





So you'd better do something about that cold tight now.

Generally a cold in the head will start and end gradually. Unless somplications develop, you can allergic nasal inflammation, on the other hand, begins suddenly and continues as long as the irritant is present.

With a common cold you might run a slight fever and have a general feeling of discomfort or illness. Seldom will an allergy cause either.



A. Pork Arm Steak Q. Where does it come from and how is it identified?

A. It is cut from the picale shoulder. The picale shoulder includes the arm and shank section of the shoulder. The pork arm steak contains a small round (arm) bone, is oval at one end, and is squared off at the other.


