# Most Teachers Have Returned To Classrooms

## 75 Remain Out Here

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Florida's non-working teachers were cleared today to return to their classrooms, but only in counties where school boards agreed to take back all personnel.

Compared to the 200 teachers who walked out three weeks ago, only 75 remained on today. Lyman High, one of the hardest hit schools, reports all but 13 teachers returned to their classrooms today.

Seminole High reports four out while South Seminole Junior High reports six still out.

Seven schools report all teachers are back in the classrooms today. They are Altamonte, Bookertown, Geneva, Midway, Monroe-Wilson, Oviedo and South Side.

Bear Lake reports six out, Coombs eight out, English Heights four out, Lake Mary two out, Longwood five out, Maitland four out, Winter two out, Sanford Junior High three out, and West Side Grammar three out.

It is reported that the teachers may pick up their resignations until March 11, at which time the school board will meet.

It is further reported by the School Board office that the students have been very well behaved.

Foster radioed for additional assistance upon his arrival at the store and was joined in the ultimate capture by Patrolman Jack Petrusik and Mike Rotun.

That would leave Herlong unranked only by Chairman N. J. ...

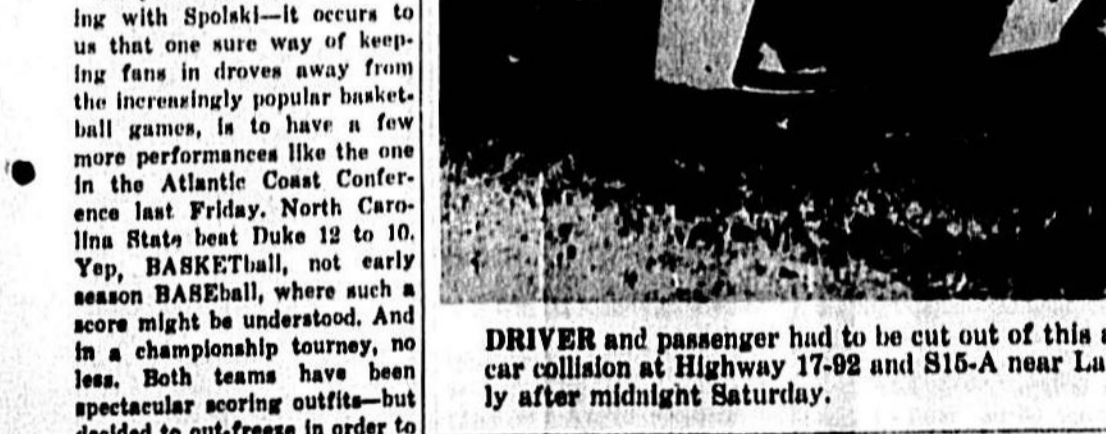

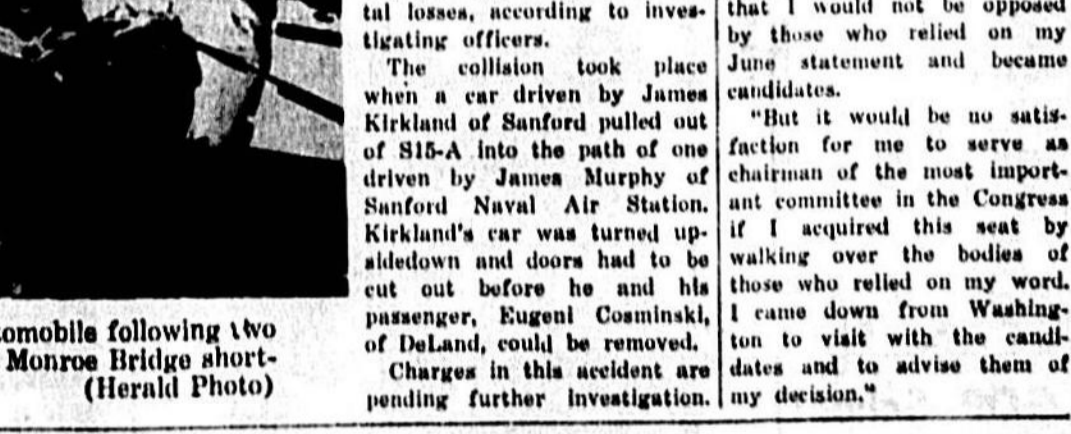

# County Commissioners Have Power

Qualifying to begin next Tuesday for candidates to the most powerful governmental board in Seminole County — the Board of County Commissioners — the board whose responsibilities range from setting the tax millage to deciding which roads will be improved — the Board of County Commissioners.

And candidates for the three open seats on the Board of County Commissioners, which each year, all three men have directly administer some \$2

million annually and has control of 225 full-time employees, need only be registered electors, reside in the district they plan to represent for six months prior to the qualifying day of \$250.

Seats up are those currently held by W. Lawrence Swafford (third), Altamonte Springs; Edward Yarborough (district one) (Geneva), and John Fitzpatrick (district five), Oviedo. All three men have announced their intentions to seek re-election to the posts.

Annual salary is \$5,000 plus \$1,200 for expenses.

County Commissioners decide which roads and bridges in the county system will be paved, maintained and approved. In like manner, they indirectly (through their power of recommendation) decide which state roads will be improved, which traffic lights will be installed and where railroad crossing signals will be placed.

Their power in this regard was shown in the last few weeks when they gave Rinehart Road to the new proposed General Dynamics plant first priority in the state secondary program when it was determined the plant, expected to employ 3,000 persons, would not be built if the road was not provided. They further placed \$ 350,000 access road to Florida Technological University, its second priority in the state secondary program, which was completed in time for opening of the school in September.

# Nixon In Final Spurt To Capture N. H. Vote Tuesday

MANCHESTER, N.H. (AP)—Richard M. Nixon staged a final spurt Tuesday into the campaign for the White House as he sought to "almost irresistible" to capture the state's electoral college vote, while Democratic Eugene J. McCarthy stuck to his standard low-key style in a week-long campaign for Tuesday's season opening New Hampshire presidential primary.

Nixon said Rockefeller "may be closer" to presidential candidacy. He said he did not know much about the New York scene—"I wasn't invited to that meeting and I didn't have it figured."

Nixon's final campaign stand today featured a series of brief visits to his headquarters in five cities. He set the tone at a Nashua reception Sunday night, urging Republicans to vote Tuesday, telling them, "We're going to win. We're going to win in March and we're going to win in November. It's going to be a new day for America."

There appeared to be no way Nixon, the only major candidate among nine on the Republican ballot, could lose in New Hampshire. The real question: How big a margin can he produce over the late-starting write-in movement from the New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller?

While Nixon was shaking hands and appealing for a big New Hampshire endorsement, Rockefeller conferred in New York with more than 20 Republican leaders who urged him to run for president.

They said Rockefeller would counsel with other Republicans within the next few weeks. It is announced by District Manager Roy Williamson. I will not campaign against the New York election until I see how it goes, said Rockefeller. He said he would campaign for Rockefeller if he could not get more than 20 per cent of the vote Tuesday. It will be a signal to Rockefeller to run for president.

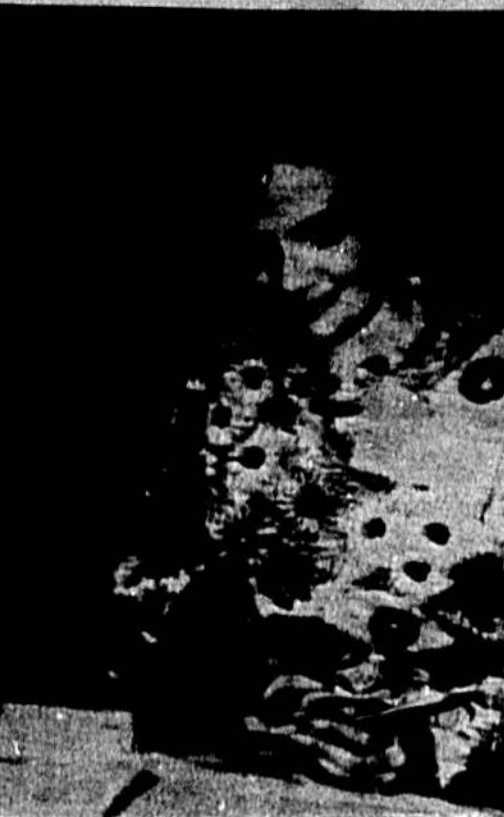

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of State Dean Rusk urged Congress today not to delay or abandon foreign aid because of the cost of the war in Vietnam. He argued that the aid program is vital to U.S. prosperity and security.

"We cannot find security apart from the rest of the world," he told the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

"And in the long run, we can do neither progress nor security apart from the rest of the world," he said.

BAIGON (AP)—South Vietnamese military reported killing 100 enemy troops in a northern frontier battle Sunday, but enemy gunners blew up tons of ammunition at a U.S. Navy base just below the eastern end of the demilitarized zone.

A spokesman said South Vietnamese casualties were light in the eight-hour fight with an estimated 60 Communist soldiers, the eighth major encounter since Feb. 20 by government troops below the DMZ. He said the South Vietnamese captured seven suspects and 25 weapons, and that their casualties were only three killed and 27 wounded.

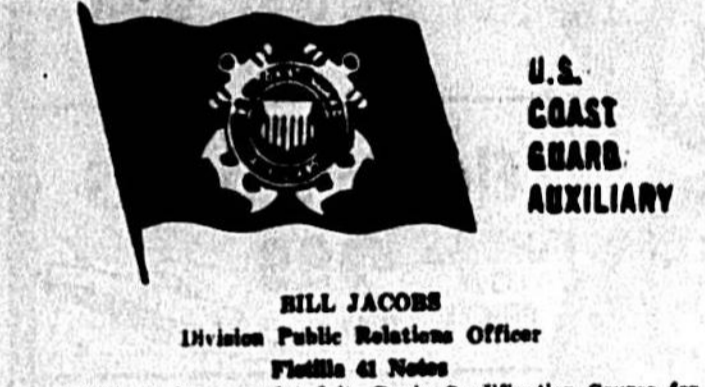

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# College Admission Criteria Discussed

Criteria most commonly used by colleges today for admission of students were outlined by Jay Lenders, assistant director of admissions, Boston University, to the members of the DeLano Lane Club at their first meeting this month.

Emphasizing that "good high school grades are the single best indicator of success in college," Lenders said that grade records from standardized tests, such as those given by the Col-

lege Board of Princeton, N. J., or by the American College Testing Service, are used. Pointing out that Florida Placement Tests are required of all Florida residents who apply for admission to any of the state supported schools.

Consideration also is given to recommendations of high school teachers and guidance counselors and to personality traits, extra curricular activities, hobbies, etc.

Selectivity among colleges, he

advised, varies considerably from the state junior colleges, which are committed to accept all graduates of high schools within the state regardless of grades, to the "Ivy League" schools which are highly selective.

"Boston, by and large, wants students with no less than a 'B' average," he stressed.

"Typical cost for a year at Boston is \$2,700. However, a considerable amount of money (estimated at \$1 million for next

year) is available to deserving students for scholarship assistance. Lenders pointed out, noting that presently, 43 per cent of the 1,800 students are receiving financial help in some form.

# Gold Barometer Of Dollar Showing Storm Signals

**LONDON (AP)**—Five men went today to find out if the United States has succeeded in securing the latest gold rush on the dollar.

Representatives of the major London bullion dealers held their daily meeting at Rothschild's bank to balance the demand for gold against supply and set the price.

The gold barometer of confidence in the dollar has been showing storm signals since March 1. Last Friday the demand on the London market reached panic proportions, 60 to 80 tons. Normally only 4 to 8 tons are traded in a day.

"Leading bullion dealers said Sunday night the statement by the United States and the other six members of the international gold pool should have a cooling effect, although it might take a day or so.

Issued after a private meeting at the Bank for International Settlements in Basel, Switzerland, a communiqué reaffirmed the determination of the seven

governments to continue selling gold at \$35 an ounce. The members of the pool are the United States, Britain, Italy, Belgium, West Germany, the Netherlands and Switzerland. They meet weekly from their reserves when no newly mined gold is available from South Africa.

William McChesney Martin, chairman of the U.S. Federal Reserve Board, had flown to Basel to get the statement of continued support. A similar pledge by the gold pool in Frankfurt last Nov. 18 and another by Martin and U.S. Treasury Secretary Henry H. Fowler on Dec. 18 stopped gold-rushes then.

The Basel statement was designed to quiet fears that the gold pool might break up because some of the smaller nations, particularly Belgium, are fearful that they can not continue supplying their quota of gold to the dealers in London. France has already dropped out for political reasons.

Martin beamed as he told newsmen he was very satisfied. But neither the bullion dealers in London, nor the gold speculators and hoarders they supply

reckoned that the increasing cost of the war would eat up the savings resulting from Johnson's restrictions.

Gold buyers usually deal secretly through banks or open agents, but it is not hard to figure out where the gold goes and why, by following traditional reports on the gold trade.

Probably the largest single hoard lies in the Arab states of the Middle East, where dollars pour in as oil royalties. U. S.

Treasury officials have been trying to wean the oil shippers away from gold for years.

Gold is also smuggled into India and Pakistan in motorized trucks, most of them sailing from Dubai on the Persian Gulf. That tiny sheikhdom is the third largest buyer of gold on the London market. Rich Indians hold vast quantities.

Europe's middle classes have always hoarded gold as a hedge against war, inflation and currency collapse. Gold is a good

investment market available to him like Wall Street, which provides Americans a hedge against inflation while their savings grow with the economy.

In Spain, where uncertainty about the political future will continue until the people find out what comes after Gen. Francisco Franco, gold hoarding is increasing at the fastest rate in Europe and now is estimated at \$20 million a year.

The continental European with some savings has no cen-

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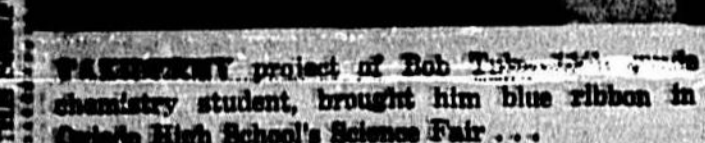
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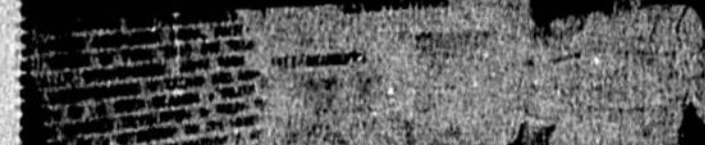
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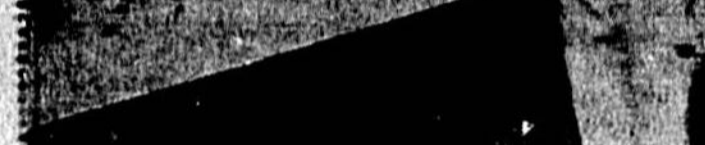

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## War On Crime Gift Confirmed By Kirk

**MIAMI (AP)**—The father of State Rep. Robert Rust said today he donated \$10,000 to pay off part of Gov. Calude Kirk's War on Crime debt, but not because of any promise for political support for his son who is a candidate for Congress.

"There were no strings—no deals," said Adolph H. Rust, 72, a retired financier from Manhasset, N.Y., who is vacationing in Miami.

The elder Rust made the comments after a national television network broadcast two film segments in which Kirk discussed the War on Crime and the means of financing it.

The first—apparently filmed candidly in January while Kirk visited the National Press Club in Washington—showed Kirk in conversation with Leonard Hall, former national chairman of the Republican Party.

Kirk and Hall discussed Hall's plans to meet with an unnamed man and seek a contribution for the War on Crime.

The governor said "It would be very good politics and publicity for him to contribute." Hall said he would contact the man and let Kirk know the result.

"That's the sort of thing that will insure his son being elected because it looks like his son is a crime fighter," Kirk said.

The second segment was an interview of Kirk by producer Martin Clancy of the Public Broadcast Laboratory, an experimental, non-commercial television network which runs a 2.5 hour news program each Sunday on 106 stations including five in Florida.

In the interview with Clancy, Kirk said the contributor he mentioned was the elder Rust.

After some verbal jockeying about a \$10,000 donation by the Flagler Foundation, Clancy asked: "Isn't it a fact that two weeks ago a man named Adolph H. Rust of New York, who had been approached by Hall, contributed \$10,000 to your War on Crime?"

"Oh sure," Kirk replied.

"Why? You act like that's a secret. It's on record."

"The \$10,000 was Rust," the governor said later. "I just couldn't be more pleased. Now Rust's son is one of our representatives, a Republican from Palm Beach County. Any young man in America who would emulate the father who has now run for the U.S. Congress, I guarantee you, he'll be a fine American. I'm very pleased with Mr. Rust's contribution. I want the whole world to know about it."

## MEDICAL NEWS

Mothers help the development of their newborn babies by talking a lot to them and by frequently looking at them face to face, says a Harvard psychologist, Dr. Jerome Kazan.

The effects can be observed as early as four months, he has reported. The more attentive mothers may be providing their infants with early training in problem-solving, and richer experiences at a time when they are undergoing rapid mental growth, Dr. Kazan suggests.

"Birth Control: A Continuing Controversy," as a book based on a symposium held two years ago at the University of California at Los Angeles. Eighteen experts participated, and their views have been included in separate chapters.

Among the subjects discussed are: the population problem in the Eastern and Western Hemispheres; the views of the Catholic and Protestant Churches and Judaism; technical aspects of contraception; the effects of overpopulation on economic planning and mental health; and the future prospects of fertility control.

The book was compiled and edited by Edward T. Tyler, M.D. It is intended as a general reference for those interested in family planning.

Anxious, nervous people are often excessive air swallowers. Air that is entrapped may cause painful distention in the gastrointestinal tract. This is "gas." Gas, in turn, contributes further to a person's emotional distress.

A New York City physician, Dr. Jerome Weiss of Polytechnic Hospital and Medical School, reports that a tablet combining digestive enzymes and simethicone to de-gassing agent) effectively relieve gas pains. Dr. Weiss subjected the medication, Phazyme, to a two-year study before reporting on it at the annual meeting of the American College of Gastroenterology.

It also suggested that anxious patients learn to relax, and learn to exhale completely before swallowing food or drink.

An insect called the house-dust mite seems to be the cause of house-dust allergy, Dutch scientists report.

If their finding is borne out, it offers a simpler way of decreasing allergic sensitivity. An extract of the mite could be used in "shots" instead of house-dust preparations, says Medical World News.

# Oregon Prison Riot Loss Estimated At \$6 Million

Prison officials estimated damage of \$6 million. George W. Randall, state director of corrections, agreed to the estimate, presented by six convicts representing the prison population of 1,100. The demands were presented shortly after midnight Sunday. Randall walked into the prison yard with several reporters to talk to the prisoners into releasing their hostages. He told the prisoners there would be no reprisals. "I've never lied to a prisoner, and I'm too old to start lying now. We won't harm anyone," he said. Randall agreed to fire warden C. T. Glavin, 77, who had served 15 years. Glavin, 31 for heading the riot. All of the convicts in the treatment center, such as the chaplain, psychologist and counselors, were destroyed. The prison hospital was severely damaged. The industrial plants, which provide vocational training, were destroyed. The damages touched off speculation that a special session of the Oregon legislature would be needed to finance reconstruction. As soon as the hostages were released, prison guards and state police forced all of the convicts into the recreation yard. They stayed there Sunday night, becoming making the cell livable will take at least until late today. One of the guards who was held in the yard said, "It was the longest 17 hours of my life." Someone asked the guard, William Lowery, if he was frightened. "Are you kidding?" he asked. Lowery said the riots were caused because "everybody was talking about the problems and no one was doing anything about them." Other demands which were granted included "washed treatment, more liberal visiting, an inmate council to air their grievances, a better prison store, less forced savings from their pay, better food in the segregation section, and making the work-release program available to more prisoners. When the riot began, 60 guards were in the area controlled by the convicts. Some of them occupied, some were rescued, and some were helped out by friendly convicts. About 17 were held by the prisoners as hostages. These were released one at a time until only the final four were left. There were no serious injuries among the hostages. A few suffered bumps, cuts or bruises. The Board of Control, which administers the prison, will appoint a new warden this week. Randall has named Roy Cup, assistant superintendent of the Oregon Corrections Institution, as acting warden.

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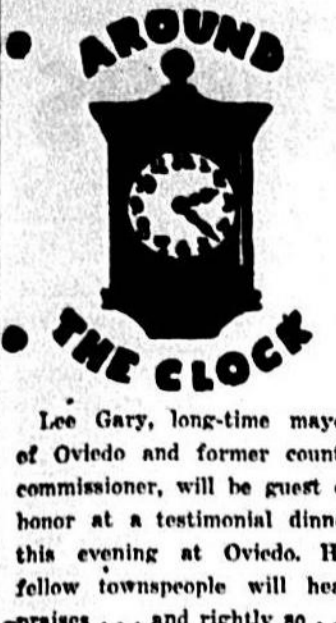
