Seminole Shows \$\$\$ Reluctance

Officials from Seminole, Orange, and Osceola Counties gathered this morning in Winter Park to discuss the proposed Short Range Water, Sewer, and Drainage Study for the tri-county area.

Michael Szunyog of the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council stated the purpose of the meeting was to discuss the require-

ments of HUD and to show the need for cooperation and coordination among the various public bodies involved. All cities and counties will be involved throughout the study, he stressed.

Attending the session from Seminole were County Commission Chairman Greg Drummond, and Mayor Lawrence Swofford and City Clerk Rodney Layer of Altamonte Springs.

Philip Inglis, speaking for VTN, proposed engineers for the project, stated it would cost \$180,000 to do the study instead of the \$100,000 originally estimated. Seminole officials have expressed reluctance to go that high.

Total cost of the study will be \$243,000 with federal financing covering two-thirds of the cost. \$63,000 would go for Planning Council expenses.

Breakdown of the cost to each county, based on population census over a 32-month period, would be Seminole, \$14,586; Orange, \$60,703; and Osceola, Guide - 1971." . . . Just loaded \$5,672.

Powers: New Charges

Ronald Powers, charged with second degree murder in the death of his two-year old stepdaughter, and facing trial on the charges on April 12, was rearrested on new charges

Powers has been charged with assault and battery upon his wife Charlene, in an alleged incident last Thanksgiving in which he allegedly choked Mrs. Powers,

as they called it in those days, was relatively simple. good and wise mother taught me that a nourishng breakfast was the best "starter" for the day. In our neighborhood, the kids walked two miles o school, were instructed by dedicated, no-nonsense teachers who flunked the non-achievers who didn't measure up. A father who had no sympathy for indolence provided the extra-curricular disciplines that

made a monthly grade card look quite respectable. When a protesting parent thought that little Johnny had been treated unfairly, a conference was arranged in which the teacher patiently explained the facts of life. There were no strikes, protests, demonstrations or psychiatric treatments, I doubt that the word psychiatry could have been found in

High school was much the same, with time for football and other sports. If you didn't make the team, no one went crying to the coach about discrimination. You simply figured he knew his business and that you weren't good enough.

University life provided more freedoms but the old man made sure you knew you were there to learn. "Either study or get out" was the ultimatum. In those simple and uncomplicated days, this seemed fair enough. You knew the rules and mapped your

Factors Of Failure

With full realization that today's teachers, parents and students face a bewildering maze of problems which in my day were virtually non-existent, I suggest they are being exacerbated by these factors: 1 - The agitation to dispense with grade a tests and make sure that "everybody passes" without regard for individual achievement.

As Adm. H. G. Rickover, himself a victim of discrimination at the Naval Academy, has sa J: "By

concentrating on equality, we have been led down a dead-end road to a politicized educational system in which quality becomes almost 'undemocratic.' "

2 - The failure or inability of parents to inculcate a proper sense of responsibility and to exercise needed disciplines at home. In many instances, negligent parents simply brush aside these tasks with a "let the teacher do it" attitude. 3 - The prevailing notion that enough money

can solve anything. Currently, Ohio's Gov. John Gilligan is pointing the finger at his own state's lack of support for higher education. Ohio is said to rank 38th among the 50 states.

Yet I find it difficult to believe that Ohio-educated children lack educational opportunities or suffer in comparison with those who live in adjoining industrial states.

4 - The emphasis by public spenders in all states on "quality education."

To members of the teachers' union, "quality" means higher salaries for themselves, not the quality of their instruction. To quote Adm. Rickover once again: "To discover children with the qualities of mind, will and categories of competence and to educate them . . . in the manner most suited to their special talents is - or ought to be - the primary responsibility of our costly public school system the costliest in the world and the least productive in quality education of any in the world."

5 - The rash of teachers' strikes and "bug-outs" from their appointed tasks. Here indeed, the educators to whom we entrust our children's aptitudes have set a sorry example

for their young charges. "If you want something, strike" seems to be their cavalier warning to beleaguered boards of education seeking to meet budgets on available tax

Political Pandering The greed of a well organized and powerful

school lobby is matched only by the pandering of politicians who for the most part will promise anything to get elected, and without regard to cost.

Ohio's Gilligan makes the assertion that "Ohio is the only state in the Union which has permitted schools to close, and the whole nation knows it." This is simply not true. Many Ohio cities have turned down school levies - as in other states - and either from ignorance of the need or because the taxpayer is fed up to here with constant demands for more and more

The intransigence of school labor leaders in New York City has caused the Board of Education to issue "an agonizing directive" to terminate the services of over 10,000 substitute teachers and prepare for the dismissal of up to 6,500 regular teachers. There is a \$40-million shortage in the budget.

Won't Go Away We are on a non-productive course in public education which, if permitted to continue, will induce a series of further crises throughout the nation.

Racial conflicts within the school system, a subject which the politicians are loath to discuss, must be ameliorated if the privileges of public education are to be fulfilled. Yet everyone other than involved teachers, parents, children and boards of education avoids this

Finally, and with a few exceptions, I remain unconvinced that adequate and equal educational opportunities are being denied our children in these United States. If more is not made of the opportunities at hand,

Labor unions make unreasonable demands which are way out of balance with the lack of increased productivity. Workers who once thought the boss was "a pretty good guy" have now worked themselves up into a hate campaign against his company. Once the haters and the reformers have brought down the "profit and loss system," one thought occurs. Where, other than from the taxes paid by corporations and their employes, will the money be available for Social Security, health insurance, edu-

cation and hundreds of other services considered indispensable to the people? The only alternative appears to be socialism, a thoroughly discredited system where egalitarianism brings everyone down to the lowest common stan-

Blacklist TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) -A Gainesville representative has charged that the State of Flor-

ida uses taxpayers' money to enforce a blacklist of retail liquor dealers and he wants that law, along with other liquor regulations updated during the coming legislative session. Rep. William Andrews will present his package of liquor law bills to a House business

regulation subcommittee Tuesday. The chairman of the House Business Regulation Committee said his primary aim is to bring down the price of booze. The Democrat said present laws have put the price of liquor artifically high by restrict ing competition on the sale of liquor from wholesaler to re-

He cited the "Tied House Evi Law" as one which hinders open competition by prohibiting manufacturers or distributors from having an interest in re tail sales. "Retailers cannot buy from

anybody but the wholesaler, he said. "The wholesalers don't have to be competitive on the small purchases, they can sell it for whatever they want to. Several retail fraternal organizations and clubs in the Gainesville area are prevented from saving \$5 to \$7 on a case of liquor because of the law, Andrews said.

Referring to what he called the "blacklist," Andrews said present law provides that the state publish lists of retail dealers who fail to pay their bills to wholesalers within 10 days. Andrews favors repeal because "the State of Florida uses taxpayers' money to enforce this blacklist. If somebody were to sell to somebody who has been blacklisted the state would
