Huddles With Attorney General On Indictments Herring Ponders Next Step In Jury Probe

Seminole-Brevard State Attorney Abbott Herring said today he is working with State Attorney General Robert Shevin's office in trying to determine what course of action Herring should take about the sealing by circuit court judges Wednesday of indictments returned by the Seminole County Grand Jury.

The grand jury presented an interim report "and other documents" to Circuit Judge Joe A. Cowart Jr. after four weeks of probing county government actions and allegations of sunshine law violations. Cowart ordered the entire jury report sealed for 15 days and said in open court that Circuit Judge Volle A. Williams had already prepared the envelope in which the report was to be sealed.

Williams told reporters before the grand jury made its return that if public officials were indicted the report would be sealed and no arrest warrants issued at this time.

Cowart later said he had conferred with Judge Williams and was following his advice in the grand jury matter.

Cowart ordered Circuit Court Clerk Arthur Beck with Jr. to make four copies of the grand jury report and documents before the court sealed the original report.

Askew Praises 'Dream'

Florida Governor Reubin Askew was at Sanford's Auto-Train terminal Wednesday and told Auto-Train President Eugene K. Garfield that his building a \$30-million-a-year corporation from scratch represents the American dream come true.

The occasion was Auto-Train's selection of Navy Lt. Michael A. Jones — who looked every bit the part of the American dream with his pretty wife and two children — as the one millionth passenger to board an auto-train since it began running four years ago.

Calling Garfield's Auto-Train a "unique experience" and a boon to Florida tourism, the impeccably dressed governor welcomed tourists on hand at the terminal, calling them the "backbone of Florida."

The test-taking Askew said in no other country in the world could a man like Garfield take \$46 and turn it into a railroad empire and asked Seminole County to "keep Florida with the Lord and keep Florida nice."

Just prior to the governor's speech, Garfield said, "Thousands and thousands said it couldn't be done — I never listened to them."

Instead he said he "started with one person — me — and a legal pad" and ended up with a railroad that employs 625 workers.

"In a period of four years, the company has grown from five to 625 employees who have worked together to make Auto-Train well respected in the transportation field.

Predicts Surge In Economy

Gov. Reubin Askew Wednesday reaffirmed his staunch stand against casino gambling in Florida and predicted a surge in the sagging economy by next spring.

In an exclusive interview, the governor answered questions which ranged from his future political ambitions to his policy for removal of elected officials under indictment for offenses prohibited by Florida law.

Askew predicted a surge in the state economy sometime in the spring. He said Florida's economy, however, lags behind the rest of the nation by two to three months.

The governor had predicted a nine per cent gain in state revenue for the last three months in this fiscal year. He said the prediction still holds true and that the nine per cent gain is over the previous quarter.

Askew Reaffirms Gambling Stand

"I intend to support the Democratic nominee," the governor said. As to his own political aspirations when his term as governor expires next year, Askew, as usual, said he has no ambitions for higher office on the national level.

However, speculation always exists that Askew could be selected as a candidate for vice-president.

Askew said he did not know at this time what his future plans are. Much like a character from a J.D. Salinger novel, the governor said he cannot predict what he will do tomorrow until tomorrow is here.

Askew said his office has no firm policy on removal of indicted elected officials from office.

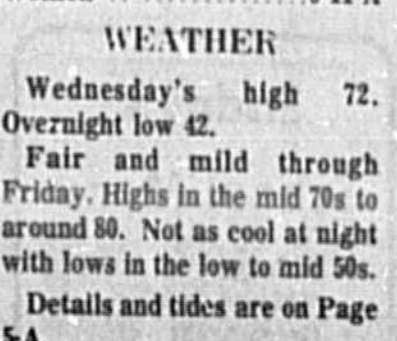

School Board Plans To Fight Federal Motion

The Seminole County School Board plans to use a U. S. Justice Department motion to improve the "racial identifiability" at Midway Elementary School, Board Attorney Douglas Stenstrom said Wednesday.

He said "there is no workable definition of racially identifiability—and that's the point." The 1970 desegregation plan for Seminole County schools assigned 60 white pupils and 300 black pupils to the formerly all-black school.

Stenstrom said the lawsuit is the first time the Justice Department has challenged Seminole County on a racial issue. He said it may have originated after an earlier suit ended in the board's favor this past summer.

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JOHN CUNIFF Is Economy Really Moving Up?

NEW YORK (AP) — If you don't already have enough economic matters to dwell upon, you might consider these:

—If prices are rising, asks the ordinary consumer, who is legion, how can the country rebound strongly from recession?

—If you are an habitual reader of scores of economic reports from banks and businesses and business schools and other places on high, you cannot but observe that the professionals really don't come to grips with this question.

For the consumer, it isn't a matter of coming to grips with it; it is a matter of being graced by it. There is no ignoring higher prices or what they do: they turn off spending, whenever it can be turned off.

There is no theory or need for theory to explain what is happening in the pocketbook. It is there that reality exists, and it cannot be ignored. There is no room or time for dreaming, because the dreamer starves.

At the professional level, where almost everyone is caught up in theories and computer models and dogmas, this elemental consideration sometimes seems not to fit. There is an awareness perhaps, but it is not an appreciation.

On the battle front, it is the only consideration. The battle front, of course, is the market place where the consumer does his spending. Two-thirds of this economy of ours is made up of consumer spending. It is almost impossible, short of war, for the economy to grow if the consumer isn't a strong participant.

The professionals don't deny this; they proclaim it. But then they go on to expect the consumer to win the war, so to speak, while the enemy is advancing. The enemy is inflation, and consumer retreats from it.

The figures for October show that enemy inflation rose at an 8.4 per cent annual rate, which puts us right back to the identical level that prevailed in the first quarter of the year. No improvement.

Retail sales, meanwhile, are admittedly "less than had been anticipated," as the two familiar phrases read. Even the Commerce Department concedes that.

The consumer, however, is a bit baffled by the indications of the "experts." He asks: "What did you expect?" To him it is axiomatic. When you raise prices you don't want me to buy."

Why, then, are prices rising? If consumer demand is off, shouldn't prices fall in order to encourage buying? That's the theory — and it's also the problem the experts should be dealing with. There is their business, as the reality of the market place is where the consumer is expected.

Doctor Saves Woman's Life After Surgical Team Quits

LONDON (AP) — A surgeon saved a woman's life by operating on her virtually singlehanded after the surgical team at his hospital said their eight hour day was over.

A truck driver with a broken foot drove around northwest London in pain for three hours looking for a hospital that would take him in. Three said they were not handling casualties. The fourth he visited rushed him into the accident ward.

These are just two of the incidents Wednesday as Britain's National Health Service, the state-run system of socialized medicine, struggled with a week-old slowdown by half the service's 19,000 junior hospital doctors refusing to work more than a basic 40-hour week.

Laos Names 'Red Prince'

VIENTIANE, Laos (AP) — Red banners waved over the streets of the Laotian capital today as loudspeakers announced a pro-Hanoi Communist has been named premier and the country's "Red Prince" named the president of the new People's Democratic Republic of Laos.

The Information Ministry said at a news conference that Prince Souphanouvong, the president, would preside over a 45-member Supreme People's Council while Premier Kaysone Phommvihan would head a 39-man cabinet.

The ministry said King Savang Vatthana, whose abdication was announced Wednesday, would be "supreme adviser" to the president, while Prince Souvanna Phouma, the premier for the past 13 years, was appointed "adviser to the government."

Paris Police Kill Back Robber

PARIS (AP) — Police killed a North African bank robber and captured his Spanish accomplice early today as they tried to escape after holding about 30 hostages for 14 hours in a bank near the Eiffel Tower.

The Spaniard tripped and hurt his head as he tried to run from the getaway car, which crashed into a taxi less than half a mile from the bank. Two women hostages in the car and all the hostages in the bank were unhurt.

Police said the two gunmen, "armed to the teeth," tried to rob a branch of the Credit Lyonnais shortly after 10:30 a.m. Wednesday, but were interrupted by guards from a Brink's delivery truck. There was an exchange of shots, a passerby was shot in the foot, and the gunmen herded members of the bank staff and customers into the basement safe deposit room.

Indonesians Shoot Hostage

AMSTERDAM, The Netherlands (AP) — Indonesians holding a Dutch train in northern Holland shot another one of their hostages today as six of their countrymen stormed the Indonesian consulate building in Amsterdam, officials said.

Authorities said the shooting in the hijacked train near Bellen, in northern Holland, occurred during a lull in negotiations with a mediator selected by the gunmen.

They said the mediator, a South Moluccan resident of the Netherlands, had just left the train when a man was pushed to the door and was shot. He fell to the track and was believed dead.

Dionne Warwick Granted Divorce After 10 Years

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Singer Dionne Warwick and husband Bill Elliott have been granted a divorce after 10 years of marriage.

Miss Warwick, 34, told Superior Court Judge Leopold Sanchez on Wednesday that her marriage had irreparably broken down.

Elliott, 41, a drummer and actor, filed the suit for dissolution of the marriage last June 3. Miss Warwick's manager, Paul Cantor, said Elliott is seeking \$5,000 a month in support fees. He has already been paid \$10,000 to cover various costs. In his suit he listed his income as \$500 a month and hers as \$100,000 a month.

A community property trial is expected to be held next year. Miss Warwick will have temporary custody of the couple's two sons, David, 6, and Damon, 2.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Television entertainer Johnny Carson has received an offer of \$1 million to appear in a motion picture version of author Irving Shaw's new book, "Nightworks."

Shaw was a guest Tuesday on Carson's "Tonight Show" and talked about the book, which is about a down-and-out resident of a sleazy hotel who finds a dead man with \$100,000 in his pockets.

During the talk, agent Irving Lazar walked on camera and offered Carson what he said was a \$1-million check if he would take the starring role, saying it would only take 10 days to film.

A spokesman for NBC said Carson was thinking about the offer.

county government actions probe, said he doesn't anticipate that the Tuesday grand jury session will have anything to do with what was presented and sealed yesterday.

Herring refused to comment on speculation that the grand jury may be investigating leads developed during the past four weeks probe.

Sheriff John Polk waited in his office until 5:30 p.m. Wednesday in case arrest warrants were issued on the indictments returned. Polk said if his office received warrants that persons named would be called and allowed to come to county jail for arrest and not brought in by deputies.

Herring went home after Cowart told reporters that no warrants were being issued.

Judge Williams told reporters that "the real reason" for the law cited by the court in sealing the grand jury report is "there have been so many officials indicted and the cases dismissed."

"But you can't seal a bill," Williams said, noting that once such indictments became public without allowing persons named to challenge them that the officials' reputations have been ruined.

Williams said any hearings on motions to expunge the jury report or portions of it will be secret hearings and not open to the public or press.

Attorneys Newman Brock and Gerald Rutberg were in the courtroom when the jury report was ordered sealed.

Brock represents County Commissioner Mike Hattaway and Rutberg represents County Commissioner Harry Kwiatkowski.

Brock and Rutberg met in chambers with Judges Williams and Cowart. Later Brock and Rutberg were joined in another conference with Judge Cowart by Orlando attorney Cheney Mason, who represents County Atty. Thomas Freeman.

All three lawyers are believed to have been given copies of the grand jury report by Cowart.

Rutberg exited the judge's chambers and was observed putting a multi-page document, believed to be a copy of the report, into his briefcase.

Both Rutberg and Brock answered questions from reporters with "No comment."

Mason, holding a file folder labeled "Tom Freeman," said, "My client will not have a comment at any time."

About an hour later Seminole County Port Authority Chairman Tom Binford was observed leaving the judge's chambers with a man identified as a lawyer. Binford was flushed and apparently upset and said he had no comment. Binford is Freeman's cousin.

Binford was one of the many witnesses heard by the grand jury in portions of the county government probe that are believed to have been centered on an abortive county \$317,000 purchase deal for 103-acres in south Seminole proposed for use as a county jail site.

Binford said he would have received a \$12,500 share of the land sale commission as the real estate salesman handling the deal for Laurel Realty. Binford is no longer associated with the realty firm.

The county contracted on July 23 to buy the acreage from Greater Construction Corp. of Casselberry, but county commissioners voted on Oct. 14 not to close the sale. Greater Construction has filed a civil suit seeking damages and enforcement of the land sale contract.

Also among witnesses before the grand jury were County Commissioners Sid Vihlen Jr., John Kimbrough and Dick Williams.

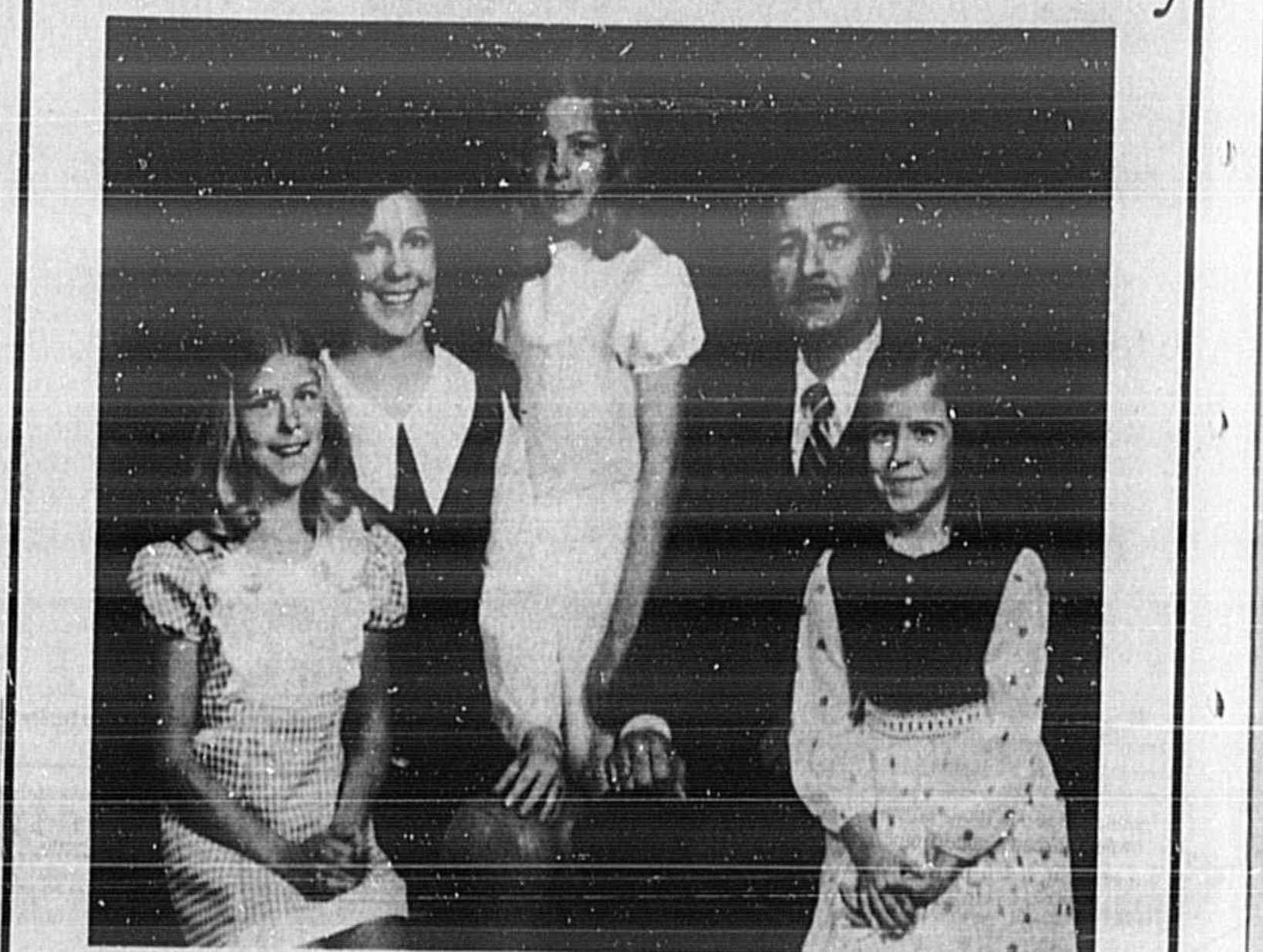

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Vecek Given A Week By AL

CLEVELAND (AP) — The Chicago White Sox and Bill Vecek remained in baseball limbo today after American League owners rejected his initial bid for the team and gave him one week to raise the ante.

Vecek, the man who introduced bat day and midgeets to baseball while owner of three teams over three decades, was told Wednesday night by the owners his offer included too much debt and not enough cash.

"I'm sort of in shock," said Vecek after being told he must come up with \$1.2 million more in debt-free money for the sale to go through. "I didn't anticipate this. The requirements in this (new proposal) are quite a bit more stringent than other teams that have been admitted in recent years."

"I'm neither optimistic nor pessimistic," he added. "It's possible (to meet the asking price) and we'll try."

The attorney for the group Vecek is representing, David Cohen of Philadelphia, was definitely pessimistic, but it is impossible, but it is improbable," Cohen said. "It's going to be seven days, 24 hours a day of backbreaking work."

Lee MacPhail, president of the American League, and the owners and general managers met for more than six hours before MacPhail emerged to announce the league counter-proposal and deadline.

"The league clubs considered the proposal and financial information and financial structure proposed by Mr. Vecek and found it did not meet league standards," MacPhail said.

He said eight teams voted against the bid, three voted to accept it and one team abstained. The vote on the league's counter proposal, he said, was 10-0 in favor, with two owners already gone from the meeting to catch planes. Nine votes are needed to pass such a resolution.

"It was a matter of structure and relationship of debt to equity," MacPhail said. "We've had difficulties in some instances with our clubs. In each instance it was because the team's undercapitalized."

"We've asked Mr. Vecek for additional capital — unsecured debt," he added. "If Mr. Vecek can meet these arrangements by our league meeting Dec. 16, it will be acceptable to the league."

Vecek's \$8.55 million offer to current Chicago owner John Allyn, according to a prospectus sent by The Associated Press, consisted of \$4,000,000 in debentures, \$700,000 in stock sales and \$3,750,000 in assumed loans from two Chicago banks.

Wide receiver Sammie Wooten and defensive back James Hunter were the two Grambling players named.

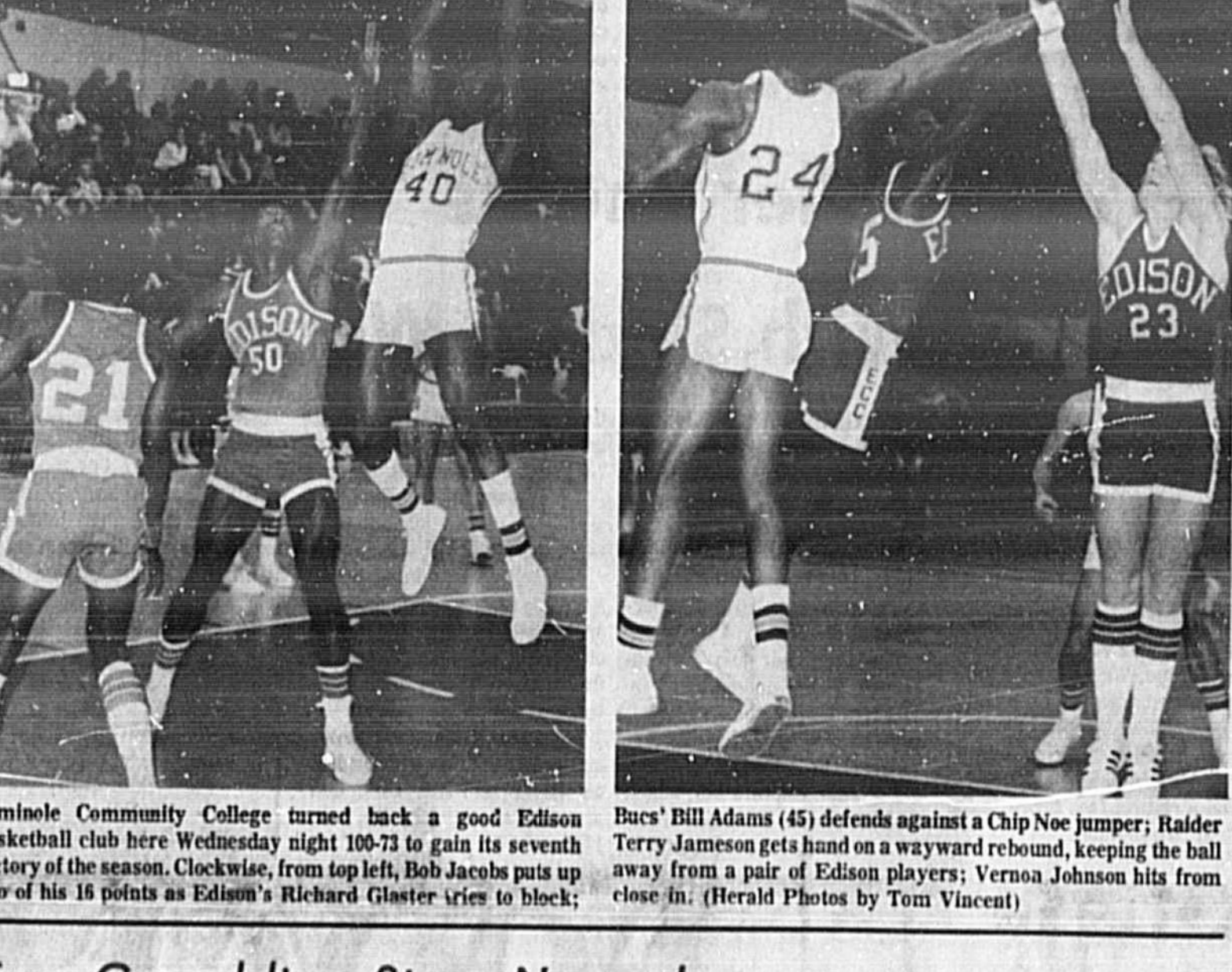
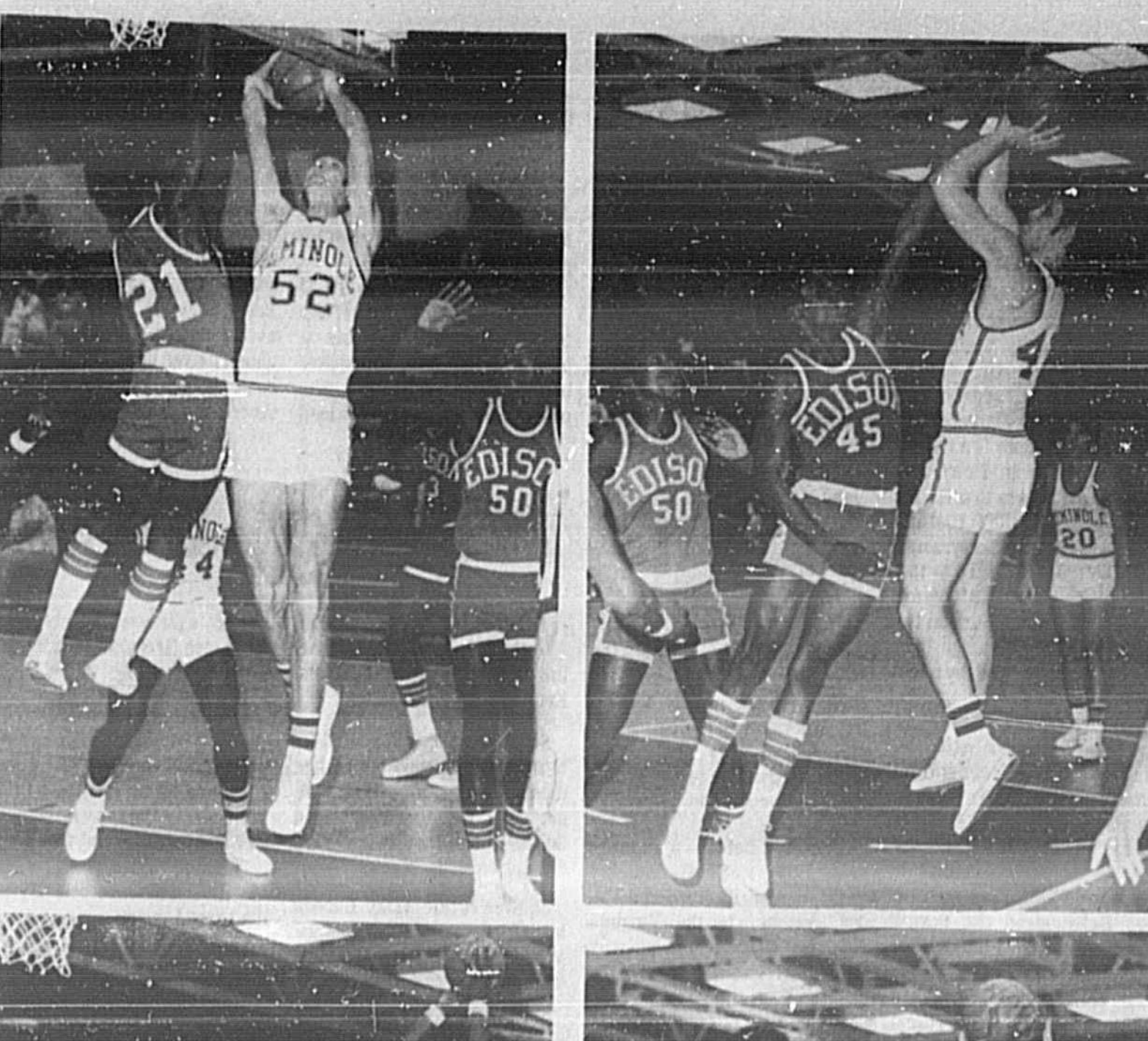
"We have a chance," Griese, operated on last week for a ruptured tendon in a big toe, said Wednesday. "But the odds are stacked against us."

The Raiders hit 57 per cent of their field goal attempts in the first half, building up a 53-32 cushion over the Fort Meyers club. Seminole upped that margin to 64-44 in the second half, taking fewer shots but sinking 59 per cent and nearly blowing Edison tight out of the gym.

Seminole's Reggie McDonald, given the tough assignment of containing 28-point-per-game guard Richard Glaster, held the Edison stand-out to four points in the first half. Glaster got loose some in the second half and wound up with 18 points.

"We felt all along that Reggie was quick enough to stay with Glaster," Sterling said. "Glaster leaves his feet a lot and doesn't have good control of his drives. That's how Reggie was able to draw two charging fouls early to put him in trouble."

Sterling also had high praise for his Vernon Johnson, who led all scorers with 22 points.

"Vernon was hitting well on the short jump shots and also played a fine game on the boards. And Randy Faber was able to keep getting the ball in to Vern through the middle of their zone," Sterling said.

Johnson hit 78 per cent in racking up his 22 points, while Faber was credited with 10 assists, most of them for Johnson. Bob Jacobs canned six of 10 shots and wound up with 16 points. Jacobs also had 10 rebounds and Johnson palled down nine.

Indiana State's Allen posted his third consecutive 1,000-yard campaign, rushing for 1,022 in nine games. He was sidelined for one contest and set out the second half against major college opponent Tulsa with an injury after gaining 145 yards on 14 carries in the opening half.

North Dakota's Deutch, a bruising 212-pounder, rushed 201 times for 1,169 yards in nine games, a 5.8 average per carry.

Sterling was referring to Florida College, Valencia and Brainerd, the last three opponents on Seminole's pre-Christmas schedule. The first two are away games and the third a home rematch with a team the Raiders beat soundly on its own home court.

"We still have the two road games coming and things can sometimes go wrong on the road. Florida College is always tough in Tampa in that small gym of theirs," Sterling said. Seminole plays Tampa College Saturday and meets Valencia Community College next Wednesday before returning home Dec. 13 to host revenge-minded Brainerd.

Sterling said his latest edition of the Raiders compares favorably with the 1970-71 team that was knocked out of the state junior college tournament by eventual winner Gulf Coast. The coast team went to the nationals in Hutchinson, Kan. "That club was a well-rounded one with a good bench, like this year's team," Sterling said. "But this one still isn't quite as sound. We're making too many mistakes but we should continue to improve."

For the night, Collins added 14 rebounds, playing most of the second half with four personal fouls. Biscayne out-rebounded the taller East Tennessee State team, 49-37.

Charles Stuart and Ron Richardson led East Tennessee State, 6-2, with 18 points each. Biscayne's foul shooting proved the difference, with the Bobcats making 10 of 21 on the free-throw line. East Tennessee State connected on 10 of 19.

South Alabama's White scored 22 points, keeping the South Alabama Cougars in the game with 16 in the first half, when Jacksonville appeared ready to pull away several times.

The Dolphin's two big starters, 7-foot Felton Young and 6-foot Marvin Lloyd picked up four personal fouls early in the second half, and South Alabama was able to control the pace after that.

The Dolphins had trouble penetrating South Alabama's zone in the first half, and relied chiefly on outside shooting by Bobby Alvarez. When Young fouled out, with 8:36 to play, South Alabama's 6-foot-7 Thomas Ledford had his own way under the boards. He ended up as the game's second high scorer with 19 points.

Risk Manager, Panel Approved

A fulltime risk manager position and a recommendation to set up an "unbiased" insurance advisory committee were approved as a result of action taken Wednesday night by the Seminole County School Board.

The board, in a 3-1 vote, okayed the recommendation made by member David Sims who said the board should regain complete control of its insurance specifications and bid procedures.

Board member E. C. Harper Jr. was opposed and board member Pat Telson had stepped out of the room during the voting.

Sims' successful motion, which was seconded by Allan Keeth, instructs Superintendent W. P. "Bud" Lavey to implement or "activate" its risk manager position to manage all of the board's general liability and medical insurance needs, which costs more than \$600,000 in annual premiums.

Lavey said he would consider assigning the task to Darrell Kirkpatrick, the board's internal auditor and part-time risk manager.

Sims said if Kirkpatrick doesn't have time to assume the duties a new man will have to be hired.

Lavey said he already has assigned Harry Peley chief negotiator to help correct certain safety and health hazards so insurance rates won't go up.

Lavey said a new risk manager would cost anywhere from \$17,000 to \$20,000 in salary, which he said is "a waste of taxpayer's money."

Sims had said Karns Insurance Agency and the McKibbin Agency have handled the board's general liability insurance for the past 15 years, which amounts to \$550,000 in annual premiums.

The board's liability coverage has been "left up for grabs," said Sims.

And of the three bids received from 38 bids mailed out for the first time, this year, the two low successful bidders were Karns and McKibbin, according to Roger Harris, assistant superintendent for finance.

Clyde Rice, another insurance agent, and Sims said the board should have called for new bids.

Sims said he did not agree with Lavey, who said at one point the board has already accomplished a risk management program by on-site inspections and use of print-out computers.

"The board has complete control now over its insurance matters because the board has to okay everything," said Lavey.

Sims said, however, the board traditionally has let the Seminole Education Association (SEA) set the insurance specifications for the board, and Sims said the board should have called for new bids.

Lavey said this responsibility now will be up to Kirkpatrick or a new risk manager if one is necessary.

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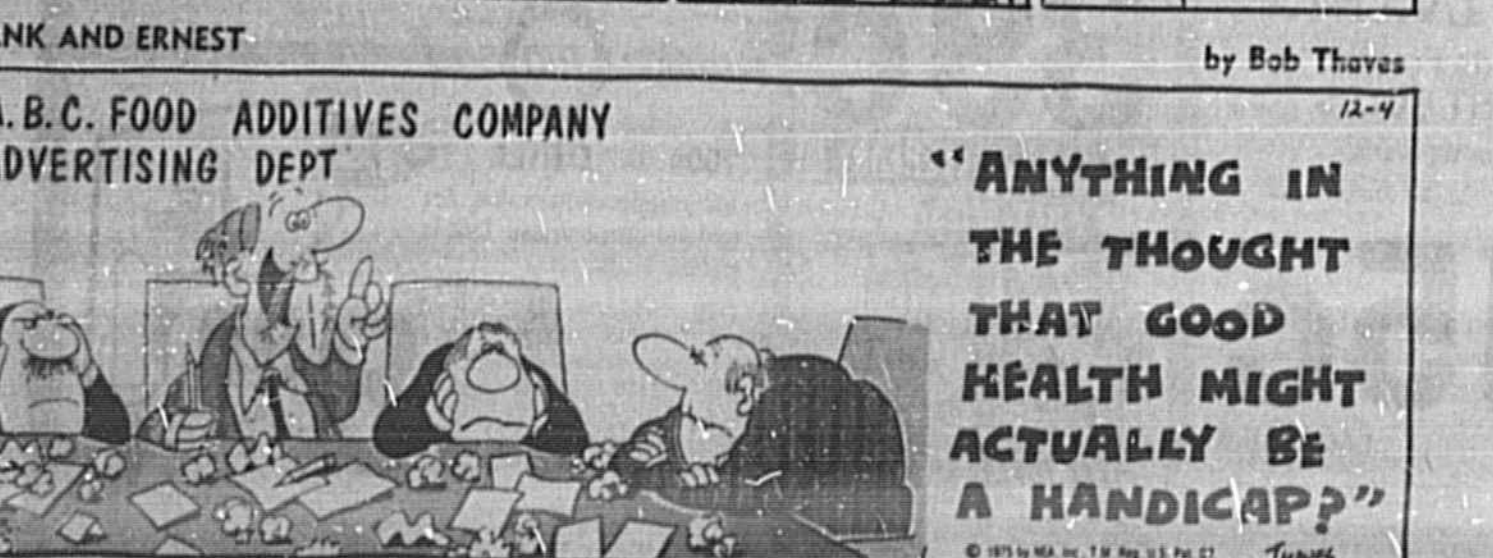

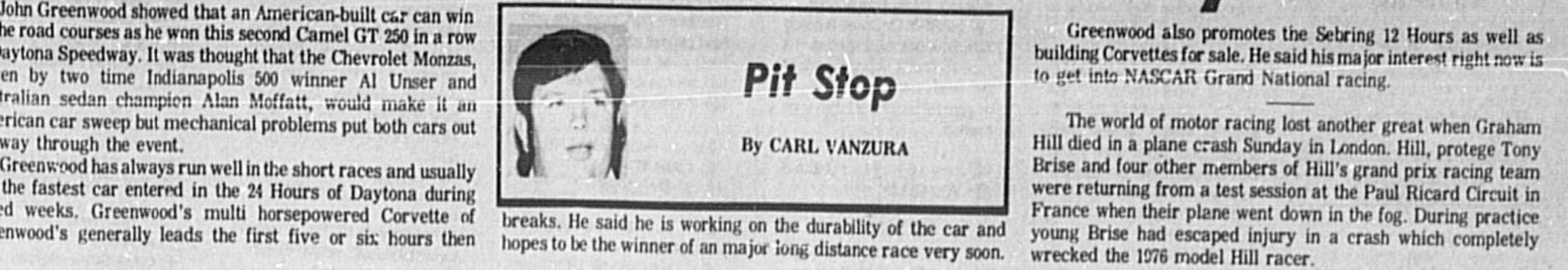

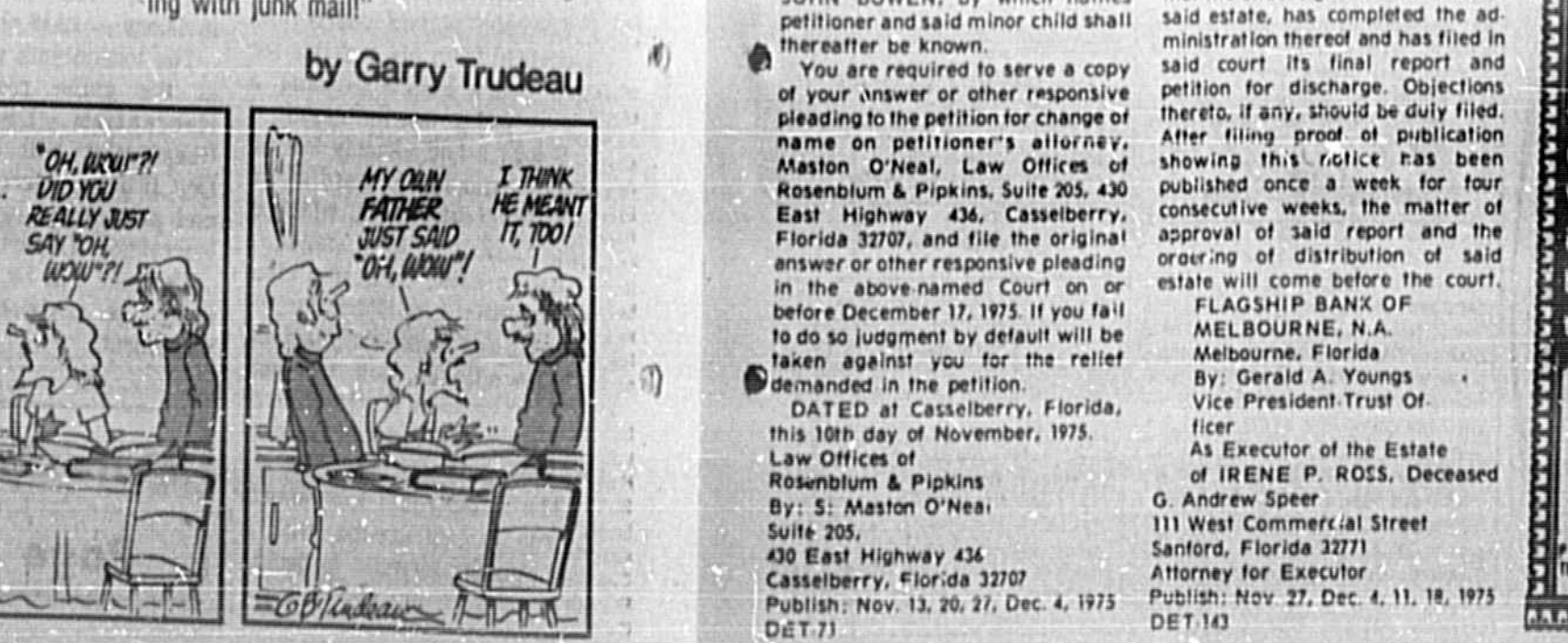

Herring To Appeal Sealing Of Grand Jury Indictments

Seminole-Brevard State Attorney Abbott Herring said today he is preparing an appeal to the State Supreme Court in efforts to get local circuit court judges to unseal grand jury indictments.

Meanwhile, a group of citizens took out a parade permit and scheduled a 1 p.m. demonstration and march around the county courthouse protesting the sealing of the indictments by the circuit court.

The Seminole County Grand Jury, after a four-week reported probe of county government actions and alleged Sunshine Law violations, on Wednesday presented an interim report and four indictments in circuit court.

Circuit Judge Joe A. Cowart Jr. immediately ordered the report and indictments sealed and not made public for 15 days.

Cowart said he was following the advice of Circuit Judge Volie A. Williams, who was to have received the jury's report. Cowart took the return while Williams was at lunch and had the documents sealed in an envelope prepared by Williams.

The court cited a state law that prevents making public grand jury reports naming individuals who are not indicted until the persons named have a chance to petition the court to repress or expunge the report or portions of the report.

According to the law, if such motions are made the report must remain sealed until the District Court of Appeals rules on the circuit court's ruling on the motions.

The local grand jury report is believed to name at least one unidentified co-conspirator, thus the sealing of the report.

Normally grand jury indictments are made public once the persons indicted are arrested on warrants issued by the circuit court. But Cowart said there would be no warrants issued on the present indictments and they too will remain sealed.

Cowart later reportedly indicated the indictments are intertwined with other information in the grand jury

report so as to make it difficult, if not impossible, to allow making the indictments public without revealing other information contained in the jury's report.

Herring said his staff asked Cowart on Thursday to release the indictments but the motion was denied.

"We're in the process now of preparing what we consider the

proper legal appeal to the Supreme Court," Herring said today.

Herring was told Thursday by State Atty. General Robert Shreve's office in Tallahassee that he can ask the Supreme Court for a writ of mandamus, which commands the performance of an official act or duty.

The issue being taken before the Supreme Court by Herring involves a dispute dealing with the official duties of a judge and a state attorney.

Herring said he doesn't expect the Supreme Court to act before the 15-day period ordered by Cowart ends, but that the appeal is necessary due to his position in the dispute.

Judge Cowart exited the Thursday afternoon closed door chambers hearing with Assistant State Atty. William Staley and attorneys Newman Brock and Gerald Rutberg and declined to reveal what had taken place. Brock, Rutberg and Staley also declined to comment.

Six Protest Food, Conditions

Inmates Stage Hunger Strike In County Jail

State Division of Corrections inspectors were scheduled to visit the Seminole County Jail this afternoon where six inmates are in the second day of a hunger strike protesting the food served and jail conditions.

Sheriff John Polk said the six prisoners, all in one cellblock, started their protest by refusing the noon meal Thursday.

"I say the food's good," Polk said. "When they get hungry they'll eat, or they can sit up there and lose some weight."

Polk didn't disclose the names of the striking inmates but he said, "It's the same group that started a hunger strike when we had them in the Lake County Jail."

"They talk about a referendum next year to build a new county jail, but those things get turned down all the time."

"But we can't even get them (county officials) to take a glance at us," he said.

Meanwhile, SCOPA operations are moving "very smoothly."

A barge carrying 9,000 gallons of diesel fuel docked at the facility Thursday night, and pumped its 378,000 gallons into storage tanks before dawn today.

In a note smuggled out of the jail from one of the inmates to The Herald the prisoners' reasons for the hunger strike were outlined as follows:

"Poor food to the degree that prisoners 'are going to bed hungry at night.'"

"Only one jail commissary delivery a week consisting of 'no food stuffs to help substantiate the hunger pains.'"

"Only one visiting day a week 'consisting of only five minutes, although some visitors come several miles to see prisoners.'"

The inmates also complained that they are refused telephone calls "although some are to obtain or help counsel towards getting a fair trial," that prisoners are denied adequate medication "and are mostly laughed at when they ask for help," and that "prisoners are treated like they are in a prisoner-of-war camp by (a corrections officer) and some of the other officials at the jail as they threaten inmates with harsh punishment."

Before going into a meeting with his staff, Polk said, "There is no factual basis for the inmates' complaints."

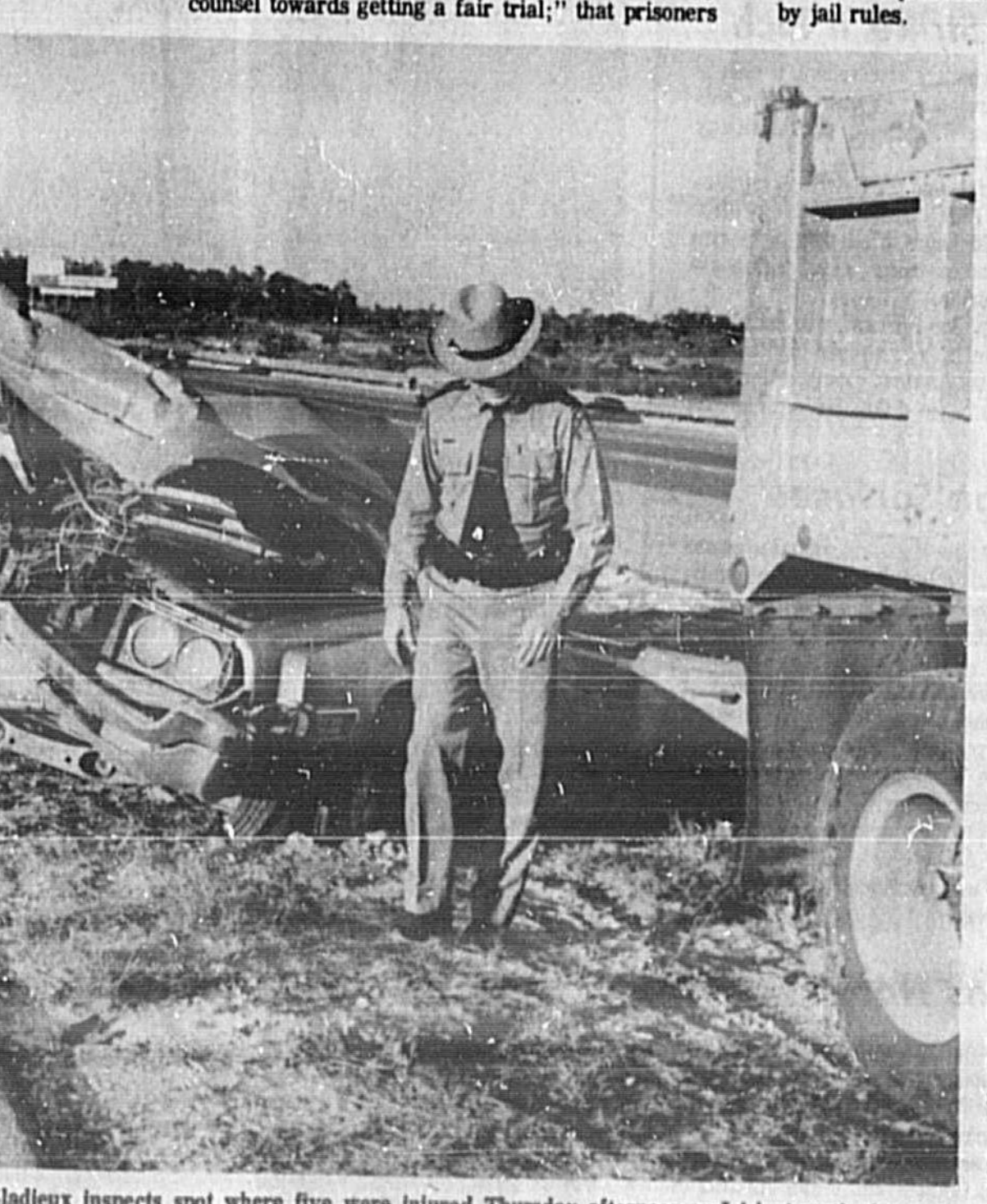
He said the corrections officer named by inmates in their complaint removed a television set from the cellblock after the cells failed to pass inspection because the prisoners hadn't cleaned it up as required by jail rules.

Sanfordite Critical After Crash

A Sanford man was still in critical condition in the intensive care unit this morning at Florida Hospital North as a result of a car and two trucks accident late Thursday afternoon which injured four other men who were treated and released, a hospital spokesman said.

Homer C. Harris, 57, an employee of the Florida Department of Transportation (DOT), was one of four workers on the median of I-4, just north of the S.R. 436 intersection in Altamonte Springs, when the crash occurred.

Florida Highway Patrolman R.L. Langdale said today a car driven by Charles Edwin Willis, 42, Orlando, apparently "made an abrupt change of lane" just before his car slammed into the rear of a DOT truck containing two workers and two others standing beside it.

"They were all lying on the ground when I got there," said Langdale.

Treated and released were Willis, Leaton C. Smith, 34, Orlando, who was a passenger in the truck; Earl Keifer Vaughn, 61, Sanford, who was standing on the median and yelled to the others; and Joseph Emmitt Priest Jr., 33, Oviedo, the DOT superintendent who was at the wheel of the truck, according to FHP Trooper Lawrence Gladioux.

Gladioux said Harris suffered skull injuries and a concussion. "He (Harris) was bounced off a dump truck. He was standing near the open door talking to the superintendent," said Gladioux.

Gladioux said Willis was charged with careless driving.

Mayor Says Oviedo Can't Repay CETA Money

The City of Oviedo is financially unable to repay the county \$4,000 in federal funds that a state ruling says was improperly spent, according to Oviedo Mayor Leon Olliff.

The County Commission Tuesday declared that Oviedo must reimburse the county for \$4,000 in salary paid to Police Chief Ken Triplett's daughter, Shirley, over a nine-month period until her termination Nov. 10, as a police radio dispatcher.

"I don't see any way we could do it. Right now we're in pretty bad shape, financially, just like every other city and the cash flow is scarce," Olliff said.

Ms. Triplett was hired under the county's Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) program, a federal program designed to offset unemployment. The \$4,000 came from CETA funds, according to Jim Bedsole, the county's CETA director.

Hiring Ms. Triplett was a "clear violation of CETA requirements in regard to nepotism," said Mrs. Betsy Stone, the deputy director of manpower planning in Tallahassee.

In a letter to Bedsole on Nov. 19, Mrs. Stone said, "The City of Oviedo must reimburse Seminole County for the cost incurred by an ineligible applicant."

However, both Olliff and Chief Triplett said city officials were unaware of CETA guidelines concerning nepotism and that Ms. Triplett was the "best qualified" of four applicants who sought the post of police radio dispatcher-jailer.

Olliff ordered the Chief's daughter terminated Nov. 10, on the strength of a letter from Bedsole. Later, Bedsole received the letter from Mrs. Stone asking for repayment.

Triplett said he didn't "know anything about CETA rules" and he said he terminated his daughter's employment "as
