

The priests accused the Czechoslovak government of violating constitutional guarantees of religious freedom. They condemned the government-sponsored Cathohe action as Schismatic and said that clerics' signatures endorsing that group had been obtained by fraud.

Pope Pius spoke to German Catholics by radio from the Vatican. The Pontiff avoided any direct reference to Communism but his speech was sprinkled with hints that any anti-church regime would be only a passing event.

There were indications that the communists may be getting ready for a struggle with German pro-testants. Neues Deutschland, leading Communist newspaper of eastern Germany, printed a fullpage denunciation of the Lutheren bishop of Berlin.
