Paper Warns Country Not To Complain If Axis Uses Armed Forces As Reaction

Mussolini Sounds Territorial Aims

Gayda Says Claims On French Colonies Are Not Forgotten

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—(AP)—The United States has today warned Finland the most drastic military action should be taken if she should maintain the friendship of the United States.

ROME, Nov. 3.—(AP)—Virginio Gayda, fascist editor, asserted today that the United States was attacking Italian submarines in the Mediterranean and added, "Is the United States in the war? If so let it say so and not complain about possible armed reactions of the Axis powers when its ships venture into the war zone."

Meanwhile, Premier Mussolini declared Italy "does not forget her claims."

This may have been U. S. way of giving notice that it will not be deterred by Italian claims to the French territories of Alsace, Savoy, Tunisia, Corsica and Sardinia, they had not been forgotten.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—(AP)—President Roosevelt, by executive order, has transferred the Coast Guard to the Navy department.

The temporary White House announced this action Sunday without offering any explanation of why the President felt it necessary to take the step at this time. The Coast Guard operated as part of the Navy since the last World War, in which the United States was a belligerent.

Previously he had transferred some Coast Guard vessels to the Navy and assigned some minor naval craft to the Coast Guard in exchange. The new order, dated Saturday, assigns the entire Coast Guard, its equipment and personnel, to the Navy.

The Coast Guard's executive order will, "from this date, will further orders, operate as a part of the Navy, subject to the orders of the secretary of the Navy."

The transfer will result in a unified control of all armed American vessels of any size and strengthen the navy in exercising its guardianship over the western Atlantic and the sea lanes to Greenland and Iceland.

The Coast Guard, whose ranks and pay already were the same as the navy's, had an average of about 11,000 officers, 18,000 enlisted men and 14,000 civilian employees during the last fiscal year. Its equipment at that time included 207 cutters, 230 picket boats, various auxiliary craft and 50 airplanes.

Here-Belaha Calls For Strong Action

LONDON, Nov. 3.—(AP)—Former War Secretary Leslie Hore-Belaha called for some positive military action and some "massive effort" which could lead away from the grip now fastened on the throat of Great Britain.

Any continuation of the present strategy, he said, would be a disaster.

Gurney Wants No Half-Way Measures

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—(AP)—Senator Gurney (R.-I.) urged complete repeal of the neutrality act rather than "another half-measure" while Senator Gillette (D.-Iowa) contended the measure should be retained because "America's welfare and the prosperity of her institutions depend on the maintenance of our neutrality in the war of Europe and Asia."

At the 100th-anniversary debate was resumed today, administration leaders are confident the Senate would pass the bill.

Only 2 Men In City Election Of Tomorrow

Only two candidates will be participating in the election for City Commissioner tomorrow when the polls open at 7:00 o'clock, H. W. Bayer, city clerk, said today. Gene G. Baber, local state owner, and H. James Gut, incumbent commissioner, will be the only two names on the ballot.

The two men will vie with each other in Group No. 2 for a seat on the Commission for the next three years, while G. D. Bishop, candidate in Group No. 1, will not be on the ballot as he is unopposed.

Since the electorate voted down the proposed amendment to the City Charter to elect all of the commissioners at one time only two offices will be open for election at this time.

Mr. Gut, a commissioner for the past three years, is an insurance and real estate agent, connected with A. P. Connelly and Sons. Mr. Baber is the owner and manager of the Aldon Five Cents and a Dollar Store.

A quiet election is expected since no speeches have been made or major issues raised by either candidate. The polls will remain open at the City Hall from 7:00 o'clock tomorrow morning until sundown.

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B-17 Bomber Crashes In California

Eight Crewmen Land With Parachutes In Mountains But Pilot Is Missing

GEORGETOWN, Calif., Nov. 2.—(AP)—Eight Army fliers who parachuted from the B-17 bomber over the Sierra mountains Sunday were found early today by rescue parties. Two others of nine crewmen were rescued last night, but the pilot is still missing.

The four-motored Flying Fortress crashed yesterday in a heavy storm near Georgetown mountains community 35 miles northeast of Sacramento, on a flight from Reno to McClelland field.

Seven army crewmen were missing. Two parachuted to safety. Capt. M. P. Hart said the big bomber crashed "apparently because of a structural failure." Two officers and seven enlisted men made up the crew.

Two crewmen identified only as Corporal Isham and Private Stooly bailed out at 12,000 feet. They landed safely, checked a telephone and reported the accident to McClelland field.

U. S. Built Planes In R. A. F. Sink Ships

LONDON, Nov. 3.—(AP)—British airmen flying American-built Hudson bombers "knocked out" four German ships last night off the Norwegian and Dutch coasts to make a total of 21 vessels sunk or damaged in less than a week.

They also attacked a fish oil factory on the Norwegian coast, the air ministry announced tonight.
