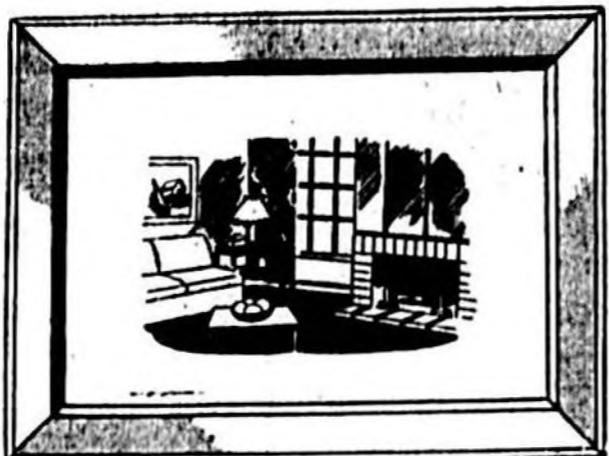

ACL To Feature Vacationer During '53 Winter Season

For the 1952-53 winter season the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad, in addition to offering the service it has provided for the past several seasons, will feature the Vacationer as a through all-Pullman train between Boston and Florida destinations, as well as an extension of the West Coast Champion to the lower West Coast of Florida serving Naples, Fort Myers, Punta Gorda, et cetera, according to announcement by L. T. Shepard, Ticket Agent of the railroad here.

Operated over the only double track route between the East and Florida the Coast Line will add the Vacationer and Florida Special to its fleet of trains now including the East Coast Champion, West Coast Champion, Miamian, Havana Special, Palmetto, and Everglades.

The new Boston-Florida service will be provided by the Vacationer which will be of particular interest to vacationists in the New England area. With first trip from Boston, Dec. 11, the Vacationer will operate every other day throughout the winter season between Boston and Miami, Orlando, Tampa, Sarasota and St. Petersburg. The Vacationer will also handle sleeping cars daily between New York and Washington, and both coasts of Florida. Pullman accommodations will consist of bedrooms, compartments, drawingrooms, roomettes, and sections. Tavern-lounge and dining cars will be provided in this train.

The West Coast Champion will continue to operate as a Pullman and coach train between New York and Central and West Coast Florida, serving such points as Sanford, Orlando, Tampa, Bradenton, Sarasota, Punta Gorda, Fort Myers, Naples, Clearwater, and St. Petersburg. The regularly scheduled equipment in the West Coast Champion will consist of lightweight all-private-room sleeping cars providing roomettes, double bedrooms, bedrooms, suites, and drawingrooms, as well as conventional Pullmans providing sections, bedrooms, compartments, and drawingrooms. The lightweight, reclining-seat coaches in this train are of modern design and all seats are reserved. The train will also carry tavern-lounge and dining cars. A new feature of the West Coast Champion will be the operation, beginning December 13th, of a lightweight sleeping car between New York and Naples, Florida. A lightweight reserved-seat coach will be operated between Jacksonville and Naples. The Havana Special will continue to serve the Carolinas, Georgia, and both coasts of Florida. Sleeping cars will be operated between New York and Miami, Tampa, Fort Myers, St. Petersburg, and Wilmington, N. C., and also between Washington and Orlando, Florida. There will also be a tavern-lounge and dining car.

His Florida radio stations were WJHP, Jacksonville; WCOA, Pensacola; WDLF, Panama City; and WFTM, Ocala.

He was born May 3, 1881, at Port Royal, Ky., which has since been named Perry Park. He was a direct descendant of Commodore Perry whose gun-backed diplomacy opened the Orient to American trade at Yokohama in 1854.

Perry won his bachelor of arts degree from Hanover College, Madison, Ind., in 1902, and a law degree from the University of Virginia, Hanover in 1906 conferred an honorary doctorate upon him.

He started the practice of law at Seattle, Wash. and became an assistant prosecutor of King County. In 1915, after becoming part owner of the James Scripps newspaper, he moved to Cleveland, O., to become attorney for the United Press, Newspaper Enterprise Association and the Scripps newspapers.

Perry came to Florida with the growing boom and became an ardent Florida booster. He sponsored the first regatta ever run in the South and the first winter regatta ever held in the United States. He was a regatta promoter in the Valley-Pennsylvania regatta of 1948 at Palm Beach.

He wrote a book on newspaper law which dealt with libel and other matters. "Who Runs the Country," "Florida in the Making," and "So This is Florida."

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Mystery Of Aging Gun-toting Hermit Is Still Unsolved

FERNANDINA BEACH (6)—The month-old mystery of what happened to gun-toting, 70-year-old hermit Alice Broadbent on her isolated little island near here promised today to continue for at least seven years.

And even then it may be settled only on a legal technicality, leaving the matter as hazy as the ocean fogs which drift along the coast to the ghost-like squawking of the gulls and which bathes in clammy dampness the dense, almost impenetrable bracken of scrub oak and palmetto and Spanish bayonet.

On the night of Nov. 7, Sheriff H. J. Youngblood noticed a glow in the sky to the south, but thought little of it at the moment.

Next day, however, he decided it might bear investigation. So he beat his way to the 100-acre spot of desolation to find in ashes the two-story frame house where the woman had lived in belated solitude since the death of her father in 1921.

"Knowing her like we did," said County Judge W. Burgess later, "we're of the opinion she wouldn't have left the house."

But what looked like bits of bone were found in the debris and they were sent off for analysis.

The result, said the judge, was "nothing in the way of medical opinion to support the assumption they were those of Miss Broadbent. We see nothing to do except depend on the seven-year statute which lets you declare a person dead if they're not heard from in that time."

The little old lady sternly resisted any encroachment of civilization, but offered no fight in the advance of jungle-like growth about her house. Nor was she very tidy.

Sheriff Youngblood said "She had been breaking pretty bad in the last year. She occasionally walked the six miles into town and once when she hadn't been seen for some time, I went out."

He said he forced his way into the old structure past tin cans, bottles, jars and other junk.

"There were enough cans alone to fill a good-sized house. She met me at the top of the stairs and told me:

"If I need you, I'll send for you."

"She cooked in the fireplace," the sheriff said. "She'd take a piece of wood and put in the fire and keep pushing it in as it burned back. I don't know how she lived as long as she did."

They didn't notice the tree was turning brown until the day they got a telegram saying Richard had been drowned at Kobe, Japan, on July 15, 1951—on his way home.

The lights were turned on again yesterday on the little tree. It'll be up again next year.

"I promised him I would save his Christmas for him," said Mrs. Lopez.
