The Miami Herald further takes issue with the Tampa Tribune, which reprinted the Variety article, for giving either circulation to these malicious "falsehoods" and then declares: "The facts are of course, that there is no such thing as gambling in or around Miami as the mendacious correspondent of Variety tells his readers. The whole story is pure fiction, written for the purpose of revenue only, and the Tribune ought to know and probably does know, that it is utterly and completely false."

We hope that the Miami Herald has not erred in its estimation of moral conditions in the Magic City, for surely even in a tourist resort there should be some limit to what gambling is permitted and certainly no wide-open city, such as depicted in Variety, could long prosper or endure. If Variety's indictment is wholly without foundation, it constitutes a vicious and malicious attack, and should, it seems to us, be vigorously prosecuted.
