

Mob Burns Negro Who Killed White Planter

ROLLING FORK, Miss., July 7.—(AP)—A Sharkey county posse of 30 men yesterday shot and killed Tom Kreen, 48-year-old negro blacksmith, dragged his body several miles, then burned it on the spot where earlier in the day the negro had killed R. Purdy Flanagan, prominent white planter.

The expedition ended in tragedy when their small boat upset. Wakefield was swept away. Hunt was injured but reached shore and wandered all night in a rattlesnake-infested wilderness.

Reports were that the negro and Flanagan fought when Green refused to do work the plantation manager ordered. Flanagan fired him and began setting traps. Flanagan came to a rifle among the traps and the negro claimed it. The planter refused to give it to him and the negro drew a pistol and fired, wounding Flanagan in the jaw. The white man returned the fire, hitting the negro in the side. Again the negro shot, the bullets striking Flanagan in the heart and killing him.

Maple Syrup Cake (A. New Eng. and Favorite) 1-2 cup butter 2-3 cup maple 1-2 cup granu. syrup lated sugar 2 1-3 cups pastry flour 3 egg yolks 4 teaspoons baking powder 1 teaspoon salt 3 egg whites, beaten Cream butter and sugar together until they are very soft and creamy. Add yolks, vanilla, salt, milk, syrup, flour and baking powder. Beat for two minutes. Fold in the egg whites. Half-fill hayer cake pans which have been fitted with waxed papers. Bake for 25 minutes in a moderate oven. (About 375 degrees.) Maple Frosting 2-3 cup granu. 2 tab. spoons lated sugar butter 1 cup maple 1-2 cup water syrup 1-2 teaspoon vanilla Boil slowly, stirring frequently, sugar, butter and water. When a soft ball forms as a portion is poured into cold water, remove from the heat. Let stand for 15 minutes. Add vanilla and beat until creamy. Frost the cake.

Chinese, Japs Deadlocked On Yangtze Front

Forces Engaged Near Hukow In What May Be Decisive Battle In Year Old War

Insurgent Advance Halted At Teruel

Germany Wants Evacuation Of 40,000 Persons By Aug. 1

A year of war in the Orient ended today with China and Japan in what may be death grips for one or the other. In Europe, while Spain's warring brothers approached their third year of fighting, conferees of democratic nations met to ease the suffering of the oppressed.

Armies of China and Japan were deadlocked along the Yangtze River about Hukow and Kiang, 450 miles inland from Shanghai and 150 miles from Hankow, Chinese provincial capital.

Japan holds about one third of China's soil after a year of victories in which the Chinese forces have been persistently pushed into the interior. But

Building Permits During June More Than Year Ago

Fines Collected By Police Drop Under Same Month In 1937

Building permits issued by the city during June numbered 17 and amounted to \$3560 while permits issued during the same month a year ago amounted to \$2838, a difference of \$722.

Police fines during June amounted to \$472 while fines collected during the same month of last year amounted to \$175.78. Fines collected this June were \$3.78 short of that collected last June.

Electric permits issued numbered five and amounted to \$9.00. Plumbing permits issued numbered four and amounted to \$12.50. There were no plumbing or electric permits issued during June of last year.

The record of arrests by the Police Department shows one arrested for petit larceny, 11 for drunkenness, 25 for disorderly conduct, two for drunkenness and disorderly conduct, one for keeping a disorderly house.

Eight were arrested for being inmates of a disorderly house, five were held for investigation, five were arrested for reckless driving, four for gambling, two or exceeding the speed limit, one for assault, one for selling liquor without a license.

Two were arrested for operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquor, six were arrested for doing business without a license, three for breaking and entering, four for pilfering and loitering, one for shop lifting, three for running a red light.

The total number arrested came to 92 but 24 were dismissed and 10 cases were transferred to other courts or counties.

Warship Sent By Britain To Scene Of Riots

28 Are Killed, Over 100 Hurt In Blood-Jew Holy Land Clashes

The British government ordered the 7500-ton cruiser *Emerald* to Haifa today. Official sources said the two days of rioting had resulted in deaths of 22 Arabs and 22 Jews and that 92 Arabs and 11 Jews had been wounded.

All Palestine was tense. Shops were closed as Arabs attempted to burn the consulate.

The outbreak was one of the bloodiest in the long history of Arab-Jewish clashes in the Holy Land which each group considers its national and spiritual homeland.

Rioting broke out during the evening rush hour when crowds were hurrying home. Witnesses said after the bomb exploded police constables opened fire on the crowds, causing a majority of the casualties.

British authorities of the troubled Palestine mandate considered a new imposition of martial law as the violence, which broke out a week ago with the execution of the first Jew to be hung in Jerusalem since 1916, began to spread into other cities and rural areas.

Jerusalem, Haifa and Tel Aviv already are under strict curfew (Continued on page five)

Trial Coach Rate Hike Is Granted To Eastern Railroads

WASHINGTON, July 7.—(AP)—The Interstate Commerce Commission yesterday reversed an earlier decision and authorized eastern railroads to increase passenger coach rates from 2 to 2 1/2 cents a mile for an 18-month trial period.

The carriers, which had been agitating for the increase for some time, estimated it will increase their sagging revenues \$40,000,000 annually. The commission turned down their plea by a one-vote margin on March 6, but today's action was forecast two weeks ago when a 5 percent general increase in pullman fares was granted.

The action came a few hours after President Whitney of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen said after a conference with President Roosevelt that if the national railroads would violate nothing but self transportation they could save \$700,000,000 to \$800,000,000 a year.

The new rates will go into effect 10 days after the new tariff schedule is filed. It was expected the roads would draw up the schedule soon, possibly within a week.

The decision does not affect suburban, or commutation, traffic where there is no interstate business. However, the ICC hopes that state commissions will see their way clear to grant the same increase for intrastate traffic.

Stating that while results from the present fare basis in the east and the recent increase in southern coach fares are not conclusive, the commission said, however, that further hearings were not necessary to prove that "in this time of business stagnation the eastern increase will result in higher revenues."

Landon Declares Depression Is Purely Political

COUNCIL BLUFFS, Iowa, July 7.—(AP)—Alf W. Landon charged last night the present depression is "purely political" and was brought on by methods and policies of the Roosevelt administration.

Replying to President Roosevelt's recent fire-side address, the 1936 Republican presidential nominee charged "the President's speech as 'the new deal version of why we have 12,000,000 people unemployed'."

Presenting the first of a series of talks he is expected to deliver during the coming congressional campaign, Landon spoke over a nation-wide radio network and in a crowd, estimated by Republicans to be of 500, of about 100,000 people at a

NLRB Told Ford Should Bargain With CIO Union

Dudley Proposes Enforcing Re-Employment Of 192 Workers

WASHINGTON, July 7.—(AP)—An examiner for the Labor Relations Board told the board today it should order the Ford Motor Company to bargain collectively with the United Automobile Workers Union (CIO) at the St. Louis assembly plant.

The board ruled last night that the Muskin Shoe Company, Westminister, Md., violated the Wagner act when it permitted an employee to distribute a pamphlet containing an attack upon the Committee for Industrial Organization by Representative Clare Hoffman, Republican, Michigan.

The NLRB said Hoffman's "address contained a tirade against the CIO, and, as reprinted, was embellished by news pictures with anti-CIO captions." It was included in a pamphlet entitled "Communism's Iron Grip on the CIO" which the board said was published by the Constitutional Educational League, Inc., New Haven, Conn.

"It is evident from the pamphlet itself that it was prepared as anti-union literature and any distribution thereof by an employer is prohibited," the board said.

STOCKS AGAIN ROAR

NEW YORK, July 7.—(AP)—A stampede to buy rail shares gave Wall Street one of the biggest trading days in recent years and the market closed up 100 points.

There were 222,000 Highway railroad shares traded on July 7, the largest volume since 1929.

France Puts On Bolder Front After Daladier Takes Reins

PARIS, July 7.—(AP)—When quick-tempered Edmond Daladier was named premier of France on April 10, his country faced another financial crisis, there was another outbreak of strikes and the foreign situation was reaching the crisis stage again because of the Austrian trouble.

"No one cherishes democracy more than I who come from the working classes," declared Daladier in one of his speeches.

"But," he warned Frenchmen in another, "unless the nation goes to work, France may expect a dictator to take it over."

Three days after he took office he was voted power to rule by decree. That meant that the blue-eyed, stocky Daladier, although he had little power in comparison with a Hitler or a Mussolini, was "temporary dictator" of France.

The premier went to work to restore the Frenchman's confidence in his country's ability to hold its place in the sun. He appealed to French patriotism in a way that Frenchmen could not ignore.

"War threatens Europe," he said in effect, "and France has been weakened. We must work to make a strong France, or France is lost."

He strengthened the nation's armed forces, solidified an alliance with Britain as an offset to the Berlin-Rome axis, laid the base for a three-year economic program and brought about at least temporary peace between capital and labor.

He also devalued the franc nine percent and raised all taxes eight percent. Both actions were unpopular with Frenchmen, but he seemed to have convinced the nation that both were necessary. And he has cut tourists' costs to help bring money into the country.

Daladier played no favorites. He increased tax decrees hit capital hard, but he hit labor too when he told it the 40-hour week law could not be carried out to the letter.

On May 14 a defense loan of \$140,000,000 was announced. The next day the government reported that the French people had oversubscribed the loan. On May 24 the government came through (Continued on page three)

Kidnaper Is Denied Plea For Clemency; One Will Now Sign Warrant For Death

Decision Reached After Short Meet

Mrs. J.B. Cash Refuses Mrs. McCall's Request To Aid Son

TALLAHASSEE, July 7.—(AP)—The Florida Pardon Board refused today to commute the death sentence of Franklin Pierce McCall for the \$10,000 ransom kidnaping of James Bailey Cash, Jr., at Princeton, Fla., on May 29.

Its decision was announced after a brief executive session following a plea by McCall's attorney for commutation, and by his prosecutor that the death sentence be carried out. The board's decision was announced without comment and came after a 15 minute deliberation.

The next step will be for Gov. Fred P. Cone to sign the death warrant unless this is delayed by some court action.

McCall pleaded guilty to kidnaping the child, who also was killed. He did not appeal to the supreme court after he was sentenced but his attorney indicated there might be an appeal.

McCall's wife and mother, and parents of the Cash child attended the pardon board hearing but did not make personal statements to the board.

Mrs. McCall and Mrs. Cash talked briefly before the board's session started, and Mrs. McCall said she had sought unsuccessfully to have Mrs. Cash join her in seeking to have her son from the electric chair. She said Mrs. Cash refused.

She said Mrs. Cash told her "Your son not only killed my son, but he figuratively killed my husband and me. No penalty can pay for the crime or relieve us of our misery."

The plea for McCall was made by Attorney C. A. Avriett of Jasper, Fla., the 21-year-old kidnaping's former home.

Avriett contended McCall could not be sentenced to death because he did not have a trial by jury. When McCall pleaded guilty, the trial judge heard the testimony without a jury.

State Attorney G. A. Worley of Miami who acted as prosecutor at McCall's trial opposed the clemency, saying there was not a single extenuating circumstance in McCall's favor.

Morgan Files Suit To Retain Position As TVA Chairman

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., July 7.—(AP)—Dr. Arthur E. Morgan filed suit in Knox county chancery court yesterday challenging the right of President Roosevelt to remove him as chief of the New TVA and asking that he be recognized as a member and chairman of the board of directors of the federal agency.

The former president of Antioch College, asserted in the bill he had never recognized the President's right and power to remove him as chief of the New TVA's great experiment in social and economic planning.

He asked payment of back salary since his removal by the President Mar. 22, 1938, and a declaratory judgment voiding the President's removal order and forcing Directors H. A. Morgan and David E. Lillenthal to recognize him "as a member and chairman of the board of directors of the defendant, Tennessee Valley Authority."

The bill named the TVA and Directors H. A. Morgan and Lillenthal as defendants.

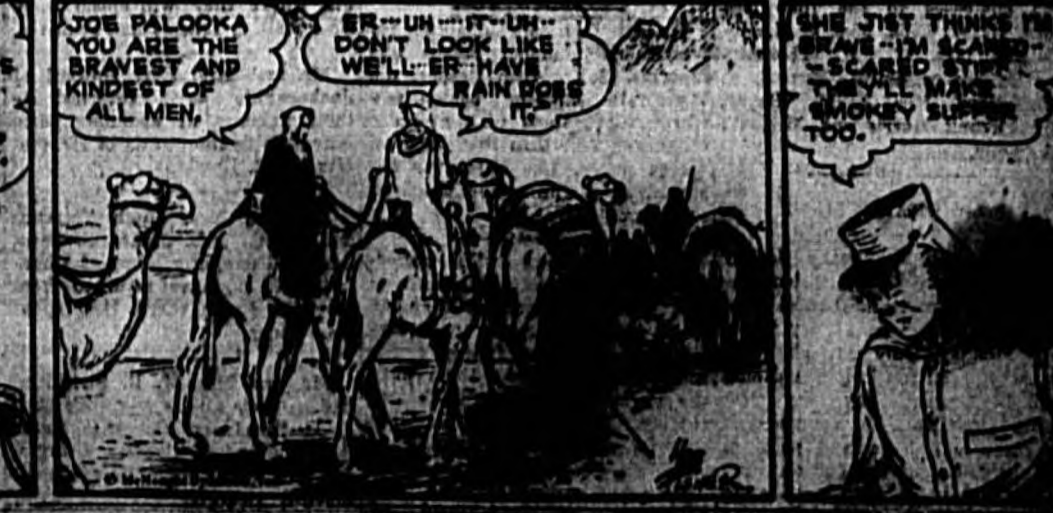

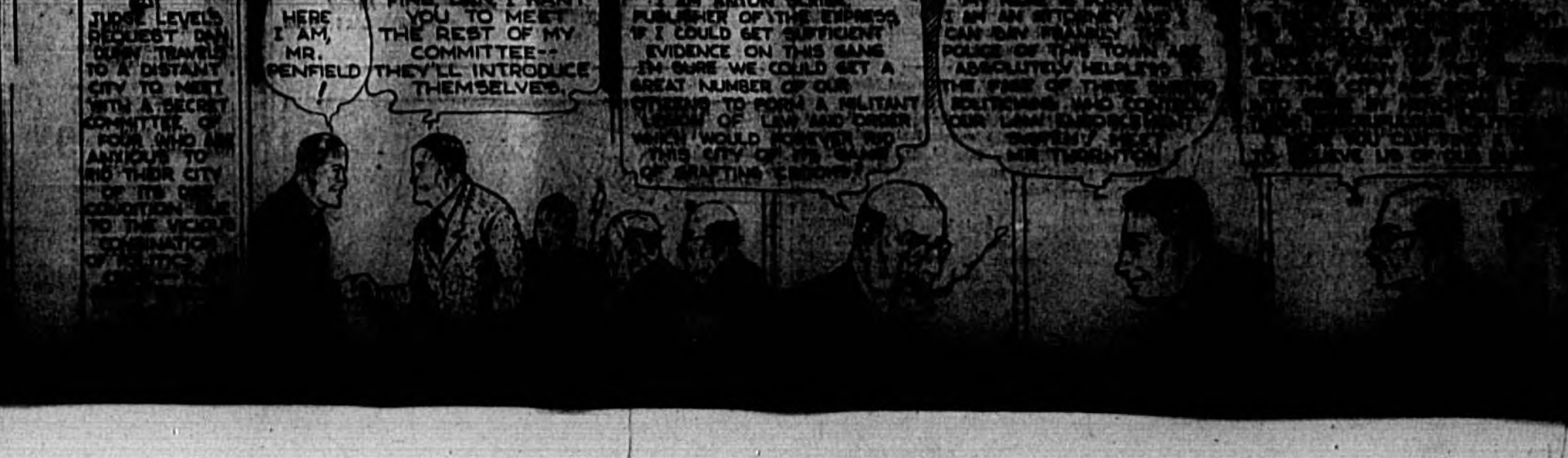

Blockade Runners Keep Traditions Of Spanish Main

Seaman Carrying Aid To Loyalists Face Rebel Air Attacks

By HENRY C. CASSIDY
PORT VENDRES, France, Near the Spanish Frontier.—The tradition of adventure on the Spanish Main is being kept alive by seamen carrying aid to the embattled Spanish government.

Imagine riding a cargo of high explosives in Valencia harbor, with insurgent air bombs sending up spouts of water around you, and you have an idea of what blockade runners experience now in waters where old-time buccannery would be a minor nuisance.

That traffic is mounting between French and Spanish governmental ports as the insurgent forces tighten their ring around Catalonia and broaden their wedge toward Valencia.

Men of many nationalities — British, British and other races of Europe — are carrying the bombs of industry and the torpedoes of submarines to carry supplies to the government coast.

Take, for example, the little British tramp steamer S. S. Stangrove of London, with a single black stack sticking up out of 620 blistered tons of freight.

Aboard her are 15 men: the Welsh captain, Robert Dowman, a veteran of 50 years at sea; five Estonians, three Frenchmen, two Englishmen, one Canadian, one Pole, one Norwegian and one Dane.

The Canadian, dark and wiry, with a beret, turtle-necked sweater and pants of navy blue, calls himself Tom Evans of Toronto. He first went "to sea" on the Great Lakes, at the age of 15 during summer vacations from high school.

"I've been in eight bombardments," he said, "and I've never heard more from the enemy than we passed ports and board ships."

"Closest shave we've had was last November. We were just going alongside with a cargo of cigarette lighters, shoes and socks, when the planes came over and started bombing the port. They dropped 50 bombs around us, but never hit us."

"Another time, we came into Valencia. They started to bomb. Six men on the quay ran down a tunnel, and a bomb lit right over them. Five of those men they never found. The sixth—a piece of shrapnel went right through his head."

"Once we went into Valencia with 300 tons of TNT from Rotterdam and Amsterdam. About 2 A. M., they came over with the planes."

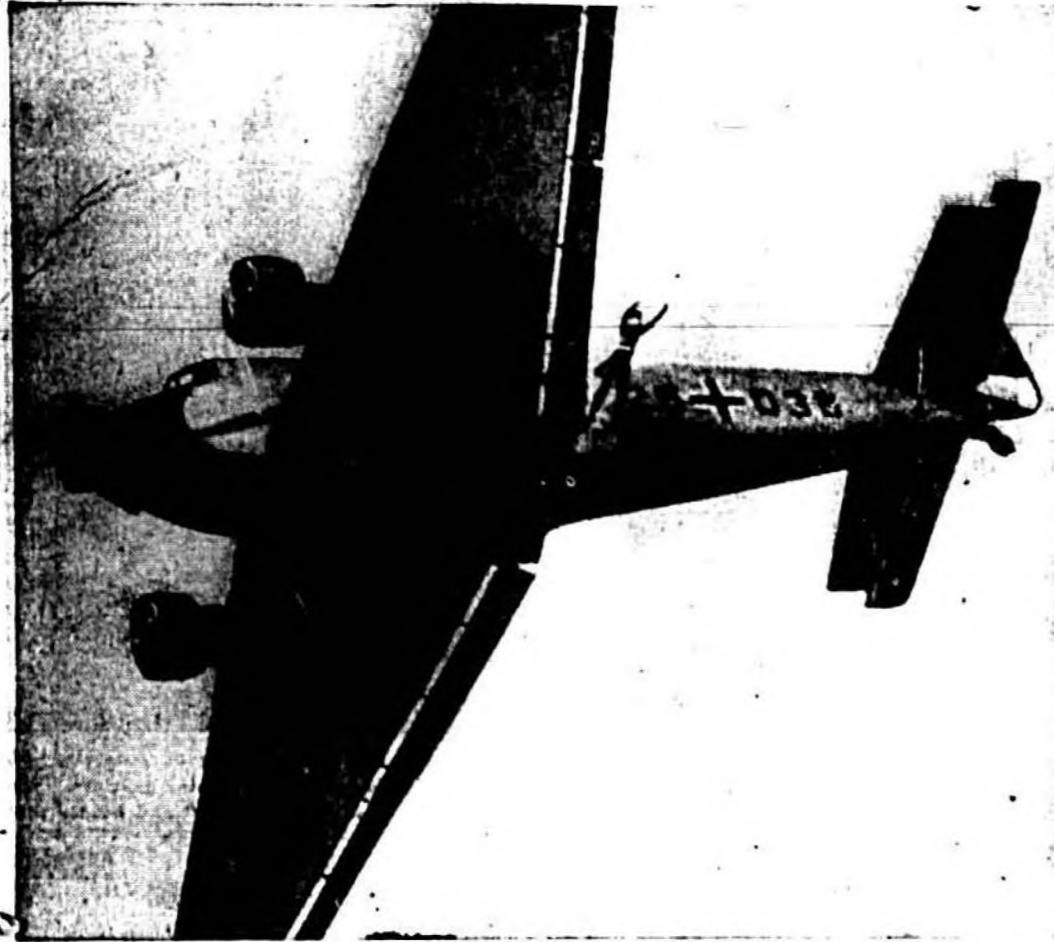
"At that time, all the ships used to go out in the harbor at night, to anchor away from all this. But we had stayed at the dock. The warehouse alongside was full of TNT and so were we. Some bombs dropped near."

"The next night, with some TNT still on, the captain took the ship out in the harbor with me even waiting for a pilot."

"Stangrove came to Port Vendres this time from Burriana with a cargo of oranges—"It took us 10 days to get the cargo because the planes came over and scared the dockers," Evans said—and left for Marseille to pick up mail for Barcelona."

"With the hazards, the men they go for high pay. It's usually over \$100 a month, plus a share of the cargo. The control of the sea out war material. They still must shade the cargo from reaching governmental ports."

"I've seen whose average pay is about \$16 a week and they receive double wages from 10 hours before they enter a Spanish port until 24 hours after they leave it."
