





The Southeastern Conference led with five men on the two first teams, offensive and defensive, followed by the Big Ten with four and the Pacific Coast Conference with three.

20 Moroccuns were sluin. By noon, police had gained a shaky grip on the situation and tanks and armed troops patrolled the troubled sections. An # p. m. to 6 a. m. curiew was imposed and assemblies of more than 10 persons were banned.

A police official driving to work was attacked by a mot during the morning. His automobile was burned but he escaped. A French schoolmaster leading Moroccan children to school opened fire on a crowd which started throwing stores at him and drove them off stones at him and drove them off The outbreaks here on the north-west African coast followed a nationwide strike call by the Moroc-can General Labor Confederation, which acted in sympathy with the Tunisian workers mayement (UGT).
