**Burns Cites Education Needs**

JACKSONVILLE (UPI) — Gov. Haydon Burns said today that the biggest problem facing Florida is the need for a better system of public schools, junior colleges and universities.

"At the same time, it is essential that we preserve a favorable tax climate in which every citizen can pay his just share," Burns said.

In his talk to the Florida Legislature, Burns said that the state's education system is in a state of crisis. He called for a major effort to improve the quality of education and to ensure that every child has access to a good education.

Burns also mentioned the need for more investment in research and development, particularly in the areas of space exploration and advanced technology.

**Reds Down Four Jets**

WASHINGTON (UPI) — American fighters shot down four Soviet-made MiG-19 fighters in a dogfight over the Gulf of Tonkin on Tuesday.

The jets were shot down by F-4 Phantom II fighters from the 4th Fighter Squadron, 48th Tactical Fighter Wing, based at Ubon Royal Thai Air Base.

The downed jets were carrying two crew members each. The pilots were ejected and were rescued by the U.S. Navy's 7th Fleet.

**Ships Collide**

WASHINGTON, D. C. (UPI) — The Ocean Queen, a 104-foot fishing and cruise boat, collided with a German freighter and quickly sank in the Atlantic near here Tuesday night.

The Ocean Queen was carrying 14 crew members and 100 passengers. The freighter was carrying a large amount of cargo.

The collision occurred in the North Atlantic Ocean, east of the coast of North America. The Ocean Queen was on its way to Europe, and the freighter was on its way to the West Indies.

**Victory Near**

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UPI) — Communist China today appeared on the threshold of winning a majority vote in the General Assembly for the first time in the 15-year-old body.

The vote was on a resolution that would recognize the People's Republic of China as the only legitimate government of China.

The resolution was sponsored by the Soviet Union and received the support of several other nations, including Cuba, North Vietnam, and North Korea.

**WESH-TV Sold**

NEW YORK (UPI) — Cowles Communications, Inc., has purchased WESH-TV in the Orlando-Daytona Beach area of Florida from the trustees of the John H. Perry Testamentary Trust.

The purchase price was not disclosed. WESH-TV is a major television station in the Orlando area, serving the Central Florida market.

AUGUSTA, Ga. (UPI) — Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower was lifted from his bed today and placed in a chair, the first time he has been allowed up since he was hospitalized with two mild heart attacks last week.

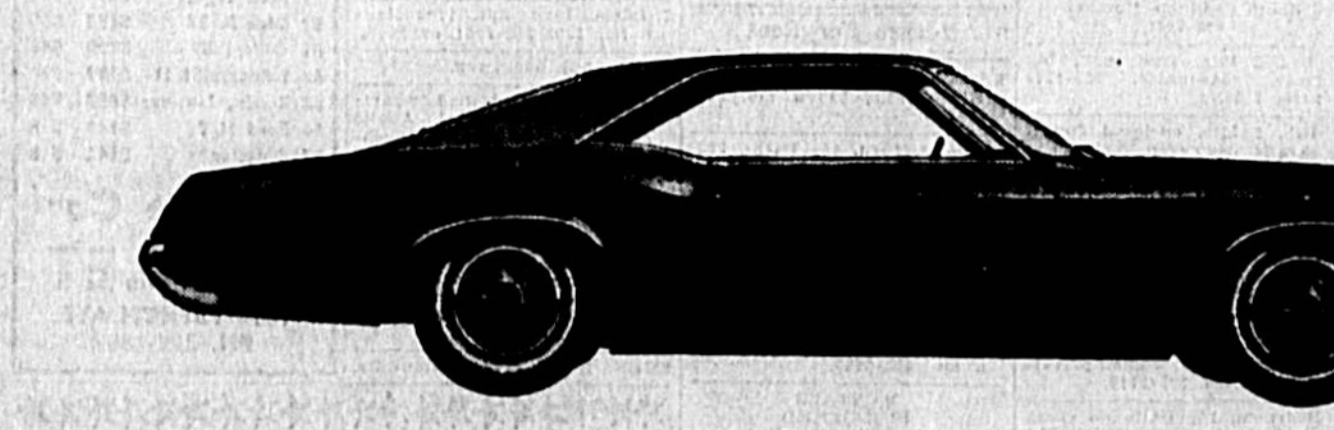
Eisenhower was in the hospital for 18 months. He is now being cared for at the Walter Reed Army Hospital in Washington, D.C.

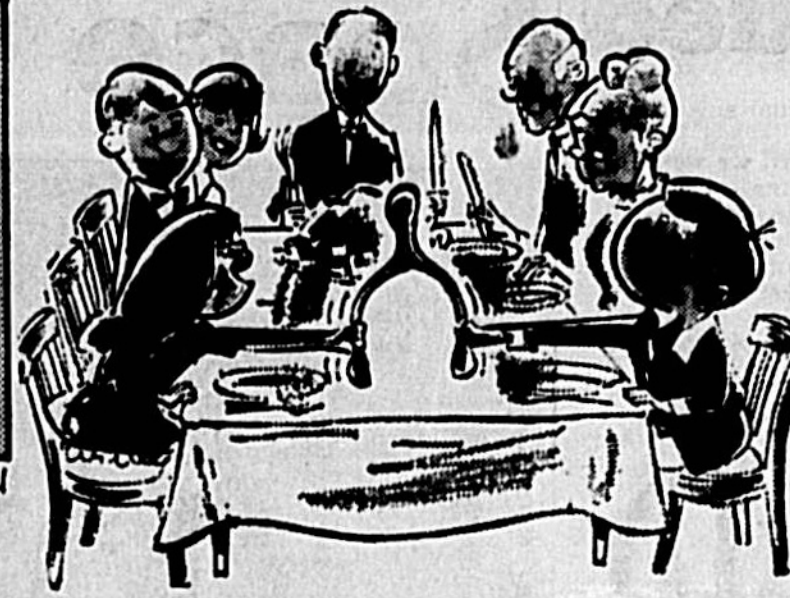

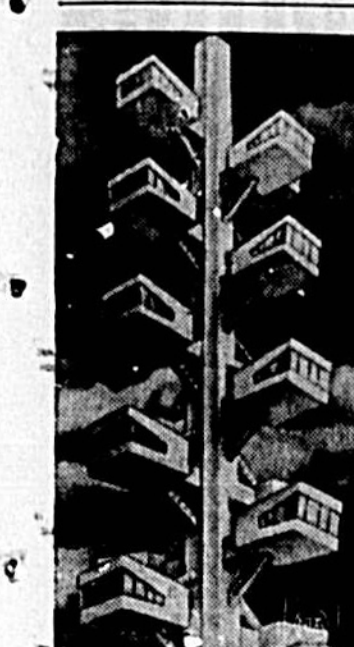

JOHNSON CITY, Tex. — (UPI) — Text of President Johnson's Thanksgiving proclamation:

For all the blessings that have been bestowed upon our nation during the past twelve months, it is a small thing to give thanks to Almighty God. When the Pilgrims first observed Thanksgiving nearly 350 years ago, life was harsh and unremitting. Cold and sickness had diminished their ranks. Their shelter was crude. Their future was uncertain. Yet when their harvest was abundant, they considered themselves blessed — and their hearts were filled with gratitude.

Today we have much more than an abundant harvest. Our nation is rich and strong and united in the cause of liberty and justice. Our physical comforts are unmatched anywhere in the world, our medicine has conquered ancient diseases. In the past year we have added greatly to that national legacy. Let us pray to Him that the forces of violence, indifference and intolerance may soon vanish from the face of the earth so that peace and understanding may reign supreme.

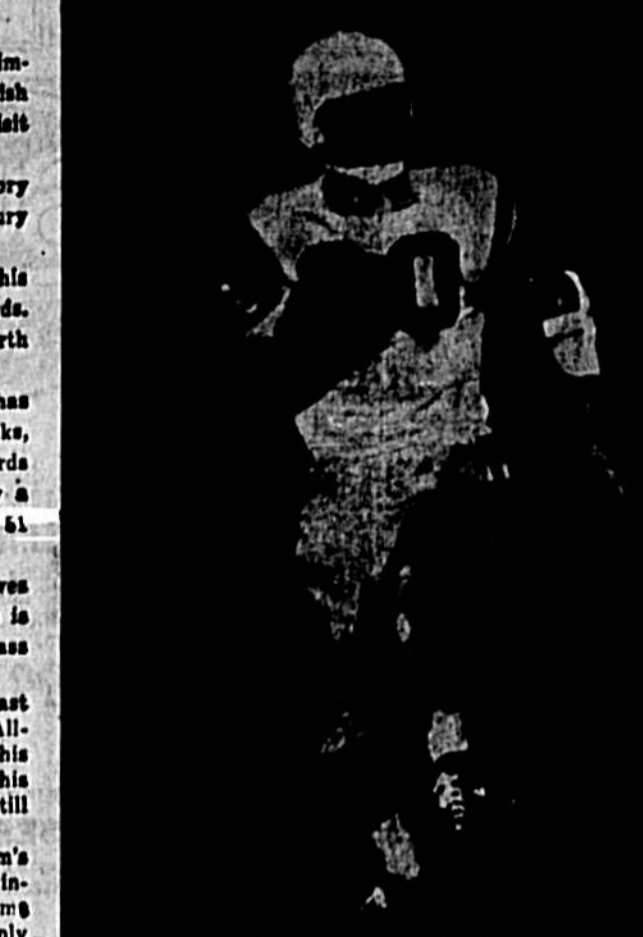

Add 2 cups of diced cooked lamb, 1/2 cup of chopped celery and 1/2 cup of sliced mushrooms. Toss. Serve on crisp lettuce. Makes 4 servings.

LAMB 'N' LEMON  
Lemon sauce is delicious with rack of lamb. Sprinkle a pound rack of lamb with salt and pepper to taste. Place on rack in shallow roasting pan and bake 1 hour in preheated 325-degree oven. While lamb cooks, combine 1/4 cup of sugar and 2 teaspoons of cornstarch in small saucepan. Gradually stir in 1/2 cup of water. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until sauce is thickened and clear. Add 1/2 cup of lemon juice. Mix well. Pour over lamb. Bake an additional 30 minutes, or until lamb is tender. Makes 4 servings.

### Wild Winter Storm Covers Northland

A wild winter storm pushed into the Northland today with snow and high winds. Gale warnings were flying on the Great Lakes and temperatures plunged to zero on the Plains. The severe storm was stirred by winds of 50 miles an hour. Up to 10 inches of snow covered the Lake Superior shore already and four inches were expected today in western Pennsylvania and Ohio. Southern California's heaviest rainfall since April dropped seven inches in the mountains outside Los Angeles Tuesday and three inches in the city, where streets were flooded. At the storm plumed eastward, the U. S. Weather Bureau issued periodic bulletins on its progress. High winds and tornadoes ripped through the Ohio Valley south of the storm center Tuesday night and at least one person was killed. High winds toppled a house trailer at Canton, Ohio, killing one man and injuring three other persons, two of whom remained in critical condition today. There were more storm injuries in the Canton area and four persons were hospitalized at Alliance, Ohio. At the height of the storm, several children were reported missing.

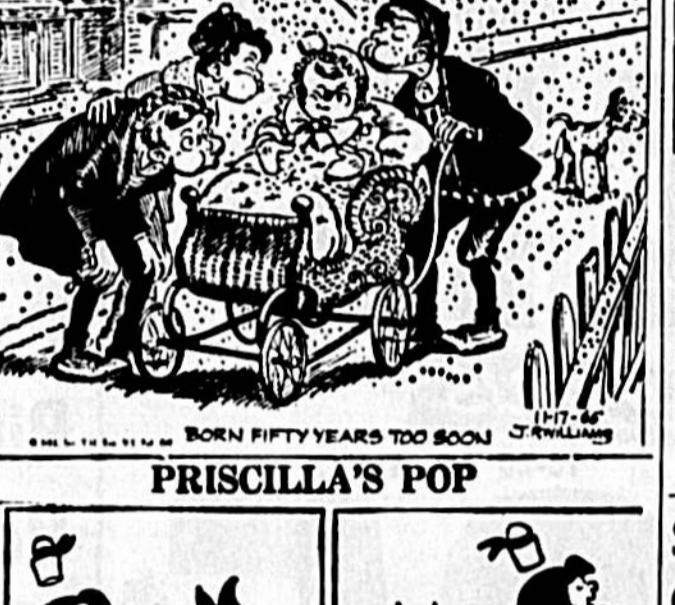

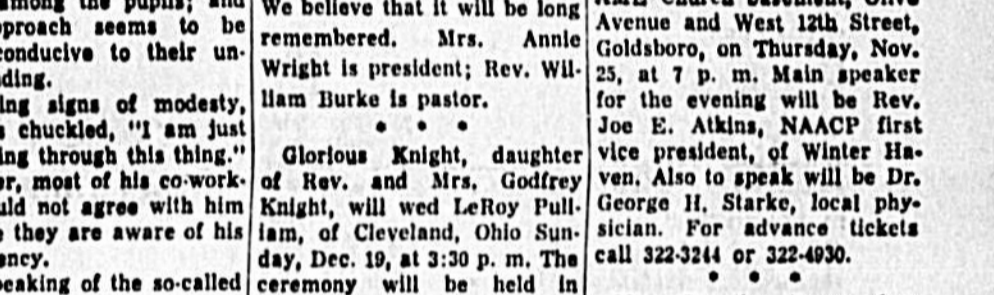

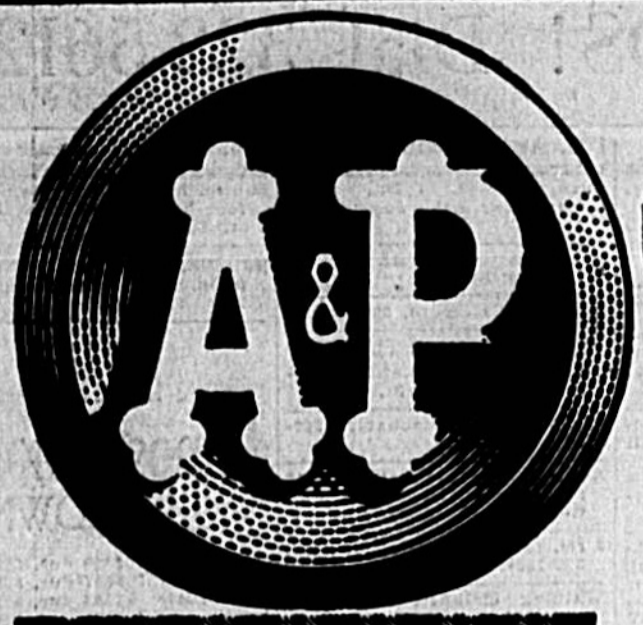

SAIGON (UPI) — U.S. Cavalry battled North Vietnamese troops on the slopes of Chu Pong Mountain today for the fifth consecutive day.

In other action, 40 U. S. Marine helicopters flew two battalions of Viet Cong troops to Hiep Duc 25 miles south of Da Nang where the Viet Cong were the town Wednesday and impaled the Communists on stakes.

### SRD Figures Reveal

By Barry Lewis

Interstate 4 has done its job . . . but it has done the job too well for Sanford!

State Road Department figures indicate the traffic count of motor vehicles on French Avenue (Hwy. 1742) it down over 3,000 daily compared to 1964. This decrease is attributed to the opening of I-4, which allows through traffic to bypass Sanford. Before I-4 was completed, Hwy. 1742 carried the bulk of north-south traffic between Daytona and Orlando or Tampa-St. Petersburg area.

The SRD average daily traffic figure for French Avenue in 1965 is 12,210, compared to 15,065 for 1964.

Before the completion of I-4, many citizens and city officials of Sanford were bemoaning the heavy traffic through Sanford and pushing for a fast finish to the new route to alleviate the pressures.

Since I-4 opened between Daytona Beach and St. Petersburg, however, traffic has decreased and now these same citizens are speaking of economic hardships because cars passing through the city have decreased.

One city official this morning estimated "one out of 25 of those cars that passed through here would stop to purchase something . . . may-

the only candy bar or a canteen . . . but they would spend money. Now, even that trade is lost."

One proposal advanced to bring the auto traffic back through Sanford is a causeway across Lake Monocacy linking Sanford with Orange City on Hwy. 1742 in Volusia County.

The French Avenue daily traffic count is not the only one in Sanford that is showing a decrease. Of seven other roads on which the SRD takes a traffic count in and around Sanford, only one shows an increase in automobile use.

The 1965 traffic figure for 27th Street (combining east and west traffic) is 4,350 compared to 3,975 in 1964. The 23rd Street or RR 46 East and SR 46A traffic total is 6,280 for 1965 opposed to 6,235 in 1964.

Another check point in the SRD survey that shows a significant drop is the one located at the city limits on Seminole Boulevard on the lakefront. This entrance to Sanford showed a decline of 2,300 cars on the daily average. The figures compare at 5,615 for this year against 7,915 in 1964.
