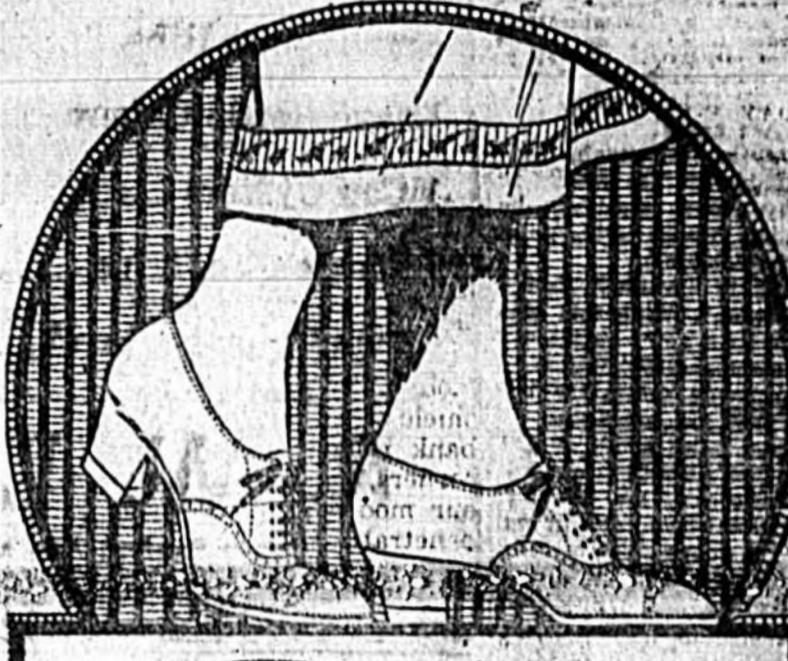

FORMER KING OF LIQUOR RUNNERS QUILTS THE GAME

W. Haas, Who Next To Remus Was Biggest Bootlegger In United States, Now Running Resort Near Savannah, Ga.

NEW YORK, Jan. 31.—W. Haas, former millionaire "admiral" of the bootleggers, who next to George Remus, was the biggest bootlegger in the United States, now is "through" backing the Volstead Act.

"I wouldn't sell a half pint for a thousand dollars," said Haas, a tall, slender, blue-eyed, blonde man of about thirty-five who talks with a Southern drawl. "I served my time for breaking the prohibition law, and it isn't worth the gamble. Never again!"

Haas lives in Savannah, Ga., his home all his life. He is said to be wealthy. How wealthy, he won't say, but friends of his claim he is worth \$5,000,000.

"Any bank in Savannah is my recommendation," Willie told this writer. "I'm in a new business. I manage the resort known as Tybrisa, at Tybee, Ga., on Tybee island, eighteen miles south of Savannah, on the Atlantic seaboard. There, in the cool of the evening under the crystal balls, and in the moonlight, the young folks and old folks trip the light fantastic and enjoy themselves, and Willie sees that they have a good time."

Time was when Willie supplied a large part of America with tremendous shipments of booze from Nassau, in the Bahama Islands. He was the "admiral" of a fleet of boats that bucked the waves from the Bahama's to the coast of Georgia with huge cargoes of liquor.

He bought the liquor for as low as \$12 a case in the Bahama Islands, sold it for \$60 a case in Savannah, and shipped it elsewhere for much higher prices—at one time getting from \$110 to \$130 a case in New York City. He used to re-ship the booze from Savannah to New York City as oil, loaded into large tanks. He also shipped the liquor as furniture and carted thousands of cases into the interior of the country in specially constructed Packard roadsters. He had a big distributing depot at Columbus, Ga.

His Packard roadsters were one of the innovations of the rum-running business. Each automobile was equipped to carry sixty cases of liquor. The trucks he used had specially-built springs that averted suspicion when they were passing through towns from Savannah en route to Washington, Cincinnati, Detroit, New York City and other points where the demand was heavy.

Haas' trucks were also equipped with auxiliary gas tanks so that they could travel long distances without a stop. His Packard roadsters usually carried a small boy or girl to alleviate suspicion. He personally supervised the operation of this far-flung business, making trips on the trucks and also making quick dashes to the Bahama's in his speed boats.

Willie grew up in the liquor business. His father was a wholesale liquor dealer in Savannah in pre-prohibition days. He has an honest looking face, charming smile and a winning personality. He has made a legion of friends. He resembles a young football coach more than he does a bootlegger.

"I'm through with that business, however," Willie reiterates. "I was finally sent to Atlanta Penitentiary for three years but was released because of good behavior after serving eighteen months. It was in Atlanta that I met George Remus. He was a character!"

"I want to say one thing in all the time I was bootlegging. I never carried a gun. The only laws I ever broke were the Volstead Act and the law that forbids bribing prison officials for special privilege. But all that is back of me. I am looking to the future now—and to the continued success of Tybrisa."

General's Jaw Put On Exhibition For Dentist Convention

CHICAGO, Jan. 31.—The model of General Scott's jaw, the largest known jaw in the world, was placed upon exhibition here at the Chicago Dental Society convention.

The jaw measured slightly more than four inches in diameter, or about twice the size of the average jaw.

"The jaw of Chamultepec," explained Dr. Ernest E. Dalton, who constructed the model, "had a massive and impressive face. It was the face of a true conqueror, its wide and heavy jaw bearing evidence to the iron determination of the warrior."

"During his lifetime he was the ruler of contemporary dentistry," said Dr. Dalton.

General Scott's jaw, which he lost in the war of 1848 against the Mexicans in which he captured the peace terms following the capture of Mexico City, but he was commander-in-chief of union forces in

the Civil War, retaining that post until he retired because of advanced age.

The model was made from a cast taken at the time of General Scott's death.
