allowed to return to their rooms about an hour later, Schwartz said.

One student who complained of shortness of breath was treated at a hospital and released, said campus police spokeswoman Angle Tipton.

### Controversial judge moves north

WEST PALM BEACH - Federal Judge Kenneth Ryskamp, both criticized for his civil rights record and praised as fair and conscientious, is moving to West Palm Beach from Miami to take on a growing caseload in Florida's Southern District.

Ryskamp arrives at a time when new case filings are flooding Palm Beach County and the Treasure Coast.

Ryskamp will preside over a criminal trial scheduled to begin Monday in West Palm Beach. He joins U.S. District Judge James Paine, who reduced his caseload after achieving senior

etatus in May.
"There has not been a statistically fair distribution of judges up here for some time." Paine said. "We really need help."
Ryskamp attracted national attention after President Bush nominated him for a seat on the 11th Circuit Court of Appeals last year. His rejection by the Senate Judiciary Committee marked the first time committee members had rejected one of Bush's judicial nominations.

### Fresh ground water being siphoned

TAMPA — In just a few decades, people who have developed homes, farms and industries along eastern Tampa Bay have used so much ground water that the supply for the future could soon become tainted, a hydrologist says.

For 10,000 years, millions of gallons of fresh water flowed daily through limestone caverns from the highlands of Polk County to Tampa Bay. The fresh water holds back the denser

salt water pushing to enter from under the sea.

But because so much fresh water has been pumped from s of southern Hillsborough, Manatec and northern Sarasota counties, not enough remains to stop the salty sort.

If pumping doesn't slow, in another 50 years the breach will become a huge hole, and the ages-old system will be completely reversed.

Instead of the 66 million gallons of fresh water flowing toward the bay, 77 million gallons of salt water will be creeping inland, tainting water supplies two to eight miles inland in parts of the three counties.

# Congressmen 'spend too much'

ST. PETERSBURG - A government watchdog agency on taxes says Florida's congressional delegation is doing better, but still wants to spend too much.

Only three of Florida's 19 members of the U.S. House, Republican Reps. Porter Goss of Sanibel. Andy Ireland of Holmes Beach and Cliff Steams of Ocala, have signed on to proposals that as a whole would save the federal government money, the non-partisan National Taxpayers Union reported.

NTU estimates the total projected cost on each member's proposals based on bills have sponsored or co-sponsored.

Goss' package of bills would save \$13 billion in federal spending, Stearns' \$1.1 billion and Ireland \$800 million, the NTU

Florida Democrata, in contrast, topped the other end of the report: Rep. Harry Johnston of West Palm Beach would bo spending by an estimated \$247.5 billion and Tampa Democrat Sam Gibbons' proposals would increase costs \$215.4 billion, the NTU estimated.

Goss said the Democrats' universal health care plans would "bankrupt the country." He said the NTU study gives a "very good indication" of who are the big spenders and who are the fiscal conservatives in Congress.

Overall, Florida's House delegation ranks 20th among all state delegations in the cost of their proposals, an improvement from last year's 16th-place showing, said NTU analyst Paul Hewitt. Ten Florida representatives naw their figure shrink this year.

Hewitt said many members of Congress across the country have taken steps this

year to reduce the price tag of their legislative agendas by sponsoring more cost-cutting measures or changing their

positions on expensive proposals. Still, Hewitt added, the urge to spend among most Congress members far out-

weighs their desire to cut back. "They have

Hewitt said the cost estimates are based on figures from sponsoring members' offices, the Congressional Budget Office, other government agencies, and from the texts of

# After Andrew: Long lines, packed tents

HOMESTEAD - The Army announced it was opening another tent city for refugees from Hurricane Andrew, even as relief officials claimed to have turned a corner from crisis to reconstruction.

Military officials said Monday they would open a tent city at the Miccosukee Indian Reservation on the fringe of the Everglades. The Miccosukee tribe's huts and trailers were badly damaged in the storm.

The existing tent cities filled up suddenly over the Labor Day weekend as authorities closed shelters in schools, which are being readied for the delayed beginning of the school year next week.

After the holiday weekend. which saw thousands of volunteers head to hurricane-ravaged sections of south Florida to help clean up, officials proclaimed a new phase in the massive storm relief effort.

"I'm not ready to declare victory." U.S. Transportation Secretary Andrew Card said. "but we've made dramatic progress and we're continuing to move forward. The community spirit is terrific.

Card, who is in charge of the federal relief effort, headed to Washington to brief President Bush and members of Congress about the situation in Florida and Louisians, as well as Guam. which was hit by Typhoon Omar





# Area doctors: White blood cell injections do wonders

ORLANDO - A medical therapy still not approved in the United States is being used in Florida by two Orlando doctors convinced that injections of white blood cells can fight off a host of diseases.

"Most doctors are afraid to try a treatment that's not recommended. They're afraid of being sued if the patient dies," Dr. Sol Klotz said. "But if the patient dies while on chemotherapy, then they can say: 'Well, it didn't work,' and, things being what they are, nobody will sue them for it."

"I am etill taking it, and I wouldn't dere change a thing." sald Joan Higgins, 59, a breast-cancer patient who moved to Orlando from Mississippi last year. She heard about transfer factor from her mother, one of Klotz's patients. in 1961.

"I took all of the conventional treatments - radiation. emotherapy," Higgins said.

Her Mississippi doctors found that cancer had spread throughout her lymphatic system. In 1983 she came to Orlando for her first course of transfer factor, using her husband's white blood cells.

### First black space woman faces launch

CAPE CANAVERAL - Mac Jemison, a doctor-turnedastronaut, believes she will be taking one small step for equality when she rockets into orbit aboard Endeavour.

Jemison, whose mission is scheduled to begin Saturday, will be the first black woman in space, an honor she accepts with some gulli feelings.

"I'm very aware of the fact that I'm not the first woman of color, the first African-American woman, who had the skills, the talent, the desire to be an astronaut. I know that I happen to be the first one that NASA selected, right now the only one," Jemison, 35, said.
Only three black Americans.

all men, have flown in space. The first was Guton Bluford Jr., on the eighth shuttle flight in

Of NASA's current 92 astronauts. Dve are black: four men and Jemison, who was chosen in 1987.

"In that sense, yeah, I want people to know," Jemison said, referring to her flight. "I don't want it to just be Lieutenant Uhura in 'Star Trek,' whom I watched all the time and I thought it was wonderful. ... I want people to know those things can be true and they're

Jemison met actress Nichelle Nichols, who portrayed Uhura, at a "Star Trek" convention a few years ago before Jemison was assigned to Endeavour's laboratory research mission.

During the weeklong flight, Jemison will be in charge of four female frogs that will be induced to ovulate: their eggs will be soaked with sperm to see how tadpoles develop in weightless-

She also will test the power of positive thinking, or bioleedback, in an effort to prevent space motion alckness.

Six others are assigned to the Spacelab mission, a joint venture between NASA and Japan's space agency. Among them are the first married couple in space and the first Japanese to fly on a

U.S. spaceship.
"With these few exceptions. it's your standard Spacelab crew." said mission manager

Aubray King.

Jemison views her presence on a personal level — "God, I get to go into space and that's something I've always wanted to do!" - and on a higher social plane.

"I have to look at it as an individual who's part of a society and that society has oftentimes told people who look like me that they can't succeed," she said in a recent interview.

"It's important not only for a little black girl growing up to know, yeah, you can become an astronaut because here's Mae emison. But it's importa older white males who sometimes make decisions on those careers of those little black

Three decades ago, in an inner-city neighborhood in Chicago. Jemison was one of those little black girls.

She remembers watching in awe as the Gemini astronauts. and then Apollo astronauts. sogred into space. All were white and all were male.

"I didn't care that there weren't any women because I just thought it was some silly male stuff that was going on. she said. "I really didn't care because I said I'm going to do this one way or the other."

Jemison won a scholarship to Stanford University, where she studied chemical engineering and African and Afro-American studies. She went on to medical school at Cornell University and, after receiving her degree in 1981, became a Peace Corps medical officer for Sierra Leone and Liberia.


She was working as a general practitioner and attending graduate engineering classes in Los Angeles when NASA tapped her in 1987 for Astronaut Group No.

Jemison, who speaks four languages, is trained in jazz and modern dance, and is single, has become NASA's most soughtafter astronaut for public speaking engagements.

She's not surprised. "In a time right now where there are a lot of questions about how races and women and various people interact with one another. I think it's an affirma-tion of the positive," she said.



A second man also faces charges to driving Duncan to the store the second time.



# Timelier OK

Government and phamaceutical industry negotiators have found what appears to be a creative way to break the logiam hindering timely approval of new drugs. At the same time the new method would ensure the continued vigilance of federal safety reviews.

The plan calls for drug companies to pay a variety of fees to the U.S. Food and Drug Administration for drug approval. Those fees. in turn, would be used to hire some 600 examiners to review new drug applications.

The additional staff would make it possible for the FDA to reduce the average time for processing new drug applications from 20 months to 12, and to cut the review time for critically important life-saving drugs from one year to six months

The notion of applying user fees to this important review process is eminently sensible. While no drug company is eager to pay more to have its products reviewed, the fees are peanuts compared to the tens of millions of dollars that the FDA estimates the companies lose each month because of delays in the approval process.

The companies surely would rather see the federal government cover the cost of the additional examiners. But the manufacturers know that with budget pressures as intense as they are, those positions are not likely to be funded soon. By ponying up to finance the needed staff, the companies can make sure that the work gets done more quickly.

The idea also makes sense from a public policy perspective. As much as they may gripe about the approval process, drug companies benefit from the FDA's exhaustive review. Studies can pick up potential dangers in new drugs and spare the companies possible liability headaches.

Up to now, drug manufacturers have not been charged for the review service. This move may encourage other federal agencies to pursue similar arrangements with the businesses they regulate.

One caveat: The arrangement must not compromise FDA's indenpendence. That they will pay fees should give pharmaceutical companies no special access to or influence on the approval process. Assuming that the agency's standards remain high, as FDA Commissioner David Kessier has pledged. this plan is an important step toward improving public access to life-saving drugs.

# Postmaster may perform a miracle

may be postmaster general. It has consumed six seemingly able men in just the last seven years. Only a masochist or a messiah would step into

Enter Marvin Runyon. After less than two months in Ben Franklin's old Job, he has undertaken the most ambitious restructuring in postal service history.

He promises to prune the service's executive ranks from 42 assistant or associate postmasters general to 24 vice presidents; to pare 30,000 middle- and lower-management positions; and to fold the postal service's 73 regional, divisional and sectional offices into three branches ... marketing and sales, customer service and processing distribution.

And, by the way, he plans to complete this massive overhaul in 90 days.

Yes, we've heard this before. Public officials are always promising to achieve this or that goal within so many days, months or years and almost always fail to meet the specified deadline.

But Runyon is not the usual public official. He's a proven reformer. In fact, he has already made good on one-third of his restructuring -- he has appointed his 24 veeps and dropped the 42 postmasters-in-waiting. Just like that. And he has more than 60 of his 90 days remaining. public sector incarnation, as head of the

Tennessee Valley Authority. When he took over the TVA, a quasi-public utility, it was a mess. It was always in the red. It had raised its rates 20 straight years by an average 10 percent a year.

'Carvin' Marvin," as he came to be not-so-affectionately known, slashed the employee rolls by 40 percent. Capital construction was suspended. A fleet of jeta was sold. All in all, these and other reforms enabled the utility to save \$500 million a year and spare its overloyed customers \$1.8 billion in slated rate increases

The letter carriers, postal clerks and others "at the bottom of the line who are actually reaching out to touch the customer have to go through so many levels right now to get a fluid decision on something

By eliminating several superfluous layers of management. Runyon expects to achieve a net savings of \$1.6 billion.

# Recycling industry moves on

What do baid tires, old sneakers, squishy softballs and bent bumpers have in common? They are all part of a growing stream of materials being recycled into new products.

But let's face it, we've all seen the reports that the stream is becoming a glut, and in some cases it's true. Recently a national news magazine reporter was calling around trying to find a warehouse stuffed with recycled newsprint that he could photograph to prove the point. Some communities have had to haul recycled and sorted waste off to landfills. A sense of jitters is developing about whether recycling has become too much of a good

Whenever any big new undertaking runs into snags, some people will caution to back off the project entirely. And recycling does represent a major shift in how we design products, the materials we put into them, and what we do with what's left over. Trimming away the excesses of a disposable society isn't a fad, it's a long-term pull to put the old-fashioned notion of "waste not, want not" into practice.

The supply revolution is well under way and the demand revolution is just beginning. is how Phil Bailey of the Buy Recycled Business Alliance sums up what's happening with recycling now. The supply revolution Bailey talks about is the enormous backing average citizens have given to the idea and the practice of recycling. Just three years ago there were 600 curbaide recycling programs in communities across the nation. Today there are nearly 4,000 serving some 15 million households and several thousand businesses. Poll after poll reaffirms the point that large majorities of American citizens support recycling.

increasing demand is where extra attention needs to be focused now: the job of making products and developing markets for recycled materials. While government initiatives can help create those markets, the private sector shows tremendous promise.

For example, hands down, the most successful recycling effort involves aluminum cans. Last year in the United States just over 62 percent of all aluminum beverage containers were recovered and reused. There's good reason for it. Recycling aluminum consumes 95 percent less energy than amelting new stocks of the metal. But it took the industry 20 years to reach its current level of recycling

The next big strides in expanded markets for recycled goods will probably come with paper. Just over half of all newspapers are already recovered for recycling. All told, about 35 percent of the nation's paper and cardboard are channeled into the recycling stream. Within the first five years of this decade, says the American Paper Institute, the industry will invest \$3 billion on expanded paper recycling capacity. A large chunk of that money is slated for 34 new or modernized plants now on the drawing boards or under construction to de-ink printed paper. As these facilities come on line, we can expect to see a narrowing of the gap between the supply and demand of recycled

paper. The same sort of thing is happening in other sectors of the economy. Three years ago a privately published national guide to recycled products listed 60 manufacturers offering 360 items for sale. The latest edition has been expanded to make room for 600 manufacturers offering 4,000 products to buyers

The Aqua Pore Co. in Phoenix is a good example of recycling industry growth. They make garden

hoses -- with two innovations. Their hose weeps out water to soak the ground, a method that cuts down on evaporation. And 65 percent of the material they use to make their product comes from old car tires. Over the last four years, the firm has quadrupled its work force to 100 employees. "And we anticipate doubling our business again in the next three years," says company spokeswoman Carrie Tillman.

In short, the underlying story is that small businesses and large industries are increasingly finding ways to capitalize on recycling's advantages. The whole idea is that in the long run recycling will produce high-quality goods at competitive prices with the added benefit of environmental efficiency. The transition won't always be smooth, nor should it be expected to occur overnight.

### Ten-year-old makes miraculous recovery from a rare disease healthy. TAMPA - Tampa doctors are confident they have successfully treated the first known survivor of a rare, deadly form of cancer. Physicians said 10-year-old Paul Seabrook of MacDill Air Force Base is making a full recovery from a cancer known as Burkitt's lymphoma.

Although it affects only two to three children per million in the United States, Burkitt's lymphoma is one of the fastest growing and deadly of all human cancers.

Doctors had a difficult time at first finding exactly where Paul's tumor was located. A large, malignant tumor had grown through Paul's heart, expanding from the right lung, through the heart muscle, inside the upper chambers of his heart, and into the left lung.

Because Burkitt's lymphoma normally occurs in the abdomen or jaw — not inside the lung or heart — Tampa oncologist Cameron Tebbi said the physicians needed "about a hundred" tests to determine the exact nature and location of the

Throughout medical literature, Tebbi says, only eight people in the world have been diagnosed with this tumor in their heart - and seven of those tumors weren't discovered until after the patients died. None survived.

"This is a very unusual case involving both chambers of the heart," says Ian Magrath, medical chief of the lymphoma biology section at NCI. "To see it actually involving heart muscle is very uncommon."

Paul's tumor responded to treatment in nearly record time after being diagnosed in December. Less than 72 hours after getting "custom-made chemotherapy," Paul's condition had improved. said Tebbi. Less than four months later, the tumor was completely gone. And his bones and

testes, where the cancer had metastasized, were

'This is one of the largest tumors of this kind I've ever seen, but the fact that it was in the heart makes it unique." says Tebbi, director of the cancer unit at St. Joseph's Children's Hospital "It's not relatively rare. It's very, very, very rare. But as quick as this tumor comes, that's how fast it can disappear with treatment sometimes."

Today, Paul continues to receive chemotherapy three days every three weeks. But only scar tissue remains. And Paul's prognosis, says Tebbi, is "excellent."

Paul was feeling occasional pain in his chest in October 1991, but it was late November before he showed dramatic symptoms. Physicians initially thought the boy had pneumonia. But medication did nothing to alleviate the pain, the stomach upset and the blood that came up when he

By Dec. 10, when Paul arrived at the emergency room, the tumor had filled more than half his lungs and a third of his heart, making it difficult for him to breathe. Tebbi says that without treatment. Paul would not have survived

The child was soon attended by a team of specialists including Tebbi; Renato Dubois, a pediatric oncologist; and Edward Eikman, a radiologist.

After a positron emission tomography (PET) scan to determine the metabolic difference between malignant and benign tumors, and blood clots. Eikman says surgeons decided an operation would be too risky so chemotherapy was started.

"I was surprised... at how fast Paul came around. Very surprised." says Eikman, who teaches radiology at the University of South Florida and the University of Florida. "I had never seen such a tumor before."

# Two teachers' strikes settled

Striking teachers reached tentative settlements with two small school districts in New Jersey and Rhode Island early today, but talks in Detroit to settle a walkout by 10,500 striking teachers ended in

In East St. Louis, Ill., public school teachers struck today after a 10-hour negotiating session over pay and other issues broke down, halting classes for more than 14,000 students two weeks after they began. No further talks were scheduled.

In Philadelphia, 20,000 teachers reached an agreement just before their contract expired

Monday night. Court-ordered talks between the Detroit Board of Education and striking teachers ended at 1 a.m. No further negotiations were scheduled. A mediator ordered an independent review of both sides' bargaining position.

Superintendent Deborah Mc-Griff said she hoped the teachers would return to work, saying the review could take up to 11/2 months. John Elliott, president of the Detroit Federation of Teachers, said it was unlikely teachers would return.

If the union resists, McGriff said she would ask district lawyers to seek a back-to-work order. The judge who ordered both sides to negotiate through the Labor Day weekend rejected a similar request last week.

The strike began Aug. 31. extending summer vacation for 168,000 students.

The Detroit teachers' union has asked for an 8 percent raise. The district offered no raise, but a 3 percent bonus for attending staff development workshops.

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# Campaign economics: Tradition

By JILL LAWRENCE AP Political Writer

WASHINGTON - President Bush is making traditional Republican promises of lower taxes and less government in trying to persuade voters he can revive an economy he admits has been dreary and anemic during his tenure

Democrat Bill Clinton is also relying on his party's customary economic prescriptions - an infusion of money into public works and education, a populist-flavored tax increase on the rich - in his drive to recapture the White House from 12 years of Republican rule.

The public mood reflects the country's economic indicators: sour. Voters are queasy about their futures and looking for a candidate with plans that inspire con-

"When people start looking at Clinton's price taga, they're going to find it a very worrisome proposition." said Joseph Duncan, chief economist for Dun & Bradstreet. "But they're also going to be very worried about the Bush economic record. It's terrible, the lowest growth in the postwar cra."

On the bottom line of Jobs, Clinton says his plan would create 8 million new ones. Bush promised 15 million in 1988 and has fallen about 14 million short. But the president isn't ceding that ground.

He contends Clinton's Job training tax. health plan and "irresponsible" defense cuts would cost 2.6 million jobs, "and we cannot have that."

Economists say there are fundamental problems with the way both Bush and Clinton propose to rekindle the fires of

economic growth.
"Neither plan deals with ... the concerns

that people have right now about keeping their jobs," said Murray Weldenbaum, who was chairman of the Council of Economic Advisers under Ronald Reagan.

"There are some huge gaps - for example, what's going to be paid for in what manner." said Duncan, who was head of budget statistics in the Nixon, Ford, Carter and Reagan administrations.

Bush is offering an unspecified across-the-board tax cut, a capital gains tax cut and other incentives for investment and consumer spending. He supports a balanced-budget amendment to the Constitution and wants to let people check off a box on their tax returns to channel 10 percent of the taxes toward reducing the \$400 billion

But Bush has also suggested major new spending. He recently proposed a \$10 billion jeb retraining program for workers. He'd give tax breaks to first-time homebuyers and families with children. He would also offer vouchers to help lower income families pay for health insurance and private-school

Clinton, the Arkansas governor, says his economic plan would halve the deficit in four years. But his top priority in a first term would be a \$220 billion investment in education, training, transportation, communication and environmental cleanup.

He also supports an extensive worker retraining program financed by 1.5 percent of the private-business payroll: college aid for all with repayment tied to future income or community service: tax breaks for families, and universal health coverage through public and phased-in employer

On the savings side. Clinton would cut defense spending \$100 billion over four years and raise \$150 billion from new taxes on wealthy Americans and foreign compa nies doing profitable business in the United States. He says he would cut 100,000 federal jobs by attrition and clamp a lid on Medicare and Medicaid costs.

Weidenbaum called Bush's checkoff box a gimmick and said a broad tax cut now would be premature. Still, he said, "I lean towards the Bush approach because it's business that creates new jobs. The Clinton program pays lip service to private enterprise, but it has an almost endless array of bigger or new government involvement."

Clinton has come under criticism for his growth and savings projections and other specifies in his plan. But others defend that as better than Bush's vague tax-cut and deficit reduction proposals.

You've got to look at the numbers in the Clinton program skeptically," said Stan Collender, director of federal budget policy for Price-Waterhouse, "But ... It seems to me that's a whole lot better than saving we'll pay for it somehow, which is what Bush says.

Last month Bush seemed to embrace a mid-session budget document that suggests restraints and cuts of more than \$200 billion in mandatory spending programs such as Medicare, Medicaid, welfare, food stamps, student losns, veterans benefits and child nutrition.

"It tells exactly and specifically how to get this budget deficit down." the president fold

The march by about 20,000 ANC supporters was to demand the ouster of Ciskel's military leader.

# Breck girls make comeback with new museum

SPRINGFIELD, Mass. - Olga Nelson Atkins never expected that being a Breck girl would bring her much popularity. especially a half-century after

the fact.
"My family didn't even make much of it. I guess they didn't want to spotl me," said Mrs. Atkins, now 93 and a retired hairdresser living in Springfield.

In fact, she said, little fuss was made over any of the women who posed for the early portraits used to advertise Breck hair care products. Her porcelain blonde profile was the first to appear in Ladies' Home Journal in 1946. after Breck moved from beauty parlor sales into the retail market.

The soft pastel portraits — which included those of Brooke Shields, Cybill Shepherd and Jaclyn Smith - haven't been used to entice shampoo buyers for nearly 15 years.

But the women have expertenced audden popularity since Dial Corp. executives unearthed and began displaying pictures of the mostly unknown beauties featured in one of the nation's longest-running advertising campaigns.

When Dial acquired the Breck label in late 1990, company officials were surprised to find they had acquired a warehouse room full of portraits, said Dial spokeswoman Nancy Dedera.

"They were a real mess." Dedera said. "They were still in the original boxes and all dirty and disheveled with the gold trim coming off the frames.

Dial Chairman John W. Teets was so taken with the 250 faces, painted from 1936 through 1978, that he directed his staff to

find out who the women were as well as ordering the portraits cleaned and displayed.

So far all but 20 have been identified, Dedera said. And the gallery, which opened in December at the company's Phoenix headquarters, has attracted more than 4,000 visitors.

The idea for Breck girls came from John H. Breck, who asked Springfield artist Charles Sheldon for a painting of a woman he could use to advertise his shampoo.

While later portraits by artist Ralph Williams featured better-known faces, many of the early models were clerks, es and secretaries from Springfield, where Breck started

selling his hair preparations in

Mrs. Atkins said being a Breck girl was no big deal at the time. "but since all the recent fuss. I've heard from a lot of people who knew me then.

Julie Gosselin Stout, a former Miss Springfield, was a college sophomore when she posed in 1959.

"It's kind of remote now," said Ms. Stout, who is assistant to the superintendent for elementary schools in Tempe, Ariz.

"But now I'm 53, and with the passage of time and all that means it's kind of a wonderful. serendipitous moment." she said. "The whole thing with the Breck girls has struck a great chord of nostalgia all across the country.

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# Courier crushes McEnroe

NEW YORK - John McEnroe needed no more convincing that his tennis career is over than the

cannonade of shots Jim Courier whizzed past him.

Courier convinced him at the U.S. Open on Monday with serves that nearly tore the racket out of McEnroe's hand, with groundstrokes he couldn't touch, with McEnroe with two brutal sets that exposed his lost skills at 33 and confirmed the strength and talent of the

22-year-old No. 1 player.

Courier, born in Sanford and now living in Dade City. convinced him, finally, in a tie-breaker that McEnroe had fought his hardest to reach, scrapping and screaming and summoning up all he had left, only to get blown out in a hurry. And when it ended, Courier going into the quarterfinals with a 6-2, 6-2, 7-8 (7-1) victory. McEnroe leaving a fourth-round loser, he knew as well as his 20,000 fans in the stadium that this might be his last match here.

"Oh, definitely," said McEnroe, who won the last of his four Open titles in 1964. "This is a pretty clear indication that Jim' has outplayed me, and that the top guys are clearly a step shead of me.

The bottom line is just that I am not as good as the top players. I am a step below the top players. If they are on top of the game, and I am on top of the game, it appears that I come up short."

He is at the stage, he said, where he can't beat Courier, Andre Agassi, Pete Sampras and several other top young players when they're playing well. For McEnroe, a perfectionist who ruled tennis as No. 1 from 1981 through 1984, there is no joy in being anything

Courier, winner of the Australian and French opens and a finalist here last year, goes into the quarterlinals against Agassi, a 6-4, 6-3, 6-2 victor over clay specialist

It was a tortuous end for the tormented genius of tennia, his popular shots no match for Courier's heavy artillery, his rage in the final set reduced to a pathetic tirade against a courtaide photographer.

Courier took target practice at McEnroe, pinning him on the baseline, forcing him to dash side to side and drawing groams and gasps as he lunged in vain after

hard, deep shots. McEnroe's magic moments were rare - the occasional leaping overhead, the few drop volleys, the odd ace — and that deepened his conviction to quit.

"I don't need any sympathy. I feel like I am very happy with my career. It is just one of those things. You've got to decide sooner or later. I suspect enough is enough.

Courier wasn't so eager to push McEnroe into retirement.

"We'll all miss him," Courier said. "There'll be other big players, but not another John. Don't get me wrong. I'm not writing him off. I hope he keeps playing. He's still got a lot of tennis left in him. On any given day, John can beat anybody."

In this, his final Open as a full-time player, even McEnroe's famous temper tantrums were subdued for a while. He drifted listlessly through a thrashing in the first two sets, barely complaining, and got really upset only when he started to come back in the third set.

# Owners get their way: Vincent retires

NEW YORK - After a summer of battling major league owners. Fav Vincent decided he was no longer

'in the best interests of baseball." Vincent, who had promised to fight owners all the way to the Supreme Court, resigned on Monday, four days after an 18-9 no-confidence vote.

"I've concluded that resignation not litigation — should be my final act as commissioner 'in the best interests of baseball,'" Vincent wrote in a three-page letter to owners that he made public.

Thus ended a three-month public struggle between Vincent and rs disenchanted with various decisions made during his 1,091-day term, the second-shortest among the eight commissioners. Vincent, 54, talked with President Bush by telephone before announc-

ing his decision.
"I thought hard about it over the weekend." Vincent said from his Cape Cod vacation home in Harwich Port. Mass. "I consulted with good friends and got lots of advice."

The commissioner was forced out by owners angry at his refusal to relinquish the commissioner's "best interests" power on collective bargaining, his unilateral order to realign the National League and his stance against superstations.

The group was led by Jerry Reinsdorf of the Chicago White Sox. Bud Belig of the Milwaukee Brewers. Stanton Cook of the Chicago Cube and Peter O'Malley of the Los Angeles Dodgers.



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

The winners of the Women's Pairs at the Pan American Championships, held in Corpus Christi last June, were Juanita Chambers and Marinesa Letizia. Both have won many national titles, and Chambers has gained two world championships. They scored more than 80 percent of the matchpoints on today's deal from the final.

The three-club rebid by

Chambers, South, showed game interest and asked North to go to four hearts with good clubs. Letizia's actual clubs were not great, but she knew her partner would squeeze the maximum number of tricks from the cards.

The play began: diamond king ducked, diamond queen to heart to the 10 and jack, spade to the ace and the diamond nine ruffed with dummy's heart nine.

Now Chambers knew East held the club ace; otherwise West would have had enough points to open the bidding.

Declarer ruffed a spade in

hand, bringing down East's queen, and led the diamond eight. West ruffed with the heart queen, hoping to promote a trump trick. (It doesn't help to discard the spade 10.) After overruffing with dummy's heart ace. Chambers led the spade jack, ruffed and overruffed.

South cashed the heart king, her ninth trick, reducing everyone to three clubs. If East had the A-Q, a club to the king would win. But Chambers read the position perfectly. She led her club eight, forcing West to cover with the 10, which she ducked in the dummy. When West returned a low club, declarer played dummy's six and made her contract.
