Estelalla Leads Batters With Two Homers, Double And Single In Five Trips

Rochester Game Here Today Is Cancelled Because Of Rain

Scoring in every inning except the second and seventh, the Chattanooga Lookouts had little trouble swamping the House of David team, 15-5, here yesterday afternoon in an exhibition contest featured by Estelalla's two home runs, both of which came with the bases empty.

The lookouts hopped on Graciano, starting pitcher, for the bearded men, for ten hits in four innings and rapped out eight against the veteran Moose Swaney in the final four. A base on balls by McFarland, Bonmiller's single, Miles' double and single by Estelalla and Bloodworth needed two runs in the first inning while Miles' triple, Waddell's single, two errors and singles by Bloodworth and Bonmiller, combined with a fielder's choice, netted six runs in the third. Estelalla's home run over the left field fence proved to be the only tally of the fourth while Estelalla's single paved the way for the only run of the fifth as the relief hurler scored after going to third on McFarland's hit by coming in on the force play made on Bonmiller. Estelalla again hit for a circuit blow in the sixth, sending the horsehide over the left field wall for the second time while Miles' triple, and error, Estelalla's double and Bloodworth's single brought about the three runs scored in the eighth.

The visitors scored one in the fifth after Vann singled and took second on Pitts' single, went to third on a wild pitch and tallied when Woods flied out to deep center. Their four runs in the eighth came after singles by Woods and Graciano, a double by Swaney, two errors and a single by Pitts.

Estelalla was the sparkplug of the Lookouts in the platter, getting four hits for five trips, including his two homers, a double and a single. McFarland obtained a double and two singles in four trips, while Moose Swaney proved to the crowd that he still could swing, getting two doubles and a home single in four times at bat.

"Alabama" Pitts, the famed pitcher from Sing Sing, failed to give the fans any extraordinary thrill although he came through in the later innings to chalk up two singles for his five trips at bat.

Cone Voices Opposition To Book Buying

Board Of Education Discusses Set Of Proposed Statutes For Year's Action

Governor Says 'Pay For Basics'

English Seeks Control Of Orders On School Texts

TAILLHASSEE, Mar. 31.—(AP)—Governor Cone opposed State purchases of supplementary textbooks for public schools today as the State Board of Education discussed at length, without final action, a set of legislative recommendations proposed by Colin English, superintendent of public instruction. "I'm not going to adopt any more of them" (supplemental books), said Governor Cone. "As far as the basic books are concerned, from now on we will pay for basic books and no more. If they want supplementary readers, they can get them, but we shouldn't have them at State expense. It's going to bankrupt the State if it doesn't stop somewhere."

English proposed to have the law revised for the State superintendent to have closer control over orders.

An existing law provides that County superintendents send in book requisitions and the State make purchases based on these.

County Dispatches 3,619 Carloads Of Celery This Season

Seminole County has shipped 3,619 carloads of celery to date in the 1937 season, according to a periodic report issued yesterday by the local branch of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

At this time in 1936, the County had shipped 3,080 carloads, comparative figures of the bulletin showed.

Breaking down the figures further the Bureau pointed out that the Sanford district produced 3,324 carloads of the total, while the Ocala section is responsible for 295 carloads. Both areas are ahead of last year's shipping.

Florida as a whole has shipped 4,311 carloads of celery this season, the Bureau said. At this time last year the figure rested at 3,976.

Develop Florida's Waterways, Lehmann Says To Kiwanians

The importance of developing Florida's waterways to connect the State's lakes and streams to create a "trachean" paradise" was brought out today by Karl Lehmann, secretary of the Lake County Chamber of Commerce, in an address before Sanford Kiwanians in the Valdez Hotel.

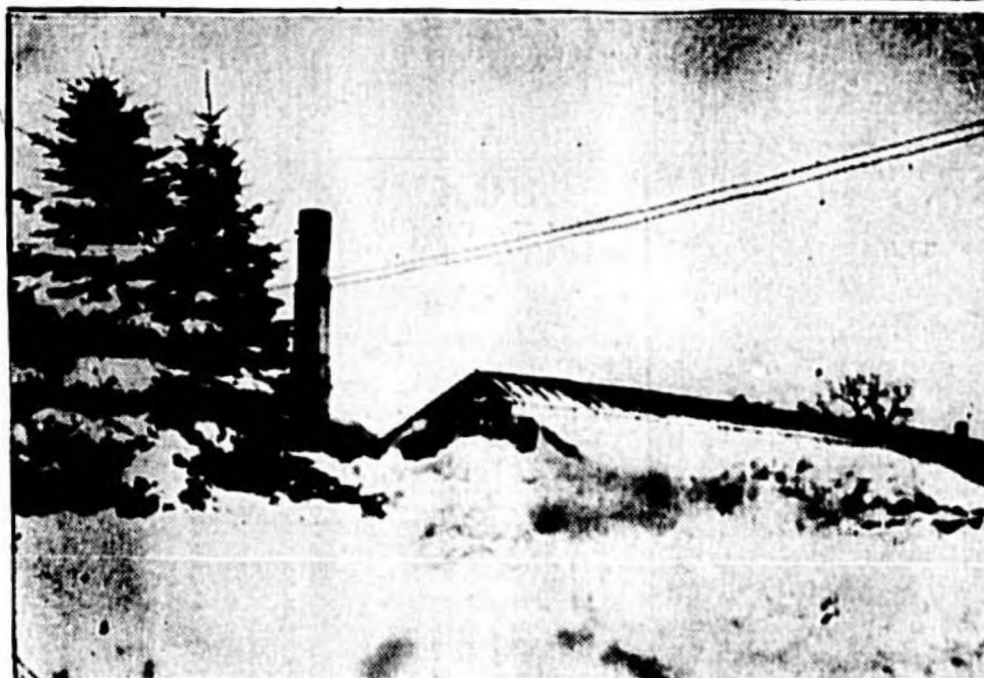

England And France Demand Insurgents 'Keep Hands Off' Neutral Shipping

Threat On Franco Felt In Morocco

Fifty Fascists Reported Executed; 1,100 Are Jailed

Apparently reliable reports that General Franco had imported 1,000 Italian colonials to stamp out a revolt in Spanish Morocco—cradle of his rebellion against the Government of Spain—today fanned international fires started by the bloody civil war more than eight months ago.

Simultaneously, Great Britain and France joined in a flat warning to Franco to "keep your hands off our ships."

French Moroccan sources heard that "overseas colony troops" landed at Ceuta, Spanish Morocco, and were distributed through the insurgent-held Spanish zone because of a still serious movement against Franco's regime.

Italy, one of 27 international pledgers of neutrality, altered European alarm only a few days ago by refusing to withdraw any of the thousands of "volunteers" she sent to Spain. These volunteers were detected northeast of Madrid in one of the most recent insurgent thrusts at the capital.

At Tangier, a semi-official Spanish news organization, Agencia Espanola, declared a counter-revolt had been crushed with execution of 50 men and the arrest of 1,000 officers, soldiers and civilians.

In Spain, Government troops launched offensives on nearly all fronts. Insurgents claimed a series of Government thrusts outside Madrid were stopped with heavy losses inflicted on the loyalists.
