Editorial Comment

Governmental Reorganization A Prime Issue

High hopes for a sound reorganization of the executive arm of Florida's state government are clouded today with a fog of political and personal emotions.

On April 8 when the 60 day regular session of the legislature convened, Gov. Claude R. Kirk, Jr. (R) summoned the Democratic controlled legislators to perform with a high standard.

Proven and entrenched Democratic leadership, however, who had been at odds with much of the Kirk operations during his first two years as governor, apparently set about to show that the legis-

lative arm was and is quite independent of the executive. Thus, when they went about raising their own salaries ten-fold, did so with great alacrity and then with a rare show of speed overrode a veto by the governor of the salary increase within less than 24 hours, the fat was in the fire.

We have discussed this issue and will do so again after the legislature brings this session to an end and what actually has happened to legislators' pay, expenses and allowance is "on the books."

Today, however, we deplore this situation as it does nothing to allow the legislators, and we do not underestimate the personal integrity and professional pride which impels the vast majority, to tackle the governmental reorganization which has long been a major objective of the public.

The heat, we must point out, has come to the capital after widespread and almost complete publicity on the salary increase produced such a voter outcry to indicate that the re-election of those who

voted to host their pay-checks is, now, in jeopardy. As the two houses send their respective members into the conference machinery to iron out differences in the bills which were voted by the Senate and the House, there is an obvious drawing of battle lines.

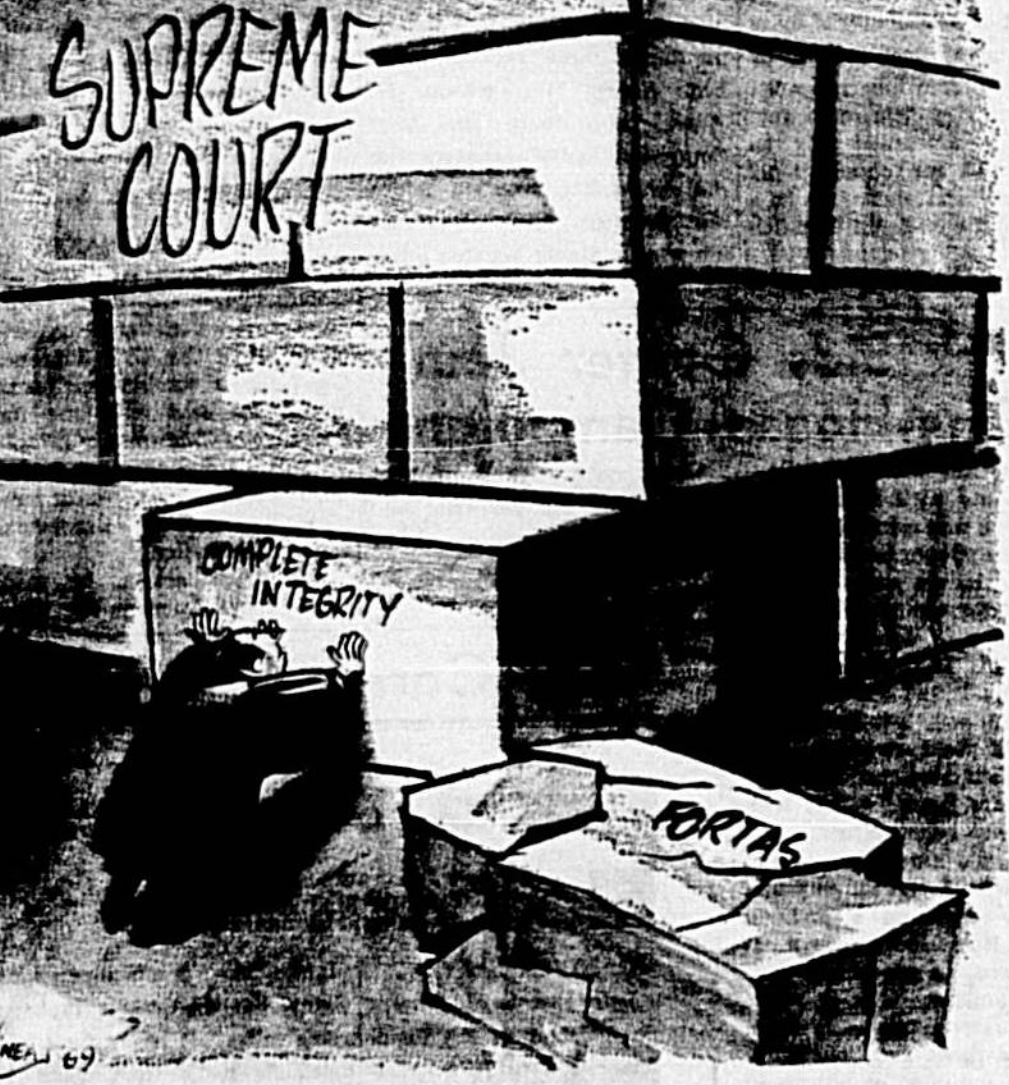
Without trying to decipher the language or to point out the intricacies of the positions which this legislative machinery is now working out, it is clear that the reorganization of the executive arm is being held up by the rather unexpected but increasingly important issue of changing the entire legislative body from a two chamber to a one chamber (unicameral) body quite likely.

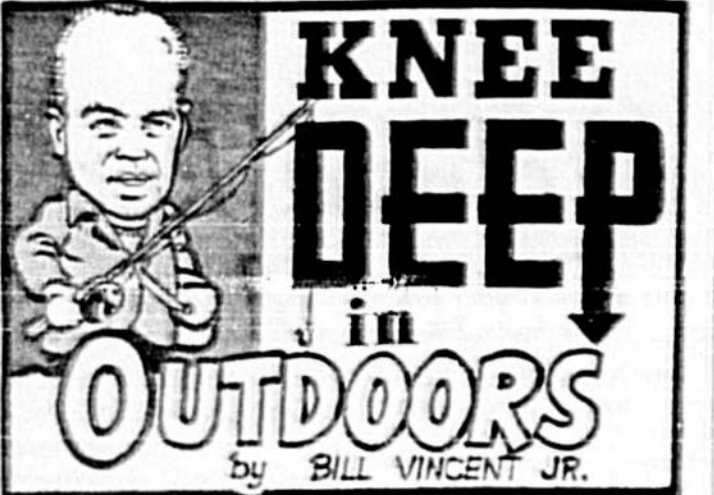

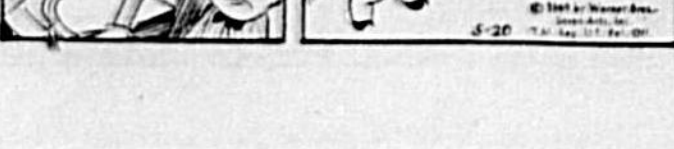

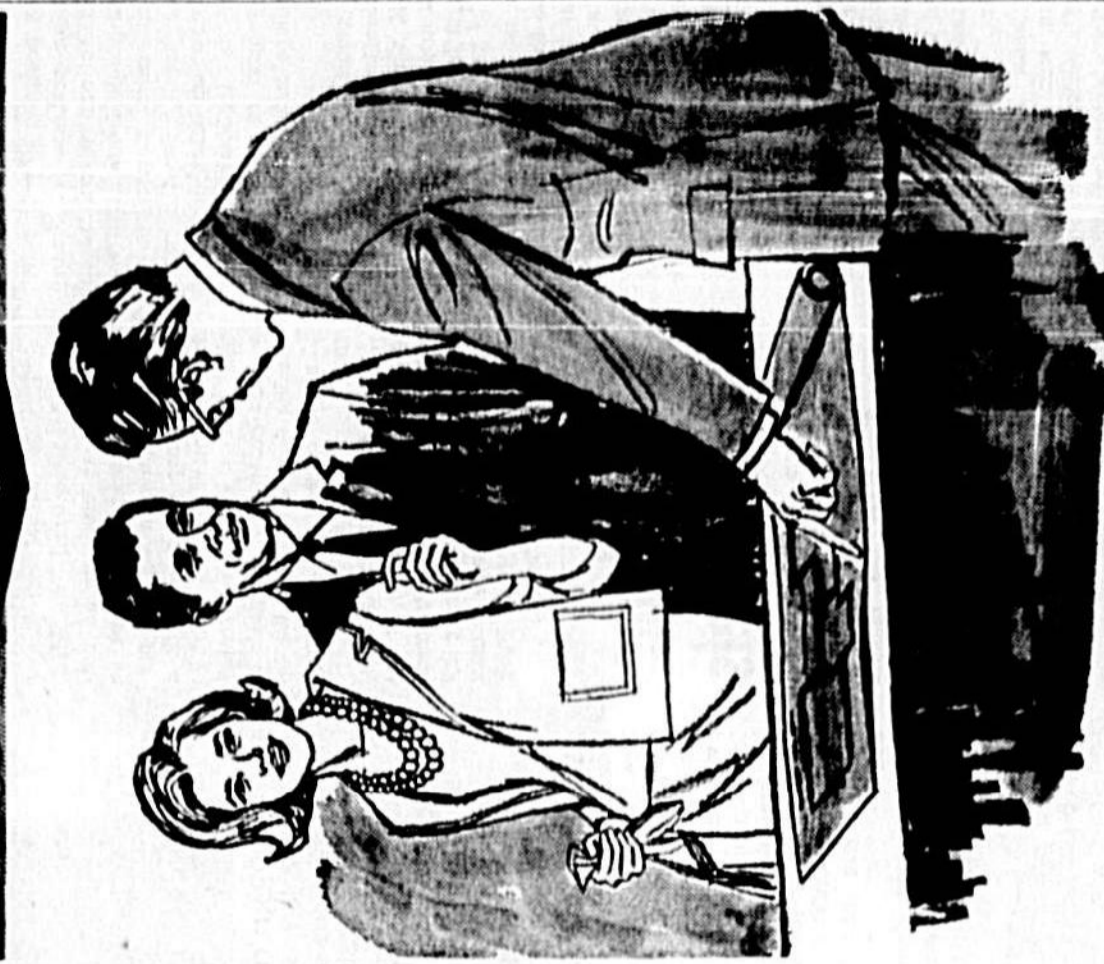
