The Bail-Out Of New York

The three years of scheduled federal funds to New York City will end June 30.

By then the government will have lost \$2.5 billion in the New York City bail-out. This was originally called a loan, but it was a temporary cash flow program.

This winter, New York City officials were begging the U. S. Treasury for more money to make good on the bail-out. They were asking for federal guarantees of long-term bonds it would like to sell.

This expense the national financing scheme as pure profligacy; New York has had much more than a cash flow problem all along.

The immediate problem is the need for credit, which gross mismanagement has forfeited.

The city is simply not creditworthy. The budget deficit is at least \$1 billion, and even larger budget deficits are in the offing.

New York's budget remains in this perpetually red condition because city politicians simply refuse to make hard political decisions, like being tough about unreasonable wage demands, and paring down the number of municipal hospitals, which exceeds that in any other city.

These root causes are plain to see, yet the Carter administration proposes that taxpayers guarantee some \$1 billion in New York bonds. And who does Washington expect as the lucky purchasers of these bonds? The city's employees, that's who, through their present funds. But the employees aren't fools; they've announced they're not buying.

The very idea of the federal government's guaranteeing city bonds is a silly subterfuge to have Washington bail out a bankrupt municipality. Treasury Secretary Michael Blumenthal, the architect of the administration's proposal, might as well propose to guarantee the city's bonds.

Meanwhile, New York City officials have been warning the nation that if the city is permitted to go under, it will drag down some important U.S. financial institutions in a national chain reaction of disastrous proportions.

Some observers believe it is the other way around; that the way to head times for the nation is through a federal bail-out of New York City. They fear, will open a door that cannot be closed with other cities getting the message.

The emotional question of federal aid to New York City has become political football with several politicians denouncing the loan.

The Carter administration must take a good, hard look before doing up any more taxpayer money and must decide what is best for both New York City and the nation as a whole.

WASHINGTON—Republicans chance for receiving the governorship of the free biggest state, originally voted as a man, appear to be getting up late.

With California's Jerry Brown and New York's George Pataki still in the race, the GOP gubernatorial nomination will be decided in a ball game.

In New York, GOP Assembly Leader Perry Duryea just holds the state to ensure the GOP gubernatorial nomination with a release of temporary funding to carry ahead leading into the November general election.

Duryea leads the strong state identification. Carter hopes to be lieutenant governor, and lost the 1980 Republican primary in California, the overwhelmingly Democratic vote of New York City and suburbs.

But he is putting together a thoroughly professional campaign organization that includes some experienced aides of his old nemesis, Nelson Rockefeller, who is no longer around to torment Duryea.

With more than \$10 million raised to date, he is making good use of a couple of top-notch campaign experts—publicist Robert Taylor and media consultant Sally Dorfman.

Money as such is not the problem or the answer.

It is the "proposed" urban program; well-intentioned programs have also worked to the detriment of the cities. The cities are the victims of the federal government's urban policy.

Zamorra Accomplice Pleads

MIAMI (UPI)—A prosecutor says he will ask for a sentence of life in prison for Darrell Agrelia, who pleaded no contest Wednesday to second degree murder for his part in the shooting death of Miami Beach socialite Elinor Haggart.

Rony Zamora, 15, was convicted last year of killing Mrs. Haggart, 62, when she surprised the two youths during a burglary. Zamora, who pleaded not guilty because of "involuntary subliminal television intoxication," was convicted of first degree murder and was sentenced to life in prison.

Dade County Assistant State Attorney Tom Headley said he agreed to reduced charges against Agrelia because "it is appropriate in view of the age of the defendant and the circumstances of the crime."

Iran Reports Major Soviet Spy Ring Smashed
TEHRAN, Iran (UPI) — Iran said today it had smashed a major Soviet spy ring and blamed Russian agents for fomenting recent anti-government rioting.
Official reports in the Iranian press said the espionage network included a retired Iranian general, two unidentified Soviet Embassy employees and another Russian employed by a local Iranian-Soviet transport firm.

Britain Warns Soviets
LONDON (UPI) — Britain is warning the Soviet Union that detente will be imperiled if an estimated 30,000 Cuban soldiers in Africa intervene in guerrilla wars in Ethiopia and Rhodesia.
Foreign Secretary David Owen, in a major policy speech Wednesday night, said the presence of the Cubans and 1,000 Soviet advisers could seriously upset the balance of power in Africa, a concern shared by the Carter administration.

PLO Kills 3 Israelis
BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) — Palestine Liberation Organization officials today said three Israeli soldiers had been killed by guerrillas and their bodies would be exchanged for Palestinian prisoners.
Military sources in Tel Aviv confirmed that the Israeli soldiers were killed in a shootout with guerrillas.

Masterpiece Defaced
AMSTERDAM, Netherlands (UPI) — Museum officials say a knife attack by a distraught artist on a Van Gogh masterpiece caused major damage that could take months to repair.
The attack occurred Wednesday in the Municipal Museum on the painting "La Berceuse," which was identified by museum officials as one of two copies Van Gogh himself made of the 1889 original that hangs in the Netherlands State Museum, 60 miles from Amsterdam.

Winter Springs Grapples With Utility Firm Purchase
Mayor Troy Flinn this week announced that the Winter Springs City Council is interested in purchasing the North Orlando Water and Sewer Co.
That he got out a motion from Councilman Laurent Peltier, seconded by Councilman John Daniels, that the city not purchase the utility. The motion died for lack of a majority — two councilmen, Peltier and Daniels voted in favor, while John Daniels and Thomas Owen voted against the motion.
When a positive motion was not made, the proposed purchase — on which Flinn and Peltier were strong supporters during the last few months — was left in limbo again.
Flinn said he took the vote as an indication that he could proceed with buying local utility to appear before the council to give recommendations on the matter.
The North Orlando Water and Sewer Co. is wholly owned by the Florida Land Co., a subsidiary of Florida Citrus, and serves 1,200 homes with water and sewer service.
The firm, which received approval from the Florida Public Service Commission

Casselberry Readies Connection Fee Pact

Casselberry City Attorney Kenneth McNeill has been instructed to prepare a "developer's agreement" with Greater Construction Co. calling for payment of \$25 in connection fees to the city's water and sewer utility per unit in the desirable subdivisions of Red Bay Road.
By instructing McNeill to prepare the agreement, the city council turned down a request from Lester McNeill, a president of the Greater Construction Co., to levy a fee of only \$20 per unit for 100 dwellings to be constructed in the area.
McNeill asked city council to permit the lower fee to him with a developer's agreement. In February, however, the city could not afford to be generous in the matter and that other developers had refused the same circumstances as McNeill.
Under the agreement, the firm was to have construction of 271 units begun in March, 1977.
The council agreed to reimburse the \$24,000 paid previously by Greater at the rate of \$20 per connection. But denied the reduction for the 100 units.
Councilman Frank Schutte said the utility department's financial statement for February showed the city could not afford to be generous in the matter and that other developers had refused the same circumstances as McNeill.
