Sanford keeps courts

Courthouse expansion in south Seminole nixed

SANFORD — Seminole County commissioners gave their endorsement Wednesday to a courthouse expansion in downtown Sanford and construction of a sheriff-public safety facility at the county's Five Points Operations Center.

But commissioners are undecided about the future use of the County Services Building, but agreed its use should continue indefinitely. They will continue their discussions at another work session. No costs have been placed on the building expansions to serve growing county services, although one estimate places the courthouse expansion at \$30 million.

Consultants space have proposed expanding the courthouse from 103,000 square feet to 280,000 square feet to accommodate future increases in court caseloads. The expansion wouldn't be fully needed for court services for several years, so the consultants have proposed moving the offices of the tax collector, property appraiser and elections supervisor to the courthouse.

By moving those services, the consultants concluded more room would be available for county administrative functions in the County Services Building.

Commissioners Bob Sturm and Pat Warren say a new administration building is needed at Five Points to be more centralized in the county. Commissioners Daryl McLain and Larry Furlong say cheaper alternatives should be examined, such as purchasing the vacant First Federal Savings and Loan of Seminole Building in downtown Sanford or accepting the consultant's recommendation.

Sturm backed down from his earlier stand to expand the courthouse south of Sanford. On March 11, Sturm argued for splitting the court system to accommodate south-county residents. In the onslaught of overwhelming objections to the proposal by court officials and the county's space consultants, he stated "I'd like to hear why my ideas do work instead of why they don't work."

Tuesday, Sturm said he only wanted to assure

Air show flies Saturday

SANFORD — The Central Florida Regional Airport in Sanford will be the setting for this weekend's Air Show Orlando. The event will be held Saturday and Sunday.

Highlight of the aerial display will be the Blue Angels. Air maneuvers include the four-plane diamond formation, fast high-performance solo flights, and all six planes performing together in the delta formation.

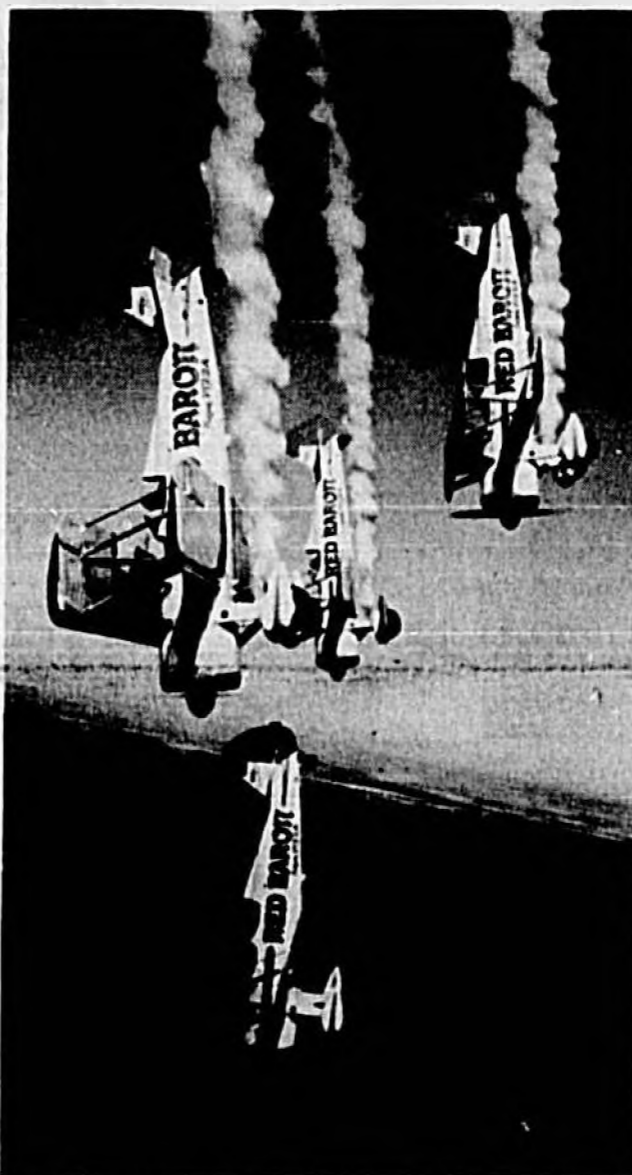
The first demonstration of each day's show, beginning at 12:30, will be conducted by the Command Parachute Team of the U.S. Special Operations Command. Volunteers from the Army, Navy, Marine Corps and Air Force will be skydiving and parachuting singularly as well as in formations that include baton passing while in the air.

Additional acts include Lee Lauderback's P-51 Mustang, the Fina Pitta S-2B flown by Jan Collmer, the Randolph Challenger airshow act, the Red Baron Stearman Squadron, and many others.

On the ground displays will feature the largest number of military aircraft in the south.

Food concessions and souvenirs will also be available.

For both of the days, April 3 and 4, the gates

DUI cases affected by court order

SANFORD — Four Seminole County Court judges ruled Wednesday breath-tests administered to some suspected drunken drivers may not be used as evidence because the test equipment was not properly certified as accurate.

The ruling will affect over 150 DUI cases still to be tried in the county courts, including the case of Orange Circuit Court Judge Linda Gloeckner. The state attorney is expected to appeal the panel's finding.

After a hearing earlier this week, Seminole County court judges Frederick Hill, Marlene Alva, Donald Marblestone and John Sloop issued a joint written order ruling breath-tests administered on the Intoxilyzer model 5000 modified with the addition of a processing board thermister could not be used as evidence in court cases.

Prosecutors use breath-test results along with testimony about a suspect's appearance, speech, if the odor of alcohol is present and the results of other roadside sobriety tests during trial.

Orchestra disbands; farewell concert Saturday

SANFORD — Scheduled Florida Symphony Orchestra concerts in Sanford and other local locations have been cancelled with the decision last night to end the

orchestra. Four FSO concerts in May, aboard Rivership Grand Romance and at the Central Florida Zoological Park, along with concerts in Oviedo and Winter Springs, have been cancelled with the decision to disband the 43-year-old orchestra, plagued by

financial woes for several years. Last week, Seminole County commissioners approved issuing \$68,000 in tourism grants to pay for the concerts. Robert McGinnis, FSO president and executive director, said the symphony has not been paid for the concerts. But the

symphony has been paid for two concerts performed earlier this year, he said.

County tourism director Jack Wert could not be reached this morning.

McGinnis said he continues to

More state money earmarked for Seminole schools

SANFORD — While all 67 of Florida's counties will get a minimum increase of 2.94 percent in education spending over last year under a budget agreement reached by House and Senate leaders Wednesday, Seminole County is slated to get even more than that.

Seminole is one of the 10 fastest-growing districts in the state with an average increase of more than 2,000 students per year.

"The amount of money that each district gets is based on a variety of items, including the cost of living in the district, the cost of supplies and the salary rates of the teachers and other school employees," explained Dave Rhea, a spokesman for the governor's press office. "Some districts will get more, but the average district will get about three percent more than they did last year."

He noted that the rate at which the district is growing was also taken into consideration when the formula was worked out.

Rhea said, however, that last year's budget represented "one of the worst years for educa-

Divers find body of pilot

TYNDALL AIR FORCE BASE — Divers found the body of an Air Force pilot amid the wreckage of his plane in the Gulf of Mexico.

Capt. Charles W. Phillips, a native of Atlanta, crashed Tuesday about 40 miles south of this Florida Panhandle base, said Capt. Charles Wynne, a Tyndall spokesman. His body was recovered Wednesday.

He was flying a QF-108 target drone, a modified version of the F-108 Delta Dart jet fighter. It is an obsolete interceptor that first went into service in 1959, and it can be flown by a pilot or remote control. Drones are used as targets when remotely flown for missile tests and air-to-air combat exercises.

Navy, Air Force and Coast Guard divers participated in the recovery effort in 108 feet of water, Wynne said.

Woman's AIDS test incorrect

FORT LAUDERDALE — Broward County has agreed to pay \$14,000 to avoid a lawsuit by a Fort Lauderdale woman who received a false positive report on an AIDS test.

"This is not a personal victory," said Susan Gibson, 49, of Fort Lauderdale, who received the wrong results. "It is another step in trying to figure out how such a grave mistake could happen."

The uninsured actress was tested in July at a county clinic, Hollywood Diagnostics Center, which held the county's lab contract, said she had tested positive for the HIV virus, which causes AIDS.

She told friends and relatives the results and said she considered suicide before getting retested twice and realizing her first test was wrong.

The county has retested 212 of about 1,000 people with AIDS lab work done by Hollywood Diagnostics but has found no other errors. The lab quit its county contract in January.

Church bells ring again

POMPANO BEACH — Church bells are once again joyful noise in this city, which cited five houses of worship for noise ordinance violations.

The noise dispute began last year when Pat Anderson complained to the city about the volume of the recorded bell music played at neighboring First Presbyterian Church.

City commissioners responded Tuesday by voting to exempt all bells, chimes and recorded music from the 55-decibel noise limit. But the church music cannot be played from 8 p.m. to 7 a.m. or longer than two minutes an hour.

Churches still must be wary of disturbing the peace. A final vote on the change is set for next week. If it is approved, the first set of citations would be dropped.

Inmate's record cleared

STUART — The Florida Department of Law Enforcement computer now acknowledges what prosecutors conceded three years ago — Todd Patrick Neely isn't a felon.

"We're just thankful that it's finally over," said his stepfather, Lewis Croxley.

Neely's record was cleared of burglary and attempted murder charges at the request of Martin County Sheriff Bob Crowder, who wrote a letter to FDLE on Neely's behalf.

"When you look at everything that happened, I could not justify obstructing this when everyone else determined this was the right thing to do," Crowder said.

'Real hooks in amendment'

Senate begins work on health care reform today

TALLAHASSEE — The debate over health care reform in the Senate has begun with a 23-17 vote for an amendment offered by a Republican lawmaker rather than the plan backed by Gov. Lawton Chiles.

"There are some real hooks in this amendment that ... would cause us problems," said Doug Cook, Chiles' top health care adviser.

Health care reform, however, is still very much in flux with dozens more amendments the Senate planned to take up today.

The action on the bill (CS-SB 1914) began Wednesday evening with a party-line tie vote defeating a massive amendment by Republican Sen. Alberto Gutman of Miami.

Next in line was another Republican proposal, this time by Sen. William "Doc" Myers of Hobe Sound. It was to be followed, if defeated, by the version supported by Chiles.

But the Myers plan was approved, with three Democrats joining the Republicans. Gutman urged his colleagues to support Myers' amendment, which he described as similar to reform measures passed by the House.

Cook, however, said the Senate version was weaker than the House proposal and was loaded down with provisions that protected doctors.

The cornerstone of Chiles' plan is a proposal to pool the purchasing power of the private and public sectors through 11 regional alliances. The authority and make-up of the alliances' boards, however, are yet to be settled.

Sen. Patricia Grogan, D-Merritt Island, has been hospitalized since a horse fall a week ago Saturday shattered her wrist and broke her elbow in five places.

"I came in for the vote," she said, adding that she would be returning to her hospital bed Wednesday night.

"I didn't want my absence to be the

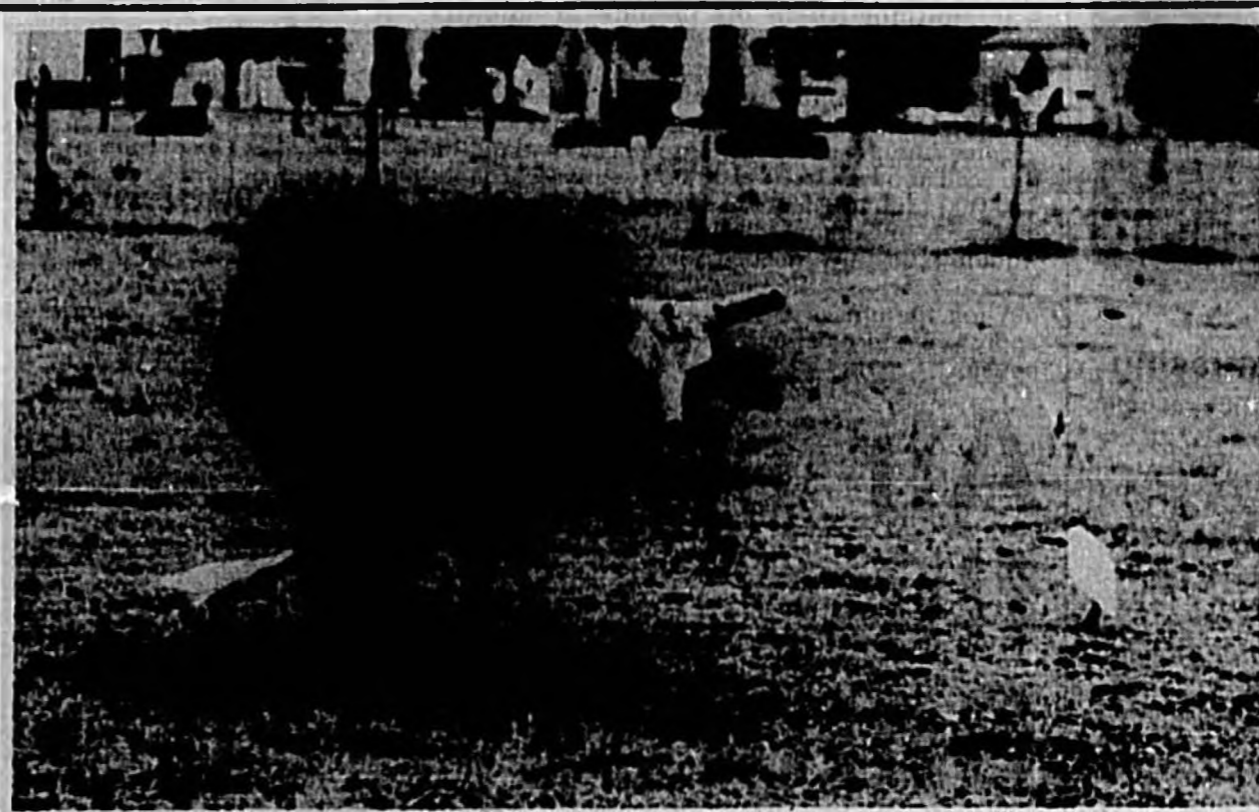
deciding factor," Grogan said.

Democratic Sens. Charles Williams of Tallahassee, George Kirkpatrick of Gainesville and W.D. Childers of Pensacola, however, voted with the Democrats to kill Gutman's proposal before switching to vote with the Republicans for Myers'.

Last year, lawmakers set a 1995 deadline for fixing Florida's \$38 billion health care system. If left unchecked, the state's total health care tab is expected to climb to \$90 billion by the turn of the century.

But cost is not the only problem. Some 2.5 million people — nearly 19 percent of the state's population — have no health insurance although 85 percent of them are workers or the dependents of workers. They don't get health care on the job, they don't qualify for government assistance and they can't afford private insurance.

Another 2.5 million people have some insurance but not enough to provide adequate care.

Reporter walks out of jail a free man today

STUART — Reporter Tom Reche walked out of jail a free man this morning 35 days after he began serving a 35-day sentence for refusing to divulge a confidential source.

"I fulfilled my obligation to both my source and to myself. I'm proud of that," Reche said, smiling and shaking his own head. "I have no regrets."

Reche, 34, was greeted by a handful of journalists when he walked through the cellblock door at 9:08 a.m. He grabbed for a cup of black coffee, saying he'd had to drink it sweetened throughout his stay, looked over the first newspaper he'd seen since going to jail, and anticipated his first cigarette.

He said he had spent a restless final night behind

bars, dreaming repeatedly that he was being called to leave.

At 4:47 a.m. the announcement came: "Tim, time served."

"It was like, 'All right!'" Reche recounted.

He was released with Hardie Carr, who served 90 days for a probation violation.

"It was good to have a reporter in there to tell you the truth," Carr said, complaining about conditions inside. Reche wrote a series of columns for the St. Petersburg Times about the breakdown of jail life.

He carried a plastic bag with about \$20 in cash. He received \$100 in bail money from a friend. Carr said he would be staying in a hotel during the week-long court battle, but would leave through a pending indictment.

Women ask Senate action on bills

TALLAHASSEE — Women advocates Wednesday tried to nudge Senate leaders into scheduling votes on a gender-balance bill, a clinic-access bill and a sports equity bill.

There's support in the Senate for the three bills, according to Susan Olickman, past chair of the Florida Commission on the Status of Women.

"That's why we want this last nudge in these final days when so many things are flying around," she told reporters at a press conference in front of the Senate chamber.

The annual two-month legislative session was scheduled to end on Friday, although lawmakers will have to work overtime to get the budget done.

Joining Olickman were lobbyists for the National Organization for Women, the Florida Women's Political Caucus and the Florida Association for Women Lawyers.

The House has already passed

the clinic bill and the gender balance bill. The school athletics bill is awaiting action in the lower chamber.

One bill (CS-SB 742) would require that appointments to state boards and commissions be balanced between men and women where possible, a measure the Senate unanimously passed last year but did not get out of the Legislature.

Another measure (CS 1714) would consolidate existing laws against criminal mischief, trespass and similar violations in an effort to protect women trying to get past anti-abortion demonstrations into clinics.

The third bill (CS 714) examines equity in school sports for girls.

Olickman acknowledged there's been a backup of bills as the session approaches its end.

But she urged President Under Crenshaw, R-Jacksonville, and Rules Chair Toni Jennings, R-Orlando, to show leadership and bring the three bills to a vote.

"We want their help," she said.

'Geneva Bubble Bill' approved by Senate

GENEVA — The "Geneva Bubble Bill" was unanimously approved by the Florida Senate Wednesday. It now goes to Gov. Lawton Chiles for final approval.

Sponsored by Rep. Marvin Couch, R-Oviedo, the bill would create a task force of state and local officials and citizens to study the community's fragile drinking water supply and laws that govern development there. The task force will recommend needed changes in protection laws by Dec. 1.

The bill was unanimously approved by the House last week. The vote on the Couch was sought by Sen. Gary Siegel, R-Fern Park, who had an iden-

tical bill still under review in Senate committees. The vote Wednesday bypasses the committee process.

The bill, itself proposing no changes in laws, has been opposed by developers. Lawyer Ken Wright, who represented the developers of the controversial Excavated Products borrow pit in Geneva, contacted the offices of several lawmakers last week. Wright said he was tracking the progress of the bill because he was concerned the task force would lead to broad development restrictions similar to those adopted for the Wekiva and Econlockhatchee River basins.

1 in 4 Americans will get a sexually transmitted disease

NEW YORK — One of four Americans will contract a sexually transmitted disease sometime in their lives, yet the government has neglected efforts to prevent the spread of such illnesses, a study concludes.

The study by the Alan Guttmacher Institute, a nonprofit think tank on reproductive health issues, also charged that the government pumps most of its money to fight such diseases — known as STDs — into clinics that cater to men, even though women are hardest hit.

"Health officials have disagreed over whether STDs are a moral or medical issue," said Patricia Donovan, author of the study. "And even today, the government often has difficulty dealing forthrightly with the STD problem as symbolized by its reluctance to promote measures — such as condom use — that can help people avoid becoming infected."

Instead, the emphasis has been on screening and treatment of infected patients, Donovan said Wednesday.

According to the report, 12 million sexually transmitted infections occur every year in the

United States — two-thirds of them among people under 25 and one-quarter among to teen-agers. At that rate, at least one in four Americans will contract an STD at some point in their lives, the report said.

The report said at least 56 million people, or more than one in five Americans, are infected with viral STDs such as genital herpes or hepatitis B, which can be controlled but not cured.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, which administers the federal program to fight STDs, had not reviewed the report and had no immediate comment, spokesman Chuck Falls said.

Sexually transmitted diseases are more easily transmitted to women and more difficult to diagnose in women than in men, the report said.

More than 1 million women suffer pelvic inflammatory disease each year, most of them because of undiagnosed infections, the report said. As many as 150,000 women a year may become infertile and 45,000 may experience a life-endangering ectopic pregnancy because of an STD infection.

Cervical cancer is strongly associated with infections from sexually transmitted diseases, according to the study.

Now is the time for the people to speak

Only 50 persons attended Saturday's Waterfront Master Plan development public meeting. Considering the present usage and appeal of the area along Lake Monroe, the number was small.

The three hour meeting was held at the Sanford Senior Center. It was well promoted, and a large turnout was expected.

Those who attended should be commended for being willing to help formulate what could be a major development in Sanford.

Although a Steering Committee meeting had been previously held, this was the first opportunity for the general public to speak. Persons were urged to attend. The only requirement was a desire to help formulate plans to improve one of the city's most prominent features.

Most of the suggestions voiced in the past dealt with beautification needs.

It was encouraging during this meeting to hear suggestions beyond that level. Some participants projected a multi-purpose hotel, shopping areas and dining facilities.

These were clearly people who had envisioned the total waterfront development beyond the beautification factor. The overall development has been suggested to include the entire shore of Lake Monroe, from eastern Sanford to the Interstate-4 area at the western end of the lake.

If commercial development is eventually deemed beneficial, caution will be needed to insure that the waterfront area will have only appealing and top quality business establishments. Throwing a development project as valuable as this out to just anyone may prove to be a disaster in future years.

If beautification such as a lit fishing pier, benches or other visitor attractions ends up becoming the main improvement, top quality will still be needed.

Regardless of the type development, money will be required. Caution must be maintained to insure that money spent will be an investment in the city's future, rather than a throw-away that pleases only a few.

The Waterfront Master Plan developers should adopt a slogan used by the 4H club, and seek to "make the best better." The waterfront is already a major attraction. Let us not change what we have unless we can improve it.

The next meeting has been scheduled for the Recreation Department meeting room, at Sanford City Hall, on Saturday, April 17. It will be an all-day affair.

Although planned as a meeting for select persons, the public is again invited to attend and participate.

Regardless of the outcome of the planning, no one can expect the development to be done this year. Although the project is for the future, public input is important. Now is the time to voice an opinion, not later when development does not go as one might wish.

Will democracy cure the world's ills?

At the close of a recent "Crossfire" program on CNN in which both sides had rooted for Boris Yeltsin, Michael Kinsley tried to get Pat Buchanan to agree that if Yeltsin should suddenly abandon democratic constraints and start ruling by decree, America ought to stop supporting him.

Buchanan wasn't willing to go that far. He indicated that he has his reservations about Yeltsin, but for the time being Yeltsin is our best bet, and his opponents aren't exactly angels, so Pat wasn't ready to dump him just because a little muscle might become necessary.

Kinsley was staggered. Was Buchanan turning his back on the ideal of Democracy? Didn't he realize that only democratic societies can be counted on not to make war? Pat was unpersuaded, but time was up, and this particular argument had to be left for another show.

The exchange served to remind me, however, just how blindly the Wilsonians in our midst serve their god, Democracy. As the world emerges from 40 years of Cold War, they are telling us that the United States, as the only remaining superpower, must not only send the Marines into Somalia, and contribute ground forces to the U.N. peacekeeping army in Bosnia, and enforce the no-fly zones over northern and southern Iraq, and use force if necessary to prevent North Korea from developing nuclear

weapons, but must do all these things, and many more, only in the name of Democracy, and only with the help of others as besotted by it as we are.

Now, I don't want to be misunderstood: Democracy is indeed, as Winston Churchill famously said, "the worst form of government except for all the others," and we are justified in hoping that the world's other nations will adopt it as promptly as possible. But only an American liberal as far gone as Kinsley could possibly believe that every country on earth is capable of democratic self-government today, and that any nation not enjoying it must be tormented by the United States until it changes its evil ways.

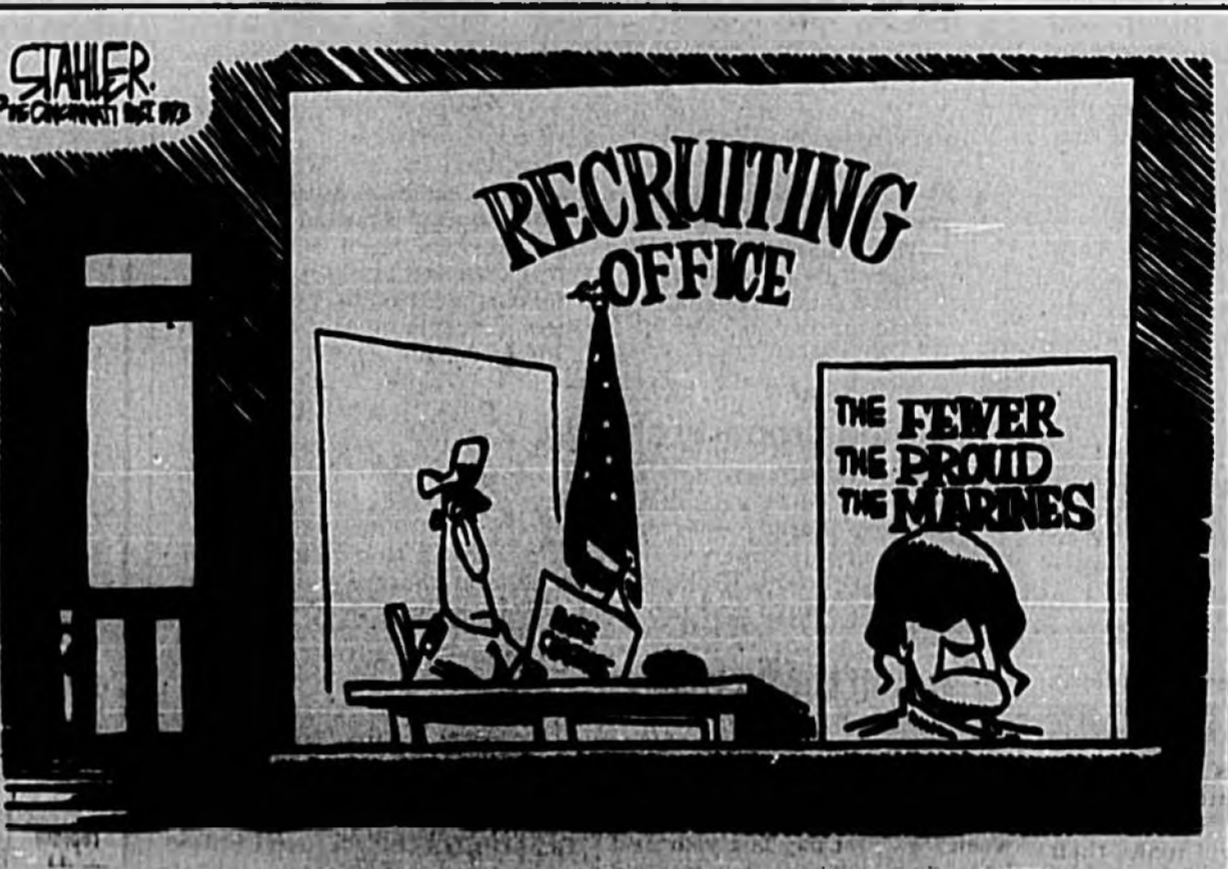
During World War II it was fashionable to speak of the conflict as between "the democracies and the dictatorships." The presence of "good old Joe" Stalin in the winning coalition poked a fatal hole in that fiction, but I don't recall any liberals objecting to his presence. During the Cold War, to be sure, when we similarly welcomed the support of anti-communist dictatorships, many liberals squealed angrily; but perhaps that was, to put it charitably, because they didn't realize there was a war on.

The recently invented contention that democracies don't start wars is, incidentally, a fiction too. At the start of World War I Germany was a democracy with a lively socialist opposition party that nevertheless voted unanimously, in the Reichstag, to support the war. And from Nehru's invasion of Goa to George Bush's attack on Panama, the more recent examples of democratic bellicosity testify only to a prudent preference for picking on small opponents.

As a matter of fact, evidence is mounting that the reform of an authoritarian society is far likelier to succeed if it begins with economic liberalization -- i.e., the adoption of a free-market system -- and lets political democracy bring up the rear. The growth of an independent-minded middle class will inevitably bring demands for greater political freedom.

Political wars: truth a casualty

Washington is a city that holds no truths to be self-evident.

It readily invents its realities and suspends its beliefs to fit the predilections of its politics. It is, on virtually every issue, a city of two tales: left and right.

That's why Washington is likely to miss the real lesson of the startling report of the United Nations Truth Commission on the massacres of thousands of civilians by our government allies in El Salvador in the 1980s. Half of Washington is properly outraged because the report reveals that the Reagan administration systematically massacred our right to know the truth. The other half figures the civil war ended with the good guys in and Marxism out; so what's the bother?

But that U.N. report is not just about an old war in El Salvador. It is an alarm bell about Washington today. This city still treats Truth as a malleable and elastic tool, to be brandished or buried as needed.

Put aside El Salvador for a moment; remember Clarence Thomas vs. Anita Hill. The allegations of sexual harassment and vehement denials left most Americans unsure who was telling the truth -- but Washington's politicians rushed to instant judgment. Conservatives instantly backed him, blasted her; liberals instantly backed her, hated him. Truth was based not upon factual evidence, but political expedience.

So it was in Washington's controversy over El Salvador. Conservatives pushed reports of Salvador's right-wing death squads and their government protectors. Liberals pushed administration reports of communist countries arming the rebels. None would admit that both were right.

Reagan officials never tried the option of truth. They thought you wouldn't be able to understand.

In 1981, after four U.S. Catholic church women were raped and shot to death by (we now know) the Salvadoran National Guard, Secretary of State Al Haig suggested maybe the church women were to blame, telling a House hearing: "... some of the investigation would lead one to believe that perhaps the vehicle in which the nuns were riding may have tried to run a roadblock, or may accidentally have been perceived to do so. ... What you never knew was that the U.S. ambassador cabled that he was "amazed" by Haig's suggestion.

In 1982, The New York Times and The Washington Post reported Salvadoran armed forces had massacred hundreds of villagers near El Mozote the previous December. Reagan officials suggested it probably didn't happen and besides, the reporters were dupes of the communists.

Assistant Secretary of State for Latin America Thomas O. Enders told a Senate hearing: "We sent two embassy officers to investigate recent reports of a massacre in ... El Mozote. They reported that ... no evidence could be found to confirm that government forces systematically massacred civilians in the operation zone."

He left unaided that the embassy officers actually reported that while they never got to the site, they'd interviewed witnesses who told of seeing dozens of bodies of babies the officials felt there had indeed been a massacre. U.N. officials say the mass graves Reagan officials never probed for the truth.

Seven years after Enders misled America, the man who held his post in the Bush years demonstrated that truth need not be the first casualty in Washington's political wars. After six Jesuit priests were murdered in 1980, Assistant Secretary of State Bernard Aronson found a way to tell us the truth. Aronson told a Senate hearing that while he had no firsthand evidence: "It's more likely that it was from the violent right than from the left. ... What my guts tell me is that they were killed by the right. The people responsible for this crime are murderers and barbarians. ... They must be brought to justice. ... The terror of the FMLN is no excuse for the terror of the violent right."

Even now, Enders doesn't get it. He just wails in The Washington Post that "I did not deny the killing," conceding only: "I have responsibility for not having been able to confirm it." The blast goes on.

LAKE MARY — Consideration will be given tonight to a number of revisions in plans for a Home Depot in Lake Mary. The City Commission is scheduled to hear of modifications from the original plan, approved by the commission on Feb. 4.

Home Depot is planned for construction north east of the intersection of Lake Mary Blvd. and Lake Emma Road.

The revisions include more parking area in front of the store toward Lake Mary Blvd., a reduction in outparcels from three to two, and no requirement for a parking area east of the Home Depot.

According to the changes recommended by City Planner Matt West, the eastern parking will not be required until a later time when a strip center is built in the area.

In many years. The \$5.8 billion earmarked for education averages out to be about \$110 more per student than last year.

As a result, many of the cuts made during the recent economic recession will be able to be restored. Teachers and staff that were cut during the last year who have not been rehired may have the opportunity to come back to work, Rhea said.

"I guess most districts will be able to get back to their 1990-91 staffing levels," Rhea said. "My guess is that Seminole will be able to at least get there, but I don't know."

Seminole County officials were in a meeting with Supt. Paul Hagerty this morning and were unavailable for comment.

The deal reached Wednesday night also will provide \$55 million for more computer technology in the classroom.

After days of wrangling over how much money 10 fast-growing counties deserved at the expense of the other 87, the House accepted an offer from the Senate on a bottom-line statewide figure.

The 10 counties, which in-

clude Seminole, will still get undetermined higher amounts. The other districts are: Broward, Calhoun, Dade, Hillsborough, Lee, Leon, Monroe, Pinellas and Sarasota.

The accord on the \$34 billion budget for fiscal 1993-94 will mean the Legislature should adjourn its regular session Sunday, two days past its scheduled end. Lawmakers must observe a new 72-hour constitutional waiting period before a final budget vote.

No issue other than the budget will be considered past Friday, said House Speaker Boiley "Bo" Johnson, D-Milton.

House Democrats had been reluctant to reduce the bottom line per-student spending level for the remaining 57 counties in order to meet Senate Republicans' insistence that the others deserved more cash.

Things finally started to move Wednesday when Johnson met with Senate President Ander Crenshaw, R-Jacksonville, to negotiate a compromise.

"This really shouldn't be a matter of gamesmanship," Johnson said. "It ought to be a matter of how we provide for students."

south-county residents had convenient access to county services and added he was not beholden to the idea of splitting courthouse functions. Circuit Judge O.H. Eaton Jr. and Clerk of Courts Maryanne Morse said splitting court functions, such as civil and criminal, was inefficient and would entail costly duplications.

Morse said county services such as court filings, traffic fine payment, and filing deeds are already provided at the county's satellite offices at Wilshire Plaza in Casselberry and Oak Grove Shoppes in Altamonte Springs. Each office also offers property appraisal and tax services.

Tax Collector Ray Valdes also operates a three-person office in Oviedo City Hall. Valdes said he couldn't justify keeping the of-

fice stalled unless the three clerks there perform work generated from other offices.

Sturm suggested County Manager Ron Rabun look to expanding services in southern sections of the county, perhaps in additional locations.

Commissioners also agreed Sheriff Don Eslinger needs a new administration building and agreed with consultants the logical location for it was with the Public Safety Department so the two services could share the same radio communications center. The recommended site was near the Juvenile Justice Center.

The Sheriff's Office is located at Building 310 at Central Florida Regional Airport. Eslinger told commissioners he had no room to expand in the old military barracks.

"If I could hire six more

criminal investigators, I'd have no place to put them," Eslinger said.

But commissioners could not decide on the future fate of the County Services Building, Sturm said commissioners never intended the former Seminole Memorial Hospital to be a permanent administration building when they moved there in 1984. Commissioners directed the consultants to plan to keep the building in long-term use, without specific directions on what type of use.

"There was no clear intent to stay here for evermore," said Sturm. "It was to be an interim space to believe the courthouse. The county commission has always been treated as second-class citizens to the courts. I'm not saying I'm for a cushy building, but it's time for us to be considered."

Warren supported the idea, saying "What's wrong with making new space for us?"

But McLain and Furlong said they were reluctant to pursue more expenses to be passed on to taxpayers.

"I think we would be making a mistake to build a \$20 million administrative building for us and the county manager," said McLain.

"This county has a long history of fiscal conservatism, of using used furniture and old hospitals," said Furlong. "We're talking about a possible bond issue here and you know how popular bond issues are for administrative buildings."

Commissioners agreed to hold another work session, their third, to decide a future for the County Services Building. Consultants also pledged to have cost estimates for the proposals.

The Intoxilyzer is used by law enforcement agencies in Seminole County for the breath-test. In Florida, a blood alcohol level of .10 or above means a person is drunk.

Calling the judges' ruling a setback for DUI enforcement, Seminole County Sheriff's Lt. Jerry Riggins said the county will continue strict law enforcement to keep drunk drivers off the roads. After the court ruling came down, Riggins said the sheriff's department had switched from the Intoxilyzer ruled out by the court to an earlier certified model.

"I think they ran some tests last night but I don't know how many," Riggins said. He said he has not gone over the cases where the breath-tests were suppressed but estimated that probably half were conducted by the county. He noted other law enforcement agencies use the county equipment including the state police and surrounding

cities police departments.

The number of traffic fatalities went from 33 in 1991 to 23 in 1992. About 16 percent of the fatalities were alcohol related. Riggins said DUI arrests last year were up 300 percent and the department will continue strict law enforcement of drunk driving laws.

"We're still in business," commented Sanford Police Lt. Dennis Whitmore this morning concerning breath-tests for drunk drivers. The Sanford Police department has two machines, one certified, the other which tests were ruled inadmissible. The Sanford Police will do all tests on the certified machine until the Florida Department of Law Enforcement obtains permission to use the second machine. The modified machine is owned by the state and was obtained under a grant.

The judges ruled that the addition of a thermister was a substantial modification of the Intoxilyzer. "It is undisputed that the purpose of the thermister device is to alter the reading of the breath test instrument."

A thermister is a temperature control resistor used on computer program boards allowing them to work at higher temperatures.

The court ruled the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services' improperly certified the Intoxilyzer (with thermister) for use in August 1992. Because the state was not approved for use by the Federal Department of Transportation until three months later. That move violated a provision of the Florida Administrative Code in effect at the time. In addition, the judges found there were no operator's or maintenance manuals for the modified test equipment contrary to the code and HRS rules.

As the result of the ruling Wednesday, prosecutors will not be allowed to use the blood alcohol test results in Gloeckner's trial scheduled for next week. Gloeckner was arrested Jan. 29 after a traffic accident at Lee and Wymore roads near Winter Park. The 43-year old judge hears adoption and divorce cases in Orlando.

believe Central Florida could support an orchestra, despite the financial problems.

"Recent events would tend to belie that impression," said McGinnis.

McGinnis said ticket sales were up 21 percent over last year, direct contributions had increased by 1,800 percent and the concert scheduled had been

expanded from seven performances to 17.

In spite of the growth, the FSO fiscal picture by the end of February indicated the orchestra had only \$68,000 in assets and \$523,000 in debts. The orchestra requires about \$4.1 million to operate annually, McGinnis said.

The orchestra will make their last appearance Saturday at the Bob Carr Performing Arts Centre

in Orlando. Although ticket holders for the 1993-1994 will be repaid, current season ticket-holders will not. About 10 performances remain this season.

Despite a player strike over salaries two years ago, McGinnis said the musicians have been very cooperative during the past year. He said they went four weeks without pay last year and have gone without pay for two weeks this year.

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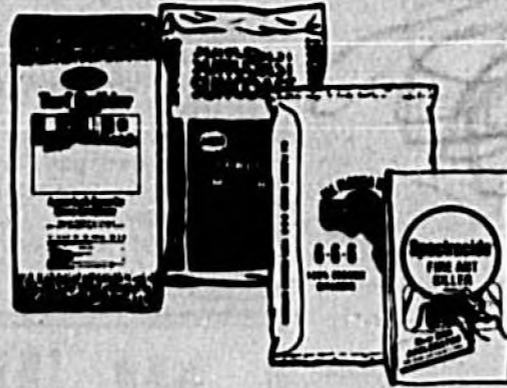

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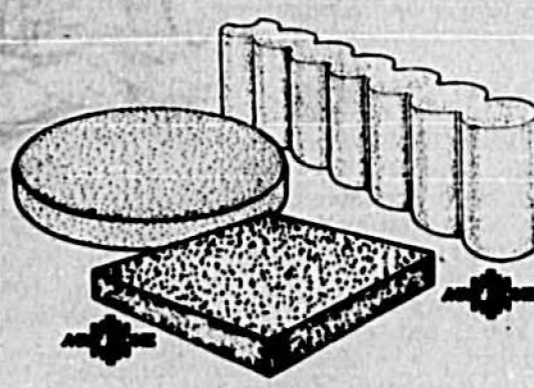

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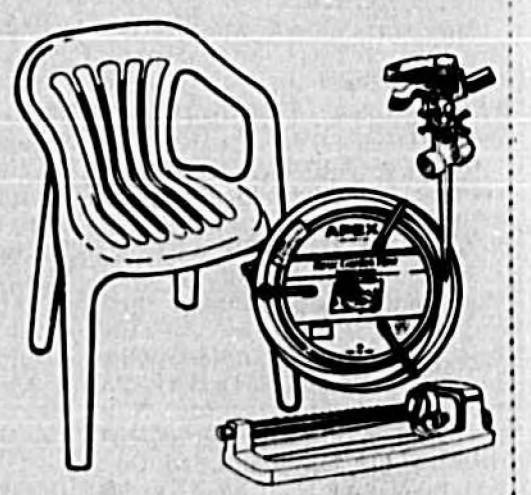

Marlin fever leaves other teams cold

FORT LAUDERDALE — Something is different about the Braves-Expos souvenir shop this spring at West Palm Beach Municipal Stadium: They're selling lots of Florida Marlins stuff.

Half the store is filled with Marlin jackets, T-shirts, caps and individual player photos. They also have Marlin umbrellas and ponchos, expected to come in handy for those late afternoon storms that often pass through Florida.

Yes, Marlin fever is rampant in South Florida, and some of the other teams feel they may be getting a cold shoulder soon.

Mostly, it's the Expos, Braves, Mets, Yankees and Indians who are concerned about dwindling interest as the Marlins build their following in the region.

Everywhere you look Marlin souvenirs are for sale, including at the spring training homes of the other teams. The local papers and TV news reports are also filled with features about Florida's team.

Montreal shares the West Palm Beach facility with Atlanta, and the Expos fear their sluggish attendance lately will even get worse in years to come.

The Braves have a large contingent of fans who make the trip from Georgia and remain popular, particularly after winning two straight pennants. But with another team to root for, the Expos are getting little attention.

There were even thousands of tickets available for the Expos game against the Marlins on Tuesday.

"It's South Florida's club, and they're going to be here, so maybe people figure they can see them during the regular season," said Rob Rabenecker, Montreal's spring training coordinator.

Rabenecker said the Expos would try to schedule exhibition games against the Marlins next year at night in an effort to increase attendance.

The Braves are now talking about building a new spring training complex in Jupiter, about 20 miles north of West Palm Beach.

The New York Mets play in Port St. Lucie, about 40 miles north of the West Palm Beach area. They have also felt the affects of the Marlins.

"I really think the weather has been more of a problem as far as attendance," general manager Al Harazin said. "But it only makes sense that the Marlins will build a large fan base in South Florida and that might hurt the other teams that play in this area."

Just about every spring training park in Florida is filled with fans wearing Marlin caps, T-shirts and jackets. The stores are filled with everything from \$150 warmup jackets to \$4 key chains.

The Marlins have made their spring training home this season in Cocoa, well north of West Palm Beach and Port St. Lucie. In their first 12 exhibition games, Florida drew an average of attendance of 6,381, only trailing the Braves, Boston and Minnesota.

'Attack' puts Shaq on shelf

ORLANDO — Star rookie Shaquille O'Neal will miss a game without pay and be fined \$10,250 after his frustration with late-game fouls came to blows.

One way Orlando Magic opponents have come up with to contain the 7-foot-1 sensation is to send him to the line, where he's not at his best. When the Detroit Pistons tried it Tuesday, a fist fight followed.

O'Neal was ejected for fighting with Alvin Robertson, who stepped between him and Bill Laimbeer, presumably as peacemaker, and wound up getting smacked on the side of the head.

On Wednesday, in addition to O'Neal's punishment, the league fined Robertson \$7,500 for retaliating.

Pistons coach Ron Rothstein says none of it would have happened if the officials had only called a foul on Laimbeer as soon as he committed it, rather than waiting until he had O'Neal in a bear hug.

"It was a simple call," Rothstein said. "Just call the foul. We wanted Shaq on the line."

"He would not call the foul. So, Bill fouled him harder. Then he stumbled back into him, they got tangled up and all hell broke loose. Make the simple call. What was so difficult?"

But O'Neal was not inclined to take it any more.

"He chopped me right across the head the first time," O'Neal said. "I told him, 'Don't do it again or I'll take care of you.' If the man can't stick (defend) me, he shouldn't be in the game."

Robertson, who grabbed O'Neal and exchanged words with him, said he was trying to prevent a fight. But O'Neal insisted Robertson started one by hitting him below the belt.

"You got to go a long way to get me frustrated enough to swing, but that's one way to do it," O'Neal said.

O'Neal, who scored a career-low seven points on 2-of-11 shooting, was ejected with 2:13 remaining. Twelve seconds later, Robertson was tossed out for a flagrant foul against Magic guard Scott Skiles.

The suspension means O'Neal will miss tonight's game against the Charlotte Hornets.

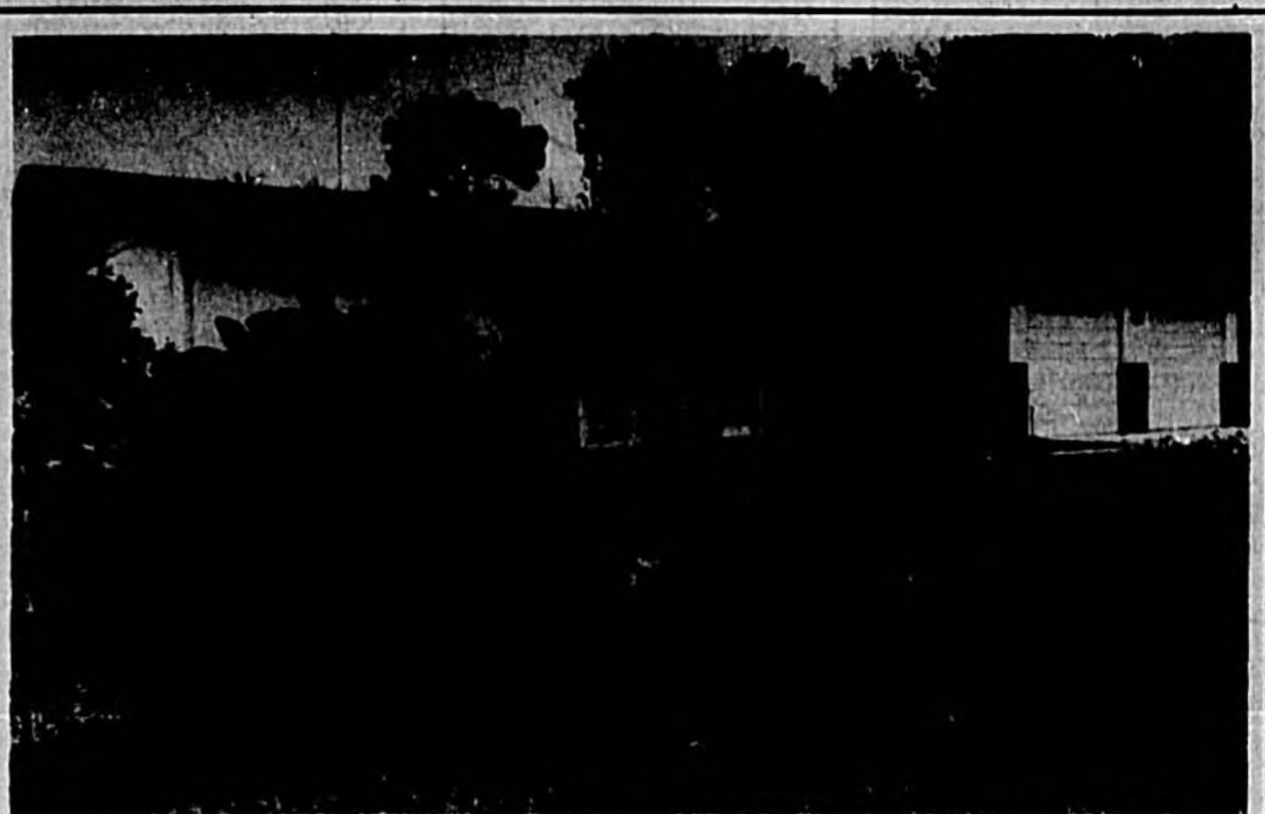

Pregnancy planning for Jews includes test for Tay-Sachs

DEAR ABBY: We have just learned that our beautiful baby boy has Tay-Sachs disease, a devastating degenerative illness that affects infants. We love him with all our hearts, but are sadly aware that he cannot survive more than a few years.

Tay-Sachs disease is a hereditary condition most common in Jewish people. Parents who might pass it on to their children can be identified by a simple blood test. We are both physicians and knew that this test was available, but we never believed it could happen to us.

We treasure every moment we spend with our son, who has given us more joy than we could ever have imagined. However, we are torn between those wonderful feelings and the painful knowledge that he will become progressively ill.

Abby, please inform your Jewish readers who could be carriers to ask their physicians to test them for Tay-Sachs before planning pregnancies. In this way, they can avoid the heartbreak that we are now experiencing.

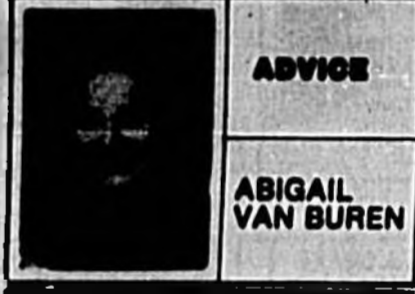
HEARTBROKEN PARENTS

DEAR HEARTBROKEN: Thank you for writing, in the midst of your personal grief, to warn others.

Readers, Tay-Sachs is a hereditary disorder that causes the progressive destruction of the central nervous system. A child born with it rarely lives to see five birthdays.

It occurs chiefly among Jews of Eastern European ancestry. Approximately one in every 25 Jews in the United States is a carrier of this gene. (Approximately 85 percent of the children affected with Tay-Sachs are Jewish.) There is a noticeable incidence of Tay-Sachs in non-Jewish French Canadians living near the St. Lawrence River and to a lesser extent within certain Cajun communities in Louisiana.

People who inherit the gene from only one parent do not get the disease, but may transmit

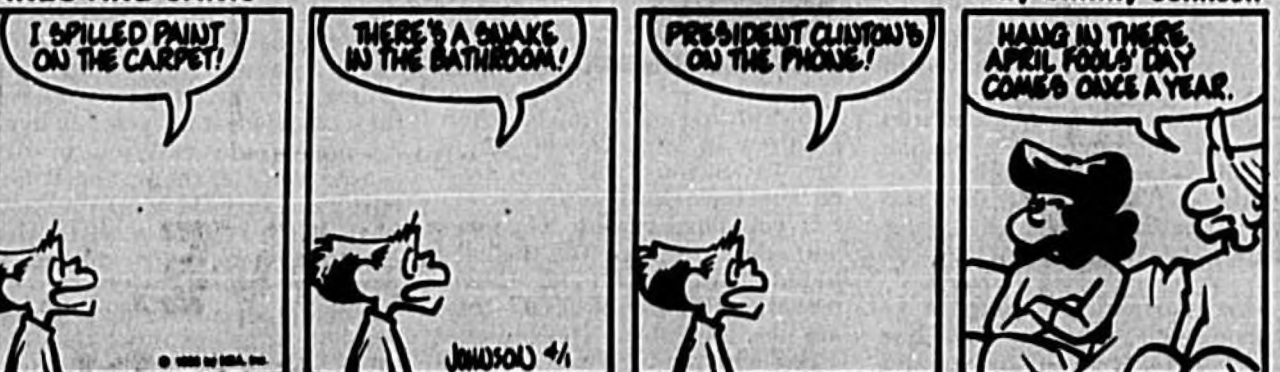

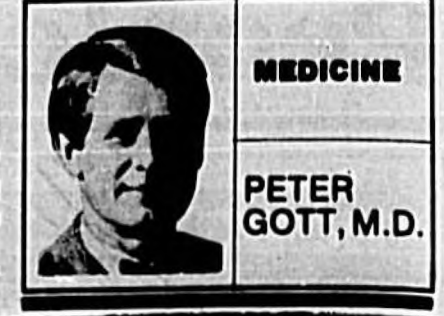

Arthritis caused by variety of disorders

DEAR DR. GOTT: My wife recently had her shoulder "scoped." The surgeon removed 20 ossicles (bony marbles), both in and around the joint. The doctor said she has moderate arthritis but couldn't explain the "marbles" (osteoarthritis). Four weeks later she returned for a checkup and they're back. What can be causing this? What can be done and can we arrest the arthritis?

Answer to Previous Puzzle

DEAR READER: As I understand the question, your wife underwent arthroscopy (internal examination) of her shoulder, during which the surgeon removed several calcifications. Subsequently, the doctor found more -- presumably by re-X-raying her shoulder. From your description, I assume that your wife has arthritis, complicated by osteosynovitis (calcium deposits within the joint lining).

Arthritis, a common affliction, is caused by a variety of disorders that include inflammatory diseases (such as rheumatoid arthritis and lupus), as well as simple, age-related deterioration (osteoarthritis). Many forms of arthritis are worsened (or caused) by over-use; repetitive stresses to the joint frequently lead to inflammation or further joint breakdown.

The healthy body responds to low-grade inflammation by forming protective calcium deposits that may occur in any organ, including a tendon (tendinitis), the joint lining (synovitis) or the joint covering (bursitis).

When the orthopedic surgeon performed arthroscopy, he introduced a special tube through the skin and into the joint. This enabled him to see the interior of the joint, make necessary repairs and remove any irritants, such as calcium deposits. Although your wife could possibly have formed new deposits in a month, I wager that the surgeon missed

You will gather, as this is the second time I'm reviewing it, that I enjoyed Bill Cole's short book "Fishheads" (Devyn, \$10.95, 800-274-2221). 1/4 tsp. salt
1 lb. medium shrimp, shelled and deveined
2 tsp. cornstarch
1 cup long-grain white rice
1 Tbsp. olive oil
1 large red pepper, sliced
2 stalks celery, sliced diagonally, 1/4-inch thick
2 Florida grapefruit, peeled and sectioned

In a medium bowl, combine grapefruit juice concentrate, garlic, cilantro or parsley, ketchup, honey, red pepper flakes and salt. Add the shrimp and stir. Allow to marinate 20

minutes, turning shrimp once. Drain the shrimp and reserve the marinade, combining it with cornstarch. Meanwhile, prepare rice according to package directions. In a large non-stick skillet, heat oil over medium-high heat. Add shrimp and saute 2 to 3 minutes or until shrimp begins to turn orange, just beginning to caramelize. Add red pepper, celery and reserved marinade. Bring to a boil over high heat, stirring constantly until shrimp is just cooked through and sauce has thickened slightly. Add grapefruit sections and heat 30 seconds. Garnish with fresh sprigs of cilantro or parsley. Serve over rice.

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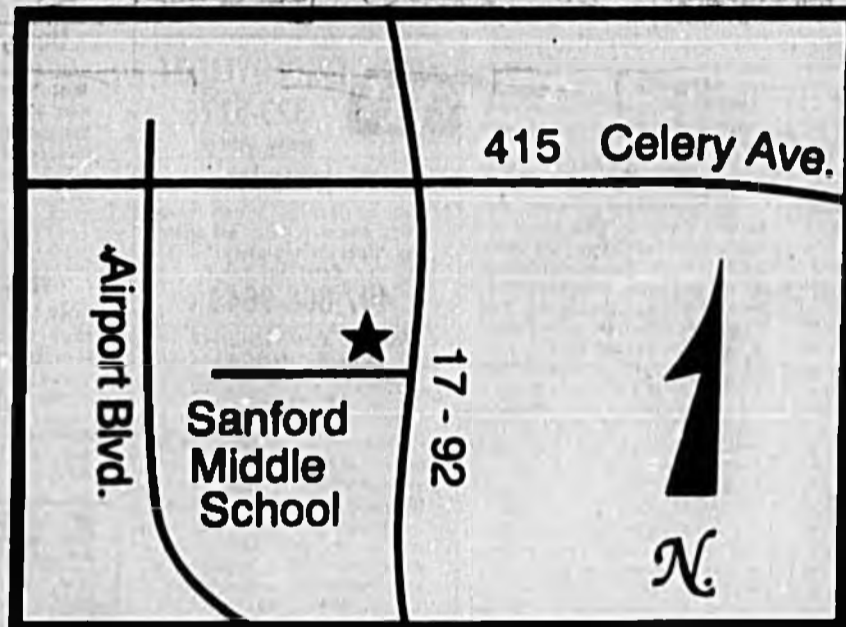
