**A special "Holiday Bus"** will not only mark the holiday season in Central Florida, but will also be a free ride for any customer who boards the bus through Dec. 31. The Holiday Bus will run a different route each day treating Lynx customers to free rides.

Lynx ran more than 19.2 million trips last year and was awarded the American Public Transportation Company of the Year for the second time in three years.

**The Jenö and Lois Paulucci family** is donating two semi-trailer loads of Michelina's and Michelina's Yu Sing frozen entrees from Lulgino's, Inc., and 250 turkeys as a holiday gift to needy families. The food will be delivered Thursday to Rich Plan of Florida, Sanford, for the nearly 50 charities and organizations in Seminole County participating in the food giveaway.

The 120,000 dinners to be donated will bring the 1998 total to close to 500,000 free dinners donated by the Paulucci family this year to help Central Florida families in need.

## County residents object to apartments

**SEMINOLE COUNTY** - Some of the people living in a farming and rural area four miles west of Sanford in unincorporated Seminole County are opposed to plans being made for a 334-unit apartment complex.

Despite these protests, the Board of County Commissioners unanimously adopted an ordinance on Tuesday to rezone from A-1 (Agriculture) to PUD (Planned Unit Development)

approximately 18.9 acres just east of Elder Road and north of State Road 46.

Resident Chris Akers said that the multi-family apartment complex would create extremely dangerous drainage and traffic problems in the area. Akers and Bruce Sepuran urged the commissioners not to adopt the ordinance as requested by Sandspur Housing Partners.

County Planner Don Fisher said that there did not appear to be any issues relative to complying with environmental

regulations and that the plan was in compliance with the provisions of the Seminole County Comprehensive Plan Development Code. The request is compatible with surrounding development.

The affordable housing complex would necessitate dedication of right-of-way on Upsala Road to meet county width standards and the maximum allowable density for the apartment complex would be 22 dwelling units per buildable acre.

The three-story buildings will have a height of 35 feet and the builder must provide minimum building setbacks of 35 feet from the boundary of the project.

There would be a limit access to the site to one location on Upsala Road and the builder would provide an on-site bus stop with shelter with convenient pedestrian access if found necessary by Lynx.

The county's Planning and Zoning Commission also gave its approval to the rezone from

A-1 to PUD.

"Most of the families who live here have been here for many years," Sepuran said.

"Naturally, we don't want to see something like this happen. We can't stop progress but we do ask that the county look deeper into this project. The drainage issue is very real. Elder Creek is not a canal as the county is calling it. It is a small creek."

Akers and Sepuran said that there have been a number of thefts on their properties in re-

## Gas line breaks at college

**SANFORD** - Seminole County and Sanford firefighters, and Florida Public Utilities responded to a service line gas leak at the Main Campus of Seminole Community College in Sanford Tuesday.

A worker from Kelly Electric of Orlando who was digging trenches at an SCC parking lot to run electrical conduits to newly installed telephone poles cut a gas line in half, said Robert Lyles, spokesman for the college. The fire department responded at 1:30 p.m., and worked for an hour to clear the area and crimp the line.

"We cleared everybody out in case there was an ignition," Fire Department Lt. Tim Benton said. "There was no ignition."

The gas leak occurred in parking lot 9 on the west side of the campus, 150 feet from the Bookstore building.

## Sanford slates pool ceremony

**SANFORD** - Seminole High School will host a ribbon-cutting ceremony on Dec. 22 at 3 p.m. for its new pool, which will serve as a community swimming pool for Sanford.

The 705,000 gallon pool will be 50 meters by 25 yards long, with heating, lighting, decking, a 5,000 square-foot bathhouse, polo capacities, and diving boards.

Construction of the pool is expected to be complete in late 1999 or early 2000, according to Tom Farnsworth, superintendent of Parks and Recreation for Sanford.

"We're very excited," Seminole assistant principal Vernia Jackson said. "We'll have a facility where the swim team can practice and host swim meets. We'll also be able to teach swimming safety."

Sanford will pay \$500,000 toward the construction of the pool, while the county and the school board will split an additional \$500,000. The tri-party agreement has been finalized.

The city is working with consultant Karl Pick to examine design concepts. Conceptual designs are expected to be prepared for the ribbon cutting, Farnsworth said.

"We expect to have a total package together in early 1999," Farnsworth said. "We'll then put it up for bidding."

The bidding process is expected to take two to three

## County drops suit against city

**SANFORD** - Seminole County will withdraw its action against Winter Springs over a controversial annexation and land use change, canceling the need for an administrative hearing that was scheduled for Monday.

The Board of County Commissioners' decision comes on the heels of a vote by Oviedo to dismiss its petition against the neighboring municipality. The county's petition withdrawal is the last of several filed against Winter Springs and the Florida Department of Community Affairs.

The Department of Administrative Hearings would have been charged with determining whether the requested land use change for the Battle Ridge development was consistent with Winter Springs' comprehensive

land plan. The DCA found the change in compliance in July. This spawned a battle between the two cities that involved the county.

"The issue seems to be focused on Battle Ridge," said Commissioner Randy Morris Tuesday, "and linkage between it and the Joint Planning Agreement with Oviedo."

Morris said he would vote in favor of the dismissal if the board would proceed with ap-

proval of the JPA, which was the next item on the board's agenda.

"I think we should go forward with an agreement with Oviedo," said Morris.

Opponents of the Battle Ridge development have spent the year trying to get the three parties involved to sign an agreement regarding future land use changes in the Black Hammock area.

Morris said he was afraid that delays in reaching agreements

were tied to future annexation issues around the Red Bug Lake Road and Tuskawilla Boulevard interchange and the Oviedo mall. Because both Oviedo and Winter Springs have indicated they would not annex into the Black Hammock, Morris said adopting the JPA was essential.

Oviedo is the last city to join the county's emergency first response system. The JPA would address that issue as well as land use planning, annexation boundaries, and utilities issues.

"It will resolve a lot of issues," said Morris.

Frances Chandler, of the county's planning and development department, said the JPA document is ready to be submitted to counsel. The board voted unanimously to move forward with the agreement with Oviedo.

## Tim Raines goes all out for kids

**SANFORD** - Baseball star Tim Raines, a Seminole High School graduate, donated \$1,800 Friday at the Sanford Police Department headquarters toward the purchase of T-shirts and certificates for 500 local students graduating from the Drug Abuse Resistance Education (DARE) program.

Raines is autographing the T-shirts, which have his number on the sleeve.

"He's done this several years in a row," officer Claudia Webber of the SPD said. "He's been extremely generous to the community."

DARE is a program run jointly by schools and police departments nationwide and internationally since 1983. The 17-

week curriculum teaches fourth- and fifth-graders different lessons each week, ranging from learning consequences of actions to how to handle gang violence.

The goals of DARE include helping students avoid drugs, alcohol, tobacco, and violence.

"Kids these days need all kinds of learning skills to lead a productive life," Webber said. "If we get the kids early, in the fifth grade, they'll be prepared for what they're going to face in middle school and high school."

The program encourages students to seek positive alternatives to drugs and violence, such as becoming active in clubs and sports.

"We have parents coming back year after year to say how

# Register for the draft on the Internet

FALLS CHURCH (Va.) - Millions of young men can now easily fulfill a civic and legal responsibility. U.S. males, 18 through 25 years old can register with the Selective Service System using the Internet.

"This is real, interactive, on-line registration," notes the Honorable Gil Coronado, Director of Selective Service, who activated the new, on-line service. The service is available to citizens as well as male non-citizens residing in the U.S. "For nearly two decades men have gone to post offices, completed and mailed a registration form, and waited 60 to 90 days to receive an acknowledgment card from us. A man can still register by mail, but now there is a better way. If he has a valid Social Security number, he simply connects to the Selective Service Web Site at [www.sss.gov](http://www.sss.gov), which links him to the Agency's computers. He clicks on the "Register Now" icon, types in his registration information, clicks on the "Submit" button which appears on the screen, and instantly receives his Selective Service number. Additionally, he receives a formal acknowledgment postcard in the mail within two weeks." The Agency hopes that registration via the Internet

becomes the primary way of registering. Coronado notes. The new system will accept on-line registrations between 8 a.m. and 8 p.m. ET Weekdays.

Coronado activated the new system during a visit to a Washington, D.C., area high school for a special kick-off event. Using personal computers at the school's computer lab, several young men turning 18 years old "raced" to become the very first man to register on-line with Selective Service. The Winner was Conor McCullough, who received confirmation of his on-line registration within 1 minute 45 seconds after entering the web site.

Federal law requires virtually all men to register with Selective Service within 30 days of turning 18. About 1.8 million men are required to register each year. Although late registrations are accepted, a man cannot register after reaching age 26. Failure to register is a felony, a man must be registered to be eligible for federal student loans and Pell grants, job training programs under the Job Training Partnership Act (JTPA), and federal jobs in the Executive Branch of the government, including jobs with the U.S. Postal Service. Male immigrants who fail to register

as required cannot obtain citizenship. Half of the states have supporting legislation which precludes men who are required to register, but who have not done so, from receiving many state benefits, like state tuition assistance, eligibility for state jobs, and (in some cases) enrolling in

state post-secondary institutions.

Although the U.S. relies on an all-volunteer military today, the Selective Service System and the registration program help America remain prepared to reinstate a timely and fair draft in a future crisis, should a draft become necessary.

When she continued to scream, several neighbors approached the car and the defendant ran away, but was found by deputies shortly thereafter.

**WINTER SPRINGS, Casselwood Drive, 700 block, Dec. 6, 9:37 p.m.** A 21-year-old man was arrested by Winter Springs Police for battery, throwing a deadly missile and criminal mischief. Police said he went to another man's house, told him he wanted to fight and began to hit him with his fists. A woman who was with him followed in the car as he chased after the victim when the victim tried to escape. She said that he became irate with her and punched out the window in her car and threw a beer bottle at her.

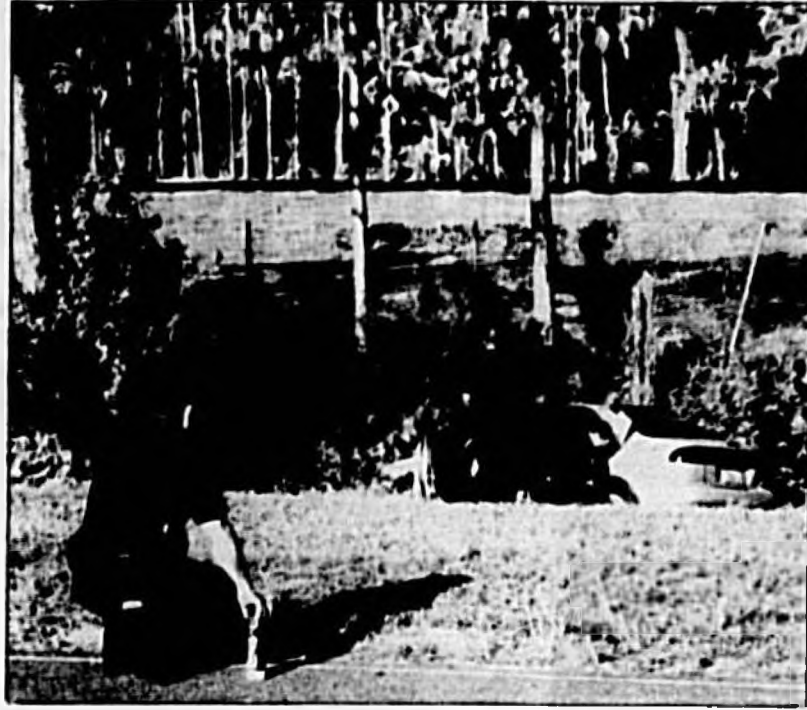

# Rams girls still dominating

## Injury-riddled Lake Mary proves it is still county's best

LAKE MARY - Even while playing at only 60 percent, the Lake Mary girls basketball team proved it still dominates the county.

Starting forward Mary Leah Sutton is out indefinitely with a hand injury and two guard Becky Pedro went out early in Tuesday's 76-25 win over visiting Oviedo with a head injury. But even with just three regular starters on the floor for most of the game, the depth-laden Rams still found a way to make a rout of it.

Lake Mary, which is back on track with a three-game winning streak after a loss to Cocoa Beach, started strong and

routed the normally tough Lions, a team which has given them fits in the past.

With all of the talent on the defending state champion Rams, it was a freshman starter, Bryn Mosler, who came through against Oviedo.

Mosler has started all season but had her breakout game last night. She is the only Ram not to have been in Lakeland, site of the state Final Four, but she isn't intimidated by the four championship ring-bearers who start with her.

"I don't feel any pressure," Mosler said. "At first I had to get used to it, but I found that I can learn a lot from them."

Senior Lauren Bradley, a Florida State signee, led the Rams with 24 points, while

Mosler poured in 21 points and Ashlee Ballance, a UCF signee, added 18. Lake Mary coach Carl Brown used his bench early and often, a luxury he's been able to afford all season.

Brown was impressed with Mosler's performance on a night when the Rams needed to dig a little deeper than normal.

"I think Lauren came out of a little slump tonight and played extremely well," Brown said. "With all of our injuries, we're not even taking it game by game anymore. It's quarter by quarter."

Besides Sutton's and Pedro's injuries, Ballance and Bradley are still recuperating from summer injuries, but the Rams are still considered a strong pick to repeat.

Against Oviedo, Pedro was lost early when she crashed to the floor and landed on her head and never returned but is expected to be okay. In her place, Brown went to his bench and the Rams never missed a beat, taking a 41-17 halftime lead and coasting from there. It was 50-17 before Oviedo got on the board in the second half and it was garbage time after that.

Lake Mary (8-1) will play a crucial Seminole Athletic Conference game at Winter Springs on Thursday, while the Lions (3-6) will be at Winter Park on Saturday. Both games are set to begin at 7:30 p.m.

## New Wildlife Management Areas created

SANFORD - The five-member Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission (GFC) created four new Type 1 wildlife management areas (WMAs) during its meeting Nov. 20 in Tallahassee.

Commissioners established Lake Panasoffkee WMA in Sumter County (8,676 acres); Potts WMA in Citrus County (8,507 acres); Green Swamp, West Unit WMA in Pasco County (34,335 acres) and Lake Marion Creek WMA in Polk and Osceola counties (9,469 acres).

In addition, Rocky Comfort Unit (2,018 acres) was added to the Joe Budd WMA in Gadsden County.

Commissioners also established special-opportunity turkey hunts in the newly formed Green Swamp, West Unit and Lake Panasoffkee WMAs and a regular spring turkey hunt in the Potts WMA.

In other action, Commissioners extended shooting hours for spring turkey hunting season on private lands to include one-half hour before sunrise until sunset, rather than the current shooting hours of one-half hour before sunrise to 1 p.m. They also adopted a rule prohibiting the taking of hen turkeys during the fall archery and muzzleloading gun seasons.

In addition, Commissioners authorized the purchase of a 2,923-acre addition to the Okaloacoochee Slough and added the 15,043-acre Gilman Paper Company tract to its Preservation 2000 acquisition list.

The Commission also selected winners of this year's state waterfowl and turkey

stamp art contests. Pilar Clinkscapes, of Marietta, Ga., won the turkey stamp art competition with his painting of an Osceola turkey, and John N. Harris, of Groveland, Fla., won the waterfowl stamp art competition with his depiction of a northern pintail.

Retired administrative secretary Ruth Stanbridge of the GFC's Office of Environmental Services received special recognition for her 34 years and seven months of service to the agency. Also recognized was GFC's retired property administrator Helen Higgins for her 27-1/2 years of service to the agency.

Commissioners also honored Representative Janegale Boyd for her efforts during the 1998 legislative session to maintain and increase recreational opportunities for hunters in Florida.

Hot weather has all species active at Sebastian Inlet. Snook, flounder, redfish, trout, jack crevalle and ladyfish are all hitting on a regular basis. Live shrimp or finger mullet are top all-around live baits. A one-ounce jig or Rapala-type lures are effective artificials.

Bass action is picking up in the river, especially in the less crowded stretches such as Buzzle Lake, Lake Poinsett and Lake Winder. Large shiners are hard to beat for lunker bass. Try ultra-light spinning tackle and tiny Rapalas for fast action near sand bars and other ambush points. When the river is low, bass are feeding on tiny grass shrimp and ditch minnows, and they will readily jump on these tiny offerings.

Captain Jack at Port Canaveral reports spotty offshore action with king mackerel, dolphin and wahoo. Seas are calmer than usual due to the lack of passing cold fronts. Inside the Port, expect fair action with sheepshead and flounder. Trout and reds are also roaming the flats of the Banana and Indian Rivers.

Action is fast and furious at Ponce Inlet with sheepshead, drum, redfish, flounder, bluefish and jack crevalle. Live or dead shrimp will not last long once they hit the water. Trout and redfish are rated as good in Mosquito Lagoon.

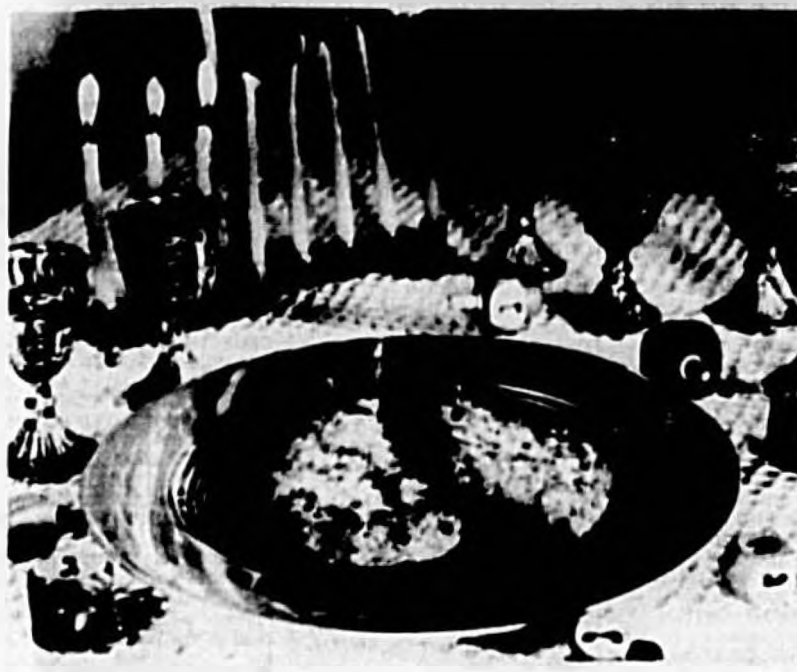

## Tired of traditional fare? 'Alternative' latke recipes add new twist to Hanukkah

A friend of mine, who hosts a very large latke party each Hanukkah, called in despair, "I'm sick of latkes!" she said. "I want to make something different."  
I did my best to tell her that we, her guests, were NOT sick of latkes, the classic Hanukkah dish of crisp potato fritters, which my friend serves with warm, homemade applesauce. I tried to tell her that we, her guests, were COUNTING on latkes at her party. I think I convinced her. But she made me promise that I'd come up with some "alternative" latke recipes, recipes that would take her out of her potato doldrums and into new latke territory.

I've made good on my promise. I found a delicious salmon latke recipe that would make a perfect first course for ANY company meal. The cauliflower and carrot latkes from the same cookbook — "Jewish Holiday Feasts," by Louise Fizzer and Jeannette Ferrary — would make a lovely side dish. The "bumuelos" were a real find, they are the latkes traditional to the Sephardic Jews (who were expelled from Spain during the Inquisition and dispersed to all corners of the Mediterranean). They are more like doughnuts than the Eastern European (Ashkenazic) latkes, and make a great dessert. "Delicious with coffee!" reads the recipe by Rabbi Robert Sternberg, author of "The Sephardic Kitchen." And they are:  
Happy Hanukkah!

**FRESH SALMON LATKES**  
1-1/2 pounds boneless and skinless salmon filets  
1 small onion, peeled  
1 stalk celery  
3 sprigs parsley  
2 tablespoons chopped fresh dill  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon cayenne  
1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice  
1 egg  
1 egg white  
1-1/2 cups dry bread crumbs  
1/2 to 1 cup oil for frying  
tartar sauce, for serving

**CAULIFLOWER AND CARROT LATKES**  
4 cups cauliflower florets (about 1 large head)  
2 eggs, lightly beaten  
1/2 cup all-purpose flour  
1/2 teaspoon baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon ground cumin  
1/2 teaspoon ground coriander

1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper  
1 large carrot, peeled and grated  
1/2 to 1 cup oil, for frying

Cook cauliflower in a large pot of salted boiling water until tender, about 12 minutes. Drain and let cool. Puree cauliflower with eggs in a food processor, turn the mixture into a bowl and stir in remaining ingredients, except the oil.  
Preheat oven to 250 degrees.  
In a large frying pan over medium-high heat, heat about 1/2 cup of the oil until hot. Ladle 3 tablespoons of batter into the pan to form each pancake. Fry until golden brown, about 3 minutes per side. Use more oil for each batch as needed. Drain on paper towels and keep warm in the preheated oven until ready to serve. Serve as soon as all are done, with tartar sauce, if desired. Yield: about 15 latkes.

**BUMUELOS DE HANUKA (SEPHARDIC LATKES)**  
1 tablespoon active dry yeast  
2 cups lukewarm water  
1 teaspoon plus 1 cup sugar  
3 cups unbleached all-purpose flour  
pinch of salt  
1-1/2 tablespoons anise or fennel seeds OR 2 tablespoons ouzo,

anise or Pernod  
1 large egg, beaten  
1/2 cup honey  
1 cup cold water  
peanut, sunflower or safflower oil  
for deep frying  
sesame seeds for sprinkling

Dissolve the yeast in the warm water mixed with 1 teaspoon of the sugar. Set aside to proof (about 10 minutes). The yeast is ready when it is bubbly. Set aside.

Mix the flour, 1/2 cup of the sugar, the salt and anise or fennel seeds (if using) in a mixing bowl. Add the egg, yeast mixture and liqueur (if using) and knead into a dough for about 10 minutes. Roll into a ball, place in an oiled mixing bowl and cover with a damp cloth. Set aside in a draft-free place (such as an unlit oven) to rise until double in bulk (about 1-1/2 hours).

While the dough is rising, prepare the syrup. Dissolve the honey and remaining 1/2 cup sugar in the cold water in a saucepan. Bring to a boil and cook until thick enough to coat the back of a spoon. Keep the syrup warm over very low heat while you make the fritters.

After the dough has risen, punch it down and knead it again. Pour oil into a wok or deep skillet to a depth of 2 inches, or into a deep-fryer to a depth of 3 inches, and heat it to just before smoking. Take 1 heaping teaspoonful of the dough and roll it into a ball. Place it in the sizzling oil. Repeat, frying a few of the fritters at a time. Do not crowd the fritters as they cook. They will puff up until about double in size. Turn once during frying. They are done when golden brown. Drain on paper towels.

To serve: Put 2 or 3 on a plate, ladle a little bit of warm syrup on them and sprinkle with sesame seeds.

Note: If you don't like the licorice flavor of anise or fennel, substitute any of the following flavors for the seeds: ground cinnamon, cloves, nutmeg, mace or cardamom. If you prefer to use a liqueur and don't like the licorice flavor of Pernod, ouzo or anise, substitute Amaretto, Frangelico, kirsch, triple sec or Curacao. Yield: 25 to 30 bumuelos.

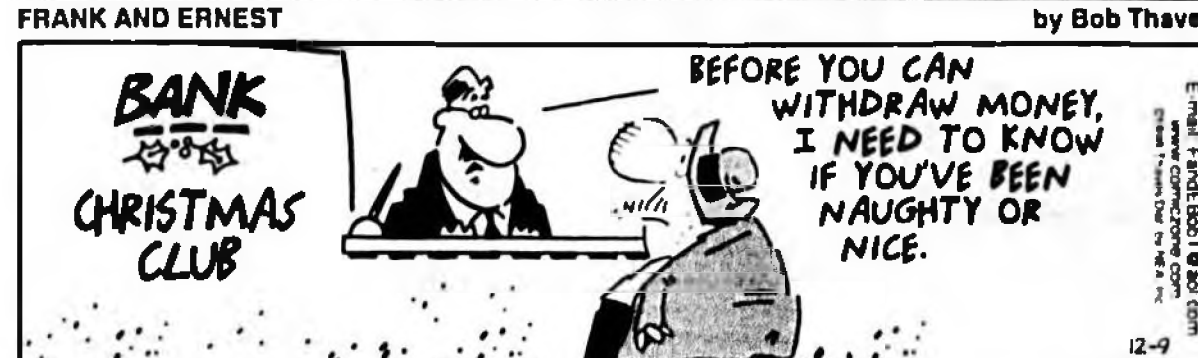

**What is meant by dumping syndrome?**

DEAR DR. GOTT: What is dumping syndrome?

DEAR READER: This is a complication of stomach surgery. After part of the stomach has been removed and the patient eats, the gastric contents empty too quickly into the small intestine. The "dumping" causes sweating, nausea, weakness and dizziness. Although the condition is permanent, the symptoms can be lessened or prevented if the patient's diet is limited to small, frequent meals of high protein, high-calorie foods.

DEAR DR. GOTT: You mentioned that many women over 50 are embarrassed when their lipstick "bleeds" into the wrinkles around lips. I've found a solution that I'd like to share with your readers.

Apply moisturizing cream on the lips as well as the face. Then put the powder on with a brush. Powder the lips, too. Apply Chap Stick to the lips, followed by lipstick. This will prevent the lipstick from seeping into the wrinkles.

DEAR READER OK. I don't have any experience with this approach but am simply passing it along as a possible antidote to a common problem.

DEAR DR. GOTT: When I am very tired or nervous, I frequently develop red blotches on my neck. What causes this? Is there any treatment for it?

DEAR READER: Stress induced red blotches are caused by a sudden dilation of the blood vessels in the skin. The reaction is produced by nervous impulses that bombard the skin's capillaries; it is analogous to blushing. There is no cure and the condition is entirely harmless.

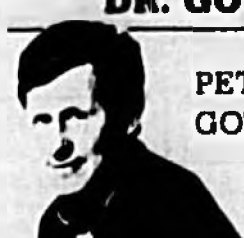
DEAR DR. GOTT: I take Propulsid for nighttime heartburn. Now I've been told that the drug is dangerous. Is this a rumor?

DEAR READER: I'm afraid not. Because of reports linking Propulsid to serious adverse reactions, including heart rhythm disturbances and death, the Food and Drug Administration has issued a warning about proper use of the medicine. Propulsid should not be prescribed for patients with congestive heart failure, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, advanced cancer, disorders of mineral balance, or dehydration. In addition, the drug must be administered cautiously to people taking antibiotics, antidepressants, antifungal agents and various other medications. The FDA urges physicians to consider every reasonable alternative before prescribing Propulsid.

Follow your doctor's advice on this issue. However, I'd be surprised if he

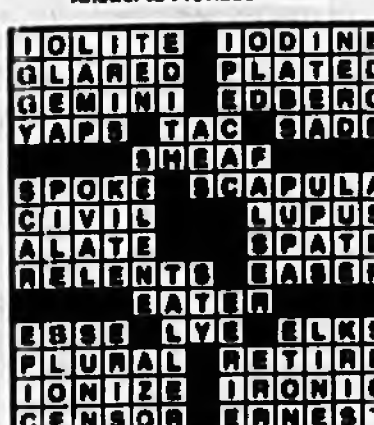

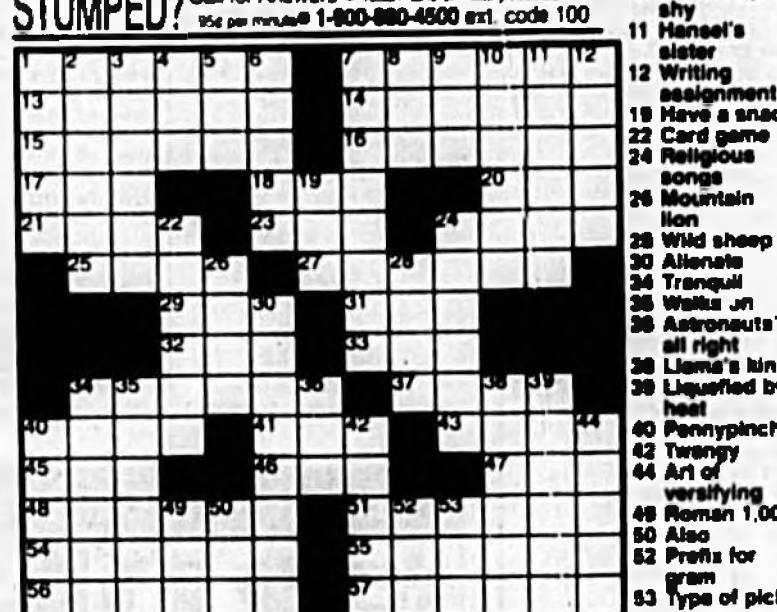

**WIN AT BRIDGE**

**Don't think — play low**

By Phillip Alder

There is one thing almost as bad as playing high when you should go low — playing low after thinking about it. Not only do you give the game away, but you might be making an error.

The key is to decide before the critical moment arrives. Then make your play smoothly.

North, with 22 high-card points and five-card support for his partner, understandably jumps straight into Blackwood. When he finds one ace missing, he settles for six hearts. (One tip for users of Roman Key Card Blackwood: Don't employ it immediately over an opening bid. Start with your forcing raise, then wheel out RKCB. If you jump straight to four-trump, use classic Blackwood re-

sponses. Probably the responder will have his own wonderful suit, which he is planning to make trumps, and he doesn't care about the king of opener's suit.)

Six hearts would be laydown but for the mirror distribution. As things stand, declarer can afford to lose only one spade trick. So, he wins trick one in the dummy, draws trumps, cashes his minor-suit winners ending in hand, and plays a spade to dummy's queen. Both opponents play low so smoothly that the kibitzers think the ace is on the floor.

Back to hand with a trump. South leads another spade. Again West plays low in tempo. Declarer has a guess. He might or might not get it right. But at least the defender with the ace — whether it be East or West — did his best.

If the spade honors are split — as they rate to be — and the defender with the ace wins the first spade trick, declarer will always get home.
