Congress Thursday set a \$4.2 billion ceiling on spending for the current fiscal year in approving the foreign aid authorization measure.

The President had wanted—but did not get—authority to borrow money from the Treasury to finance long-term loans to underdeveloped nations.

One of the main reasons Kennedy wanted this long-term borrowing authority was to avoid the economy minded appropriations committee, although he never announced it.

In approving an \$11.5 billion authorization bill Thursday, Congress did give the President authority to make loan commitments for five years but required him to seek the necessary appropriations each year.

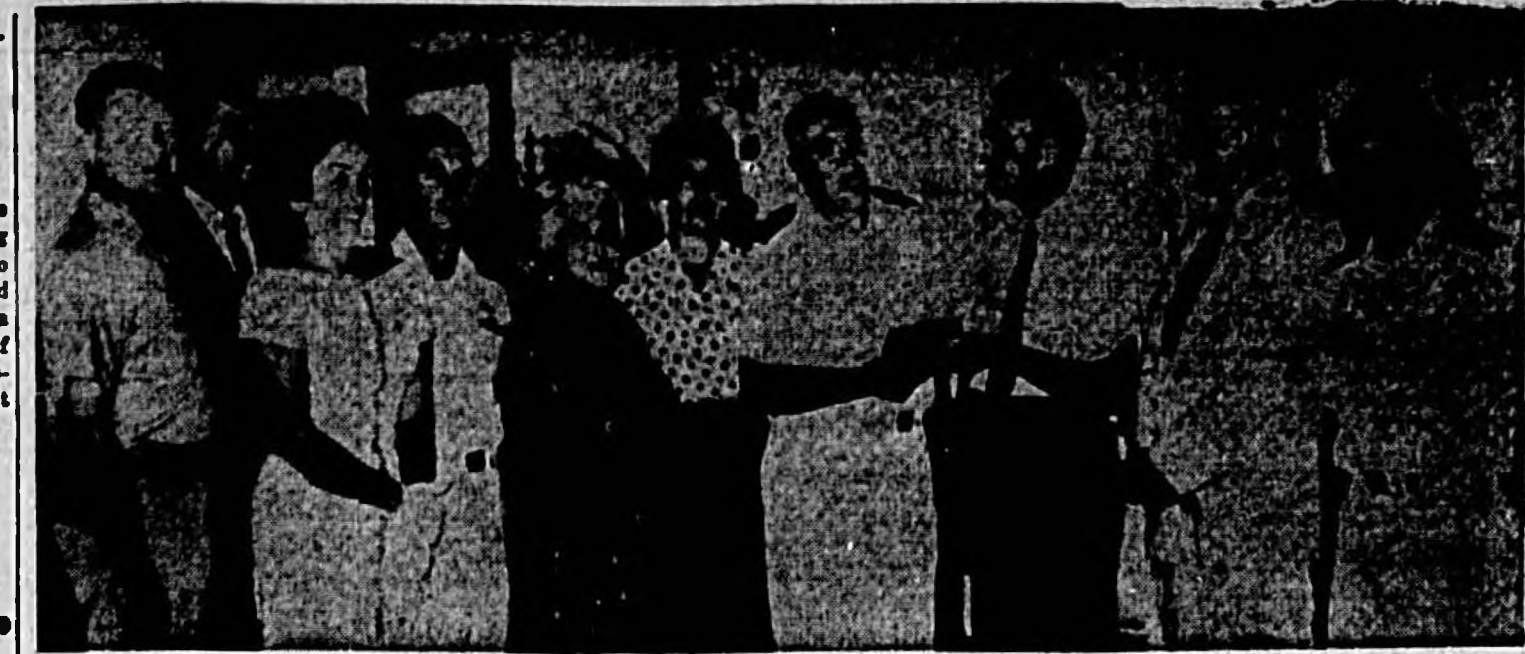

Tight Security Mix Rules Relaxed In Atlanta

ATLANTA (UPI) — City officials announced today the first relaxation of tight security around the four public high schools which admitted nine Negro students in peaceful desegregation this week.

Authorities said the Negroes would arrive for class today at the same time as white students at three of the four integrated schools. They had been told to wait until 15 minutes after class began before showing up during the first two days of the transition.

Police will maintain a 24-hour watch on the schools at least until next week, School Supt. John Letson reported.

He added that the Negroes and their parents would be accepted like any other spectators at football games and other school functions this fall.

The scene at the four desegregated schools Thursday was

even more peaceful than during Wednesday's end to 100 years of classroom segregation in this capital city.

The Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., Atlanta Baptist minister and leader of Southern Negroes in their fight for desegregation, said the city had given "the nation and the world a magnificent demonstration of good faith, good sense and good planning."

City officials, meanwhile, were engaged in legal difficulties over the rapid-fire arrest and jail sentence handed one of four Wednesday's first day of integrated classes.

Attorney James Venable, who handles many cases with racial aspects here, obtained a writ of habeas corpus for Ronald T. Farmer, 18.

DeKalb County Judge Frank Guess set a hearing for late today on the youth's charges that

13,200 Slated To Attend Schools Here

Tuesday is the big day for 13,200 boys and girls in Seminole County when the big yellow buses begin to roll and school bells begin to ring.

This year an additional 1,200 or more children will answer the roll call in the 22 Seminole County schools, but only one new school will open its doors.

The heavy influx of new students in the south end of the county will necessitate double sessions for grades one through four at Alamoonte Springs, and mass instruction groups in the fifth and sixth grades there.

Forty-six new teachers will take their places in the county's educational system and the Hopewell Elementary School for Negro children will add 11 new classrooms to the county total.

At Lyman, a new (to this area) plan of teaching as many as 150 students at once is being put into operation for the first time.

The system utilizes visual education aids and uses an overhead movie projector, film strips and accompanying study texts.

School safety patrols, made up of the boys and girls in the school, wearing their safety helmets, and their Sam Browne chest straps and bells, will guard the approaches to the school to help schoolmales across the street at designated points and carry out their proven value as safe conductors for their fellow students.

There will be a new gymnasium at Lyman School and also a new gym at Crooms Academy, bringing these schools up to the standards to other high schools in the area.

In the junior high schools, beginning industrial shops have been set up to provide a general exploratory study of the future utilization of mechanical skills on the part of the students.

This new project is aimed toward developing a trade and industrial school which will eventually go on through the high school level and also be used by adult vocational training classes.

Tardy bells will ring at various times at schools throughout the county with most of the elementary schools beginning at 8 a.m. However some will begin at 8:30 a.m. and the junior high and high schools at about 8:45 a.m.

All buses will run and lunchrooms will be serving on the first day. This will be a full class day of regular classroom work in most schools.

Hurricane Moves Across Open Sea

MIAMI (UPI)—Hurricane Betsy and her 100 mile an hour winds moved across open sea in the tropical Atlantic today 1,600 miles due east of Cuba.

The season's second hurricane, discovered Saturday night, took an encouraging turn to the northwest Sunday night, a track moving her away from Puerto Rico and the Leeward Islands.

A 3 a. m. advisory from the Miami Weather Bureau centered the storm near latitude 20.6 north, longitude 50.8 west, or about 1,000 statute miles east of San Juan, P. R.

The storm was expected to continue toward the northwest at about 20 miles an hour with little change in size or intensity for the next 12 hours, the advisory said.

Highest winds were estimated at 100 miles an hour near the center. Gales extended 200 miles from the center to the northeast and 75 miles to the southwest.

Before his change of course, Betsy had been following a path ominously similar to that of Hurricane Donna last September. Donna bored across the Atlantic and sliced into the heart of the Florida keys with widespread damage.

Excursion Boat Sinks In Pacific

BOGOTA, Colombia (UPI)—Rescuers worked through early morning darkness today to find out how many persons drowned when a Sunday excursion boat carrying from 200 to 300 persons sank in the Pacific Ocean harbor of Buenaventura.

Port authorities feared that not more than 40 persons were saved, which would put the loss of life in the hundreds, making it Colombia's worst maritime disaster.

At least 60 bodies had been recovered, officials said, but no exact figures were available as to the number of persons aboard.

County Budget Hearing Tuesday

County Commission Chairman J. C. Hutchison will ask the County board at its budget hearing Tuesday to reconsider setting aside additional funds for Civil Defense and putting back in the budget \$15,000 for the tax assessor for reappraisal work.

The county board will hold its formal budget hearing at 9:30 a. m.

Hospitalized Commissioner Vernon Dunn told the Herald by telephone this morning also that he wishes the board would change its mind about the need for a warning system in the county and additional funds for the tax assessor.

Dunn, speaking from Orlando Air Force Base Hospital said he would be "out of circulation" for about a month with a minor heart condition.

The district 4 Commissioner was admitted to the hospital last Thursday night and has undergone several tests and medication.

He reported he was feeling fine but, was ordered to "rest."

Dunn urged the board to reconsider needed CD appropriations, tax appraisal work and also the foster home program for the county.

The commission three weeks ago, by a 3-2 majority, turned down CD requests for a skeleton warning system to cost the county around \$15,000.

Both Hutchison and Dunn favored the warning system.

Speaking about the new reappraisal work, both Dunn and Hutchison today said that the recent board of equalization hearings points out inequities on the tax roll.

A tentative budget for 1961-62 calls for expenditures of \$1,666,050 and a levy of six mills.

General revenue calls for \$612,717 and \$603,333 road and bridge fund.

The tentative fine and forfeiture allotment is \$292,224 and the interest and sinking fund is set at \$109,316.

The proposed countywide levy includes 1.8 mills for the general fund; 2.00 mills for road and bridge; .82 mill fine and forfeiture and .63 mill interest and sinking fund.

A .12 mill levy for the county health unit is expected to produce \$20,829 and .35 mill for the Seminole Hospital district will bring in \$93,461.

Drowning, Accident Mars Weekend Here

A five-year-old Maryland boy visiting the county, was drowned and two persons were hospitalized after a truck-car collision here to mark the Labor Day weekend in Seminole County.

The youngster, Jerald Paul Finch, 5, was drowned in Bear Lake late Saturday afternoon as his parents were visiting friends.

He was found at about 7 p.m. by his sister after he had been missing for 10 minutes.

The Labor Day weekend started off on a bad note Friday afternoon when a semi-trailer and car collided on 25th St. and French Ave.

Mildred Feinberg of Sanford and her six-year-old daughter, Mallory were injured in the mishap with cuts and bruises. The driver of the truck, William Steward of Jacksonville was charged with failure to grant the right of way. Damage to both vehicles was estimated at \$1,000.

Labor Day traffic, defying uncertain weather and official pleas to consider every driver a potential death partner, today sped toward a treacherous bumper-to-bumper climax.

Highway carnage mounted by one dead motorist or pedestrian about every 12 minutes on the final day of the 78-hour, three-day holiday weekend. A spate of boating tragedies sent the weekend accidental death toll still higher.

In a plea to keep the road toll below the Labor Day weekend high of 433 set a decade ago, safety officials noted Labor Day traffic would include not only weekend vacationers but also thousands of families motoring home from summer holidays in time for school.

The National Safety Council estimated 420 persons might die in traffic accidents during summer's final weekend. Highway deaths approached the estimate at about five an hour.

Thunderstorms expected in the Pacific Northwest, parts of the

Great Plains and most of the nation east of the Mississippi meant added driving hazards.

A United Press International tally at 7 a. m. counted 288 traffic victims since the weekend began at 6 p. m. (local time) Friday.

At least 79 persons died from other accidental causes for an overall weekend toll of 363.

It's Safer To Be Way Out

WASHINGTON (UPI)—American astronaut Alan B. Shepard Jr. and Virgil I. (Gus) Grissom have found out that a safe space ride doesn't guarantee a safe ride in a jet plane.

Col. John (Shorty) Powers spokesman for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, today confirmed a report that the two successful spacemen had "a little trouble" with a T-33 jet trainer Saturday over Lake Erie.

He said they "made a routine landing at Selfridge" Air Force Base, Mich., Saturday and during a "normal post-flight inspection it was discovered that the engine pitched a bucket." This, he said, was a term for a turbine bucket, "something like a fan blade."

"They didn't declare an emergency while in the air and made a routine landing at Selfridge," Powers said.

Save Peace Appeal Sought By Neutrals

BELGRADE (UPI)—Leaders at the summit conference of unaligned nations today prepared a "save-the-peace" appeal to the big power blocs to seek a truce in the cold war.

Informed sources said the appeal may be made directly to President Kennedy and Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev later this week.

With the conference opening its fourth session the foreign ministers were reported at work on a draft of the appeal to be submitted later to the conference for final approval.

Conference leaders were said to have decided on the appeal because of deepening concern over the increased international tensions created by the Berlin crisis and Russia's decision to resume nuclear weapons test.

Nikita Unlikely To Accept Plan

MOSCOW (UPI)—Diplomatic observers said today it was unlikely that Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev would accept Western proposals for banning nuclear tests in the atmosphere.

As of early today, there was no public report in Moscow of the joint message to Khrushchev from President Kennedy and British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan.

Clashes Reported In Viet Nam

SARIGON, South Viet Nam (UPI)—Government troops and Viet Cong guerrillas clashed in Koutum Province today with heavy casualties, government sources reported.

The sources said at least 100 rebels and 19 government soldiers were reported killed in the fighting in the central highlands.

The forces were said to have met in fierce hand-to-hand combat in the jungle and highland area near the Laotian border.

Reports from Koutum Province said the guerrillas were two heavily armed battalions which had slipped in from Communist North Viet Nam through Laos and had attacked two government outposts at Poko and Thaka three days ago.

DETROIT (UPI)—The United Auto Workers hoped to get a counter offer from General Motors today by dropping its profit sharing demand and starting preparations to call a strike of 310,000 GM workers if no agreement is reached in two days.

Kennedy Holds Firm Hope Reds Will Back Ban

HYANNIS PORT, Mass. (UPI)—President Kennedy holds firm hope that Russia will join in an immediate British-American-Soviet ban on fallout-producing nuclear tests in the atmosphere as a big first step toward worldwide outlawing of such blasts.

This was reported today by authoritative sources. They said the Chief Executive is convinced that France and other countries with present or future atomic capabilities would follow suit if Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev signs the three-power pact proposed Sunday by Kennedy and British Prime Minister Harold A. Macmillan.

Kennedy's basic position was summed up by Acting Press Secretary Andrew T. Hatcher, who told newsmen:

"The President's views are that the matter of atmospheric testing is acute to all nations of the world, and should be acted on at once. As more and more nations achieve the ability for atmospheric testing, there is less and less of a chance that an agreement can be reached."

One big question, of course, was whether a multi-nation agreement ultimately would also extend to Communist China, which has been described as trying to develop its own nuclear weapons.

Labor Day

Labor Day is a uniquely American holiday. Other nations may have days to honor labor, but they're not the same. May Day, for example, is a worker's holiday in Communist lands, but it is a holiday in honor of the state, not the worker.

Parades and organized celebrations are the exception in modern America. The holiday has grown into a private affair, a family day for picnics and outings or back-yard loafing, a quiet end to summer.

Does this bespeak softness and selfishness in the American people? The flag should be flown on this day, but how many have you seen on front lawns or porches? Is it just a pause during the mad capitalist scramble for money and material possessions?

Or, on the other hand, is it the proper way for a free people to honor a system under which they, themselves (not the state,) have provided more people with more of the good things of life than ever before in history—not 20 years from now but today?

Critical months lie ahead. The American people have been called on for unusual pastimes sacrifices. They may be called upon for more, and they will respond again, if need be. Those who conclude that the patriotic hymn is the only American symbol do so at their work. Rather, it is an indication that our citizens are facing the danger and... rifles with a quiet confidence that proceeds from an inner strength.

In purely domestic affairs, other challenges face the country. The paradox of pockets of jobs in the midst of growing unemployment and business expansion is still an unsolved problem. The phenomenon of automation will continue to cause some dislocation. Creeping inflation remains an economic threat.

Recognizing this, it seems only fitting that Labor Day be observed by the individual taking advantage of a fall in the "honest vigor of his toll" and return with even more resolution to his daily stint.

In the struggle with totalitarianism, with its absolute control over production, consumption and goals, the manner in which America meets its own problems is as important as the number of its troops or missiles. Not everyone can do a uniform to meet the external challenge, but all can contribute in some way to America's strength at home.

That is the importance of Labor Day, U.S.A. It is more than a day to honor working men (both employer and employed) and the benefits which their labors have provided. It is a day to make a renewed determination to show that it is in freedom that the good life finds its home. It cannot be decreed by the state. Americans, as in the past, have the freedom to prove it or not.

ROME, Italy — As if in answer to my wish for a set of statistics with which to fortify my belief that there is no such thing as a World Opinion, the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) has come out with one.

According to this international body, nearly 70 per cent of the world's population lives without knowing what is going on at home or abroad. Millions upon millions never read a newspaper, hear a radio, or see a television set.

This is a shocking commentary on the way of life in the twentieth century, but it's true. It should be remembered by statesmen and politicians, especially our own, when they shy away from positive action for fear of arousing world opinion.

"World" and "opinion" are over-worked words in the United States, along with "darling," "wonderful," "super," and "okay."

The United States thinks twice before issuing a new stamp lest it offend world opinion. It weighs world opinion—even though there isn't any such thing—before fussing about hijacked planes, kidnapped citizens, and making a bank loan.

You would think, to hear some

statesmen talk, that all the people in the world were hanging on to their words, and would make up their minds as a result of what they heard. Or set around after a speech from Washington, Paris, or London comparing notes.

Those 70 per cent who don't even know where Washington, London, and Paris are, or whether they are rivers, cities, or mountains, should not be pictured as listening with hands cupped behind their ears lest they miss a word.

It would be wonderful if they did, and were sufficiently educated to appreciate and think through what they heard, but they don't and aren't.

If world opinion existed, and counted for as much as the leaders of the West seem to think it does, then Russia would have few people on its side, for not a day passes that Russia does not commit an act which would outrage men and women who believe in peace and decency and dignity.

Russia cares little for world opinion. Either that or she chooses to ignore it.

If world opinion counts, then how does Russia get by with sealing off East Germany, turning people into animals to be kept in an incorporated zoo, and shooting those who try to escape?

How does Russia tell the world that it is perfectly willing to seal off the access routes to West Berlin and allow the inhabitants to starve for all it cares?

If Russia thought there was any world opinion, or cared a farthing for it if it did, it wouldn't dare stamp out the freedom for which people all over the world are seeking with all their might.

I can't help but wonder what would happen if the United States pulled a lawless act comparable to what the Russians have done in East Berlin. The very Americans who accuse it in Russia, who seek negotiations with Russia, who are willing to make concessions to Russia, would fall dead in horror, or just about.

Russia can threaten the earth with destruction and get by with it. Let the United States send in 1,500 armed men to a trouble spot and the world gasps. It doesn't make sense.

Political Notebook

WASHINGTON—(NEA)—John J. McCloy, presidential adviser on disarmament, resumes huddling with the Russians in New York Sept. 5, but it isn't to talk about disarmament as such.

The topic will be composition of a new United Nations commission which will talk about disarmament later.

This was the subject of talks which McCloy conducted with the Russians in Washington, Moscow and with Khrushchev at his Black Sea vacation resort earlier this summer. They made no progress.

If the New York talks don't do any better, the subject will probably be kicked back to the UN General Assembly convening Sept. 19. The disarmament treaty-renewal will then be cranked up for another spin to get the treaty.

In view of the Berlin situation, any talks at all with the Russians on or about disarmament may seem futile.

The Russians have walked out on disarmament conferences five times since the end of World War II. The last time was at the 10-power talks they initiated at Geneva in June.

They are still trying to get mileage out of Khrushchev's proposal for "general and complete disarmament." Communist propaganda has misled the whole world on G and C D.

By the Russian definition, every country would agree to disarm in principle, but there would be no disclosure of arms strength and

no inspection. Then, at an agreed-upon date, every country would deliver to deposit on many missiles, planes, war vessels, tanks and pieces of artillery. These would be destroyed. But there would be no verification of what stocks of weapons any country might have left.

This would make it more a game of blind man's bluff than genuine disarmament. The West might disarm. The East wouldn't. Any ambassador who tries to negotiate disarmament under such conditions has to be an incurable optimist.

McCloy seems to qualify. So does Arthur H. Dean, who has just returned to Geneva for a third try at getting a nuclear weapons test ban agreement with the Russians. Somehow, the Democratic administration like to give these impossible jobs to Republicans to keep down the Democrats.

There have been 19 U. S. special ambassadors assigned to negotiating disarmament with the Russians since 1946. They have kept the Russians from scoring by pitching good ball. But when their own terms have come at bat, nobody has reached first base.

Why keep trying?—particularly in the face of arms build-ups by both sides over the Berlin situation?

President Kennedy has postponed an agreement for starting civil aviation flights between New York and Moscow because of this tension and Republicans have praised him for it.

So why not be equally realistic and give up on disarmament talks and cultural exchange agreements, too?

McCloy has a ready answer for all such extremist and defeatist ideas. If the United States has to wait until all is calm before dis-

armament talks are begun, it will be a long time.

Taking up disarmament talks now accompanies the Berlin crisis, he continues. If the Berlin situation can be settled peacefully without a war—which both sides seem to agree will happen eventually—the advantages of disarmament will then be apparent to everyone. Progress can then be made.

But before there is any general laying down of arms, a lot of other problems will have to be solved. There will have to be agreement on how future disputes will be settled without war. A real organization for peace will have to be set up. There will have to be agreement on how it is to be controlled, and that no Russian veto can be applied to its decisions.

The more all these problems are studied, the more complex and difficult they become. This is the justification offered for setting up the new U. S. Disarmament Administration under legislation now before Congress.

Neither the Russians, the British, the French nor any other nation has such an organization.

Its creation by the United States, says McCloy, will be a pledge of the American desire to secure disarmament with complete security.

Yanks Just About Wrap-Up AL Race

Nice race — wasn't it?
For eight teams, the American League race has been over for some time.

And the New York Yankees took care of the ninth team Sunday by polishing off the disillusioned Detroit Tigers, 8-6, for a crushing three-game sweep that left Ralph Houk's crew 4½ games in front and little question as to which city the World Series will start in next month.

The only remaining question in the AL centers around Babe Ruth's home run record and whether Roger Maris or Mickey Mantle will break it.

Maris, with 33 homers already, failed to hit any Sunday, but still is eight games ahead of the Babe's record pace. Mantle, however, belted his 40th and 50th homers of the season to move three games ahead of the pace.

Never before in major league history have two players on the same team hit 50 or more homers in one season. And the total of 103 homers by Maris and Mantle are only four shy of the record 107 hit by Ruth and Lou Gehrig in 1927.

Mantle, playing with an ailing left arm that required ice applications between innings, hit his second homer of the game off loser Gerry Staley to lead off the ninth. The blow tied the score at 5-5.

Yogi Berra, who had homered in the first inning, followed Mantle's ninth inning blast with a single that finished Staley and brought Ronnie Kille on the scene. A sacrifice and an inten-

tional walk to Bill Skowron followed. Elston Howard then ended the game with a three-run homer into the left field seats.

Southpaw Luis Arroyo, making his third appearance in as many days, was credited with his 13th victory. Arroyo won two of the three games with the Tigers and saved the other one for Ralph Terry.

Baltimore beat Cleveland, 1-0, in 11 innings, Boston downed Minnesota, 8-6, and Chicago swept a pair from Washington, 5-4 and 4-1. The Kansas City-Los Angeles game was postponed because of rain.

In the National League, the Los Angeles Dodgers climbed to within 2½ games of first place with a 5-4 decision over the San Francisco Giants. The last-place Philadelphia Phillies, beaten 17 straight times by the Cincinnati Reds, finally defeated the league leaders, 3-2.

Birdie Tebbetts made his debut as manager of the Milwaukee Braves and led his team to a split against the Chicago Cubs. The Cubs won the opener, 6-5, and the Braves scored a 4-2 victory in the nightcap, called at the end of six innings because of darkness. The Pittsburgh Pirates defeated the St. Louis Cardinals, 8-1.

County Commission Defers 1961 - 62 Budget Adoption

Action Expected Friday

The County Commission today deferred action until Friday on its 1961-62 budget after delegations appeared before the board protesting any cuts in the agricultural and home demonstration funds.

The commission was also hit with a protest from a south Seminole resident asking that appropriations for the Chamber of Commerce be curtailed.

The board agreed to continue its budget hearing at 9:30 a. m. Friday.

A delegation headed by Mrs. George Otta of Longwood appeared before the board asking whether the board was considering eliminating the home demonstration office.

"I know of no such move," said chairman J. C. Hutchison.

(At an informal budget hearing in which a Herald reporter was present, the board discussed eliminating that office as well as an assistant to the county agent and juvenile counselor.)

M. L. Cullum, who said he represented the county farm bureau, also stressed the need for keeping the county agent's budget the same as last year and said that "in reality the county agent needs additional help."

S. Forbes Simpson appeared before the board and said he was objecting to any appropriations to the chamber and Jaycees.

And also heard from was Civil Defense Director A. B. Peterson Sr., who said he was not here for an appeal. "You all realize the need and are as familiar with the situation as I am," he explained.

Peterson has time and time again requested additional funds for CD and has cited the need for a warning system.

The board also received a letter from Tax Assessor Mary Earle Walker who urged the board to reconsider its action of cutting out \$15,000 for reappraisal work in the temporary budget.

Commissioner John Fitzpatrick said that in view of all these "taxpayers," I move we defer action until later.

It was then the board agreed to reconvene on the budget Friday.

Commission Okays Redistricting Plan

The County Commission today adopted a resolution redistricting the five county commission districts and agreed to advertise the legal boundaries of the districts next week.

The redistricting move would equally distribute the population in all the five districts.

In other business heard Commissioner James P. Avery reported that a suitable building to conduct welfare surplus commodity operations has been found but negotiations with the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad for the project are necessary.

Avery said he would recommend using a portion of the ACL freight warehouse on First Street for the program.

Sanford Tot Hit, Injured By Auto

A four-year-old boy was hospitalized Monday after being hit by a car at 12:30 p.m. on Sipes Ave., the sheriff's office reported.

The boy, James Alexander, darted out into the path of a vehicle operated by Larry Ash, according to Deputy J. Q. Galloway.

The spokesman said it was the first time Western troops on border duty in Berlin had used tear gas against Communist police.

The first report of the incident came from West German police. American spokesmen at first expressed surprise at the report but later confirmed it.

Police said the Communists sprayed the water across the border at an American officer and two enlisted men on border patrol.

The patrol threw five or six tear gas grenades back over the Communist-erected wall and the East German police scurried for cover in doorways, police said.

The incident was an indication of a toughening attitude by the American military in the face of repeated Communist provocations.

Sunday the Americans drew an orange chalk line at Friedrichstrasse — two yards within territory claimed by the East Germans—and stationed live heavily armed soldiers on it to show where the border was.

U. S. Must Test, Smathers Says

OCOE (UPI) — The Berlin crisis will get worse before it gets better, Sen. George Smathers, (D-Fla.) said Monday.

Smathers, in a Labor Day address to about 2,000 persons here, also called for resumption of U. S. nuclear weapons testing.

Nikita Khrushchev, Smathers said, "can play only two more cards—one to block off the allies, or, two, to start war in some other area of the world, directly or through a satellite."

Must Hold Firm, De Gaulle Says

PARIS (UPI) — President Charles de Gaulle said today the Allies must hold their positions in Berlin "by force if necessary."

He told a news conference attended by 700 reporters at the Elysee Palace that the Western powers "have no better means of serving work, peace than by remaining upright and firm."

May Reach Hurricane Force By Wednesday

MIAMI (UPI) — Carla, the season's third tropical storm, built up today as a menace in the Caribbean Sea as Hurricane Betsy harmlessly far out in the Atlantic.

The Weather Bureau at Miami said Carla may reach hurricane force by Wednesday.

An 11 a. m. advisory located Carla's center about 100 miles southeast of tiny Swan Island, site of a radio station that broadcasts propaganda against Cuban Premier Fidel Castro. The location was near latitude 16.4 north, longitude 83.0 west.

Carla was moving at a slow nine miles an hour toward the west-northwest.

"The storm continues to increase slowly in intensity," the bureau said.

Highest winds this morning were clocked at 50 m.p.h. Gale-force winds fanned out 200 miles to the northeast and 100 miles to the southwest.

The Weather Bureau said the north coast of Honduras, which is south of British Honduras, would escape dangerous winds. But an advisory warned against heavy rains and some flooding along the northern mountain slopes of Honduras.

Hurricane Betsy, meanwhile, still packed 100 mile an hour winds. The weather bureau said at 11 a. m. that although Betsy has shown a more northwesterly course during the night it still offers no threat to the U. S. mainland.

The hurricane center was located near latitude 27.1 north, longitude 82.0 west or about 800 statute miles east-southeast of Bermuda.
