### Busy Roads

This Fourth of July weekend, an estimated 37.4 million Americans will travel 100 miles or more from home. This is the highest volume of travel for the holiday in 13 years, according to a AAA Auto Club South survey. The figure represents a 5 percent increase over last year. The record for July 4 travel is 38 million in 1986.

The greatest number of motorists will come from the Southeast and the West with 8 million each, followed by the Midwest, 6 million; the Northeast, 5.3 million; and the Great Lakes, 5.1 million. Of those taking a trip this holiday, 32.4 million are expected to go by auto, light truck or recreational vehicle, a 5 percent increase. Another 5 million will travel by airplane, train or bus, up 9 percent from last year.

# Business soaring at Sanford airport

**SANFORD** — Business at the Orlando Sanford Airport continues to soar as two on-site companies recently announced plans to expand their facilities.

Sunjet Aviation will hold grand opening ceremonies for a new facility on July 15. The 23,400-square-foot structure will be home to a terminal building with a first-class passenger waiting area, flight planning room, pilots lounge and conference room.

The structure will also house a 15,500 square-foot hangar, bringing Sunjet's total hangar space to nearly 50,000 square-feet.

"It will be a beautiful facility," said Sunjet Aviation President James Watkins. "We'll have 16-foot high opera ceilings, large sheets of glass windows, and a water fountain in front."

The facility is located between the airport's two runways. Watkins said there are five-acres of ramp space to park airplanes, and the company maintains an aircraft maintenance and repair station

and a jet charter service.

Sunjet also has a flight simulator for its flight school. The company trains more than 200 students per year in its Jet Flight School program.

Sunjet has been located at the airport for seven years, and employs 70 people. It is the largest supplier of jet aircraft charters between Ft. Lauderdale and Atlanta.

"We think the airport has a tremendous future," Watkins said. "We can see great growth potential."

The new facilities make Sunjet the

newest Fixed Base Operator at the airport, able to fuel general aviation aircraft from its own fuel farm, 24-hours per day.

While Sunjet continues to grow, it is not the only Fixed Base Operator that has plans to expand.

Million Air Orlando, the original Fixed Base Operator at the airport, plans to add 100,000 square-feet of hangar space within the next five to six months. The company is also looking into adding four acres of ramp space for airplanes using the facility, said Roger Phillips, General See Airport, Page 6A

# Jalowsky earns a second chance

Mother of three named national Student of the Year

**SANFORD** — For Seminole Community College nursing graduate Lynn Jalowsky, it's not how you start the game, but how you finish. The game of life that is.

Jalowsky jets to the nation's capital this Fourth of July weekend to pick up her award as the country's only community college student to be selected as "Student of the Year" by the Cooperative Education Association. Her award and cash prize of \$500 is due in part to her volunteer work last summer at a Tulum, Mexico medical

clinic as part of SCC's cooperative education/Mexico summer program.

"I was dumbfounded when I first found out about the award," said Jalowsky. "I didn't expect to win. I'm really excited for the college and for the program, it really deserves the recognition."

Just four-and-a-half years ago, Jalowsky seemed like the unlikely candidate for a national award. A ninth-grade high school drop out with no marketable skills, the bottom fell out of her world when her husband passed away, leaving her to care for the couple's three children.

"At that point in my life I didn't have any direction," she recalls.

Out of necessity Jalowsky took a job as an office assistant See Jalowsky, Page 6A

# U.S. Coast Guard to launch safe boating campaign

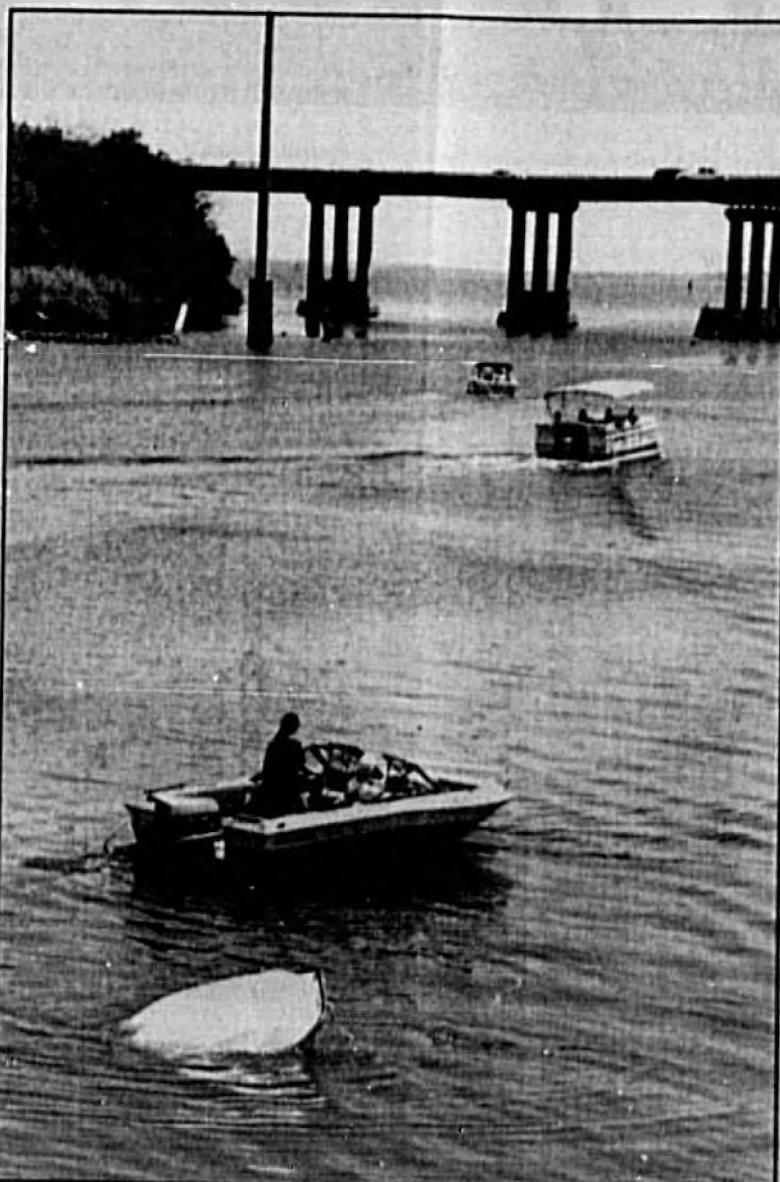

**SANFORD** - With 8,426 miles of tidal coastlines, 51,000 miles of rivers and streams, and more than 3 million acres of lakes, boating activities in Florida are a natural.

The Florida marine industry pumps more than \$10 billion into the state's economy. More than 800,000 boats are registered in the Sunshine state with another 400,000 boaters visiting annually.

Small wonder then, that the U.S. Coast Guard has chosen Florida to launch an ambitious statewide safe boating campaign that kicks off over the Fourth of July weekend.

The pilot program, focusing on the dangers of alcohol consumption and boating, comes during the peak of the Florida boating season that coincides with the three-day holiday; one that safety officials unfortunately label as one of the most dangerous boating weekends of the

# Lake Mary fire officials prepare for the worst

**LAKE MARY** — Imagine fires sweeping through Lake Mary.

The Lake Mary Fire Department is preparing for the worst, mindful that summers in Central Florida bring the threat of wildfires. They also hope to prepare residents of the city to know how to react during emergencies.

Fire Chief Craig Haun said he plans to use a \$14,000 state grant to start a series of seven-week courses for Lake Mary residents, creating Community Emergency Response Teams.

Haun discussed the plans to create Emergency Response Teams at Thursday's Lake Mary City Commission meeting.

Residents signing up for the courses would learn how to survey a building for dangers, as well as First Aid and other emergency management techniques. The first class will be held in mid-September.

There would be 20 residents in each class. Haun is hoping that a residents from across the city

will sign up for the classes.

"We're making sure that we're prepared as a Department," Haun said. "We're hoping that the citizens will also be prepared. The intent is to have people from different areas participate in each class."

In the meantime, Lake Mary's Public Works Department is working with CPH Engineering, to address possible drainage and overflow problems.

"The drainage we've done in Big Lake Mary will solve a lot of problems in the future," said Rick Diaz, director of Public Works.

In other business, the commission postponed hearings on amending a development agreement on a 1.7-acre parcel, formerly known as the Stenstrom property, that surrounded by the Woodbridge Lakes subdivision.

Lennar Homes recently purchased the property, and wants to build three home sites. City officials said the plans are compatible with surrounding lots, including Woodbridge Lakes and the nearby Timacuan subdi-

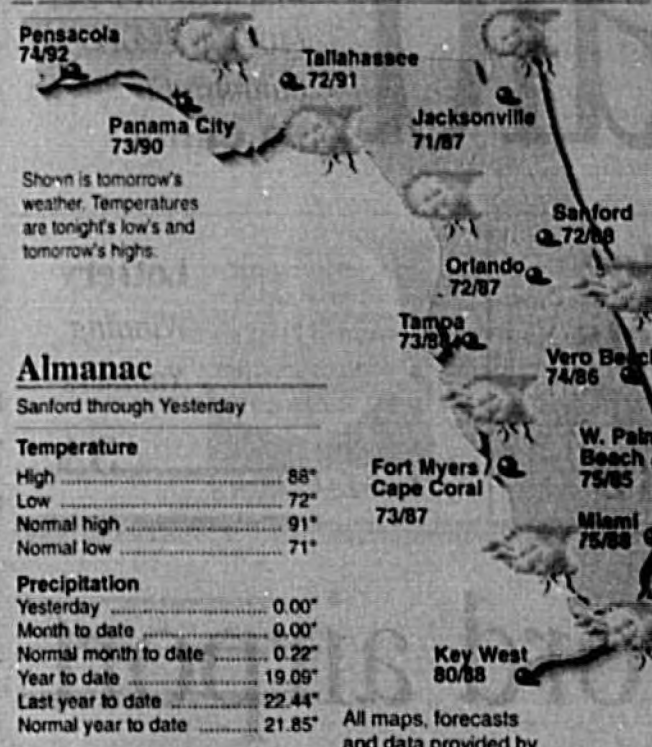

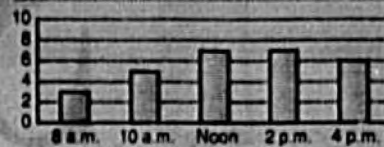

as important as being sober behind the wheel of a car," said Coast Guard Rear Admiral Thad W. Allen, one of several representatives on hand Thursday at the State Capital Rotunda building in Tallahassee to kick off the campaign.

The multi-year public education campaign entitled, "It's a Different World on the Water," will feature television, radio, print and outdoor public service announcements as well as grassroots efforts in local communities throughout the state.

Recent statistics underscore the concern expressed by Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission director Colonel Robert Edwards.

"Boating fatalities and accidents due to boating under the

influence are a serious problem in the state of Florida," Edwards said. "Tragically, these accidents and fatalities are preventable. The campaign is designed to raise public awareness and provide strong deterrents to boating under the influence."

In 1998, a total of 70 people were killed as the result of 1,282 total boating accidents in the Sunshine state. Thirty-five percent of those fatalities were related to alcohol and considered preventable. In Seminole County last year, there were 15 reported fresh water boating accidents that resulted in two

fatalities, 14 injuries, and more than \$19,000 in damage to vessels and property. None of Seminole County's 1998 boating accidents were alcohol related.

Seminole County ranked 21st out of Florida's 67 counties in the number of boating accidents statewide. Boating fatalities now rank second only to automobile crashes as the cause of transportation-related deaths in the United States.

Like automobile drivers who operate vehicles while under the influence, boaters now face tougher penalties for boating

under the influence. Boat operators with a blood alcohol content level of .08 or higher face up to five years in jail, a \$5,000 fine, non-paid public service, and mandatory substance abuse counseling. Drunk boaters who cause serious bodily injury or death could be subject to up to 15 years in state prison and a \$10,000 fine.

Refusal by boaters to submit to a blood alcohol content test results in an automatic \$500 civil fine and a suspension of boating license. Additionally, the state legislature has cracked down on youthful offenders who operate boats while drinking. Persons under the age of 21 who are found to have a blood alcohol content level of .02 or greater are subject to 50 hours of mandatory community service.

# All appears to be well in 'Grace' land

Kevin Grace is working for Seminole County again - two years after he was told he wasn't needed.

Gary Kaiser is the one who said good-bye to Grace. At the time Kaiser was county's top administrator. Kaiser decided he needed only one deputy manager. Two were too many. Kaiser kept Cindy Coto, and dismissed Grace.

When Kaiser left government for the CEO position at HTE, Inc., the county conducted a search for a new manager. Sure enough, Kevin Grace applied.

And guess who won the job? Kevin Grace.

"Was there a bit of revenge in your intentions?" one of the county commissioners asked

Grace. "Yes, sure there is," Grace said.

On Monday, Grace had the satisfaction of moving into the third-floor manager's suite at the County Services Building. Cindy Coto was among the first to greet him.

There were many hugs, E-mail messages, and notes from Rep. John Mica and State Rep. Lee Constantine.

Kaiser cleaned out just about everything in the manager's suite. He did leave a bottle of Alevé in the desk drawer.

"I'll probably be needing this," Grace said.

In talks he has had with department heads and four of the five county commissioners, Grace said he realizes that most things haven't changed in the

two years he worked elsewhere. Projects from five or more years ago continue.

Jim Marino and Bob Alophé are among the new department heads who will report to Grace. Marino applied for the county manager's job but did not make the short-list.

The majority of county workers know Grace and he knows them. Hopefully, this will benefit all. Coto stayed close to Grace the first three days this week before taking a much-deserved two-day break.

Aware of the political goings on in the county, Grace said he intends to manage without influence from either segment of the county's political front. Three of five commissioners picked him as their top choice to be manager. Sure, Grace would have liked four or all five. The initial vote might have chased most candidates away — but

Grace was not going to let the numbers get in the way of his return to county government. He has a chance to show everyone that he's as talented if not a better manager than Gary Kaiser.

It's unlikely that residents will notice any immediate change in the way the county does business. For the last three months, Coto managed well. Grace has Coto to assure business as usual until the end of the year.

Much can and will happen in 2000, a huge election year. Three commissioners (two of whom championed Grace's return) are up for re-election. Should Grant Maloy or Dick VanDerWeide be beaten, Grace would be vulnerable to the whims of a new commission.

He's much too busy today to worry about such things.

For small upsets, he has that Gary Kaiser's bottle of Alevé.

## The importance of fathers

It had been two years since Andrea Bullock had heard from her dad. Then one day she went to work, where a visitor awaited her. A coroner. And he informed the 23-year-old woman that her father was dead.

She sat down and wept. Not because she had enjoyed a model father-daughter relationship by any stretch of the imagination. Indeed, her dad was a hard-drinking man who was "in and out of AA." He did a prison stint when she was 7 years old. And he eventually parted ways with her mom, leaving her to raise a daughter and son mostly on her own.

Yet, Andrea bore no bitterness toward her father. Because she remembers the dad who would watch Saturday morning cartoons with her. The father who would fetch his little girl White Castle hamburgers when she craved them. The man who had a generous streak, who would, say, pick up a hitchhiker along the road.

"He was the most kind human being," says Andrea, despite his flaws. "My dad taught me to love people the way they are."

Many young Americans can relate to Andrea's experience — the difficult, but nonetheless loving, relationship she had with her father.

For while 80 percent of children born during the early postwar era grew up in stable homes with their happily married (at least according to American mythology) biological mom and dad, only about 50 percent of children today will have that experience.

Until very recently, fathers were considered almost incidental to child rearing; important only so much as they provided reliable financial support to mom and the kids (and maybe keeping the car tuned up and the house in good repair).

But we now know, from myriad studies, that fathers play a vital role in the psychological and emotional well-being of their children. (For instance, children with involved dads are less susceptible to peer pressure, are more competent, more self-protective, more self-reliant and more ambitious.)

We also know, conversely, that father-absence has a deleterious effect

vision. However, several residents of Woodbridge Lakes said they are concerned about above-ground utility lines on the north side of Woodbridge that would run along Rinehart Road through the properties.

"The issue is that the power lines need to be underground," Mayor David Meador said. "Whose responsibility is it? That's what we need to determine."

City staff and a representative of Lennar Homes agreed they can work together to resolve the issue. The request from Lennar Homes will come before the commission again on Aug. 12.

The Commission did give preliminary approval to The Reserve at Lake Mary, a 144-unit subdivision on 66 acres with planted pines, located to the west of the Mayfair Golf Course. The subdivision is proposed to

be built in two phases. BML Investments, PRN Investments, and The Jerome D. Feinstein Family Trust are the applicants.

"This will be a very important project for the City," Meador said.

A representative from BML Investments agreed to work with the city to ensure that water lines to be installed will provide adequate water for the residents. Commissioner Thom Greene encouraged the developer to use reclaimed water sources.

In other action, the commission:

- Gave final approval for providing \$165,000 through the Qualified Target Industry Tax Refund Program, beginning in fiscal year 2000, to AIG Warranty Services. Seminole County is also providing \$165,000. Lake Mary is competing with Baltimore, Md. to land

the insurance company. The company is looking at five different sites in Lake Mary.

- Announced the grand opening ceremonies for Trailhead Park on Lake Mary Boulevard will be held July 15 at 10 a.m., instead of the previously scheduled date of July 13.

- Authorized CPH Engineers to perform design, bidding and construction administration services for the Crystal Lake Avenue Gravity Sewer in an amount not to exceed \$14,477. Installation is expected to begin on Aug. 9. The sewer will serve the city's new police station to be located on Crystal Lake Avenue.

in a local doctor's office. Over the next three months she found a new passion and a new direction.

"That experience convinced me I wanted to be in the medical field, but I knew I had to go to college."

Her next step was perhaps the most monumental in turning tragedy into opportunity.

"I walked into Seminole Community College and said, 'I want to be a nurse, how do I get started?'"

She got started with the smallest of steps that eventually led to an educational and vocational resurrection. First she completed high school by earning her GED through SCC. From there she enrolled in the college's Associate Degree Registered Nurse Program. Her learning appetite whetted, she also checked into the requirements for an Association of Arts Degree. But her educational journey was no walk in the park.

"There were several times when I really got discouraged," she recalled. "Sometimes it seemed like it would take forever. But I wanted to finish something for the first time in my life."

Step-by-step and semester hour by semester hour, Jalowsky did finish something, not one degree, but two. This past May she earned her Associate of Arts degree from SCC.

In June she finished requirements for her Associate Degree Nursing program and will soon test with the Florida Board of Nursing to receive her Registered Nurse designation.

Not a bad end, and probably just another step in Jalowsky's journey that began four years ago.

"I think I've finally grown up," she said. "The biggest change between then and now is that I feel good about me. I'm convinced that if I decide I want to do something, I can do it — nothing can stop me."

Jalowsky credits strong family ties as part of her success and persistence, looking for inspiration from her mom Judy Croter of Allamonte Springs, once a surgical nurse, and her daughter Amanda and son Andrew, students at Lake Mary High and Rock Lake Middle School.

"The kids have really been patient and sacrificed a lot while I was going through the SCC program," she said. "Now I try to tell them to profit from my experience, don't make the same mistakes I made, and to have a back up plan for life because life can sometimes throw you a curve ball. To have a Plan B really takes a lot of hard work and perseverance."

There won't be any resting on her laurels for the new college

graduate. Jalowsky began full-time work at a local podiatrist's office this week. When she returns from Washington with her national award on Tuesday, it's back to the grind of a full-time job.

"I'm going to take a year off from school, spend some time with my kids and make some money. I've got those student loans to take care of," she chuckled.

Jalowsky's new Plan B calls for a little in-line skating, and after some time off to recharge her batteries, enrollment at the University of Central Florida for a Bachelor's Degree in Psychology, and eventually a Master's Degree in Nursing.

Chances are, nothing can stop her.

Manager of Million Air Orlando.

The company currently has 60,000 square feet of hangar space, and 4 1/2 acres of ramp space at the airport. It supplies approximately 100,000 gallons of fuel per month. The company opened at the airport nearly five years ago.

"We're maxed out as it is," Phillips said. "Our hangars are completely full."

Million Air Orlando is a national franchise owned by the Jet Air Group. It is affiliated with Hertz Rent-a-Car, and also operates a private store for maintenance and avionics equipment.

"We're growing really fast," Phillips said. "We expect to get bigger."

The expansion of the Sunjet and Million Air Orlando facilities is in conjunction with the airport's plans to expand the Commerce Park and general aviation services, said Ray Wise, Director of Marketing for the Sanford Airport Authority.

Pan American airlines is operating a line maintenance facility out of the airport, using Sanford as its Florida base.

Later this summer, Pan Am plans to bring the first regularly scheduled domestic service to the airport, with non-stop flights to locations such as Newark, N.J. and two cities in Puerto Rico. The airline may also offer flights to Chicago and Atlanta.

Pan Am officials are tentative-

ly planning to start flights in late-August.

"To get the pole is really special, especially this close to home," Nemechek said after his third career pole and his first in 1999. "It was a very exciting lap. We hooked it right down on the bottom of the track and got a good run."

"We knew the car was going to be fast. We worked on it a little bit more and came down here and it was real fast."

Nemechek, who earned the nickname "Front Row Joe" with several front row starting spots a couple of seasons ago, joined Jeff Gordon, who qualified 11th Thursday, as the Bud Pole winners at Daytona in 1999, the first time in three years that there were two different Bud Pole winners here in the same season. Mike Skinner swept both Bud Poles in 1997 and Bobby Labonte repeated as the Bud Pole winner in both races here last season.

Ricky Rudd qualified second in a Ford with a speed of 194.574 mph. This qualifying run marked the first time that Rudd has started on the front row since 1983.

"I knew we had a good lap going and as much as some of the guys were picking up, I thought we had a shot at the pole," Rudd said. "We didn't quite get the pole, but the way

## Summertime = dingy roof time

Is your "light" roof dark and dingy? The summer is the time when light colored roofs turn green, brown or black. With the warm humid weather discoloration appears on houses, especially roofs.

Algae spores will grow wherever they find minerals, moisture, warmth and light. It's a plant and it likes the summer climate in Florida. It doesn't grow directly on any specific roofing material such as asphalt, concrete or clay tiles, fiberglass or aluminum, but as soon as a light accumulation of dust and other organic materials settle on a roof and enough heat, moisture and a little light are available, algae type spores, ever present in Florida, make the roof their home and start to grow.

Chlorine bleach kills and the force of a scrub brush or a strong spray will remove the soil and stop the growth - at least for a while. But read on. There are precautions.

Working on a roof can be dangerous. It is not good to walk on your roof. Using a brush can remove the fine granules that reflect the sun and protect the surface of asphalt and fiberglass roofing. Very high pressure sprays can do the same thing. Additionally, chlorine bleach can damage plantings, vinyl win-

dows and other construction materials if used in a solution too strong.

The force of a spray from a garden hose may not be strong enough to remove an accumulation of dirt on a roof. You may need to check the warranty that came with your roof before cleaning. Some roofing warranties become invalid if you walk on them. All-in-all the very difficult job of cleaning algae from a roof may be better to turn over to a professional.

In choosing a professional cleaning service you might want to ask what precautions are taken to protect planting and house materials. Does the service check the condition of the roof before and after cleaning? Talk to others in your neighborhood who have used a cleaning service and talk to several ser-

vices before you choose one.

For cleaning small areas that you can easily reach here are some suggestions:

- Wear rubber soled shoes that are both skid resistant and secure.
- Rinse roof and planting with clear water before and after using a cleaning solution.
- Use a mild chlorine solution. (1 part chlorine to 10 parts water and moderate pressure. Spray pressure as high as 1,000 psi may be too strong.) Remember that chlorine is caustic. Protect your self when using chlorine by wearing plastic gloves and avoiding splatters.
- Use a safe ladder placed so it is secure at both the top and bottom.

Unfortunately, whenever the conditions are right (minerals and organic material for algae, moisture, warmth, and a little light), algae type growth are available. They will retard algae discoloration for longer periods of time.

Parents tell their children not to talk to strangers, but most children who are abducted are taken by someone they know. The Internet can be a very dangerous place for a child. These and other child safety issues can be addressed by a crime prevention specialist.

Anyone can become the victim of a crime. As a police officer, I assure you that we would rather educate people in crime prevention techniques than work with them as crime victims. Abby, I would encourage your readers to contact their local law enforcement agency to find out what crime prevention services are offered and take advantage of those services. When it comes to criminal activity, an ounce of prevention is worth a ton of cure.

## WIN AT BRIDGE

### Setting up a long suit

By Phillip Alder

For the last three days, we have been looking at ruffing losers in the dummy. As this play usually generates an extra trick, it is almost always the right line. However, there is one notable time when it is probably wrong: when you are trying to establish dummy's long side suit. Then you often need dummy's trumps as entries. This deal illustrates the basic idea. How would you try to make four hearts? West leads the club king. You have nine top tricks: two spades, six hearts and one club. Equally, there are four losers (two diamonds and two clubs) staring you in the face. You cannot ruff any of them in the dummy, so you must establish a long spade in the dummy. There are six spades missing. They will probably divide 4-2, which means that you must ruff two spades in your hand before a long spade is estab-

lished. Therefore, you need three entries in the dummy: two for the ruffs and one to get back to the dummy to cash the established winner. What are those three entries? You have a top spade, so the other two must be in trumps: the ace and nine. This means that you cannot afford to draw more than one round of trumps. Here is the safest line: Win the first (or second) trick with the club ace, cash the heart king, play off dummy's ace-king of spades, and ruff a spade high in hand to avoid the risk of an overruff. Play a heart to dummy's nine, ruff another spade high, lead a trump to dummy's ace, and cash the established spade seven. Your 10 tricks are three spades, six hearts and one club.

## ASK DR. GOTT

### Not all memory loss is Alzheimer's

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm middle aged and never had an especially good memory for names, but now I can forget the name of a movie star two hours after I saw the movie. Then I spend the next hour trying to remember it. The more I try, the angrier I get at myself. Do I have early Alzheimer's?

DEAR READER: I don't know. Loss of memory can be a symptom of disease or it can be a normal, age-related variation — the benign forgetfulness of old age. Many people routinely experience memory loss. We have other things that concern us — worries and problems; our circuits become overloaded. Under some circumstances, we may tend to forget inconsequential events and names. I have an elderly patient who recently declared to me: "I know all the people in town. I just can't remember their names." Nonetheless, as you pointed out, various neurological disorders, including Alzheimer's disease, often begin with minor memory lapses. I suggest that you get checked out by a

doctor, just to make sure that there isn't an early, treatable condition that should be addressed.

A further comment: Judging from the quality of many movies being produced today, I'm not surprised that you might have difficulty remembering a certain "star." But I'll bet you would remember her if her performance were memorable. Could you possibly forget a Hepburn or a Bergman? Unlikely. We're deluged by names... and we have every right to forget them.

I've found that the more frustrated I become at not being able to recall a name, the more elusive the name becomes. There are lots of tricks people use to overcome this, including making lists. Then you can refer to a written record to refresh your memory. My problem is that I usually forget where I put the darned list.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Please discuss chronic gastritis and helicobacter pylori.

DEAR READER: More and more studies implicate the bacteria called H. pylori as the cause of peptic ulcers,

as well as gastritis (stomach irritation). The diagnosis can easily be made with a blood test or a specific analysis of the irritated area. Treatment with antibiotics usually clears up the disorder. Ask your doctor about this.
