CHICAGO, Apr. 7 (47)-Mo-torists suspected of driving while drunk may argue with the arreating cop that they are sober -but not with the findings of the drunkometers.

Drunkometers and similar devices for testing the intoxica tion of metarists now are in use in several cities. The American Municipal Association said they operate with great accuracy.

The test is simple. The susmeasured quantity of breath into rubber bag. The air passes through a series of tubes con taining chemicals. The chemical reaction determines the alcoholic content of the blood.

Six shots of whisky or six bottles of beer boost the alcoholic content of the average person's blood to .15 per cent. At that point, the association said, there is no question about intoxics-
