

Eye Bank Asks Pledges To Aid Blind Persons

An appeal has gone out to the citizens of Seminole County asking them to consider the giving of a most precious gift at this Yuletide season—the gift of sight to the blind.

This lasting gift, which has no monetary value but whose intrinsic value is immeasurable, is made by pledging the donation of the eyes after death to the Seminole Hospital Eye Bank Association (SHEBA).

At the present time 485 persons in Seminole County and DeBary have signed a pledge to give their eyes after death so that someone else may see, and the list continues to grow steadily.

Rev. Elton Richards, of Longwood, is president of the organization with Hibbard Casselberry, of Casselberry, serving as treasurer. Both are members of the Casselberry Lions Club, which works with the officials of SHEBA in obtaining the pledges.

To date 11 sets of eyes have been taken after the death of local donors, shipped to the North Florida Eye Bank at the J. Hillis Miller Medical Center in Gainesville, where doctors transplanted the corneas to the sightless eyes of 22 persons, restoring their sight, or perhaps permitting them to see for the first time in their lives.

"What better Christmas gift, in the true spirit of good will to men, than to sign the pledge card, making it possible for some blind person to see, after you have passed on and have no more need for your eyes," asked Rev. Richards.

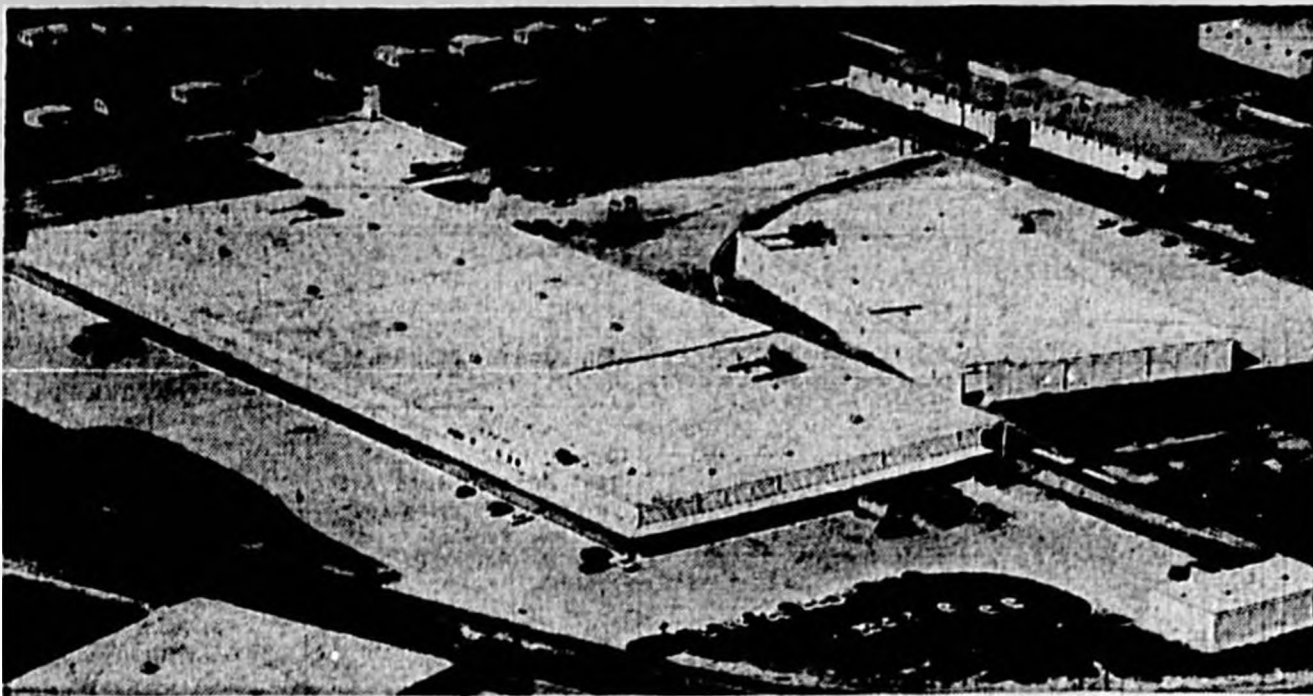
WEYMOUTH, England (UPI) — Five beatniks were placed on probation here after showing up in court—clean-shaven and with haircuts.

Season Here . . Swindlers, Too

NEW YORK (UPI) — The Christmas shopping season is also the annual golden harvest season for the gyp artist, President Kenneth B. Wilson, of the National Better Business Bureau, warned today.

Some of these sharp operators make so much money in the Yule season by trimming the unwary that they don't have to work the rest of the year.

Some of their shoddy merchandise rackets and outright thefts are carried on the year around—but activity is stepped up between Thanksgiving day and Christmas.

Wilson warned folks to watch out for these swindlers, always prevalent this time of year—Street corner hawkers peddling ramshackle toys and other shoddy goods.

Mail order ads or telephone solicitations offering well known branded merchandise at suspiciously low prices. When the goods finally come, they turn out to be cheap imitations.

Hustlers who harass business men who buy Christmas gifts in quantity or solicit orders at factory gates.

Solicitors of gifts for phony charities.

Some of the rackets are outright theft—such as the "delivery man" who tries to get you to pay C.O.D. charge on a package for your neighbor who isn't home. When the package is opened it contains waste paper.

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There Are Tramps And

Beatniks Give Britain Black Eye

LONDON — (NEA) — Britain is fast acquiring the reputation of a nation of dead beats, thanks to the number of unshaven British beatniks who flood the continent of Europe.

Many of these scruffy types pose as students, although they are, in reality, little more than panhandlers. "Most of them beg," says the Paris police gazette. "They try to put on the air of jazz musicians or art students."

"They hang hurriedly drawn sketches on bridges and beg for a few coins with a hat."

The typical British tourist was once highly respected abroad. He paid his own way and was generous with tips. His appearance was just fine or "ticky-boo," to use a British expression. He was adept at showing the flag.

But the image of Britain as a nation of free-spending, well-dressed travelers is now vanishing. Its place is being taken by the picture of "penniless, unshaven beatniks, extremely unsanitary with hair down to their shoulders," according to the Paris police publication.

Gendarmes found 224 of these British beatniks sleeping under bridges along the Seine during one roundup. Of the 4,500 tramps who were rounded up by police and taken to de-lousing stations outside Paris, 650 were foreigners. By far the largest contingent was British.

Ten of these youthful British tramps were expelled from France for petty crimes.

The crimes laid at the doorstep of British beatniks abroad are not always petty ones. For

example, Stuart Christie, an 18-year-old Scot with a Beatnik-style haircut, was recently sentenced to 20 years imprisonment by a Spanish court-martial after he had been caught smuggling explosives into Spain via Barcelona.

Christie, who calls himself an anarchist, carried detonators and plastic explosives in the rucksack on his back when he hitchhiked to Barcelona. They were intended to inaugurate a campaign of terrorism, according to Spanish police.

Britain's deadbeat tourists are a growing worry to British diplomats, anxious to preserve the nation's image abroad. One of the diplomats' chief

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Drainage Hassle Stalls 25th Street Improvement

City, County At Odds Over Ditch Pipeline

The question of the responsibility for drainage problems which will be created by the reconstruction of 25th Street has erupted into a bitter struggle between the City of Sanford and Seminole County Commissioners. City Manager W. E. Knowles revealed at a meeting of the City Commissioners.

"The battle revolves around where the drainage water from 25th Street will go," Knowles said. "The county wants to channel it into the city sewers via an open ditch. We cannot permit this as it could rupture our sewer pipes by pouring in too much water too fast and we must demand that the county install a pipeline to control the flow of water at an acceptable rate," said Knowles.

City commissioners said they have on record an agreement made between the city and county in November 1959 when Sanford Avenue was widened, wherein the county agreed to install the pipe at the time of the reconstruction of 25th Street.

"County officials say they do not have this agreement in their minutes and are, therefore, not obligated to carry out the agreement," Knowles told city officials.

"This is a moral obligation and involves the integrity of the county commission to abide by its agreement. They know they made it, whether or not they have it in their minutes," Knowles said.

Knowles, who is an engineer, insisted that not only would the channeling of the drainage into city sewers possibly rupture the pipes, it would greatly increase flooding of city streets during heavy rains, a problem which is already severe.

Knowles refuted a statement by J. H. Hannah, right of way agent for the State Road Department, who said the pipeline would cost about \$35,000 and quoted SRD letters stating that the cost would be nearer \$23,000.

County Engineer Bill Bush also told County Commissioners, Tuesday, that the pipeline was not necessary. However, Knowles charges that Bush admitted to him in a telephone conversation that he (Bush) had not done an engineering review on the matter—that he has only searched the records for the minutes of the agreement.

"We have on file letter from the SRD district engineer stating that the city sewer is inadequate to take the flow unless the city allows the flooding of low areas in the Grandview Avenue-East 21st Place area. This we cannot do."

"The county must abide by the agreement made with the city in 1959—it is a moral obligation which reflects the integrity of county officials in upholding their end of the bargain," Knowles concluded.

Martin Co. United Fund Idea Rejected

Ray Desires County Gifts For Seminole

A suggestion by G. T. Willey, vice president and general manager of the Martin Company's Orlando division, that Seminole County's United Fund become a part of the Orange County United Appeal, was rejected today by Troy Ray Jr., campaign chairman for Seminole's UF.

Willey's recommendation came when George Touhy, representing Seminole County's United Fund, recently asked that community chest funds collected by Martin on the payroll deduction plan from employees who reside in Seminole be channeled through Seminole County's UF rather than through Orange County's appeal.

Willey turned down Touhy's suggestion by declaring, "We are not interested in breaking down the united effort or in weakening the programs by dividing funds in separate, piecemeal efforts."

Ray, in a letter to Willey, stated, "We... feel, however, that we have a strong relationship and mutual interest (between) Martin Company and Seminole County... due to the large number of Seminole County residents who are employees of Martin Company."

"We readily agree... that services in some agencies involved in the Seminole County Fund and United Appeal of Orange County are so interrelated due to their regional nature that they are available to residents of a large area."

But Ray also pointed out, "...the large bulk of an appeal, such as either of our drives, is to our respective local agencies which provide excellent service to their own residents freely without question and depend solely upon the United Fund (or Appeal) for their existence."

Ray added, "We do not wish to combine our Fund with the Orange County Appeal any more than we wish to share any other problems we may have concerning the betterment of our community."

Ray called to Willey's attention the fact that the McDonnell Aircraft Corporation of St. Louis solved an identical problem by sharing receipts of employees who reside in various counties. He also told Willey that "... Winter Park Telephone Company and other companies have been most cooperative in apportioning pledges and donations by their employees who live in Seminole County."

Ray said that he and other UF leaders felt that they were right and justified in "persisting" that efforts be continued to solve the problem.

Longwood Man Held In Jail

Jack Hall Ends Life At Store

James Roland (Jack) Hall, prominent business man and civic leader in downtown Sanford in past years and more recently manager of the Handyman Store on South French Avenue, was shot and killed shortly before noon today.

Coroner W. Hugh Duncan said Mr. Hall died of "self-inflicted shotgun wounds of the chest." He said the shooting occurred at the store. Assisting in the investigation was Police Chief Roy G. Williams.

Hall was formerly head of Yowell's Department Store on East First Street. At that time he maintained an active interest in Seminole County Chamber of Commerce projects and headed many of the more prominent committees.

In years past he had served as president of the Chamber. John Krider, executive manager of the Chamber, stated soon after the tragedy that Hall was "one of the best civic workers in the community prior to his illness."

"The community suffered a tremendous loss when Mr. Hall became ill and had to curtail his activities," Krider added.

MQ Ranch Buys 4,000 Acres In Putnam County

The MQ Ranch is leaving this area for a 4,000-acre spot in Putnam County and in moving it will improve its facilities tremendously, according to Atty. William C. Hutchison, counsel for the dual ranch owners, Mr. and Mrs. Herman Morris.

The three-pronged exchange of property was completed in simultaneous legal actions in Palatka, county seat of Putnam County, and Deland, county seat of Volusia County.

Hutchison said the transaction completed a year of negotiations with such dealings being "intensive" since last May.

Involved were George Gibbs of Jacksonville, owners of property in Putnam County, the MQ Ranch owners, and heads of Mackle Brothers, builders of nearby Deltona.

Deltona wanted the MQ Ranch site so it could expand its community. The Morris family was interested in the Putnam County location, also to expand its operation. Deltona bought 15 from Gibbs and exchanged it for the ranch.

According to Hutchison, the new MQ Ranch location will provide better facilities including "magnificent fishing sites" with its own lakes. The dual ranch operators will move all of their facilities to the new place. They have 90 days in which to conclude the move, Hutchison said.

Meanwhile, Deltona officials have placed several lakefront properties on sale to clients through its German office.

Hutchison said all phases of the negotiations were completed by the three factions and on a telephone signing made in Palatka and Deland the transaction was completed at the same instant with all three parties signing the appropriate papers.

A total of 323 voters of 155 registered in Altamonte Springs cast ballots in Tuesday's municipal elections to put Colin Crews on council as district 3 representative and Berl Chapman on in the district 4 seat. Vote count included six absentee ballots.

Carefree Rogues Under Bridges Of Paris

PARIS — (NEA) — Yes, it's Christmas time for the Paris clochards, too.

What is a clochard? He is a vagabond, a displaced person from society—in short, a bum. But a special kind of bum.

While his counterparts elsewhere in the world sleep by railroad tracks and factories, the clochard of Paris sleeps under the mighty bridges of the Seine, with historic Notre Dame Cathedral and the Louvre Museum as a backdrop.

Harassed by police, camera-carrying tourists and the great enemy winter, the clochard pursues his way of life with dedication. Not all of them are old. Some younger men have chosen the life of a tramp perhaps to escape the regimentation of factory or in reaction to the severity of military service.

No exact figures are available. Estimates place the clochard population of the French capital at from 10,000 to 30,000.

For the past few decades Christmas has had a special meaning for these men—and women.

With funds provided from street collections by the Salvation Army, the Red Cross, the Catholic Aid Society and other private organizations, hundreds of clochards are served a bountiful midnight supper on Christmas Eve.

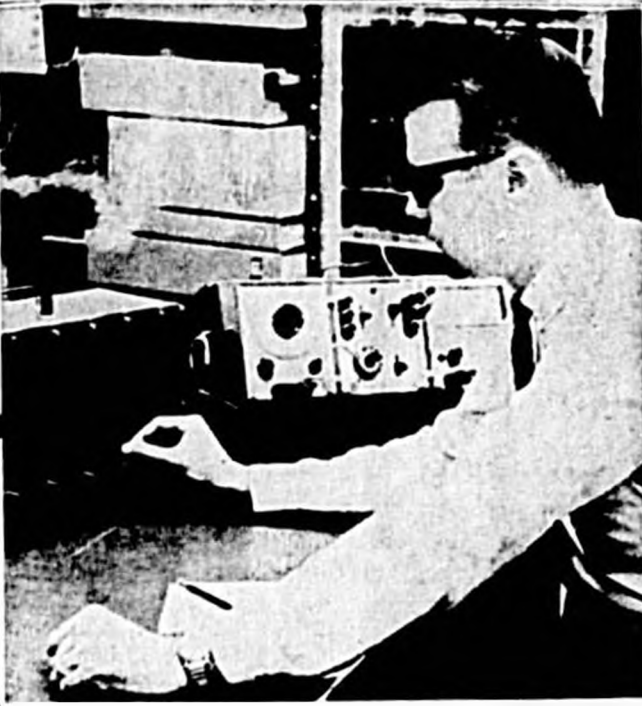
Students of all nationalities dole out the thick hot soup, the yards of bread and garlic sausage, washed down by rivers of red wine—the food and drink they most appreciate. All are set up on long tables under the bridge of Sainte Genevieve.

At any other time the clochards will not tolerate an invasion into their privacy and anonymity, even when offered enough to buy a bottle of wine. The curious tourist or social worker is most often rebuffed with a string of oaths.

Charitable organizations are taken to these people outside aid implies a degrading hotel bed, a bath, an alcohol cure and the offer of a steady job.

One of the habits of the Pont Sainte Genevieve has "furnished" his particular spot with a derelict sofa and a couple of springless easy chairs. An upturned crate serves as a coffee table, and a pin-up photo supplies the final touch. He holds "open house" once or twice a month and thoughtfully provides empty cans. His guests are expected to bring their own red wine.

Visitors consider the clochards a picturesque sight. Light of Gay Paree. But the Parisians prefer that this 1964 throwback to the medieval "Devil's Kitchen" did not exist. Some politicians have suggested that the condition of "clochard" be outlawed.

Florida To Battle U. S. Over Tidelands

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Florida has paved the way to do battle in the U. S. Supreme Court over its boundaries in the Gulf of Mexico off the Florida keys.

Atty. Gen. James W. Kynes reported to the trustees of the Internal Improvement Fund that he and Solicitor General Archibald Cox are far apart on the extent of Florida's boundaries in the keys and Dry Tortugas areas.

He said hundreds of thousands of acres of submerged lands are at stake in the dispute. At his recommendation, the trustees agreed to ask the 1965 Legislature to clearly define Florida boundaries in the area by law and then put this law before the U. S. Supreme Court for a ruling.

Kynes will meet in Washington Thursday with Cox to tell him of this decision and wind up negotiations there. The decision could be vital to Florida because of oil royalties that might be forthcoming should oil be discovered on or shore areas in the Gulf. Some \$7 million in oil royalties is involved in a similar dispute in Louisiana, Kynes said.

He said because of the joint claims of the state and federal governments, some oil companies exploring off Florida have double permits, one from each government. The law puts the state boundaries at three miles offshore in the Atlantic and 10.4 miles in the Gulf but Kynes said Cox is not even ready to concede Florida the 10-mile limit.

The present Florida law on boundaries is quite general, saying the state boundary runs to and around the Dry Tortugas, then northeasterly to the mainland. He said Cox wants to limit the state to a three-mile radius around islands and the Tortugas.

He said the federal government contends the 10-mile limit applies only to the Florida mainland and can't be applied to 10 miles off the islands claimed by the state. All of the dispute involves areas south of Key West, he said.

It's Still Fun To Snap Photos At Christmas

The camera that trails a youngster delivering a gift, or sights a street-corner Santa talking to an awe-struck child can often yield a little photographic masterpiece. But even if your photos aren't apt to win a prize, it's still fun to take pictures, especially during the holidays. And a really exciting project for the amateur camera fan is a photographic essay on the Yuletide season.

Begin taking photos at the first hint of the season, making up a list of likely subject matters well in advance. Start with the first appearance of Santa, cover a shopping stint, and carry right on through Christmas Day activities. It's all there for the taking... the expressions of anticipation and excitement, the story-telling action, the colorful holiday setting. The trick is to catch it early and completely, and in color, if possible!

Shoot more than one picture of each situation, particularly those involving children, and in picture-story sequence. Shooting in sequence is a wonderful way to record the antics of youngsters. When you're photographing a child, it's a good idea to come in as close as your camera will allow, including only that background which is important to the meaning of the picture. If you think the youngster may suddenly move toward you, step back an extra foot or two to allow a safety zone.

Group shots of children can really tell a story, especially during the holidays. Photographing four or five children instead of one may pose a problem but the solution is simple. Stay on the sidelines and snap when the youngsters are so absorbed in their own activities that they won't notice you. Opportunities like this abound at Christmas. Your best angle in such a situation is a high one... a foot or two above the children's heads. Aim down so that you look into the group. In this way, none of the children will block your view of the others and all will be nearly the same distance from the camera.

Make sure your camera is in working order for your project, and that you have plenty of flash bulbs, fresh batteries and color film.

Bombers To 'Hit' 12 Cities Friday

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Strategic Air Command (SAC) bombers will make high and low-level attacks on targets near 12 cities in the western United States and in three Canadian provinces early Dec. 11. 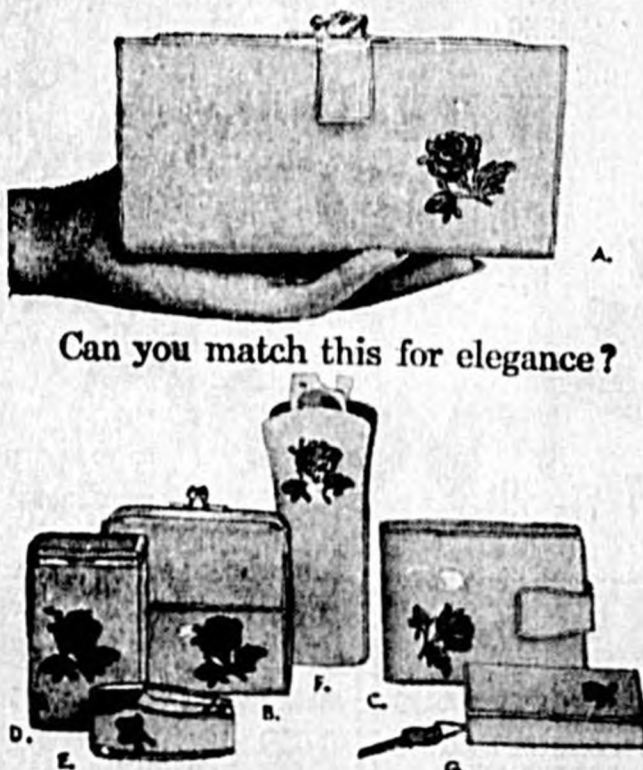

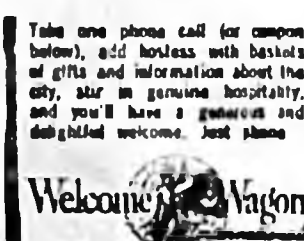

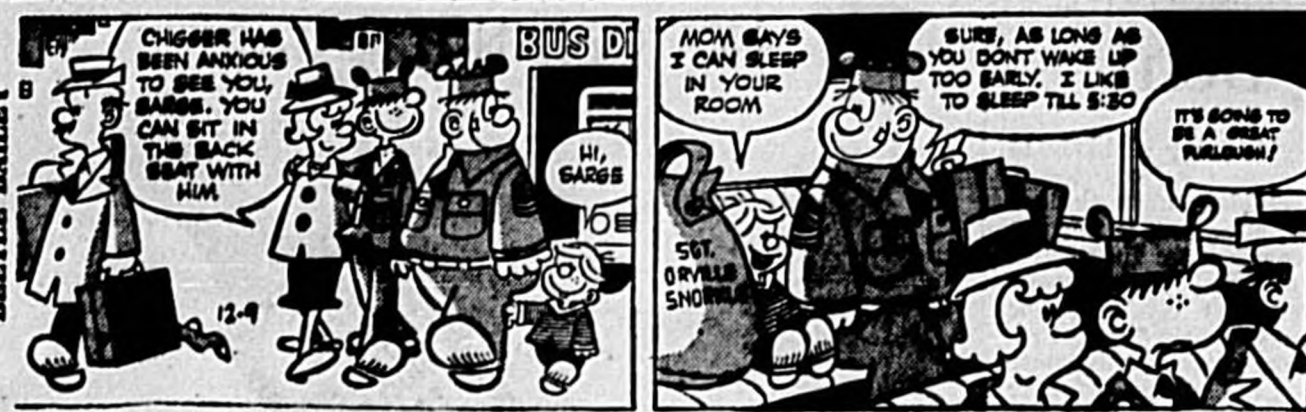

She attended Holy Cross Episcopal Church.

Mrs. Schultz is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Floyd A. Palmer, of Sanford; four grandchildren, Mrs. George Eick and County Judge-elect Kayle Housholder, of Sanford; Mrs. Richard Bate, of Painesville, N. Y., and Miss Gayle Schultz, of Tampa, and 10 great-grandchildren.

She was born Feb. 11, 1863, in Baltimore, Md. Mrs. Schultz lived there and later in Pine Grove, Pa., and Anderson, Ind. She was married to the late Julius Schultz, of Galesburg, Ill., in 1887. She and her husband moved to Sanford in 1914 and Mr. Schultz died in 1916.

Yesterday the manager was given the lie detector test and he admitted taking the money on Nov. 29 and using it to gamble, police said.

Construction Likely To Be Recommended

Jack McCarthy, project engineer with Lockwood Greene Engineers, of Spartanburg, S. C., in charge of the feasibility study for the barge port terminal at Sanford, reported today that he is "very encouraged" with results of his study, so far.

McCarthy, speaking to members of the Seminole County Port Authority and county commissioners at the Mayfair Inn at noon, outlined the findings to date.

The engineer revealed that soil borings will begin in the area in about three days. He did not disclose the sites of the borings.

"We will begin making final layouts for the terminal when the results of these tests are received in our offices," he said.

Results of a survey conducted by the firm show that about 400,000 tons per year of export cargoes exist in the St. Johns River tributary area. He said he felt that 200,000 tons per year of import cargoes would pass through this port.

"We feel at this time that these cargoes alone are sufficient to warrant the construction of a one-berth barge terminal—even without depending on the future construction of the cross state barge canal and the St. Johns-Indian River canal.

"However, the completion of the canal would certainly open a vast gateway of trade with the Mississippi and Ohio River system and the many barge cities located on these systems," McCarthy said.

"Aside from the benefits of the actual cargo shipments through the Sanford port, the mere fact that the port terminal was constructed would be a great attraction for industry to locate in the area," McCarthy told the group.

He said three similar port installations constructed in the last five years have found that five large industries located at each, although none of these industries received or shipped a great deal of cargo over the terminal.

"Statistics show that barge traffic in general has increased from 21 billion ton miles in 1946 to 133 billion ton miles in 1962," McCarthy declared.

"Based on our studies to this point, we feel that we certainly will recommend that the barge port terminal be constructed here," he concluded.

Meeting with the Seminole County port authority committee and county commissioners were Sen. Mack Cleveland Jr. and Rep. Joe Davis. They will take up the finalizing of the necessary legislation after the completion of the feasibility report.
