CAR SHORTAGE NOT SERIOUS SAYS SHIPPERS

Assurance that the growers and shippers of this section of the state will have the full cooperation of the railroads in handling the fruit crop this year is the basis of the serious shortage in refrigerator cars, was given at the conference held in Frazer Hall here yesterday morning. It was suggested that ventilator cars be used in shipments to all markets outside of the freezing zones and the shippers agreed to adopt that method. S. J. Sligh, a local shipper president of the section, said he is trying to get a car after the next big fruit program across. HALL MILLS MURDER MYSTERY TAKES A SENSATIONAL TURN

NEW BRUNSWICK, Oct. 21.—Developments in the Hall Mills murder investigation reached a feverish state of expectancy tonight based primarily on unconfirmed reports that the grand jury of Somerset county had returned an indictment today after Prosecutor Beckman had appeared before the body.

Neither Mr. Beckman nor any other court official at the county seat in Somerset can be induced to give the slightest enlightenment on the puzzling attitude of all concerned in the inquiry. Responsibility for the next move, which is expected to be of a sensational character, was said now to be squarely up to prosecutor Beckman, who is moving cautiously in his apparent desire to be sure of his ground.

The home of Mrs. Frances Stevens Hall, widow of the slain rector, is vigilantly guarded by state troopers and all attempts to communicate with the house by telephone have been unsuccessful.

On the heels of unconfirmed reports that the grand jury of Somerset county had today returned an indictment in the mystery, the investigation was given a sensational twist tonight when it was officially learned that an eye witness to the double shooting, a woman of reputable character in New Brunswick, had been discovered.

The only handicap regarding the prosecutor in bring the situation to a climax was said to be the problem of positive identification by the newly found witness, as more than one person is said to be involved in this crime.

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BANK STOCKS

BABSON SEES BRANCH BANKS

WELLESLEY HILLS, Mass., Oct. 21. There has been much discussion regarding branch banks at the annual convention of the American Bankers Association which was held last week in New York.

Owing to the controversy which this discussion has developed, Roger W. Babson was today interviewed regarding the probable outcome.

"Of course the discussion is the natural outgrowth of the establishment of the Federal Reserve Banks. Before the days of the Federal Reserve system," says Mr. Babson, "a branch bank organization practically existed, altho it was an unconscious and invisible organization. For instance, the small bank in Indiana took orders from its correspondent bank in Indianapolis, and the Indianapolis bank took its orders from a still bigger bank in New York.

The heads of a few of the New York banks would hold a conference at the home of the late J. Pierpont Morgan or at the home of Mr. Baker of the First National Bank and decide upon a policy. This policy they would pass along to the large banks of Boston, Chicago, Philadelphia, Indianapolis, St. Louis, New Orleans, and other large cities.

The banks in these large cities would in turn pass the same policy on to the small banks in their districts. There were no contracts or stock control existing between the banks, but there was an invisible control which was very powerful. With the organization of the Federal Reserve Banks, the clearance of checks at par, and the legislation against interlocking directorates, this control was given a tremendous impetus. No longer is it much less than for a country bank to keep a deposit with the large city bank.

Thus there has been a gradual change from the old system of the country banks from the city banks. The city banks have become more numerous in New York, and the country banks have become more numerous in the large cities. As a result, the money rates were high and the country banks were in a position to do business with the large city banks.

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that the present tendency of eliminating the small farmer and substituting the renter in place of the owner is not for the good of the country. The development of chain store systems which are slowly crowding out the individual retailer is not good for the country.

"One Christmas Henry Ford sent me an autographed photograph on which he wrote these words: 'Eliminate absentee ownership and industrial problems will solve themselves.' He is correct in that absentee ownership is at present difficult with our industrial organizations. As the chain store grows, a similar difficulty will develop which we do not now have with our individual retail system, and as a system of branch banks grows, there will be that same difficulty with our banking system. Yet I believe these changes are inevitable. Branch banks will be established throughout the country, and congress will enact such legislation as is needed to make this possible."

Mr. Babson was then asked what the effect of this would be on bank stocks and he replied that it should be a benefit to bank stocks. There are enough banks in the country districts at the present time. Hence, the city banks will be wise enough not to start new ones to serve as their branches. Instead the city banks will buy control of the better country banks. This will develop a new and active market for country bank stocks.

Small banks in growing communities will be in special demand. Their stocks will surely sell higher. At the present time most bank stocks sell on "book value" without any consideration of the value of "good will." As soon as city banks bid against one another for the country banks, the "good will" feature will at once be of value. With banks of small capital stock, this will at once become a valuable asset.

Banks which have a small capital stock and banks which have a virtual monopoly of the banking interests in a community, will be in special demand. A community which has four banks, one of these four banks purchased by the four big city banks so that one of the four big city banks will have a branch in the smaller city. When one of these is only one bank in the community, the four big city banks will compete and bid against one another for the stock of this big bank. The stock of many of these banks, which today can be purchased at \$200 to \$300 per share, may later be paid for at \$1000 to \$1500 per share.

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and county taxes. This fear is unfounded. The city of Daytona has a different set of valuations than those used by the county tax assessor and the city of DeLand has a different set of valuations. These are not taken by the county assessor as a basis for his books, and neither will New Smyrna's valuations be used for this purpose. The county assessor, in a statement to the city commission, says he has his own means of determining valuations and will continue to use the method used in the past, regardless of valuations established by the city of New Smyrna. That banishes the fear.

A city's credit and standing with bond buyers and other financiers is established by its assessed valuations. Increasing the valuations increases this credit and financial standing. Listing property at full valuation naturally increases the totals for the city, and accordingly increases the city's credit and financial standing.

Listing property at full valuation does not and can not increase the amount of taxes paid by the individual owners, except, perhaps, in cases of inequalities which have existed in the past, and which will thus be regulated. Taking the county figures, the total valuations for the city of New Smyrna last year was a little less than \$1,000,000, and the city's valuations were set at \$2 to raise the necessary \$42,000 for running expenses of the city, paying interest and principal on bonds. The total for this year at full valuations, is in the neighborhood of \$5,000,000, or five times the figures established by the county assessor. The same \$42,000 can be paid this year by the levying of 10 mills, or one-fifth the millage rate for last year, and the individual owner will be paying the same amount of taxes, except in cases where inequalities have thus been regulated.

Therefore, listing property at full valuation does not increase taxes, but it does establish an absolutely fair basis for levying taxes, and it greatly increases the city's credit and financial standing. That the city commission's backing of the people of New Smyrna in this move is shown by the fact that the board of trade at a meeting held last winter passed a resolution requesting the city commission to take this forward step and assess all property within the city limits at full valuation, as a move toward increasing the city's financial standing and making it a more attractive place for investing home-seekers. —New Smyrna News.

French Plan For Solution German Financial State

(By The Associated Press) PARIS, Oct. 21.—Complete and rigid control of all German finances, power to veto expenditures and regulate taxation, and authority to dictate the arrangement of the budgets of the various German states are among the chief proposals contained in the plan of the French government for a solution of Germany's financial difficulties and for placing that country in a position to meet her reparations payments.

The plan was submitted to the reparations commission last night by Louis Barthou, the French representative on the commission, and discussion of the project will begin tomorrow. Although not mentioned in the plan, the commission of experts will consider the question of inter- Allied debts.

The plan, in effect, is a reply to the British reparations project recently placed before the commission by Lord Rothermere. It differs from the British plan in that it provides for a gradual reduction of the amount of reparations to be paid by Germany, and for a gradual increase of the amount of reparations to be received by the Allies.

The proposition would gradually put Germany on a gold basis, beginning with an issue of gold treasury securities. M. Barthou would have Germany pay her outstanding obligations in paper currency, and he calculates that then Germany's paper circulation would be 510,000,000,000 marks, which at the present rate of exchange are worth less than the Reichsbank gold reserve.

The moment has come, according to M. Barthou, when the Allies must take energetic steps or else be faced by a Germany, proclaimed before the world as a ruined nation, despite the fact that her actual capital is intact.

PLANE CRASHES INTO WALL; PILOT KILLED

PENSACOLA, Oct. 21. Captain Roland T. Brumbaugh, student pilot, was instantly killed at the naval air station here yesterday afternoon when the naval plane in which he was a passenger skidded and crashed into the seawall. The plane was completely wrecked. Capt. Brumbaugh's skull and spine were fractured. He was in the box cockpit. First Lieut. Raymond J. Bartholomew, marine corps, the pilot, was unharmed. Capt. Brumbaugh was a son of Dr. A. S. Brumbaugh, 1010 Lexington avenue, Altoona, Pa.

PARADE OF FIGHTING BIRDS

What is Known as the Bass Rock, in the Firth of Forth, Scotland, is Unique.

The fighting birds on the Bass rock, in the Firth of Forth are described by Oliver G. Pike in the London Daily Mail.

It is certainly the most wonderful citadel I have ever looked upon," he writes. "Its sides rise straight from the sea, and if you placed St. Paul's cathedral by its side the cross would only just top the cliffs.

"Every available ledge rock contains its bird.

"Several are fighting and their method of settling a battle is very different from that of the farm-yard cockerel.

"They find a convenient ledge, then, holding one another's beaks, pull and push in opposite directions. The one that wins the fight is the one which pushes or pulls its opponent over the cliff."

COAST LINE SERVICE IS BEST SAYS ANDERSON

WHO HAS BEEN IN SEVERAL STATES SHIPPING FRUITS AND VEGETABLES

Sandy Anderson and wife have returned home from a trip that included Ohio, West Virginia, Pennsylvania and western New York state. They left Sanford June 10th for Lowell, Ohio, in the interests of the American Fruit Growers. The first of July the railroad boys took a vacation and left the growers with hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of tomatoes, cabbage, cukes and sweet corn seeking a market. Prior to this strike there was a twenty-four hour schedule which put these delicious vegetables in the retail stores fresh and crisp. But after the railroad boys went fishing the growers were knocked to the tune of 72 hours and longer. Getting these vegetables to the market, arriving in a wilting deteriorated condition thereby causing a weakness of the markets by fully fifty percent. The car supply was acute.

After this deal was finished Sandy was transferred to western New York and stationed at Youngstown, the greatest fruit belt in the eastern states. Here he had 600 cars of peaches, one hundred cars of pears and one hundred cars of mixed fruit totaling eight hundred cars to move. The equipment to be used at Youngstown totaled about three hundred cars and fifty of these were either working with the railroad or in the hands of the growers.

Anderson said that the growers kept their produce in the open air and it was very hot and dry. Some of the truck drivers charge that the fruit is being spoiled by the heat and that the growers are not doing their best to keep the produce in the open air.
