Calming Life's Storms

There is a most interesting passage in John 4:1-21. It is the story of Jesus walking on the water, and calming the storm which threatened His disciples. However, in reading this passage, let us consider not just one, but three storms which raged.

First, there was a storm raging in the life of Jesus. To realize this, we must understand the tremendous pressure being put upon Him by those who wanted Him to conform to their concept of the Messiah. The Jewish nation had been looking for a Messiah who would deliver them from the power of Rome. They had just witnessed His marvelous power as He had multiplied the five loaves and two fishes to feed thousands.

Then Jesus was bringing again upon Christ the storm of temptation. He was attempting to turn Him from the path that led to Calvary to a path that would mean the crown and honor of man. He was holding before Him a crown of gold, and tempting Him to accept it rather than a crown of thorns.

Then when the storm of wind and waves lashed upon them, they thought they were about to lose their very lives. Could there be a remedy for such a storm of despondency and fear? The remedy was the presence of Jesus. He came walking to them on the water, and when they were "willing to take Him into the boat," the storm ended. He had calmed them by saying, "Be not afraid, it is I." The presence of Jesus calmed the storm of fear. His presence in our lives is the remedy for today's storms of fear and uncertainty.

Finally, His power calmed the storm on the lake. It was much like an earlier occasion when He had been in their little boat sleeping as they crossed the sea. A storm so violent that they cried, "We are perishing!" had swept upon them. He arose from His rest, and with the regal majesty that was His as the Creator of all things He commanded those very elements which He had made, and "suddenly there was a great calm, and the wind ceased, and the sea was glassy as if God had hushed it."

Here we find the answer to life's storms: prayer — the presence of Christ — the power of the Creator in our lives!

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# A Citizen's Alert

Remember the voters are with you and you should be able to influence the continuing reversion. This phenomenon means that you have been selected by the voters to play a role in the government and administration, and demands your attention. When the voters of New Hampshire learned the blunders of a late winter storm, trudged into the polling booths and made their choice for Democratic or Republican standard-bearers they did so in a mood of serious which had already reached the voting area.

In an over-simplification of the result it can be logically assumed that two great issues dominated the election. One is the national and local side over the Vietnam war. The other the lack of foresight, candid leadership by the administration in coping with the domestic challenge of crime in the streets and violence in the cities.

What then is the part of the voter, the Sanforidian citizen who is not only aware of these national crises but is willing to do his part? To us it is simple - yet complex; easy to define - hard to practice.

The first obligation is to keep informed. The news columns of our newspaper and every other means of mass communication to know what the candidates for all elective offices want you to know. Then sift the chaff from the wheat.

The second obligation is one which we applaud in our friends and neighbors, yet find it hard to apply to ourselves: keep objective, appraise candidates on the basis of past performance and present deeds, not on rosy promises which are out of line with the record.

Third, and most important, we believe it is for you to be one of the most critical, controversial, discerning and passion-dominated presidential elections in years, then we are also offered the opportunity to participate.

How are your political muscles? Try flexing them now in these preliminary months before the main event. There is no doubt that your political strength, your political knowledge, your political judgment will be needed before the November election day dawn.

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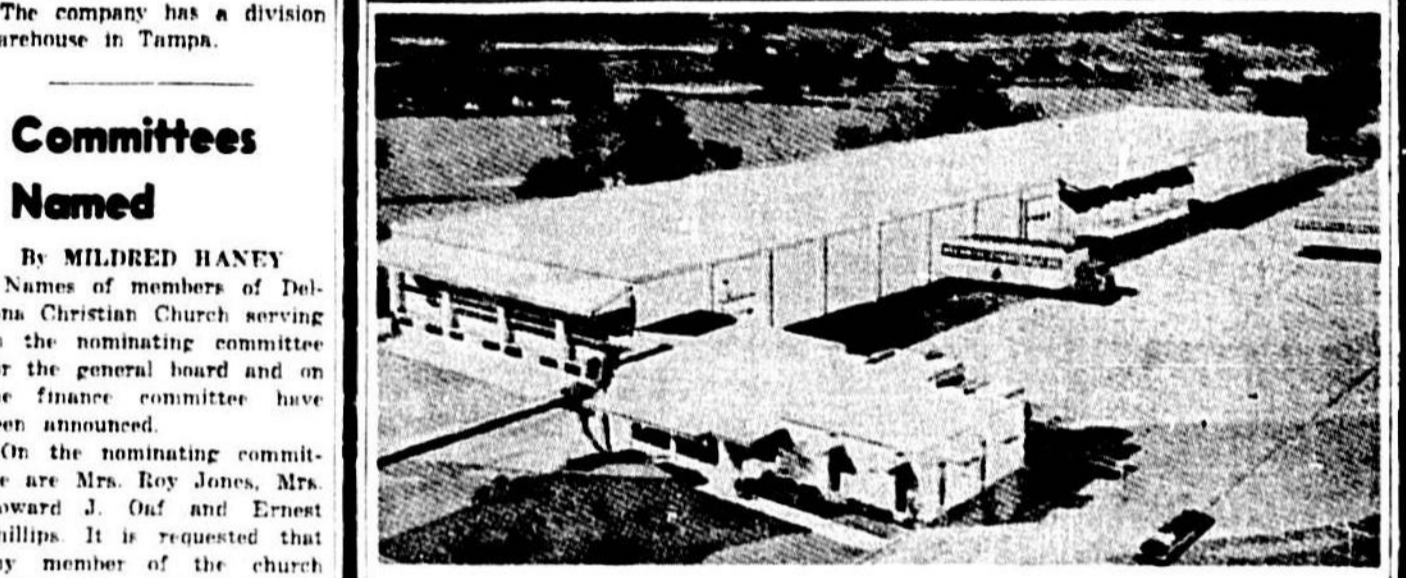

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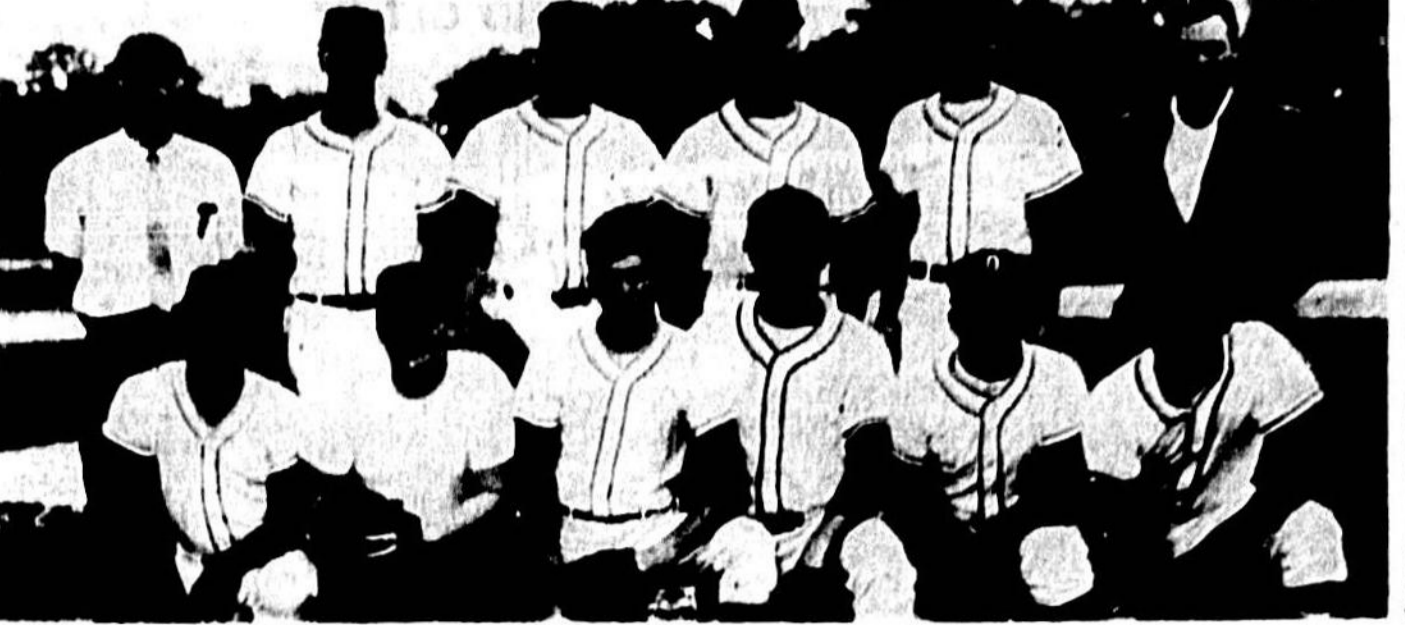
