



Nationwide Strike Averted

Tentative Accord Reached

WASHINGTON (AP) - Negotiators reached a tentative settlement today averting a strike threatened by 70,000 members of shopcraft unions that would have closed down virtually all of the nation's railroads.

The agreement came after the unions postponed a scheduled 6 a.m. walkout which would have stranded thousands of commuters and long-distance travelers and halted rail freight deliveries.

The postponement followed tentative agreement on two key issues. Negotiators continued talks on several others. ultimately reaching a tentative settlement at late mor-A formal announcement was expected before noon.

Cities To Ask For Waiver

MIAMI BEACH (AP) - The National League of Cities is prepared to ask Congress to waive its new budget procedures in order to re-enact general revenue-sharing quickly next year.

Meantime, a Dallas City Councilwoman, Rose Renfroe, intended to try today to get the nation's largest organization of urban officials to take its first public stand on school busing.

Mrs. Renfroe, who is attending her first national conference of urban officials, said she would offer a resolution to put the city executives on record as favoring a constitutional amendment to ban busing to achieve school desegregation.





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Who's In Charge? Ford, That's Who

Those columnists and commentators who have been asking the Ford administration "who's in charge" as they analyzed the President's programs and policies receive a conclusive answer from Mr. Ford's recent news conference. He is in charge.

The full authority of the executive office was visible in the President's decision to dismiss James R. Schlesinger as secretary of defense and William Colby as director of the Central Intelligence Agency. The strong hand of President Ford also is visible in the decision of Nelson A. Rockefeller not to seek the office of vice president for the next four years.

There is no great mystery as to why Mr. Schlesinger and Mr. Colby were retired to private life or why the vice president issued his Shermanesque statement. The President wants to speak with a single voice in foreign policy. Although the President said that Mr. Schlesinger and Secretary of State Henry Kissinger had no differences over national security, the secretary of defense has been increasingly skeptical of Soviet intentions even as Mr. Kissinger has pursued detente more vigorously. By letting Mr. Schlesinger go, the President warned others in his administration that dissent has its limits. In the process he also substantially strengthened Mr. Kissinger's efforts to achieve coexistence with the Soviet Union as well as his power within the executive branch.

In the case of Mr. Colby the President undoubtedly simply wanted to indicate that a new chapter in the intelligence agency's life was

Finally, the Rockefeller decision probably was inevitable, but for some strange reason surfaced amid the recent high drama in the White House. Rockefeller's departure means that the administration is more keenly concerned about the Reagan candidacy than heretofore believed and it leaves the President with a freer hand in dealing with the problems of New York.

Political ramifications of the executive branch changes will be dissected thoroughly, but it appears initially that the President has lost more than he won. Americans tend to look suspiciously at massive political changes. The conservatives' favor over the ousting of Rockefeller may be outweighted by a new focus on the detente-defense issue and their growing antipathy toward Mr. Kissinger who to them, represents accommodation rather than strength. And, Mr. Ford will indeed have to tame the mavericks in his stable - to speak in a single official voice on major issues if he is to reap full benefit from the upheaval.

Over the long pull, however, the consequences of President Ford's decision to put the hood on his hawk and remove some restraints from his dove will be weighed by students long after his administration reposes in history. It will take the success of detente to vindicate him

Why mandatory retirement? It's inhuman. It's discriminatory. And it's a waste of, not manpower, but a waste of personpower because it affects men and women alike.

More than 100 years ago, 65 was settled as the age when people in the United States should retire from work. But times have changed. We are now an industrial and not an agrarian nation. Machines do the heavy work and we aren't physically drained at an early age. People are better educated and trained with useful skills. Medicine and science have improved the general health and added to the average longevity of those who today are referred to as "the aging." Is 65 the right time for everyone to be handed his "walking papers" and turned out of his job? Usually his mandatory retirement means a forced withdrawal from what was a normal, active and productive life.



After Four Rocked By Blasts MIAMI (AP) — Guards were posted at all government buildings in Miami early today after four federal offices were rocked by bomb blasts Wednesday night, police said. One other bomb was defused.

No injuries were reported. Several officers narrowly escaped harm when one bomb, found during a city-wide search for other explosives after the first blast, went off before an attempt was made to dismantle it.

That blast was at a local Social Security office. It caused minor damage, mostly broken windows. Similar damage was reported at the local FBI headquarters and two post offices.

five minutes, although some visitors come several miles to see prisoners." The inmates also complained that they are refused

telephone calls "although some are to obtain or help counsel towards getting a fair trial;" that prisoners

laughed at when they ask for help;" and that "prisoners are treated like they are in a prisoner-ofwar camp by (a corrections officer) and some of the other officials at the jail as they threaten inmates with harsh punishment."

Before going into a meeting with his staff, Polk said, "There is no factual basis for the inmates" complaints."

He said the corrections officer named by inmates in their complaint removed a television set from the cellblock after the cells failed to pass inspection because the prisoners hadn't cleaned it up as required by jail rules.
