

Lookouts Swamp House Of David Nine By 15-5 Count

Estellala Leads Batters With Two Homers, Double And Single In Five Trips

Rochester Game Here Today Is Cancelled Because Of Rain

Scoring in every inning except the second and seventh, the Chattanooga Lookouts had little trouble swamping the House of David team, 15-5, here yesterday afternoon in an exhibition contest featured by Estellala's two home runs, both of which came with the bases empty.

The Lookouts hopped on Gravie, starting pitcher, for the bearded men, for ten hits in four innings and rapped out eight against the veteran Moon Swainey in the final four. A base on balls by McFarland, Benmiller's single, Miles' double and single by Estellala and Bloodworth netted two runs in the first inning while Miles' triple, Wadell's single, two errors and singles by Bloodworth and Benmiller, combined with a fielder's choice, netted six runs in the third. Estellala's home run over the left field fence proved to be the only tally of the fourth while Estellala's single paved the way for the only run of the fifth as the relief hurler snared after going to third on McFarland's hit by coming in on the force play made on Benmiller. Estellala again hit for a circuit blow in the sixth, sending the home side over the left field wall for the second time while Miles' triple, and error, Estellala's double and Bloodworth's single brought about the three runs scored in the eighth.

The visitors scored one in the fifth after Vang singled and took second on Pitt's single, went to third on a wild pitch and tallied when Woods fled out to deep center. Their four runs in the eighth came after singles by Woods and Grancin, a double by Sweeney, two errors and a single by Pitts.

Estellala was the sparkling of the Lookouts in the platter, getting four hits for five trips, including his two homers, a double and a single. McFarland obtained a double and two singles in four trips, while Moon Swainey proved to the crowd that the old boy could still go, getting two doubles and a long single in four times at bat.

"Alabama" Pitts, the famed athlete from Sing Sing, failed to give the fans any extraordinary thrill although he came through in the latter innings to chalk up two singles for his five trips to the plate.

Cone Voices Opposition To Book Buying

Board Of Education
Discusses Set Of
Proposed Statutes
For Year's Action

Governor Says
'Pay For Basics'

English Seeks Con-

TALLAHASSEE, Mar. 31.—(AP)—Governor Cone opposed State purchases of supplementary textbooks for public schools today as the State Board of Education discussed at length, without final action, a set of legislative recommendations proposed by Colin English, superintendent of public instruction.

"I'm not going to adopt any more of them [supplemental books]," said Governor Cone. "As far as I'm concerned, from now on we will pay for basic books and no more. If they want supplementary readers, they can get them, but we shouldn't have them at State expense. It's going to bankrupt the State if it doesn't stop somewhere."

English proposed to have the law revised for the State superintendent to have closer control over orders.

An existing law provides that County superintendents send in book requisitions and the State make purchases based on these.

3,619 Carloads Of
Celery This Season

Seminole County has shipped 3,619 carloads of celery to date in the 1937 season, according to a periodic report issued yesterday by the local branch of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

At this time in 1936, the County had shipped 3,080 carloads, comparable figures of the bulletin showed.

Breaking down the figures further the Bureau pointed out that the Sanford district produced 3,224 carloads of the total, while the Orlando section is responsible for 285 carloads. Both areas are ahead of last year's shipping.

Florida as a whole has shipped 4,911 carloads of celery this season, the Bureau said. At this time last year the figure rested at 3,979.

Sanford Asked To Assist Blind In Flower Sale Appeal For Funds For Worthy Cause

An appeal to Sanford citizens to be made Saturday by the American Brotherhood for the Blind through the sale of flowers.

Contributions received from these sales will be used to further the Brotherhood's various Braille publications that are given free to blind readers.

The committee sponsoring the affair includes Mayor Edward Higgins, Mrs. Stella P. Arrington, the Rev. W. P. Brooks, Jr., Mrs. J. C. Mitchell and Mrs. Walter Cooper. The event is sponsored by the Sanford Lions Club.

During the flower day sale, headquarters will be maintained at the Valdez Hotel with Miss Luella Holt in charge of young people's work and finances.

The American Brotherhood for the Blind is supported entirely by voluntary contributions, and through the flower sales it has published more than 10,000 volumes in Braille during the last 14 years and has placed them free in libraries and elsewhere for circulation among the blind.

The Brotherhood also publishes the "All Braille Magazine," the only fiction magazine made in the United States for the blind. It circulates without cost to sightless readers in every State and 15 foreign countries.

At the request of the Veterans Administration, Washington, D. C., it is being sent to blind veterans throughout the country.

The national advisory council of the Brotherhood includes Hon. David Shultz, former governor of Florida; Dr. Edward Conradi, president of Florida State College for Women; John D. Wing, of the Episcopal Church; the Rev. C. M. Brittain, of the Baptist Church; Robert Campbell Lawson, Evan Gudger, Booth, of the Salvation Army; Kathleen Norris, novelist and others.

At City Hall, where City exemptions are applied for, the forms may be turned in up until 6 P. M. tomorrow.

No provision is made in the law for filing applications after Apr. 1. City and County tax assessors have pointed out, consequently homeowners who have not requested their tax benefit by tomorrow night will find their homes on the year's tax roll.

Maniac Wounds 2, Murders Father, Bruises Mother

Former Patient Of
Insane Asylum On
New York Rampage

TROY, N. Y., Mar. 31.—(UPI)—An investigation into the slaying of an aged man was climaxized today by a gun battle in which two State troopers were wounded and John Ireland, 40, was arrested and charged with first degree murder.

Six State troopers were called to the home of the victim, Edward H. Ireland, 75, after the Rev. Michael J. Dwyer, Catholic priest, heard shots as he was saying mass in a nearby church.

Inspector Edward O. Hageman of the State police who preferred the charge of first degree murder, said John Ireland, former patient at Hudson River State Hospital, had shot his father, thrown his mother down stairs and wounded two troopers at the Ireland home at Latham, a suburb.

The wounded troopers, P. J. Fitzpatrick and C. J. Konior, who went to investigate, were taken to a Troy Hospital, where they reported. Fitzpatrick received 75 shots in the shoulder and one of Konior's eyeballs had been penetrated.
