Hiring A Cook

Are you thinking of hiring a cook, a maid, or a nurse? If you are, here are some good suggestions from the New York Herald Tribune's Home Institute...

- 1. Be on time for the interview. That will show the girl you are the kind who will be courteous and considerate of her convenience.
2. Be businesslike while asking the girl about her qualifications. Never be too intimate. Never be too haughty.
3. Look for a sense of neatness in the girl being interviewed. If a girl is not neat with her own clothes she generally will not be neat with the possessions of others.
4. Is the girl's voice or mannerism irritating to you at the time of the interview? If it is, do not consider hiring her. Such minor things have a way of becoming major problems when you must live with them day after day.
5. Never say to the girl being hired, "There's practically nothing to do." Most women who make this remark either know very little about the inner workings of their home, or are perhaps trying to misrepresent the amount of work to be done.
6. Outline your home routine honestly. Do not plan to pile on the work after she is on the job.
7. Never spread propaganda about the family at the time of the interview. The maid will find out for herself when she is established in the household, just how smart Junior is, and just how talented little sister is.
8. Be sure to examine the references of the maid very carefully, for your own protection.
9. Never hire in haste. It is more profitable to do your own work a few days than take the wrong person into your home.

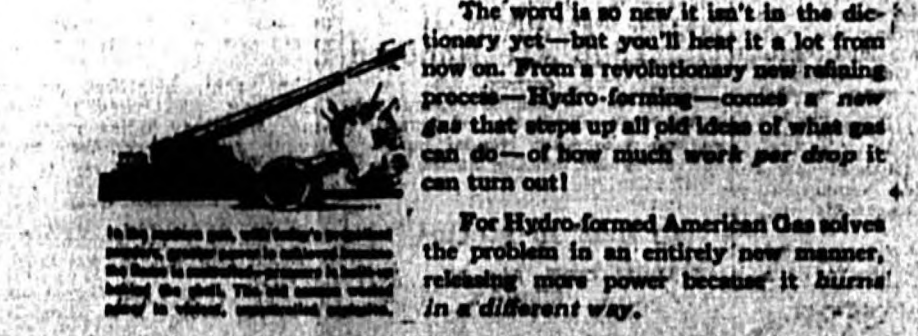

The yacht, identified as the large-going, was taken to Havana, about 40 miles south of Havana, pending a further investigation of its activities off the coast.

Italy Decrees Death For Military Fraud

ROME, Apr. 29 — The Fascist government last night decreed death for imprisonment and lesser prison terms for certain cases of military fraud, contractors, workers and others in full collaboration with the state.
The decree, issued by Premier Mussolini ordered death for aggravated cases of fraud affecting military operations, persons and property, and for contractors who fall down on military supply orders, long prison terms for soldiers who fail to show up at departure of their troops and death by shooting in the breast for soldiers guilty of aggravated second offenses.

Strike Seriousness Is Told By Speaker

PHILADELPHIA, Apr. 29 — Reporting statements by government officials concerning defense industry strikes, Walter D. Fuller, president of the National Association of Manufacturers, asserted last night that "propagandizing ourselves" as believing that strikes in defense industries don't amount to much is to invite national tragedy.
"America needs to be shocked," Fuller, who is president of the Curtis Publishing Company, said at a regional N. A. M. conference. "America needs to be brought up short against the stark reality of what is going on about us. Planning strikes with the underlying day-to-day facts of defense production is gambling with our destiny."

Washington, D. C.—Out of the agony of bomb-ravaged Britain has come an appeal for American doctors.

Britain's request to "bring not already the American Red Cross, acting for her sister society in England, has carried the appeal to the nation's medical profession. Up to 1,000 American doctors will be needed by the British Red Cross to supplement the "hard-pressed corps of doctors engaged in saving British lives from London to Singapore."

American Red Cross workers who have been in England since the outset of hostilities report the need is acute. Formerly a nation at war needed doctors to treat the sick and wounded, on the battle front. Today, with every bomb-dropping of civilians, Britain needs her doctors fighting against desperate odds.

American doctors will report to the British Red Cross where they will be allowed to choose service either in the Royal Army Medical Corps or in the civilian Emergency Medical Service, the latter corps of physicians assigned to temporary duty.

That service will be for one year, but if at the end of that period they



wish to continue, they will be eligible for promotion. To be eligible for service with the R.A.M.C. doctors must be 40 or younger, while the E.M.S. will accept men up to 44. Despite the cruel aspects of all-out hostilities, American physicians answering Britain's appeal will be protected by the Red Cross Treaty of Geneva, a 1906-bid (modified) which will, in force on the battlefield, protect all American doctors, as far as possible, will be allowed to choose

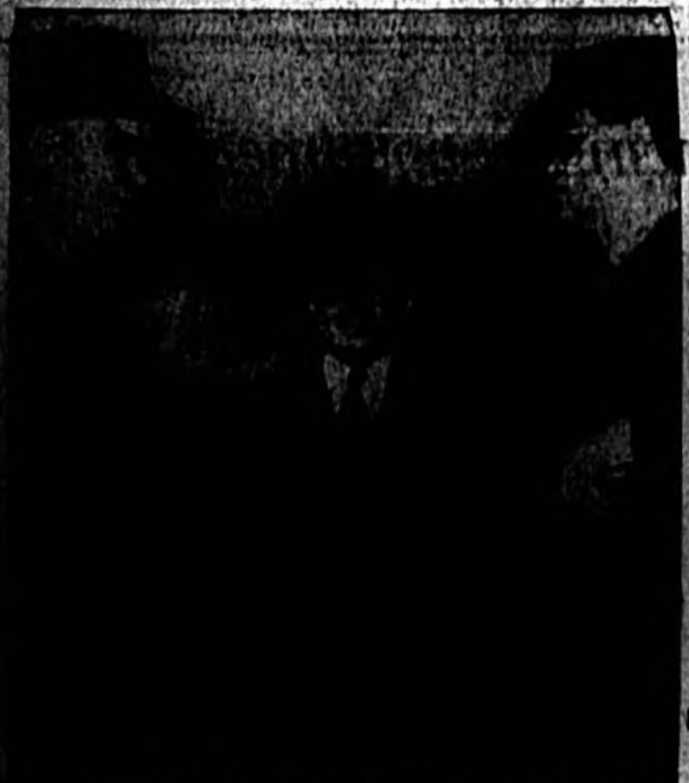
where they will serve—whether it be in London, Rangoon, the Middle East or any point of emergency along the far-stretched lines of British defense. The appeal of the British Red Cross has the endorsement of the President of the United States, the Secretary of War and the Surgeon General of the Public Health Service. These doctors subject to military training under our own flag are being given special consideration by the Selective Service.

South America Loans To Nazis, Bullett States

WASHINGTON, Apr. 29—(AP)—William H. Bullett, former ambassador to France, asserted last night that "many states of South America are waiting only for the disappearance of the British navy to turn totalitarian and invade the economic and military co-operation of the dictators."

Bullett made this statement in an address prepared for a China Relief meeting. His speech was broadcast by CBS.

"We know," he said, "that if the British navy should be eliminated we would soon see a totalitarian army and a totalitarian air force in South America, and that all Europe, all Asia and Africa as well, would be organized against us."

Meanwhile John D. Rockefeller Jr. declared it was his conviction, arrived at in anguish of spirit, that the people of the United States and all the American "should stand by the British empire to the limit and at any cost."

Calling for the American people to stand solidly behind President Roosevelt and to see that supplies of war munitions sufficient to win victory were "laid down at Britain's door," Rockefeller said the issue being fought was freedom versus slavery and added:

"I would rather die fighting the brutal, barbarous, inhuman force represented by Hitlerism than live in a world which is dominated by that force."

\$1,300,000 Sent To England For British War Aid

NEW YORK, Apr. 29—(AP)—A total of \$1,300,510.73 in contributions and purchased articles and money was sent to England for the relief of war-stricken civil populations and the armed forces during the first four months of the fiscal year beginning with December 1940, by Bundles-for-Britain, Inc., 745 Fifth Avenue. It was announced Saturday. More than half of this amount, or \$692,379.94 went forward during the month of March.

The figures covering relief sent abroad are from a consolidated statement by the American women's relief organization based upon monthly reports to the United States Department of State.

Contributions in money and goods, plus revenues from benefit entertainments and earnings from the sale of merchandise reached a record total of \$575,983.48 for March, bringing the aggregate figure for the four months to \$1,693,603.92.

Cash gifts in March represented \$193,808.29. Entertainments yielded a gross of \$55,211.10 and \$34,105.60 was earned through the sale of merchandise items in branches and shops of the nationwide organization.

Contributed articles, consisting of new and used clothing, knitted garments for the armed forces, surgical instruments, apparatus and medical supplies, and hospital garments and children's apparel made in Bundles for Britain's sewing rooms, were valued at \$210,338.51.

Expenses for March, covering transportation and administration of the organization with 193 branch units and sewing rooms across the nation, the cost of entertainment, mail appeals, promotion, publicity and material for the branches were \$41,045.03 or 24 percent of the receipts. For the four-month period total expenses amounted to \$148,398.41, or 8.8 percent of receipts.

The expenses, including the operation of national headquarters in New York City and cost incident to the direction of the branches, plus the huge mercantile operation of receiving, sorting, packing and distributing at the central warehouse amounted to \$28,976.91 in March. An outlay of \$7,434.06 was made for benefit entertainments and donations. The balance of \$1,064,181.35 for the branches cost \$5,039.18. The expense of mail appeals was \$2,646.80.

Of the relief goods and supplies sent to England in the month of March \$168,211.95 represented articles purchased abroad, \$142,376.87 in foreign currencies, and \$1,024,592.53 in the form of the dispatch to England of second-hand clothing, equipment, and other goods for Britain had no purchases and contributed articles representing a value of \$76,020.65.

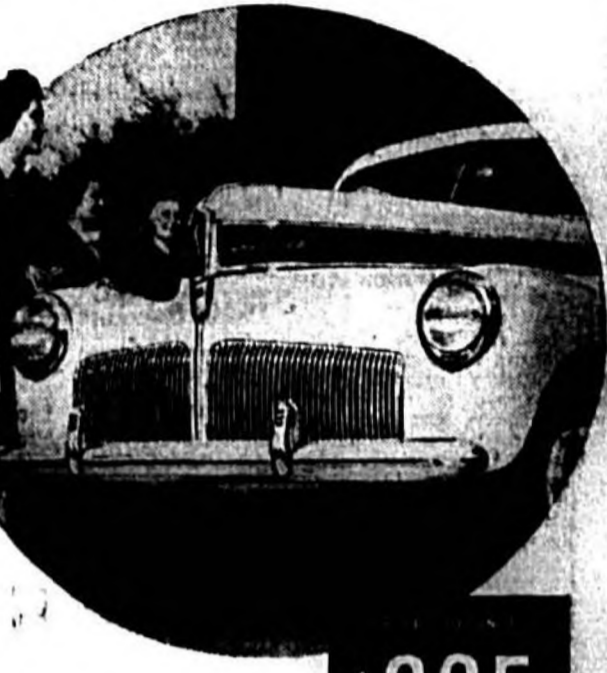
