College Birth Rate

Dr. Clarence J. Gamble, in the current number of the Journal of Heredity, gives figures to prove that college-educated people are failing to reproduce themselves.

He gives as reasons for the falling birthrate among highly educated people the high cost of children, the fact that the small fry interfere with the pursuit of success, and, among women, the fact that their education tends to turn them away from homemaking as a career.

Among these reasons, the expense of raising children alone seems convincing. The medical care of a child becomes more elaborate and expensive year by year.

The trouble is said to be that they rely too much on elbow-grease. By using modern electrical equipment they could reduce their average weekly cleaning time by 36 per cent and remove 186 per cent more dirt.

Canada's solution of this problem consists of a subsidy for each child above a certain number, and there are many large families in Canada. In most of Canada, also, some of these modern expenses are not considered necessary.

United States Line Completes Plan of Giant Ocean Liner

NEW YORK, Apr. 7 (AP)—The United States Line has completed plans for the largest, fastest and most luxurious passenger liner ever built in this country.

Although its 48,000 gross tonnage would be only slightly more than half that of Britain's "Queen" ships—the Mary and the Elizabeth—the proposed super-liner would carry as many passengers as the Queen Mary and about 200 fewer than the Queen Elizabeth.

Converted to emergency transport duties, the projected vessel could haul 12,000 troops. The 25,484-ton America, commissioned in 1940, cost \$17,000,000. It cruises at 22.5 knots.

THE WORLD TODAY

Russia's quick public apology for the Soviet-British plane disaster Monday in Germany created hopes that this might signal a general relaxation of the tension which developed recently between the Soviet and the Western allies in that zone.

The Russians today blamed the British for the collision between the Soviet fighter plane and the passenger ship, with the loss of 15 lives. The Bolsheviks charged that the British pilot violated regulations by flying over the Soviet traffic zone.

The Soviet authorities not only had apologized but had promised that hereafter allied planes would have unhindered access to Berlin. As a result, British Foreign Secretary Bevin, while preparing for immediate investigation of the disaster, felt able to tell the House of Commons regarding the general East-West dispute in Germany.

If there is good will, it is capable of solving the small question that qualifies "If."

The Russians are treating the crash as an accident, and while that exact characterization might be questioned, the allies haven't quibbled over the term. It appears from the testimony of six witnesses for the allies that the pilot of the Red fighter plane was trying to harass the transport by diving at it.

It means they were afraid this shocking incident might cause a rupture of the peace, coming as it did when East-West relations already were tense. So they did what they rarely do—they apologized.

This alleged "buzzing" of the British transport with its precious freight fitted perfectly the strong-arm methods the Reds have been employing recently in Germany against the Americans.

But observers generally take the view that the latest Moscow exhibition of studied insult—certainly involving the holding up of allied trains for examination, and perhaps the buzzing of the British transport—have had another purpose.

And now the Russians, having perhaps seen a grave development by quick apology for the plane crash, apparently are reverting to their old tactics.

Justice Hobson Takes Supreme Court Seat

TALLAHASSEE, Apr. 7 (AP)—With a complete absence of ceremony, T. Frank Hobson of St. Petersburg yesterday took his seat as the newest and youngest member of the Florida Supreme Court.

Judge Hobson, for 20 years a circuit judge, was appointed to the Supreme Court by Governor Caldwell 10 days ago to succeed Justice Rivers H. Buford, who retired.

He had been delayed in taking office by the requirement that he rule in several lower cases he heard before he was named to the Supreme Court.

In line with the Supreme Court's traditional practice in seating new members, there were no formalities. Circuit Judge John U. Bird administered oath to Justice Hobson in St. Petersburg Monday, and he filed a written oath with the Secretary of State yesterday.

Young Comedian Is Realizing Profits Of Sound Nonsense

NEW YORK (AP)—Sid Caesar is a young comedian who discovered that nonsense sounds make sound financial sense.

One of the first true comedians of the machine age, Sid has parlayed his talents from a \$17 a week job as a theater doorman to star billing in the musical show, "Make Mine Manhattan."

He can do "doubletalk" in any language and imitate any of the noises and machines that complicate modern life—from a subway turnstile to a hand grenade.

"Right now I'm working up a skit in which I play the life of a white-walled tire," he said.

In his present Broadway job—his first break in big time here—he is so busy he meets himself coming on and off the stage.

"I'm in nine scenes, have 22 changes in costume, play 23 characters and have to do 15 vocal sound effects," he said the other day at Lindy's, a place where people go to eat breakfast for lunch.

"On matinees I have 44 costume changes, and get all worn out just putting on clothes and taking them off."

Caesar is a tall, good looking guy from Yonkers who used to dream of becoming a great musician. He worked as a doorman here for several months before getting with a jazz band.

During the war he served in the Coast Guard. His burlesque of airplane movies in the Coast Guard show "Stars and Spars" won him a Hollywood contract.

Sid liked the film colony money, but couldn't stand the inactivity between film assignments. "What a life," he said. "They were paying me more in a week than I had been getting in a year with the Coast Guard. But what did I do? Play a game of tennis, then jump in the pool. Play a round of golf, then jump in the pool. Take a ride in my car—and back into the pool again. It was driving me nuts."

U.N. Observers Come Under Guerrilla Fire

KASTANIANI, Greece, Apr. 7 (AP)—United Nations observers watching the southern Albanian border came under fire early yesterday when Greek guerrillas defending Mount Murgana unexpectedly struck at this frontier village.

At least 70 mortar shells and hundreds of machinegun bullets crashed into Kastaniani in a three-hour attack. One Greek soldier was wounded. The firing began after observers for the U.N. special commission on the Balkans and this correspondent had watched the lights of trucks which apparently had brought guerrilla supplies to the border from Albania.

Blood found near one Greek army outpost indicated there had been some guerrilla loss. Battered Kastaniani was recaptured a month ago from the guerrillas.

Armenian Healer And Servants Held

MIAMI, Apr. 7 (AP)—Avak Hagopian, 21, Armenian faith healer, and his two servants were arrested yesterday by immigration authorities on warrants charging them with being in the country illegally.

They were expected to be released shortly on bonds of \$500 each pending a hearing at which time they will be asked to show cause why they should not be deported. The immigration office here said no date for the hearing had been set.

Vinas given Avak and his servants, Simed Eghiazarian and Gevork Snakian, expired last Thursday midnight. Warrants for their arrests were issued Monday.

There was a report at Avak's hotel that he and the servants were prepared to leave for Cuba if they were ordered deported.
