The Economy At A Glance

New York: Soaring oil prices, turmoil in Iran and a mixed economic picture depressed prices on the New York Stock Exchange Thursday, shaving 6.43 point from the Dow Jones Industrial Average which closed at 829.99 in slow trading.

Tokyo: The dollar held firm against the yen today, finishing at 200.45 compared with Thursday's close of 200.30 in quiet trading that saw \$343 million change hands. Abu Dhabi, United Arab Emirates: Persian Gulf oil producer Abu Dhabi has boosted the price of its crude oil by 7 percent and Qatar and Iraq also are demanding premiums during the Iranian oil shutdown.

Washington: Treasury Secretary Michael Blumenthal says the price of oil in the United States should rise as a means of encouraging conservation.

Detroit: Ford Motor Co. reported record worldwide sales in 1978 sent profits soaring to \$1.589 billion for the second year in a row, but company officials say a nine-week strike at plants in England and spiraling domestic production costs shaved the actual profit margin.

New York: The Federal Reserve Bank says the nation's basic money supply rose to a seasonally adjusted average of \$360.2 billion during the week ending Feb. 7 — a gain of \$2.9 billion.

Washington: The Commerce Department says business inventories increased by a little more than one-half of 1 percent in December, but sales were ahead by 1 percent — all of which probably reflects inflationary conditions.

Washington: The Federal Reserve Board says American industrial output rose by one-tenth of 1 percent in January — the slowest rate since the industrial output declined by six-tenths of 1 percent in January 1978.

New York: The Conference Board, a private business research group, says consumer confidence and buying plans lagged in January, perhaps indicating development of a projected economic slowdown earlier than some have anticipated.

Cleveland: Economist Dr. Otto Eckstein says an overheated economy and soaring inflation will force the government to adopt monetary policies that will lead to recession within a year.

Velocipedes, Boneshakers, Bicycles

The velocipede (swift walker) of the early 1800s was the granddaddy of the modern bicycle.

It had a wooden frame with 2 wheels. The rider sat on a seat and pushed it along with his toes.

Velocipedes were also called dandy horses because they were very popular with the dandies, or fancily dressed young men of the times.

In 1839 a Scotsman MacMillan added pedals which turned the rear wheel and in 1862 Ernest Michaux of France made a velocipede with the front wheel larger than the rear.

Later models made in the U.S. were called boneshakers because the iron-rimmed 2 wheelers jarred the riders so.

By 1877 rubber tires and wire-spoked wheels were added and the front wheels grew in diameter to 5 and 6 feet. This gave the bike extra speed, but was risky to ride.

In England they were nicknamed penny farthings because the large front wheel and small rear were proportioned similar to the large English penny and the smaller farthing.

Henry Lawson of England developed the safety bicycle that resembled bikes of today with the two wheels of equal size and a chain drive on the rear wheel.

From the late 1800s through the turn of the century the popularity of the bicycle grew rapidly — with adults, not youngsters. It was the height of fashion and was the first step forward from the horse and buggy.

Mrs. Amelia Bloomer thought up the Turkish-styled pants that made it easier for women to ride. The change in women's clothing from bloomers to slacks, culottes, pedal pushers, and shorts has been brought about largely by the bicycle.

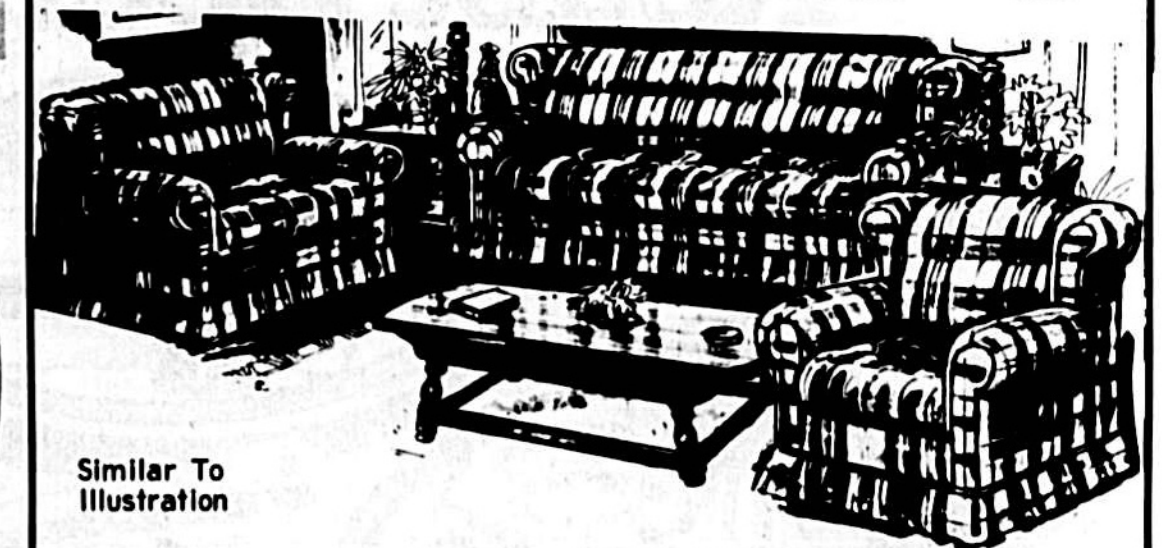

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Military Reserve Pay Question: County Calls It Double Dipping

 Whether Seminole County must pay a county employee seeking monies deducted while he trained with the national guard may hinge on a court interpretation or a clarification by the State Legislature.

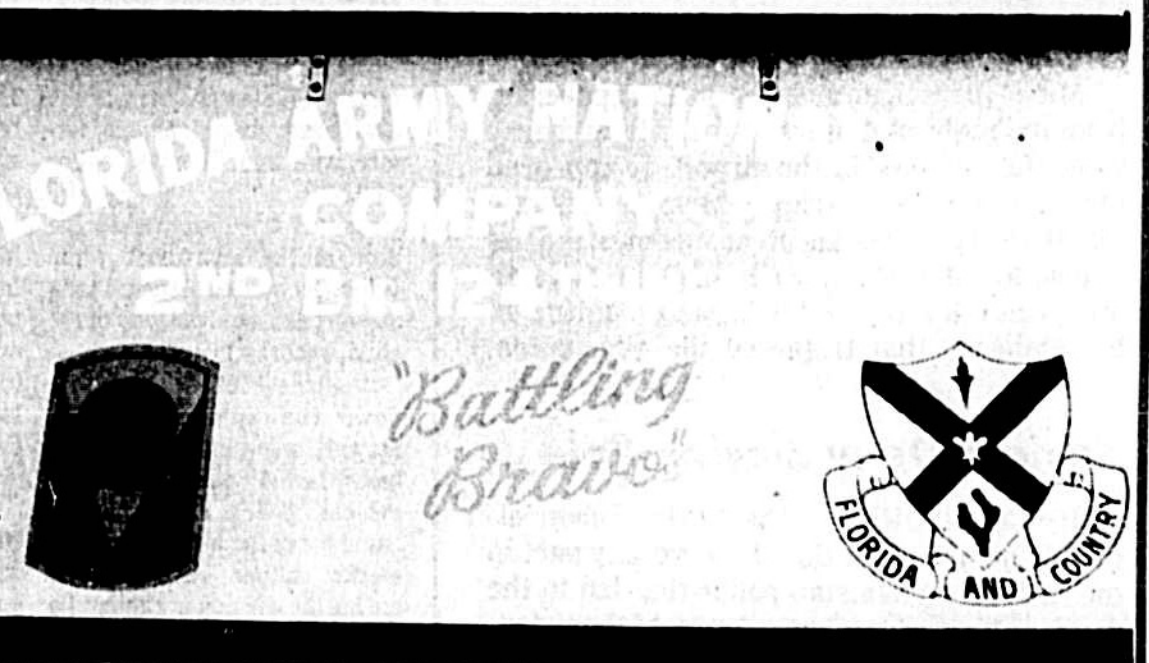
The county employee recently asked the county commission to pay him monies deducted while he was training with the national guard. The county commission, however, voted 4 to 1 to deny the request and said it will seek help through the legislative delegation to get changed a 40-year-old state law requiring state, county and city governments to pay its employees full salary during such training periods for up to 17 days. Assistant county attorney Robert McMillan says the commission's action was based on its interpretation of a phrase

in the state law which may be ambiguous enough to permit the county to deduct any part of an employee's salary paid for reserve or national guard training. That phrase, according to McMillan, is "without loss of pay." The state law refers to an employee being permitted to engage in reserve or national guard training without loss of pay. However, McMillan said, the county commission feels paying an employee

his salary, less what the reserve or national guard pays him for that training period, constitutes no loss of pay. On the other side of the issue, however, are attorneys general opinions which state a county, city or state government must pay such employees full salary during reserve or national guard training — up to 17 days a year — without regard to how much that employee may be paid by his unit.

McMillan said, however, the county is not bound by an attorney general's opinion. At least one other lawyer, Sanford City

Attorney C. Vernon Mize Jr. said he feels the state directive is clear and that he is convinced a court would find it clear as well. "The intent seems clear to me that a municipality is obligated to pay an employee's full salary up to 17 days while on reserve or national guard training, regardless of how much he gets from his unit."



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Chinese Attacking Vietnam

TOKYO (UPI) — Chinese forces supported by aircraft, tanks and artillery launched a large-scale military offensive against Vietnam today, Japanese correspondents reported from Peking and Hanoi.

The reports said the attack was carried out in Lam Son, Lai Chau, Hoang Lien Son and Quang Ninh provinces on the Vietnamese side of the border. Japanese reporters said the Chinese forces penetrated up to 8 miles into Vietnamese territory.

The Chinese Communist Party confirmed the report and said the People's Liberation Army decided "to go into battle in order to punish Vietnamese for their repeated provocative actions and violence."

The party's bulletin described the action as "a systematic defensive warfare" and said Peking had no intention of occupying Vietnamese territory, according to Japan's Kyodo news service.

Japanese Foreign Ministry officials said Japan's embassy in Peking was unable to determine the full extent of the Chinese action, and it was not possible to contact the embassy in Hanoi.

In Washington, the State Department said it had no independent knowledge of the fighting. "We are following this," a spokesman said.

Vietnam's Premier Pham Van Dong was out of the country when the Chinese attacked. He was visiting Phnom Penh to discuss the China situation with Sang Sannir, the Cambodian rebel leader whom the Vietnamese aided in his own war last month.

A correspondent of the Japanese Communist Party newspaper "Akahata" (Red Flag) in a report from Hanoi said the Chinese launched the attack simultaneously in the four provinces at about 4:30 a.m. local time.

By noon, the report said, Chinese forces supported by aircraft, tanks and artillery were continuing the attack, with Vietnamese forces staging fierce counter-attacks. The Chinese occupied a guard post at the capital city of Dong Dang county in Lang Son province and artillery attacks were under way near the provincial capital of Lang Son, the Akahata report said.

MIAMI (UPI) — Dade County School Board member Ben Sheppard said Friday he'll accept sex education in the public schools but only if the word "sex" isn't spelled out in the title of the course.

Sheppard, a strong opponent of sex education, thinks sex courses should be called "Human Development."

Some members of a citizens' committee established to make recommendations on the subject privately said Sheppard is afraid to "call a spade a spade." Sheppard told the committee not to refer to the program as a course in human sexuality although a high school junior publicly chastised him for his opinion.

"If you don't use the word 'sexuality' in the title of the course you already are saying it is an unspeakable issue," said Matt Page. Sheppard admitted later he was "playing politician" with the subject.

"Sure we are avoiding the issue. But there are people, even on the committee, who are opposed to what we are trying to do," he said. Committee members agreed not to call the course "Human Sexuality" but did not decide on a permanent name.

Dade schools do not have a uniform sex education program. Lessons in physiology and anatomy are taught in science, health and home economics classes. The committee is trying to develop a mandatory program for students in kindergarten through the 10th grade with the course electives in 11th and 12th.

Headstart Teacher Claims 'Discrimination, Harassment'

A teacher in the Headstart program, Mrs. Ada Sires, has filed a letter with the Seminole County Community Action (SCCA) Board of Directors charging "discrimination" in the administration of the program and "harassment and intimidation" to some employees.

William Carpenter, President of SCCA, has asked Mrs. Sires and the mothers to document complaints with times, dates, places and circumstances for consideration by the board.

And John Moore, SCCA vice president, has asked the complaints will be looked into. The SCCA directors, after a prolonged meeting Thursday night, heard the complaints from Mrs. Sires and the mothers made at the directors were about to adjourn.

The Headstart program is the oldest in SCCA's 15 years of existence and the program was started in 1964 by SCCA. No complaints have ever been filed against the program in its 15-year history.

Mrs. Sires, accompanied by four mothers of children in the Headstart program at Bushburn — Kaye Lee, Marilyn Palmer, Patricia Morris and Frances Campbell — told the board while she is dedicated to the program, she found morale at a very low ebb after many discussions with staff members.

"We have been told by our executive director (Mrs. Sires) if we did not like what was happening in our program to get out," she said, adding, however, "Walking away from a problem does not solve it."

"It is not my idea to close Headstart, but help make it a program that we can be proud of, not one that is making enemies and hiding our heads in the sand."

"When someone wants to improve our system, the better way of members of this organization is that you are working against the poor and unfortunate people. This is pure harassment," Mrs. Sires said. "I refuse to be the villain. My intentions are devoted to returning to the original goals of Headstart — helping children, parents and community."

She listed her grievances as follows: "no retirement plan, no clear understanding of employment compensation, no representation of workers, no wage scale-no set rule, low pay — the gap is too wide between staff and administration, too much paper work-over 30 different forms — multiply this times the amount of children in each classroom; no staff meetings, unfair hiring practices, no efficient method of record keeping in office, discrimination against age, no career development — no career ladder and career advancement in program, medical records in office rarely get in doctor, harassment and intimidation to some employees, no input in supply needs, personnel policy does not apply to Headstart employees — it is interpreted and enforced at administration's will."

Mrs. Sires said a headstart teacher is paid about \$9,000 a year. According to Mrs. Anne Jones, SCCA executive director, Mrs. Sires' salary is \$14,500 annually.

Mrs. Sires said today the crux of the problem is that Mrs. Sires sought the position of social services for the handicapped director and didn't receive it.

"When Mrs. Sires applied, she called me on the telephone and said if I didn't see it that she got the job, she would make trouble for me. It sounded like a threat to me," Mrs. Sires said.
