(3) Fresh Fruits and Vegetables. Cuba is a producer of fresh fruits and vegetables which mature much earlier in the season than similar products grown in this country. This fact opened the way to concessions on a seasonal basis, which will permit the early Cuban products to enter the American market prior to the time when similar domestic products are ready for market.
