"Purge" Will Go On Despite Carolina Loss

PWA Ickes Declares He Would Vote For Lewis In Maryland If He Could Vote

Roosevelt Seeks Tydings Defeat

McAdoo Blames Loss On "Cruel Delusion Of The Old Folks"

WASHINGTON. Sept. 1. —(AP)—Indicating that the "purge" will go on in spite of the outcome of New Deal efforts in South Carolina to oust Senator Ellison D. Smith, Secretary of the Interior and Public Works Administrator Harold Ickes today joined President Roosevelt in seeking to defeat Senator Millard Tydings up for reelection in Maryland.

Secretary Ickes announced today that he favored the candidacy of Representative David J. Lewis in the Maryland Democratic primary. Though Ickes resides in Maryland, he votes in Illinois.

"If I could ballot in Maryland," he said, "I would vote for Lewis."

Yesterday President Roosevelt's only comment on the South Carolina primary in which he had vigorously opposed Senator Smith was: "It is often true that it takes a long, long time to bring the past up to the present."

In backing Johnston, the President had referred to Smith, an opponent of some New Deal measures, as one who represented the past.

Visually complete, but unofficial, returns from Tuesday's primaries gave Smith 177,000, Johnstone 188,697.

Some Administration adherents appeared far more concerned over the vote piling up in California for Sheridan Downey, advocate of a \$60-over-thursday pension plan for the aged than over the unsuccessful outcome of the effort to "purge" Smith.

Returns from 8538 of California's 12,433 precincts gave Downey 276,861 votes for the Democratic senatorial nomination to 230,791 for McAdoo.

The 74-year-old McAdoo, who helped turn the 1932 Democratic national convention to the Roosevelt banner and who has been supporting the President ever since, credited the pension movement with giving the victory to the "successful candidates."

"This undoubtedly determined the result of the election," he said in a message to Mrs. Lillian Del Valle Grady, national committee-woman for California.

McAdoo reiterated that he could not support a cruel delusion of old and deserving people, as this measure undoubtedly is."

"It is x x x I know that it will ruin California if adopted and that it will defeat the Democratic Party if it advocates it."

"I consider wholly in the views expressed by President Roosevelt on this subject, while at the same time I renew my allegiance to him and to his New Deal objective."

"I am not concerned about myself, but I am deeply concerned about the future of the State and about the continued success of President Roosevelt's Administration of which I have been and shall continue to be a constant supporter."

NEW YORK. Sept. 1.—(AP)—Cross and unbroken, J. Edward (Dixie) Davis, the star state witness in the racket conspiracy trial of political boss James J. Hines, today matched his wife with Defense Counsel Lloyd Paul Stryker. Davis swore he did "everything in my power" to prevent Hines before finally and reluctantly, he said, agreeing to turn state's evidence against the Tammany district leader. He said that when George Weinberg, former business manager of the "Dutch" Schultz policy racket syndicate, tried to get him to testify for the state, he told Weinberg: "I won't do it. I would have to make a man a body I'm going to protect Hines." The reticent "Dixie mouthpiece" for the Schults, not planted his feet on top of the witness box and gave a rebutted Stryker's attempt to elicit "yes" or "no" answers.

Jaycees Endorse Construction Of County Hospital

Business Men Organize To Get Out Vote In Coming Election

Endorsing the need for a County hospital, the Sanford Junior Chamber of Commerce held a special meeting Tuesday night to discuss methods of getting out the vote for the freeholder election, which will be held for the purpose of determining whether the County shall issue necessary bonds in connection with the building of such a hospital.

Members stressed the great need the County has long felt for a new County-owned hospital here and pointed out that the establishment of such a hospital will permit the taking care of many persons heretofore obliged to seek outside hospital services due to inadequate local facilities.

A committee, consisting of Andrew Carraway, chairman, T. M. Ivey, and M. L. Robson was appointed to take charge of preparations for getting out the vote. The committee will also provide transportation to the polls for those who are unable to get there.

The magazine of travel, "Globe," which is published in Sanford, was distributed to members so they could see the full page advertisement the club had placed in it for September.

It was announced that John Ivey had been elected to fill Fred Stock's place on the board of directors. Mr. Stock resigned.

Order Issued For Railroad Strike Vote

More Than One Million Rail Workers To Vote On Cut Or Strike Proposition

CHICAGO. Sept. 1.—(AP)—Railroad brothers odds with a men's club of nearly 1,000,000 workers called an immediate nation-wide strike vote last night after collapse of a Federal mediation board attempt to settle a 15 per cent wage dispute.

Orchestrating the strike vote was posted in conferences of 1,000 men in chairman representing railroads in the railway labor executive association and representatives of railway trainmen. George Harrison, president of a union described the brotherhood action as their answer to the original insistence on the wage cut. The vote, he said, was unanimous.

A. F. Whitney, president of the teamsters, said his commitment would leave Chicago last night with strike ballots to poll 140,000 trainmen. They will return to Chicago by Sept. 28.

Whitney predicted President Roosevelt would appoint a fact-finding commission to intervene in the dispute by the last of September.

Under terms of the railway labor pact passed in 1936 by the brotherhoods are required to notify the mediation board of a strike vote. The board notifies the President and he in turn appoints a fact-finding commission, which has 30 days in which to make its report. Another 30 days must intervene before a strike can be called.

There has been no serious railroad strike since passage of the labor act.

"We are not going to take a cut," Whitney said. "Our men are not receiving more than a living wage now. And, the question of the carriers' ability to pay cannot be used as arguments for a wage reduction. Employees are entitled to wages before payment of interest on bonds and dividends on stock."

Proceeding the action of the two labor groups was Dr. William M. Letterson's announcement of the mediation board's failure to reach a settlement on wage cuts.

Five Killed As Avalanche Strikes Apartment House

QUEBEC. Sept. 1. —(AP)—A cliffside avalanche, loosed by violent rains, plunged down on a crowded four-story apartment house in a Quebec suburb today, killing at least five persons and leaving an estimated one trapped in the ruins.

At least eight other deaths were attributed to the same rains. Six persons were drowned when the flood waters washed a house into Portneuf, 40 miles west of here.

Two died in the derailment of a Montreal-Quebec passenger train, caused by a washout. An apartment house tragedy occurred at St. Gorgoile de Montmorency, a textile factory town six miles east of Quebec.

A landslide tore a year-old partly brick building from its foundations. Eighteen persons were injured, some seriously, when a great mass of earth broke from a towering 200-foot hillside and smashed into the structure.


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IN BIRTHPLACE OF THE BIG GUNS

Mellon's Fortune Reduced By Gifts

PITTSBURGH. Sept. 1.—(AP)—Andrew W. Mellon's personal fortune, which exceeded \$200,000,000 two years after the stock crash of 1929, was disclosed yesterday to have been reduced, principally by gifts, to \$36,500,000 upon his death last year.

All of the stocks, bonds and securities listed in an inventory filed today and an estimated \$20,000,000 in real estate goes to charity and will not be subject to the federal inheritance tax.

The state of Pennsylvania, however, already has collected \$2,200,000 and may get some more, although this will not nearly reach the \$12,500,000 figure paid by the estate of the banker's brother and business partner, the late R. B. Mellon.




Large Advertising Campaign Is Begun By Movie Industry

In every city, town and hamlet in the United States there will start today an advertising campaign in daily newspapers proclaiming the essential character of motion picture entertainment in the social and cultural life of the people.

As characterized by motion picture executives, "it will bring forcefully to the attention of motion picture patrons the highly specialized efforts of Hollywood writers, directors, actors, and technicians in providing America with its most popular form of entertainment. A total of well over 2,000 daily newspapers will be used in bringing this essential character of motion picture entertainment to those who enjoy it as well as to those who are at present not enjoying it."

Nearly 16,000 motion picture theatres throughout the United States and Canada will officially begin their part of the celebration by initiating the national "Movie Quiz" contest. This contest has been advertised on their screens and many of the phases of the contest have already been run in these theatres. Ninety-four pictures are included in the list. Booklets in these theatres detailing the rules of the contest with blanks for registering answers to the questions may be obtained from theatre attendants. "One of the greatest and most interesting of national brain-twisters will start a four month puzzle life for the eighty millions of people who patronize motion picture theatres every week of the year," it is declared.

A JOINT RESOLUTION Proposing an Amendment to Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Florida Relating to the State Militia by Adding Thereunto Additional Section Specifying the Duties to be Performed by the Florida National Guard.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF FLORIDA: That the following amendment to Article IV of the Constitution of Florida relating to the State Militia, by adding thereto the following section, known as Section 3 of said Article XIV, specially applicable to the federally recognized State Guard, be and is hereby agreed to, and shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Florida for ratification at the next General Election to be held in 1932, as follows:
