



Adams wanted Jefferson to crite it, for, wrote Adams later, "I had been so unpopular and ob-"gate crasher" in the United noxious for my early and continual zeal in promoting the measure that any draft of mine would undergo more criticism and scrutiny in Congress than one of his composition.

Adams' Speech Lost It was Adams, however, whose loquence persuaded the Congress to pass Lee's resolution and so aved the way for Jefferson's. His famous speech on that occasion is lost, although Daniel Webster later tried to reproduce such parts as he could remember in the "Supposed Speech of John Adams." These are only a few of the many
