State Fair Briefs

Not only are attendance records being shattered at Tampa's Florida State Fair—the first in four years—but national records for state expositions as well. On Saturday it was difficult to see the exhibits, so great was the jam of people. Eating places were swamped; carnival men had an all time take of more than \$31,000. Seminole County has no exhibit at the fair, but nearby Volusia county has a prize winning display of fruits and vegetables which appeared to come from two golden horns of plenty, while surrounding this was an animated band majorette which goes through some realistic motions in the manner of Seminole High School's Sophie McDougall. The Tampa Tribune's exhibit, which has posters and descriptions of the leading contributors to the fair, was designed by Byron Stephens, art editor and former Sanford resident, who is famed throughout the nation for his Florida art work and dioramas at the New York World's Fair and the Chicago and Cleveland expositions. Mr. and Mrs. Stephens have purchased a charming little home on Davis Island. Apalling in their grim menace and mechanical complexity are some of the army's huge mobile guns which at the fair grounds loom up above gaping onlookers like huge, prehistoric monsters of steel. An army sergeant explains how a remote control range finder connects with a maze of radio like equipment in a truck which in turn supplies the "brains" to a huge 90 MM gun with a long muzzle, which faithfully follows the eyepiece movements of the range finder. Shell fuse arrangements are mechanically computed constantly. Men, women and children clamber upstairs to a platform to peer into the unromy interior of a Sherman tank. No soft upholstery in there. Mobile pieces of interest are 105 and 155 M4 howitzers, guns and machine guns. Naming Of New Interior Head Expected Soon

President Said To Be Combing Possibilities For Man Of High Caliber

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—(AP)—President Truman is expected to act swiftly in naming a successor to Interior Secretary Harold Ickes. The question as to who may get the cabinet post, which Ickes is quitting tomorrow, is still regarded as very much up in the air. The President is said to be combing the possibilities for a man of top caliber. In this way political observers believe the circumstances of Ickes' resignation may possibly be offset.

Secretary Ickes, resigned after declaring President Truman had questioned the veracity of his testimony concerning Mr. Truman's nominee for undersecretary of Navy—Edwin Pauley. Ickes said that Pauley, as National Democratic Committee treasurer, had suggested \$300,000 could be obtained for the party coffers if the government would hold off in a suit to gain title to certain oil-bearing islands. Ickes termed the raw deal proposition "a very bad idea," Truman said he thought Ickes might have been mistaken as to what Pauley had been driving at.

President Truman conferred today with a number of Democratic congressmen from the western states in the wake of cabinet crisis. Among those who visited the White House at Mr. Truman's request were Senator Joseph O'Mahoney of Wyoming, Ickes' successor, Mr. Truman also talked with House Speaker Sam Rayburn of Texas and Senators Burton Wheeler of Montana, Carl Hatch of New Mexico, Albert B. Thomas and William McNamara of Utah. White House Secretary Charles Rosa announced that the President has postponed his scheduled press and radio conference to 4:00 P.M., E.S.T., tomorrow.

The venerable Democratic congressman from Illinois, Adolph Sabath, wants Harry Truman to run for the presidency in 1948. The Chairman of the House Rules Committee and dean of the lower chamber describes Mr. Truman as "a man who was elevated to the presidency against his own wishes, but who has proven by his honesty and fearlessness that he is fully qualified to hold that office."

Dawson Says Work Sheets Must Be In By February 28

Conservation and production worksheets mailed to growers between Jan. 23 and 29th must be returned to the County Agent's office by Feb. 28 in order that growers may be eligible for any payment under the 1946 soil conservation program. County Agent C. R. Dawson today declared.

Mr. Dawson warned bee keepers whom he has notified to list the number of hives and colonies of bees they have, also how much sugar they feel they are entitled to in order to feed the bees, that they must supply this information or they will get no sugar quota. This data was required by J. H. McCoy, chief of the sugar ration section, he said. Any bee keeper who requires sugar must make this report by Feb. 28.

The OPA has reported to Mr. Dawson that it may be possible to set at \$2.75 per 100 pound bushel on Jan. 31, will revert to \$3.50 ceiling on Feb. 28.

Gerald Nye To Seek Election To Senate

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—(AP)—Former Senator Gerald P. Nye of North Dakota, a Republican, has announced that he will run for the Senate in the North Dakota election. Nye held a Senate seat for nearly 20 years prior to the 1934 fall elections, when he was defeated by a Democrat, the late Senator John Moses. Moses was named on Jan. 2, 1945, and died shortly thereafter in the North Dakota election. Nye had appointed Senator Young, a Republican, to serve until this year's election.

North Dakota's other senator, William Langer, also comes up for re-election this year. Nye says he has not decided whether he will run against Langer or against Young. He intends to wait until the various state conventions are over before making up his mind.

Boston Mayor Is Denied New Trial By District Court

Curley Faces Stiff Sentence On Mail Fraud Conviction

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—(AP)—The mayor of Boston, 71-year-old James Curley, has been denied a new trial on a mail fraud conviction. Judge James T. McLaughlin in Washington denied a request for a new trial by Curley. Curley was convicted in 1944 of mail fraud in connection with the case of the Boston Police Department. He was sentenced to 18 months in prison and a \$10,000 fine. The two others convicted with him in a district court were Donald Wakefield Smith, former member of the National Labor Relations Board, and James Fuller, who now is serving a 5-year sentence for sending fraudulent securities through the mails.

All three were former officials of Engineers Group, Inc. This firm was accused by the government of obtaining more than \$500,000 from clients by representing that it would obtain government contracts for them. Curley was not available immediately for comment on Justice Proctor's decision. His secretary, Frank Howland, said that Curley intends to appeal the district court finding to the appellate court and if necessary, to the Supreme Court.

Argentina Plans Reply To United States Charges

BUENOS AIRES, Feb. 14.—(AP)—Informed sources in Buenos Aires say the Argentine government is preparing a reply to the United States' blue book charging the South American nation with close links, both past and present, with Nazi Germany. President Peron, a strong candidate and so-called "strong man" of the Argentine, is expected to make a statement in the near future. Argentine sources were identified in the State Department document as linked to the German cause.

Foreign office sources say that Foreign Minister Juan L. Cooke probably will at least refer to the blue book in a nationwide radio speech he is scheduled to make tonight from Buenos Aires. These sources have not disclosed when a formal reply, if any, will be delivered to Washington.

So far, no Argentine official has commented on the serious charges contained in the State Department's blue book. Neither has Peron, although he has accused the United States Assistant Secretary of State Sproule Braden—former ambassador to Buenos Aires—of what Peron termed "insolent intervention" in Argentine affairs.

JACKSONVILLE, Feb. 14.—(AP)—Director Roy Coffey of the north Florida OPA district says he resigns from the post with effect tomorrow. He will go back into private business.

Chiang Shouts Chinese Are No Longer Slaves

Generalissimo Talks Before 500,000 On Extra-Territoriality Within China

SHANGHAI, Feb. 14.—(AP)—The voice of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek pulsed with emotion as he shouted: "We are free and independent. We no longer have to live as slaves and beasts of burden." 500,000 voices split the sky with a thunderous roar of approval as the Generalissimo continued: "I return to you the responsibility of preserving those sovereign rights forever."

The scene was the vast Shanghai stadium and the Generalissimo was speaking on the abolition of extra-territoriality in China, the unique system under which foreign nations had established out-and-out sovereignty within the boundaries of China in many of its cities. The extra-territoriality that China's vast resources went, not to enrich the Chinese, but to add to the wealth of foreign nations.

Major Presby shot down approximately 30 German aircraft before he was accidentally shot down in the Pacific. He was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross and the Distinguished Flying Cross. He is now in the United States on a leave of absence from the Army.

Rescue Parties Get To Earthquake Area

ALGIERS, Feb. 14.—(AP)—The first rescue parties have reached villages in the vicinity of Constantine, Algeria, where an earthquake killed or injured 276 persons yesterday.

Reports from the area say the strongest shock was felt south of Constantine, about 50 miles southwest of the Port of Boue. The time of the quake has been fixed at 2:00 P.M. (2:00 A.M. Eastern Standard Time).

United States Archivist Declares Red Tape Helped In Winning World War II

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—(AP)—If you'll take the record of the United States archivist, Bolton Buck, red tape helped win the war. While archivist Buck does not mind weeding out the paper harvest which Uncle Sam reaped during the war, he is convinced that quite a few yards of red tape should be kept for the use of posterity.

For those who are interested in figures, Buck discloses that by the end of the war the government had something in the neighborhood of 18,000,000 to 20,000,000 cubic feet of records. For instance, if you put the records in four-drawer filing cabinets placed side by side, the cabinets would line the railroad tracks solidly from Washington to Chicago. Dumped out, they would cover one acre of ground and pile nearly as high as Washington Monument—that's 555 feet.

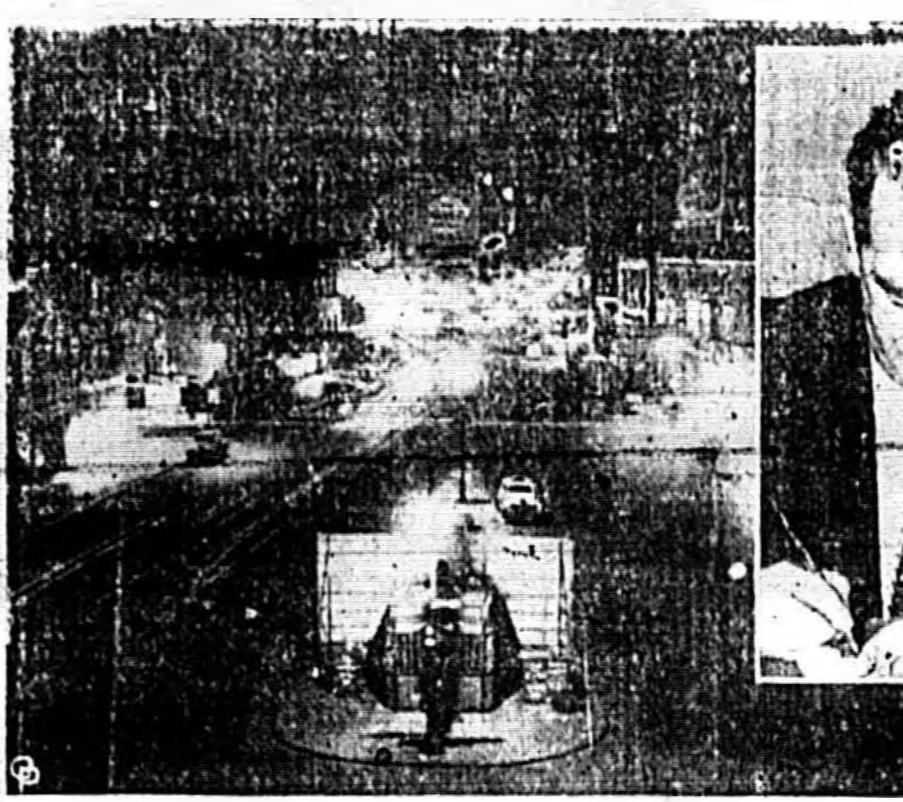

Buck stresses that not only was the citizen army mobilized and demobilized on paper—but the industrial war machine was belted with so-called red tape. And he continues: "even the capitulation of our enemies was witnessed and symbolized in the documents slipped at Rheims and in Tokyo Bay."

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—(AP)—The State Department advisor to General MacArthur, George Atchison, Jr., arrived in Washington this morning from Tokyo and quickly declared that there had been any rift between MacArthur and himself. Atchison declared that on the contrary, relations between the Allied commander and his department have been of the happiest.

MacArthur, he said, has asked him to return to Tokyo after his consultations in Washington. Atchison added that in his opinion, MacArthur is doing a grand job in Tokyo.

Nimitz Says Carrier Fleet May Make Atomic Air Attack Difficult

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—(AP)—Nimitz says the Navy's carrier fleet may make an atomic air attack in the Pacific and other areas. Nimitz, commander in chief of the Pacific Fleet, said that the Navy's carrier fleet is the most successful means of transporting atomic weapons within short distances of coastal targets.

Nimitz stressed before the committee to prevent the Navy Department's recommendations for the post-war fleet.

He has shown the committee plans for a system of 33 overseas Naval bases for ships and planes in the Pacific and other areas.

Nimitz says the Navy wants a force of 47 atomic bombers, and has indicated one and a half percent of the fleet.

Wage, Price Policy Still Being Delayed

UAW President Predicts GM Strike Will Be Settled In Near Future

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—(AP)—The new administration wage-price policy announcement still is being delayed, along with the announcement of a price boost for the steel industry. Administration sources disclose there still is disagreement among top officials, including President Truman, on policy matters. Mr. Truman is said to want to set up a wage increase formula which will make it unnecessary for the wage stabilization board to pass on every single wage increase granted. There also is continuing disagreement on whether a boost in steel prices should apply only to carbon steel or to alloy steel as well.

DETROIT, Feb. 14.—(AP)—Today is the 40th day of the nationwide strike of 15,000 auto workers at plants of the General Motors Corporation. It finds GM and the union still as far apart on basic issues as when the strike started.

However, UAW President R. J. Thomas, following conferences with special Federal mediator James Dewey, has indicated that the strike will be settled in the not too distant future. Thomas has given no explanation other than to say he does not see how the strike can last much longer unless, as he put it, "it wants to go completely broke."

Hendricks Tells Why River Funds Left Out Of Bill

Representative Joe Hendricks, confereed with Manager Ed Higgins and President H. C. Higgins for two hours in Orlando yesterday afternoon and explained why the \$325,000 10-foot St. Johns River channel project had been left out of the House Rivers and Harbors Appropriation bill and promised to make every effort to have the project restored to the bill in the Senate.

Representative Hendricks said it was left out of the bill because the Army engineers had recently approved a second project, deepening the channel to 12 feet instead of 10. The 10-foot channel had already been authorized by Congress in a Rivers and Harbors Bill but the 12-foot project has not been approved by the engineers, and has not yet been authorized by Congress.

No appropriation can be made for a project which has not been authorized, he said. Therefore, the engineers and the Bureau of the Budget desire to combine the two projects, and refused to recommend an appropriation for the 10-foot project which had been authorized.

Representative Hendricks said he was very much chastened over this matter and conferred with the Chief of Engineers and the Bureau of the Budget to find out why they had not included the project. He said that they should be combined in the interest of economy and time, he explained.

Representative Hendricks said he discussed the matter with the Chairman of the Sub-Committee and offered to have another project in his district reduced by \$500,000.00 so that he could insert the St. Johns River project, but the chairman reminded him that in view of the fact the Bureau of Budget had recommended no funds at present, this could not be done.

Representative Hendricks telephoned Senator Andrews and Senator Pepper in Washington, Mr. Higgins said, and asked that they make an effort to put the \$325,000 appropriation for the 10-foot project into the bill which is now before the Senate. Senate rules permit this, Mr. Higgins said, whereas the House rules do not. Senator Andrews and Senator Pepper are said to be contacting their friends on the Sub-Committee in an effort to get the project in the bill.

Representative Hendricks is vitally concerned in getting this project through. Mr. Higgins said, because it affects so many counties in the district, and he proposes to leave no stone unturned until it is brought to a successful conclusion.

AMERICANS WRITING LETTERS TO NAZIS CRITICIZE ALLIES
FRANKFURT, Germany, Feb. 14.—(AP)—American Army headquarters in Germany disclose that citizens in the United States have written letters to German critics of the Allies and praising the Germans. The Army says the letters also criticized the United States government and lamented the bombing of German cities.

The Army has the names of all those persons who wrote such clandestine letters. Correspondence in or out of Germany for Germans is forbidden at the present time.

However, the Army says that only a small portion of the illegal mail it has intercepted has been critically, but that portion has been violently so.

The Army cites a letter from Buffalo, N.Y., which says in part: "The end of this cursed war brought little joy... it began with lies and ended the same way... I wonder how long this fool play of a Nuernberg trial will go on. When that is over the honorable judges can start to cut each others' throats with atomic bombs..."

The other letters, including one from a United States Army finance employe in Los Angeles, all were in the same vein.
