## Royalty To Fete Dutch Heroes

Mrs. Grace Van Staveren, office manager at Ellnor Motors, will leave Tuesday for The Netherlands to attend a reception for her husband, Cdr. Jan Van Staveren (Dutch Royal Navy, retired), at the Dutch palace by Queen Johanna and Prince Bernard.

Van Staveren, who is presently working in Atlanta, Ga., is one of the wearers of the Militaire Willem Order, a war decoration comparable to the United States Congressional Medal of Honor.

All wearers of this medal are being feted at the reception on the occasion of the 150th anniversary of the origin of the award by King Willem III, the father of the late Queen Wilhemina. The reception will be held at Huistamborsch Palace, near The Hague.

Mr. and Mrs. Van Staveren were born and reared in Holland and Mrs. Van Staveren herself, was decorated by Gen. Dwight Eisenhower for her work with the Dutch underground, helping to hide downed American flyers.

Before his retirement from the Dutch Navy, Van Staveren was sent to the United States as assistant Naval attaché at the Dutch Embassy in Washington, D. C.

EVANSTON, Ill. (UPI) — Methodist leaders delayed for at least six months a showdown on whether an all-white southern division of the church would be forced to accept jurisdiction over Negro church units (conferences).

The petitioners for both sides, the Central (Negro) Jurisdiction and the South-eastern Jurisdiction, bowed to the wishes of church bishops and decided not to present their arguments to the church's nine-member judicial council here.

The Southeastern Jurisdiction is made up of Methodist administrative units from Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Kentucky, and Tennessee.

AUGUSTA, Ga. (UPI)—The Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen was enjoined from striking the Southern Railway Thursday shortly after brake-men left their jobs. Federal Judge Frank M. Scarlett issued the injunction several hours after the strike was called.

**Birth Control**  
JACKSONVILLE (UPI) — The State Welfare Board has turned down an offer of \$25,000 to set up a voluntary sterilization program for the poor. The board felt that it should observe the results of a voluntary birth control pill program before embarking on any new ventures.

JACKSONVILLE (UPI) — As his son burst happily into the room to greet him, an Internal Revenue Service employe squeezed off a pistol shot which killed the boy's mother, then killed himself.

## 6 More Yanks Dead In War With Commies

SAIGON (UPI) — Four Americans were killed today in two separate clashes with guerrillas in South Viet Nam. In the air war against North Viet Nam, an armada of 190 U. S. planes knocked out seven vital bridges — the most crippling attack yet against Communist supply routes to the South.

Three Americans were killed while charting a beach for possible landings by more U. S. combat troops. An American Special Forces officer was killed and two enlisted men were seriously wounded in a battle with guerrillas 150 miles southwest of Saigon.

U. S. military authorities reported two other combat deaths — an American pilot killed when his observation plane crashed last night 270 miles northeast of Saigon and an officer wounded near Da Nang.

Authorities identified the Da Nang victim as 1st Lt. Gary L. Steele, of Bliss, Idaho. He died at Clark AFB hospital in the Philippines where he was flown for treatment of his battle wounds.

The observation plane pilot died when his plane crashed on takeoff from an airstrip at Phu Cat.

U. S. Air Force and Navy planes carried out today's massive attacks on the Communist north, raining almost 600,000 tons of bombs in daylight sorties.

The first — and largest — raids were conducted almost simultaneously by 74 Air Force and 50 Navy attack planes that destroyed five major bridges ranging from 140 to 300 feet in length.

An Air Force spokesman said the bridges were located at Phuc Thien, Ly Nhan, Pho Yen and Xom Thung, where two bridges span the Din River.

Later, 60 Skyhawks and Skyraiders, supported by Navy Crusader jets, returned to North Viet Nam to blast bridges at Xom Gia and Son Dinh.

There were indications that the South Vietnamese air force also conducted a raid today against North Viet Nam, but no official announcement was made.

## Northern States Freeze, Bask

United Press International Hall hit sections of Minnesota, Wisconsin and Illinois early today. Thunderstorms and rain drummed western and Great Lakes states.

Snow rimmed northern Michigan. Freezing drizzle leech Duluth, Minn.

Cool northern weather contracted sharply with summer-like warmth from Missouri and Colorado south. Temperatures pushed into the 90s in both states Thursday and topped 100 in south-west Texas.

## Strong Winds Delay Fire Ant 'Bombings'

Too much wind prevented B-17 bomber planes from taking off this morning to initiate the fight against the imported fire ant in Orange, Seminole, Lako and Volusia Counties.

The intensive four-county program was scheduled to begin at 7 a. m. from Herndon Airport but gusts of wind up to 15 miles per hour delayed the departure of the planes.

"We need virtually no wind for this type of operation," Jim Haley, of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, said.

He said this morning's wind of eight-15 miles per hour would distort the pattern of the millions of pellets of poisonous bait to be dropped.

Haley said it is doubtful if the planes would be able to drop the mirex bait today but the program would begin Monday or Tuesday if the weather conditions are right.

Haley forewarned residents that the converted B-17 bombers would be flying at altitudes of 100 to 200 feet.

## Navy Chiefs Upset Taxes

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The Supreme Court ordered today to refund \$311,381 in consumer whiskey taxes collected from 32 Navy chief petty officers' club around the state during a 23-month period.

(This order will bring the return of more than \$4,000 to the CPO Club at Sanford Naval Air Station, the man's club today.)

The court said the clubs "were all instrumentalities of the federal government and therefore were not subject to state taxation of the type involved when the taxes were collected and paid."

The Navy clubs challenged a 1961 state law that made excise taxes on alcoholic beverages a consumer tax instead of a tax on the manufacturer and distributor.

## Church Merger Voting Delayed

MONTEAT, N. C. (UPI) —The 103th general assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. considered today a record \$8.5 million budget and several key committee reports, including one on Christian relations.

The assembly delayed until Saturday a vote on whether to approve a study which would lead eventually to a merger with the Reformed Church in the U. S.

The Reformed Church has about 250,000 members in the New York-Pennsylvania and Midwest areas.

The assembly's new moderator, William J. Patterson, of San Antonio, Tex., told a news conference he hopes to live to see an eventual merger of all Presbyterian and Reformed churches in the nation.

## Burglars Strip Golf Pro Shop

The golf pro shop at Mid-Florida Country Club in Longwood was almost entirely stripped of merchandise by burglars, according to Sheriff J. L. Hobbs.

The shop was almost completely cleaned out of all items for sale—shoes, gloves, clothing, balls and other equipment — and customer's equipment in the repair shop also was taken.

Conspicuous People



How often a child has heard from its parent or a husband from the wife (or vice versa) that one should try to avoid being conspicuous. We feel that it is poor taste to be conspicuous in the way we normally use the word.

There is one way, however, that many people should want to be conspicuous as a means of witness. Those who call themselves Christians should be seen as such and if they are not something is lacking. One of the worst testimonies to a person's faith is for it to be said that no one would know that he was a Christian by observing his life.

One would certainly not want to be conspicuous for his ugliness. Abraham Lincoln seemed to use his looks as an asset at least part of the time. Lincoln delighted in telling stories about himself. One of my favorites went like this: "In the days when I used to be on the circuit I was accused by a stranger, who said: 'Excuse me, sir, but I have an article which belongs to you!' 'How is that?' I asked, considerably astonished. The stranger took a jack-knife from his pocket. 'This knife,' he said, 'was placed in my hands years ago, with the injunction that I was to keep it until I found a man homelier-looking than I am myself. I have carried it from that time until this; allow me to say, sir, that you are fairly entitled to the property.'

Christ said that His disciples were to let their lights shine. This is not to say that one is to live so that he will seem to be saying, "look how good I am." This would be pride of a bad sort. We are simply to live so that others may see our good works as well as faith and want to live well themselves.

Since we are humans we discover that no matter how much we try, our witness will not always be good. The most important thing is that we want, with all of our hearts, to do God's Will with our lives and trust Him to use us. If we do this we will not have to worry about the results. Our conspicuous Christian lives will speak loudly, indeed.

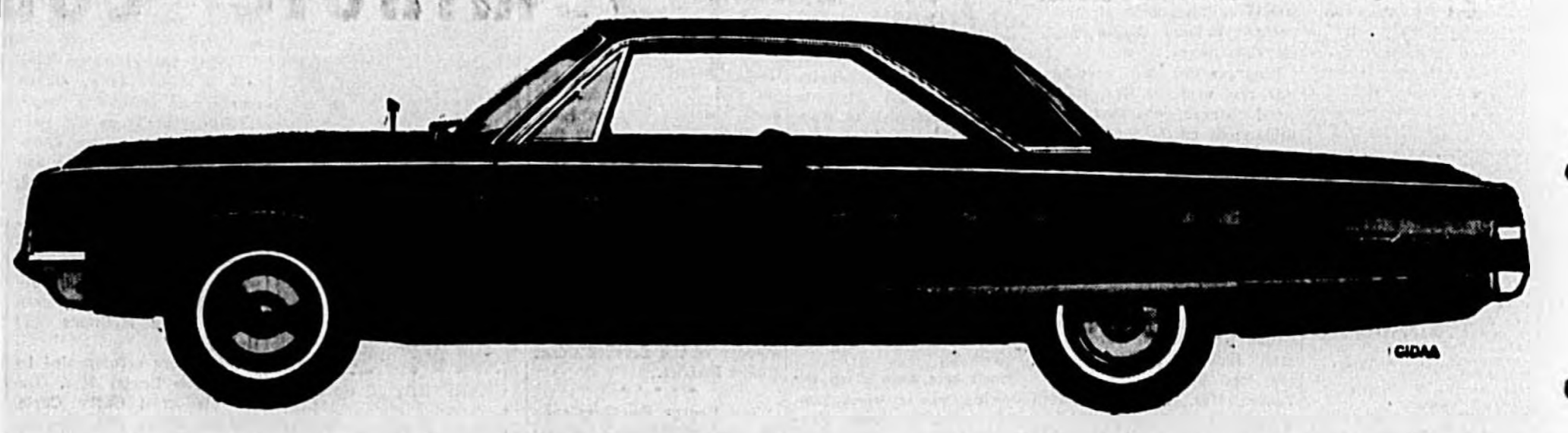

# Rural Renewal Program Yields \$65 Million To Arkansas

ASHDOWN, Ark (NEA) —  
The seeds which led to the rural renewal program — a harvest which has yielded about \$65 million in federal grants and loans to Little River County—were sown in early April 1960, when John F. Kennedy began his West Virginia primary campaign.

Kennedy's victory in the primary—most experts agree it was the key step in his rise to the Democratic presidential nomination — was the result of hard work and determination.

The dismal living conditions in that depressed area opened Kennedy's eyes to the realities of poverty. "He wallowed in poverty for six weeks," says an observer.

"Hubert Humphrey was his schoolmaster," adds another. "Humphrey pointed the issues out, and Kennedy developed them. He had to in order to win the primary. But he never forgot them."

Kennedy saw poverty conditions first hand there and they became living symbols of something that had to be destroyed. This led to the creation of the Rural Areas Development (RAD) program in 1962, a series of directives which mobilized the full resources of the Department of Agriculture (USDA) to aid rural America.

One of the directives established the rural renewal program, mainly an effort to check the vast exodus of people from farms to cities.

If the architect of the rural renewal program was John Kennedy, the contractor has been Orville Freeman, director of the sprawling Agriculture Department, which critics note "is growing faster than the number of farmers is declining."

Freeman, whose role in the war on poverty has been greatly expanded by President Johnson, is currently changing USDA's orientation from that of a "farmer's department" to one of a "people's department."

"The answer is not to transform rural poverty into urban poverty, but to strike at the causes of poverty and rural decay," says Freeman.

To help the low-income farmer, Freeman points out, USA can do two things. "We can use the commercially oriented approach," he says. "But to really help the poor farmer who's earning less than \$2,000 a year, we'd have to raise price supports 150 per cent. And that just doesn't make sense."

"The only other thing we can do is help him build a decent home and live in a decent community."

Freeman's advice to farmers is not "Don't leave the farm," but simply "Give yourself an option or two." He points out that only one of ten young men entering farming is going to be able to make a better living than in almost any other business he might choose.

Freeman stresses the need for local initiative in the war on poverty. In the last four years, progress has been spectacular not only in the rural renewal program—where Little River County is the only pilot project—but in the many areas of USDA aid (loans and grants) which can be initiated on an individual basis.

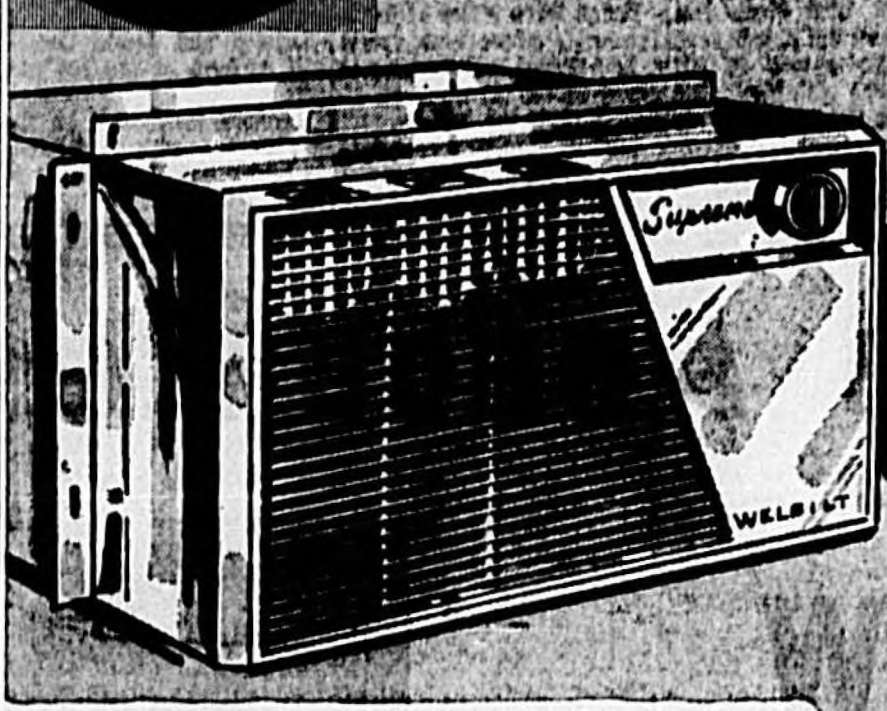
Hard-working and strong-willed, Freeman—who, as a Marine lieutenant had part of his jaw shot off by a Japanese sniper during World War II—had to literally force his "people-oriented" approach past skeptical Agriculture Department veterans.

In the process, Freeman has discovered a vast new area: a kind of rural constituency. "It may well be the biggest constituency in the country," says one of Freeman's associates, "and Orville always looking for new ways to serve it."

The road has not been easy. Freeman has not been a particularly popular Secretary of Agriculture, but the job has never been one which creates heroes. At times, virtually every farmer's lobby in the country has been calling for his scalp.

NEW YORK (UPI) — For the stockholder with a diversified portfolio, this can be

one of the busiest seasons of the year. He would be well advised to have an ample suitcase along with the portfolio, too. And a

good supply of timetables. If he wished to make some of the blue chip meetings; he would have to do some rapid shuttling along the Eastern Seaboard and the Midwest.

holders and officials profited in undue fashion for themselves or associates by using "inside" knowledge of the company's big ore strike in Ontario.

## Miami-Boston Super Cable Slated

A super-capacity, blast-resistant long distance telephone cable, four feet underground, will be built between Miami and Boston by the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, Robert Shedd, local manager, announced today.

"When fully operated, the cable will add 32,400 circuits funnelled through 20 coaxial tubes to the network. All cable, communications centers and amplifier stations will be underground and will be engineered to withstand natural disaster such as floods, hurricanes, tor-

nados and even nuclear blasts—short of a direct hit," Shedd explained.

The cable will pass through Florida, Georgia, South Carolina, Virginia, Maryland, Delaware, New Jersey, New York, Connecticut, Rhode Island and Massachusetts.

The route will avoid large cities and major industrial areas and will be built in two sections. The Miami-Washington section is scheduled for service in 1967 and the Washington-Boston section in 1968.

Shedd said that long distance traffic out of Florida has been growing 10-15 per

cent annually and is expected to rise well above the nation-wide average of nine per cent.

Existing microwave and cable routes along the East Coast will be operating at maximum capacity within the next three years.

"The new route will be urgently needed and will help insure the survival of communications in the highly industrialized coastal section of the country," he noted.

"The system will include nearly 1,800 miles of coaxial cable, 900 auxiliary amplifier stations strung along the route to precast manholes and 18 communications centers.

"The communications centers, constructed of heavily reinforced concrete will be two to three story buildings, entirely underground.

"In emergencies, each center can generate its own power. Food and water will be stockpiled to permit operation in a 'buttoned up' condition for at least three weeks," Shedd concluded.

## Wide, Varied Career Chalked Up By Mayo

Capt. James O. Mayo, a native of Quitman, Miss., has enjoyed a varied civil and military career.

He completed a four-year course in three years at Mississippi State College with the highest academic average in the history of the school. On graduation in May 1911, he accepted an all expenses scholarship to study economics at the University of Virginia.

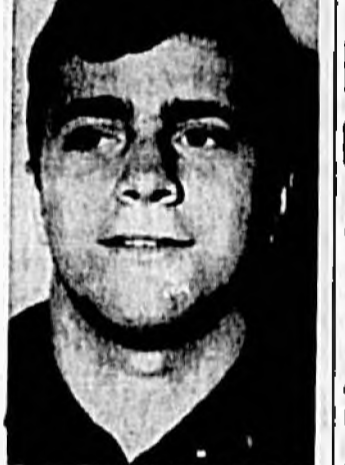
This schooling was interrupted by World War II, and he entered naval flight training, winning his wings at Pensacola on Dec. 16, 1942.

During World War II he served as a torpedo plane pilot aboard several aircraft carriers in the Pacific, participating in three major campaigns, winning three Air Medals and the Presidential Unit Citation.

At war's end, Lieutenant Mayo was offered an all-expenses scholarship to Harvard graduate school of economics but elected instead to remain in the naval service. Subsequently, he has had varied assignments, including the following: Assistant naval attaché to Belgrade, Yugoslavia, and Prague, Czechoslovakia; executive officer, Fighter Squadron 101; projects co-ordinator for test and development, Naval Air Special Weapons Facility; tactical development officer, staff, Commander-in-Chief Pacific Fleet, co-ordinating development of new tactics for airborne, surface and submarine weapons systems; executive officer and later commanding officer of Heavy Attack Squadron Six; Southeast Asia and Latin American military advisor, staff, U. S. Army War College.

Before reporting to Sanford, Captain Mayo was operations officer of the USS Franklin D. Roosevelt deployed to the Mediterranean with the U. S. Sixth Fleet.

While in service around the world, Captain Mayo has maintained his academic interest. He has a master of arts degree in international relations from George Washington University and is a graduate of the U. S. Naval Intelligence School, the U. S. Naval Russian Language School, the Air Command Staff School at Montgomery, Ala., and the U. S. Army War College at Carlisle Barracks, Pa. He is a qualified interpreter and translator of the Russian and Serbo-Croatian languages.

# Bombing To Continue

## Chinese Reds Aid Guerrillas, -McNamara

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara said today that Communist infiltration of South Viet Nam was "progressively more flagrant and unconstrained."

He said U. S. bombings of North Viet Nam would continue.

McNamara told a televised news conference there was evidence that the "hard-core" Communist guerrillas in South Viet Nam "are being entirely re-equipped and re-trained with the newest Chinese Communist family of weapons."

"The carefully controlled air strikes will continue as necessary to impede the infiltration and to persuade the North Vietnamese leadership that their aggression against the South must stop," he said in an opening statement.

McNamara estimated that at least 10,000 Red guerrillas were sent to South Viet Nam in 1964, and said the great bulk of their weapons came from outside sources.

He also noted that an increasing number of the infiltrators—approximately 75 percent in 1964—were born in North Viet Nam.

Previously, most of the guerrillas were South Vietnamese, trained in the north. "With the changing nature and the intensification of infiltration both of arms and personnel, the course of aggression pursued by the government of North Viet Nam has grown progressively more flagrant and unconstrained," said McNamara.

"The latest step is the covert infiltration of a regular combat unit of the North Vietnamese army into South Viet Nam.

"Evidence accumulated in the last month has now confirmed the presence in north-west Kontum Province of the 2nd Battalion of the 101st regiment, 325th Division of the people's army of Viet Nam.

McNamara placed the number of "hard core" guerrillas in South Viet Nam at 38,000 to 46,000. He said there were 100,000 armed "irregulars"—part-time guerrillas.

**BUILD-UP?** SAIGON (UPI)—A regular unit of the North Vietnamese army is fighting in South Viet Nam, American and Vietnamese officials disclosed today.

It was the first official confirmation that a regular army unit from North Viet Nam had joined the fighting.

## Mary Miller Fatally Hurt Near Palatka

Mrs. Mary M. Miller, 44, of Sanford, suffered fatal injuries Friday night when the car she was driving left the road on a curve about three miles north of Palatka on Hwy. 17, struck a concrete culvert and flipped over several times. It was learned here today.

Florida Highway Patrol Trooper T. K. Bowman reported that Mrs. Miller was alone in the car, returning from a business trip to Jacksonville. She apparently lost control of the car, which left the road and struck the culvert causing it to flip over several times, throwing Mrs. Miller out and crushing her underneath. Trooper Bowman reported that although Mrs. Miller's car was equipped with seat belts, her belt was not fastened.

The accident occurred about 9:10 p.m. and Mrs. Miller was dead on arrival at Putnam Memorial Hospital in Palatka.

Mrs. Miller, a widow, was employed as a freight classification assistant in the supply department traffic branch at Sanford Naval Air Station for the past nine years. She was a former chief petty officer in the U. S. Navy WAVES.

Survivors include two daughters, Donna, 12, and Victoria, eight, of 2403 1/2 Grandview Avenue. It has been requested that in lieu of flowers, donations be sent to the educational fund of the Mid-Florida Women's Traffic Club in Orlando.

Services were conducted at Sanford Naval Air Station Chapel today with burial in Evergreen Cemetery in Orlando. Pallbearers were members of the women veterans American Legion Marion Clark Post 227 of Orlando.

## Fern Park Man Hurt In Crash

A Fern Park man was injured this morning when his motorcycle struck a car on U. S. 17-82.

Irvin B. Johnson, 34, of 2800 Wells Avenue, was admitted to Seminole Memorial Hospital, after the accident at 7:45 a. m. near Dynatronics.

State Trooper J. L. Sikes said Johnson's motorcycle collided with a compact car driven by Mrs. Bessie T. Rodgers, 302 Sunland, Sanford. Sikes said Mrs. Rodgers was making a left turn into the Dynatronics plant when the accident occurred.

## Dominican Palace Bombed

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (UPI)—Rebel-held Radio Santo Domingo said Dominican Air Force planes today bombed the presidential palace "and the people." It said Navy gunners shot down one of the attacking planes.

"The rebels, seeking to return ousted President Juan Bosch to the presidency, said they were attacking the highway between the city and the air base at San Isidro, to prevent the Air Force from bringing tanks into the city.

The Air Force opposes the

return of Bosch to succeed Donald Reid Cabral, head of a civilian junta ousted over the weekend in bitter fighting.

The rebel-held radio said the "people" were holding the wives and family members of Air Force pilots as "hostages" for future air aid to the rebels. A number of pilots' wives appeared on the radio, exhorting their husbands to defect to the side of the rebels.

The fighting appeared centered on a bitter dispute between leaders of the weekend revolt to see who would replace Cabral. He was reported under arrest after announcing his "retirement" from politics and return to private life, following his ouster.

Air Force, Navy and some Army units balked at plans to bring Bosch back to the presidency. He was ousted by a military coup 19 months ago because of alleged "softness" toward Communists and Castro-Marxist-Leninists.

Dominican Radio, in a broadcast shortly after midnight, hinted that the coup had not been completely successful.

"Don't go to sleep tonight," the broadcast said. "This is your revolution. Onward with your revolution."

The broadcasting used the term "rebel army" in referring to the pro-Bosch forces, and urged all exiles to return home.

Jose Rafael Molina-Urena, newly named acting president of the Dominican Republic, ordered into effect the constitution created two years ago when Bosch was installed as the country's first freely elected president in three decades.
