

2000 A.D.:

- The oceans will be mined for minerals, and we may even be putting together all kinds of materials from air, water and common elements in the earth's crust.

- Relay satellites and laser beams will make it possible to communicate with anyons, anywhere, anytime. Individuals will have miniature television transceivers to see and talk with one another over personal chan-

deep within the earth and far out in space. Exploration of the moon and pearer planets will be well under way. - Our vehicles will be powered by nuclear energy and fuel cells. No points on earth will be more than a few hours apart.

Ordinary people will have access to computers as they now have te electric power. The "information revolution" will have multiplied man's capacity for problem-solving and creative thinking by a thousand times.

Whether or not such a society will deserve the adjective "great," however, depends upon whether men can keep up with this disaying technological progress, which is moving faster and faster and affecting every part of life, including personal es. Says Haller:

"Trying to 'make sense' of change will be our highest task."
