## Political season: Bringing out the best and worst

SANFORD — Political races bring out the best and worst in the candidates.

Strong records are often questioned in debate and accusations fly when the campaigning becomes intense. Quite often it's not only the candidates who are doing those things, but rather the voters searching for answers about who should or should not receive their endorsements.

Sometimes in their search, people turn to the newspaper to

vent their frustrations or to find answers to those questions raised by the opponent of the candidate they favor or that have come about in their research on a particular candidate.

We will here attempt to provide answers to many of the questions posed to us through your letters.

●**Sheriff's race**  
On questions regarding Joe Becker's career as a Navy pilot,

Becker said, "I served as a Flight Instructor in both F-4 Phantom and the F-14 Tomcat aircraft and flew 147 Vietnam

combat missions in jet fighters off aircraft carriers operating in the Tonkin Gulf as a Naval Flight Officer and Mission



Commander."

On Joe Becker's law enforcement experience,

Becker said, "I am presently serving as a pilot and Reserve Police Officer with Matland Police Department."

On the claim that Dan Eslinger and/or the Seminole County have been named in 82 lawsuits since his appointment as sheriff six years ago,

Eslinger said, "There have been 26 lawsuits since I've taken office. We've won 20, four are still pending, two have been covered by our self insurance. The 82 came from the files we

have created on other candidates. They are 100% paid lawsuits."

NOTE: by comparison, during the last four years, Seminole County Sheriff Bob Williams' department has had 100 lawsuits named in its jurisdiction, of those have been named in the county.

On the incident that happened in Orlando last year, Eslinger which Eslinger said he apologized a fellow audience member.

Eslinger said, "I never happened. Do you really think that?"

## Just for the birds Island is sanctuary to many

For a dollar and change you can briefly glimpse the island in the middle of Lake Jesup while traveling south on the GreenWay. Without a boat that says lose as you can get.

Members of the Seminole Audubon Chapter recently did get closer and enjoyed a surprisingly up-close look at the inhabitants of the island as they loitered around the island.

The official name of the privately owned island, recorded on county records, is Lane Isle, but most folks call it Bird Island, with good cause. Audubon members saw the willow trees and water locusts growing on the island's perimeter were full of twig nests. Predominant cattle egrets were displaying their

bright, breeding plumage, orange and buff on their backs and crowns, reddish bills and dusky red legs. Tricolored herons and golden footed snowy egrets were guarding their eggs in the colony, also. Great egrets, blue herons, anhingas and ibis flocked and roosted on the large trees in the island's center. Several black-necked stilts were seen, too.

Lake Jesup is one of the few remaining lakes in Florida where boaters can view a shoreline of cypress and other native Florida vegetation, not houses, boat docks and jet skis. The nutrient level of the lake is so high that vegetation is brimming over. The present abundance of food is great for ospreys, eagles, terns and other species. Biologists are warning, though, that the lake may be near the maximum

nutrient load. They fear that the lake may become over-loaded and fall victim to the same malady that afflicted Lake Apopka. The duck on the bottom of the lake is so high now that large amounts of nutrients enter the water when the lake level is lower during the dry season. Boat propellers mix it up to create even more pollution.

The Friends of Lake Jesup Committee, an environmental action group, has been analyzing the sources of Lake Jesup pollution and will make recommendations beginning this year for projects to improve the water quality. In the same vein, members of the Seminole Audubon Chapter would like to have Bird Island recognized as a breeding island for coastal water fowl and posted and protected. See Birds, Page 10A

## How the British see Sanford airport Recent national newspaper article lauds efforts

SANFORD — Time was when people in other parts of Florida had never even heard of Sanford unless they came through here on a Greyhound bus on the way to somewhere else.

But now, our little corner of the world is not only better known around the state, but is also the talk of holiday-makers across the pond in England.

A recent article in a national newspaper, *The Independent*, sang the praises of the Orlando Sanford Airport for international travelers coming to visit Central Florida.

Irving K. Dragosavac of Lake Mary has been telling his family in England about the superb airport practically in his own backyard, but they have continued to travel into Orlando when they have come to visit

"But my father saw this in *The Independent* and he thinks they may come into Sanford next time," Dragosavac said.

The article, written by Simon Heptinstall, praises Sanford for the friendly and efficient way in which the British tourists are treated at the facility.

Horror stories of four and five hour battles to get out of Orlando International Airport are contrasted with 10 to 50 minute exits from the Sanford facility.

Kate Burgess-Craddy, a spokesman for Unijet, is quoted in the article as saying her airline waited to see if Sanford could handle the large numbers of British tourists arriving each day.

"Although Sanford's much farther from downtown Orlando, passengers are getting to their hotels more quickly because it is more efficient."

Unijet will switch all of its charter flights from

Orlando to Sanford in November.

The story quotes one Orlando International executive as having "written off Sanford as little more than a shed and a windsock." Not so, said the article, which predicted the popularity of Sanford's facility would continue to increase.

Since Sanford opened the airport here to British operators, it has captured more than half the market between the United Kingdom and Florida. *The Independent* article noted: Five transatlantic flights arrive in Sanford from Britain each day.

The only downside reported about the Sanford airport was that passengers "must drive for 45 minutes on a toll road costing two pounds 75 (\$4.50) to reach Orlando city, whereas arrivals at the main airport have only a 15-mile trip.

The pleasant trip along the GreenWay is not portrayed as a big problem for visitors who are tired of the backups and high costs of traveling into Orlando International.

**Candidate responds**

Regarding your endorsement in the District One County Commission race, I wish to take issue on your claim that "Grant Maloy does not mention details on funding transportation." As I recall, you did not ask me details on funding transportation.

For the record, I believe it is wrong to look at problems such as transportation and decide that the only way to fix them is to raise taxes. The tax burden today in Seminole County is higher than it has ever been. If more spending were the answer, we should have no problems today.

I have many creative ideas on fixing transportation without additional funding.

- **Better Planning.** Red Bug Lake Road is a perfect example. The incumbent, which you support, throws away a half million dollar plan to 6-lane the road in favor of 4-laning the road. Then she approves a mail at the end of it that requires the 4 lanes to be ripped up and 6-laned.
- **Different Zoning Rules.** Use traditional zoning such as Park Avenue in Winter Park in some areas. Apartments can exist on top of retail stores which allow shop owners to be close to their work. It cuts community and crime.
- **Private Jet Service.** By deregulating taxi service you could slash prices much like when President Reagan deregulated airlines.
- **Change Road Construction Contracts.** Don't buy by low bid, but rather buy lowest price per guaranteed life expectancy of the road. It is cheaper in the long run.
- **No Light Rail System.** The County would

feebly waste millions on rail systems that are guaranteed to lose money. Our development is too spread out to justify rail transportation. In fact, current rails are being converted to jogging trails.

• **Rewards and Penalties.** If a road is over budget or delayed ... penalize the contractor. If it is completed ahead of time ... reward the contractor.

• **Discounts for the Greenway.** Many communities encourage the use of toll roads by discounting those who use it often. Our expressway is under-traveled and overpriced.

• **Encourage carpooling.** If the goal is to get cars off the street, then why not make the Greenway free to those who carpool with 3 or 4 passengers. It would relieve the stress on other roads.

• **Don't build unnecessary roads.** It is a waste of millions for the county to 6-lane Howell Branch Road, especially when Orange County has no plans to widen it on their side.

• **Clean up the road department.** Cost overruns, mismanagement and expensive equipment are standard practices in Seminole County.

I could go on. Every idea I have listed would either break even or save tax dollars. No new funding is necessary. If your goal is to endorse a candidate who can raise taxes then you made the right decision. I plan to bring something different to Seminole County Government.

I would perform my judicial duties with honor, impartiality, candor, fair play and diligence. I would uphold the integrity and independence of the judiciary.

## Endorsement recap

Sanford resident Sonny Raborn asked us in a recent letter why newspapers endorse political candidates. A fair question.

Years ago, citizens were not as educated, nor as worldly as we all are today. People without access to different sources of information relied on word-of-mouth and on the newspaper to inform them. Today, inundated by many sources of information on many subjects, many of us do not have the time to attend candidate debates. Candidate brochures may shed some light on the issues, but are often designed to place the sender in the best light, and the opponent in the worst.

We feel we now endorse candidates because newspaper reporters deal closely with incumbents in government offices. We follow the issues and report to you how decisions made will ultimately affect you. We ask questions of the challengers we feel you want answered.

In this year's county races, we based our endorsements on several points, including fiscal responsibility, a vision for Sanford and the county as seen from the post caught, a plan to implement that vision and a background that supports election to that office.

This year, we chose fiscal conservatives, because we believe that all facets of county government in recent years have been spending money impudently, money that comes from you, the taxpayer.

Our choices do not necessarily reflect the status quo, because we also believe in Thomas Jefferson's tenet that a community-minded business person should serve his or her government, bringing new ideas to the table, and then go back to the community with a sense of how government works, allowing another member of the community to serve.

We want all of our citizens to know that we have recapped our endorsements from the Herald. To recap our endorsements from the Herald:

**For Sheriff of Seminole County: Joe Becker...** For his distinguished military career as a decorated U.S. Navy captain, a leader in combat, coupled with his efficient plan to streamline a bloated budget and restore programs that traditionally and efficiently lead to arrests.

**Seminole County Commission, District 1: Pat Warren...** For her balanced eye toward development and environmentalism and her ability to listen to all sides of an issue.

**Seminole County Commission, District 5: Don Niebelas...** For his conservative money management skills, grasp of the issues, and for having Sanford's well-being first.

**Seminole County School Board, District 3: Bob Goff...** For his ability to make waves in behalf of students, even if the stance isn't a popular one, and his hardline position that the school board has been spending way too much money, and not on the students.

**Seminole County School Board, District 4: Larry Furlong...** For his long-time volunteer efforts to make kids' lives better in Seminole County, efforts we saw long before and will see long after any election.

**Checked the facts**

I know this is long, but I thought it extremely relevant to the race. Keep up the good work.

Ah yes, September 3 draws near. Soon the armies of Joe Becker and Don Eslinger will have their answer ... who will be the next Sheriff of Seminole County? Throughout this campaign, candidate loyalists for both camps have diligently promoted their leader with utmost zeal. It's actually been quite entertaining as each new day brings new "facts" distorting the previous day's "facts" which are in themselves, often beset with numerical inconsistencies.

I have followed this race closely for the last six months and have painstakingly investigated various allegations raised on behalf of both parties. Let's take an in-depth look at some interesting points of both candidates.

Mr. Eslinger touts his Seminole Neighborhood Policing (SNP) "not tough" jail program. SNP is a program where inmates grow their own vegetables; have no weight equipment and live in tents; the response time is "4" times faster than when he took office; and finally the "fact" that crime is down in the unincorporated Seminole County by 25%.

Mr. Becker has based his platform on three primary points, frivolous budget increases totaling 40% over the last five years; an 82% failure rate in violent crime solving; and an overwhelming (83%) dissatisfaction of current Seminole County employees with their boss, Don Eslinger.

It's hard to distinguish the facts, isn't it? I've talked with members of both campaigns ... assured by both that their candidate is "in touch" and providing "truth in disclosure" information to the voting public. What to do? I called the candidates' sources.

Let's look first at Mr. Eslinger's "truth meter."

I contacted deputies who actually execute the "Seminole Neighborhood Policing" policy. In theory, as related to me, it looks like a great idea. In reality, however, it has resulted in a false sense of complacency since there isn't enough time for a deputy to (1) take the call, (2) write up the report, (3) investigate the incident, (4) arrest the individual and (5) while doing 1-4, go to court and answer the next day's call! This could relate to Mr. Becker's assertion that crimesolving is atrocious in Seminole County.

Mr. Eslinger states response times are four times faster since he took office. Mr. Becker's office provided me with actual response time data taken over a random 1995 four-month period, and based on my investigations and verification, Mr. Eslinger's statement cannot be substantiated.

Mr. Eslinger states "If it is good enough for our military, it's good enough for our inmates." He is speaking of the recently publicized "prisoner in tents" policy. I must agree I thought it a good idea also. Upon further investigation, I was informed by correction officers involved in this program that the cost

of running PVC pipe for water and sewer, additional CO's to escort prisoners who may have to use the toilet facilities, and numerous other undisclosed costs make this policy fiscally subject to further review. In addition, I was informed that the only individuals to be housed in these "tents" are trustees and weekend non-violent offenders. The hard core inmates that we are "punishing", according to my source, are nowhere near the tents. In addition, I once asked what happened to all the weight room equipment that Mr. Eslinger removed from the jail to make it more stringent on the inmates. I was informed that it was sold and the money returned to the "Prisoners Fund." Makes good sense to me until I informed a deputy friend of mine who contradicted that account. He stated that the machines were simply "thrown out back." I found this a little hard to believe and henceforth yesterday, I was provided with the pictures of the weight equipment outside the jail in the back. I have included this for your review. I don't believe that this is very cost effective but perhaps there is a logical explanation.

Mr. Eslinger's statement that crime is down 25% in the unincorporated area is not accurate. According to Florida Department of Law Enforcement, reported crime has decreased 17% and most of that is in areas patrolled by our city police forces.

Now, it's Mr. Becker's "truth meter" which bears review.

I called the County Commission at 407-321-1130 to see whether Mr. Becker's allegations of over a 40% increase in the Sheriff's office budget were factual or just election year "fluff." They are accurate.

I called Florida Department of Law Enforcement at 904-486-8221 to see whether Mr. Becker's allegations that only 17 out of 100 violent felony crimes are presently being solved by our Sheriff. Mr. Becker's allegations are accurate.

Over the course of the last four months, I asked a total of 50 deputy sheriffs in marked units, as a concerned citizen, whether they were going to vote for their boss, Don Eslinger, in September. Of the 50, 10 said "Yes", 22 said "No" and 18 nervously said they could make no political statement either way. In Orange County, where Sheriff Kevin Beary is running for re-election, I also asked 50 deputy sheriffs the same question. A resounding 43 enthusiastically supported their boss, Kevin Beary for re-election in September. Even the most ardent supporter of anyone must conclude that there is more going on with the morale of the Seminole County Sheriff's office than an "election year splinter group" as suggested in the Sentinel's recent political endorsement.

I have made my choice based on the facts and will support Mr. Becker. I urge you to call the above agencies as I did and find out for yourself. People, this is a great country we live in, take advantage of your rights and vote.

**DUI arrest record**

As a registered voter and concerned citizen, I am amazed that some very important issues dealing with the Eslinger/Becker race for Seminole County Sheriff have not been addressed. Having lived in Seminole County for the past eight years until a very recent move to Winter Park (my family still lives in Seminole County), I feel it necessary to report the facts and inform voters so that they will make the most educated choice at the polls on September 3. All of the following facts are all public record; they are not fictitious.

In 1994 the Orange County Sheriff's Office made close to 3,000 DUI arrests for an unincorporated population of 485,707. That same year the Seminole County Sheriff's Department made only 116 DUI arrests for an unincorporated population of 162,323. That is 1.16 arrests for the entire year. In 1995, that figure fell even lower to 98! Don't you think that statistic for the Seminole County Sheriff's Office is very much on the low side? Even keeping in mind that Orange County is three times larger than Seminole County, the DUI arrests for Seminole County are extremely low; they should be around the 1,000 mark.

Maybe the arrests are low because Sheriff Don Eslinger disbanded the Seminole County DUI Specialty Units in 1994. Maybe it is because Sheriff Eslinger does not believe that arresting drunk drivers should be a priority in unincorporated Seminole County. Maybe the arrests are low because no one drinks and drives in Seminole County.

For whatever reason, since Eslinger's election to office in 1992, DUI-related fatalities have been on the rise in the parts of Seminole County under the Sheriff's jurisdiction. The facts are as follows:

- In 1992 there were 4 DUI related deaths.
- 1993 - 8 DUI related deaths
- 1994 - 17 DUI related deaths
- 1995 - 18 DUI related deaths

Isn't it amazing how DUI-related deaths in Seminole County doubled the year after Don Eslinger was elected Sheriff and the year he disbanded the DUI task force?

DUI enforcement should be a priority on every street in Seminole County. Sheriff Kevin Beary takes DUI law enforcement seriously. Why doesn't Eslinger?



### Military record

The Herald's recent endorsement of Joe Becker for county sheriff along with Nick Pfeiff's supporting article, surprised me very much. Some of the many retired Naval officers who live in Seminole County are aware that Mr. Becker misrepresented his Navy service record and knowing this, are insulted and repulsed by this action. The following facts about Becker were verified from the Navy Inspector General's office in Washington.

(1) Lt. Becker was released from active duty in June 1973, to inactive duty in the Naval Reserve. He then served in inactive reserve units and attained the rank of Captain, U.S. Naval Reserve (Inactive). Unless he has some disability, he has not yet reached the age for retirement with pay.

Mr. Becker has repeatedly claimed to be an "experienced fighter pilot" who piloted many combat missions in Viet Nam, but his Navy record shows he was never trained as a pilot and could not have piloted fighter planes and survived. His Navy training was as a Naval flight officer, who files as a necessary

crewman, but not as a pilot in physical or mental control of the aircraft. Mr. Becker attended Radar Intercept School and as a Radar Intercept Officer in the back seat of Viet Nam era fighters he was a vital crew member on every operational flight but not a pilot.

Mr. Becker's three bronze stars were awarded in lieu of additional Viet Nam service medals and therefore apparently do no represent any specific combat connected event. The Viet Nam service medal was awarded more for being there than anything else.

It is a pity that Mr. Becker chooses to embellish his military service record because this real record is respectable and admirable as it is. His four air medals for combat air mission, his highest awards, attest to that. Having falsified his military record, how can any other of his statements be trusted?

How can we vote for a candidate for Sheriff we can't trust?

as sheriff of Seminole County I could have gone there and done that and walked away without some incident?"

(NOTE: Ealinger has 18 signed affidavits from those who were there who say he did not participate in any fight. Becker has sworn statements from five who say that he was, indeed, involved.)

On a report that Ealinger misled people by stating in the Florida Sheriff's Association's Directory that he had earned the "Military Order of the Purple Heart for meritorious and conspicuous service?"

Ealinger said, "I was asked by that group to list the awards I had gotten. That is the name of a civic group that gave me their Officer of the Year award. How could I have earned the Purple Heart without having been in the military. And I did not mention that award in any of my campaign literature."

On Becker's claim in campaign literature that he earned "Vietnam Service/3 Bronze Stars (and) National Defense/Bronze Star" during his career in the Navy.

Becker said: "The awards are

ribbons given for service in Vietnam with bronze stars on them."

• Circuit Court Judge's race:

On a post card sent out by Judge Kirby Moncrief accusing his opponent Ken Lester of representing "prostitutes and drug dealers" in court (accompanied by photos of Lester's signs in the vicinity of adult entertainment establishments) while signing a Christian Coalition statement that he believed "county and city government should do everything possible to discourage the establishment and support businesses in our county."

Moncrief said, "I just wanted to tell the truth. It is absolutely true. He said he represented Club Juana. He says he's tough on crime while he represents pornography. Open letter to Kirby Moncrief

My name is Ilic Bucur, and I am the respondent in the case #960308DRR008M, presided over by Judge Kirby Moncrief, running for re-election Tuesday. If Judge Moncrief doesn't remember me, I will try to refresh his memory. In that case I was trying to avoid an eviction my ex-wife and ex-business partner applied against me. It was a big mistake for me being in court with no lawyer, but what I can say now. Probably I was the last innocent in this country thinking if you never did anything wrong, never bother some body, never have anything to do with the law enforcement agencies, except some traffic violations, you don't have to be afraid to defend yourself even in the court of law.

The large picture on page 3 of this evening's Herald almost made me gag. Sheriff Eslinger being commended for having 81.5% of his employees as veterans ... don't make me laugh.

About a year ago after ten years of service as a corrections officer in Seminole County, my son, under extreme stress from family problems (his wife had surgery for cancer, his mother had just gone in to have surgery, his father had heart failure, and he himself had medical problems) talked back to a sergeant, quickly apologized, but was suspended WITHOUT PAY for 30 days. Remember the deputies that shot up two cars in the parking lot? They didn't get 30 days without pay.

Our son knew he was wrong to talk back, but was never given an opportunity to talk it out or was he afforded any type of counseling for stress management. Caring prisoners is bad enough, but unbearable when amplified by circumstances described above.

On the day the sheriff chose to chew him out, (four months after the incident) he showed

overwhelming compassion (tongue in cheek) by admonishing my son "not to bring his personal problems to work" yet the Sheriff was off for several days when his wife had their second child. Our esteemed sheriff proceeded to tell our son "that his being a veteran meant nothing. He didn't care how many theatres of war he had been in." Korea, 3 tours in Viet Nam and Desert Storm. His ten years without offenses were never even a consideration.

Our son left the Sheriff's Department and has since been hired by a very employee-oriented company where your good deeds are appreciated, and employees are important. My point is: It's a farce for the Sheriff to be honored by vets; he personally doesn't give a hoot.

The letter to the editor concerning Deputy Frank Johnson assigned to Lake Howell as a resource officer with his past made my blood boil. GO AHEAD VOTE FOR ESLINGER. AS FOR ME, ILL VOTE FOR BECKER.

amount of time she had when she wrote her story. That was too much from an immigrant. But you don't have to underestimate me for that. I am an American citizen, and I have all the same rights as you. It is not important what you are. It is important what you understand how you live your life - why didn't you let me 1986.

Did you do some investigation before you made the decision to evict me? When you make these kinds of decisions that will affect people's lives forever, you do not check their records? How did you make this kind of decision against me. Was it based solely on what she said?

Later I found out that in our legal system you can say anything you want about somebody and mention you never press charges for a certain reason. If you never press charges, there is no record, and if there is no record, you can say everything you want and play scared. Something is not right here.

For a fraction of a second, I am sure now you understood something is different from what you have been told. But you passed that chance and told me to sit down. I realized then there would be no justice and I am lost. What followed was a circus and I will regret for my entire life that I did not stand up and leave that room. I left myself to be humiliated by you Kirby. We have two houses and two apartments. I asked you to let me live in one place until we solve the financial matters between us. Even an idiot can agree there is nothing wrong with that especially when these properties are separated by four city blocks. You said "No."

But life goes on Kirby. Probably lots of people who know me may ask why I'm writing this now. I know this does not solve my legal problems, more than that can make them worse, but might help someone else. The entire Seminole County is full with your signs. Back in my old country, we use to say every doctor has his own cemetery on his back. I can say now that if I am the only mistake you made in your career, if I am the only body in your cemetery, you did enough damage. You cannot be a judge Kirby - you are not wise enough. It took me some time

to swallow my frustrations but now I am OK. I am starting over because you have to know that you shook me badly you

### Law officer picks Becker

The Sentinel stated that response times are faster than in prior years. That's because Sheriff Eslinger has dismantled the specialty trained divisions (like DUI task force) and placed them on the road. As a result, training is wasted and arrests are down. Which is better, faster or more effective?

The Sentinel coverage of this issue has continually favored the incumbent without clearly informing the voters of Joe Becker's position. He is qualified and intelligent. He is not just a complainer, he has a well thought-out plan to improve the Sheriff's Office crime fighting ability. This plan includes improving current programs and implementing new (or reinstating old) programs.

I support Joe Becker for Sheriff. As a certified crime prevention practitioner and law enforcement officer, as well as citizen of Seminole County, I feel confident in giving him my vote.

SANFORD — The Sanford Airport Authority will hold its next meeting Tuesday, Sept. 3, beginning at 8:30 a.m.

The first item on the agenda is a discussion of the election of officers. The current slate of officers includes Ronald L. Weindruch as chairman, Lee P. management plan, including regular bird counts and appropriate habitat vegetation maintenance will be one of the subjects of discussion at the first chapter meeting of the year, Sunday, Sept. 8.

Rich Paul, manager and biologist at the National Audubon Sanctuaries on Tampa Bay, has provided the group with instructional material for estimating and counting the birds and will also assess the vegetation requirements on the site. Members of the chapter and the Native Plant Society have already completed the first vegetation survey.

Many of the large wading birds who nest and roost on Bird Island fought hard, as a species, to escape extinction. Their numbers were nearly decimated early in this century by plume hunters seeking decorative feathers. Now their breeding places around the state have been reduced by constantly

expanding human colonies. Bird Island is a fine refuge. It is safely away from human development and lacks other bird predators, such as racoons. If boaters will keep a reasonable distance from the shore, the island will remain safe so these beautiful water-birds can reproduce.

Volunteers will be needed to help with monthly bird counts on Bird Island, and to assist with appropriate vegetation maintenance. Anyone interested can attend the upcoming meeting of the Seminole Audubon Chapter. This year, the monthly meetings will be held at the First Street Gallery, in Sanford, beginning at 2 p.m. The Gallery is located near the intersection of Magnolia Avenue and Second Street, next to the Rita Theatre. The speaker for the September meeting will be from the Save Our Everglades Committee and will speak on restoration and upcoming legislation.

# Oviedo sweeps 'tripleheader'

WINTER PARK — Everything went Oviedo High School's way in Friday night's Florida High School Activities Association's Preseason Football Classic at Lake Howell High School.

The Lions swept all three games from the host Silver Hawks, winning the freshman contest 6-0, the junior varsity matchup 8-0, and the varsity clash by a 18-0 score.

Afterwards, neither varsity coach had much to say, not wanting to make too much out of what was, after all, just a preseason scrimmage.

"We played well," said Oviedo varsity coach Jack Blanton. "They guys executed well."

"We did fumble once or twice and we gave up a couple first downs on penalties. Other than that, we played well. And nobody got hurt, which is important."

Two big plays helped the Lions take a 18-0 lead in the first 4:33 of their two-quarter workout with the Silver Hawks at Richard L. Evans Stadium, one of the few structures still standing as Lake Howell is razed and rebuilt this year.

After C.J. Hatala caused a fumble that Kenny Kayne and Josh Cullen covered for the Lions, Oviedo quarterback Andy Neufeld tossed a 38-yard pass to Josh Greer down to the Lake Howell 1-yard line.

Neufeld did the rest, plunging in for the touchdown. The extra point attempt was blocked.

Oviedo forced Lake Howell to punt after three plays, then needed just three plays to cover 84 yards. Jaimes Scott went off right tackle for a 57-yard touchdown run that gave the Lions a 12-0 lead with 7:28 left in the first quarter.

Dan Dyke kicked the extra point. Dyke later added a 24-yard field goal that was set up by a 42-yard Neufeld-to-Greer aerial.

"Oviedo has a good team," said Lake Howell varsity coach Mike Biceglia. "We were banged up coming in, but they just outplayed us."

"We knew that Neufeld is a big-play guy. They were picking on a 10th grader in our secondary with no varsity experience. They did the right thing."

Neufeld completed four of five passes for 84 yards. Greer caught a pair for 78 yards. Scott added 88 yards on three carries while Leon Scott had 32 yards on three carries.

Defensively, Oviedo limited Lake Howell quarterback Matt Mara to 43 yards through the air on 3-of-12 passing. He was also intercepted once by Carson Gore.

Leading the Lake Howell ground attack were Christian DeJesus (seven yards on two carries) and Chris Harris (four rushes for six yards).

Seneca Moore tossed a 24-yard touchdown pass to Justin Holmes for Oviedo's touchdown in the one-quarter freshman scrimmage. Jammal Dorsey threw a key block to spring Holmes loose.

Thomas Ringer had two carries for nine yards to lead the Silver Hawk freshmen. Scott Napierata rushed twice for six yards.

In the 12-minute junior varsity workout, Charles Gonal scored on a 1-yard run and Josh DeBoto threw to John Buchanan for a two-point conversion to give the Lions an 8-0 win.

Micajah Lucy rushed for 36 yards on four carries for the Oviedo junior varsity. For Lake Howell, Nick Mahon had a 5-yard run, Josh Figueroa contributed a 4-yard rush, and Ben Golts carried the ball twice for four yards.

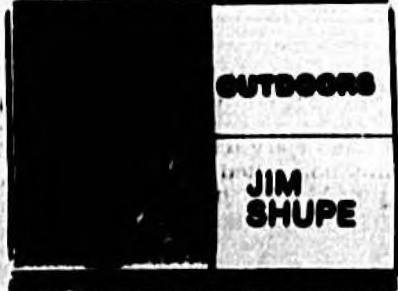

## Commission considers dove season shift

The Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission is considering changes to dove hunting season. Being considered is a proposal to set statewide dove hunting season for Oct. 5-28, Nov. 12-Dec. 1, and Dec. 14-Jan. 12. Previously, dove season opened on the third Saturday of September in the Northwest Zone.

Another rule change to be considered by the Commission would specify that alligators may not be kept as personal pets. Current rules prohibit possession of alligators without the owner having a permit. Although the Commission issues permits only to alligator farms or to individuals who use the reptiles for exhibition, commercial or scientific purposes, en-

forcement officers believe possession of alligators as personal pets should be prohibited. Concerning caging, possession and harvest of alligators and other reptiles, the Commission is

scheduled to consider rule changes, primarily to eliminate unnecessary restrictions and clarify specifications. Special opportunity and short-term hunting and fishing area criteria and permit fees authorized by the 1996 Legislature, are scheduled for consideration by the GFWFC. Also on the agenda is a staff request for direction concerning a proposed constitutional amendment to place jurisdiction over freshwater and saltwater resources under a single agency to be called the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Com-

mission. If successful, the issue will appear on the 1998 ballot.

Also, the staff plans to ask the GFWFC to endorse a nationwide non-game wildlife stewardship program. "Teaming With Wildlife" and the GFWFC's magazine staff will ask for approval to boost subscription rates from \$10 to \$12.

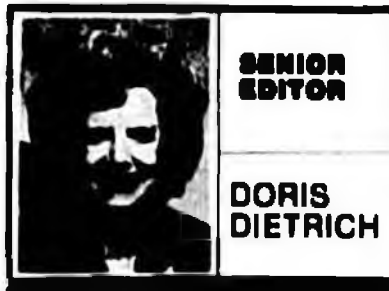

**Open Sesame, or Lead On, Macduff**

Many excellent books have been written about opening leads, but arguably the best ever has hit the streets. In "Opening Leads" (C & T Bridge Supplies; 900-528-4718; 900.00 p.p.), author Mike Lawrence doesn't spend pages explaining which card to lead from various holdings. He tells the reader the agreements he will use and swings immediately into explaining how to find the best opening leads. Of course, this is primarily done by listening closely to the auction and building up pictures of the hidden hands. As Terence Reese used to say, there are no blind leads, only deaf bridge players.

After a comprehensive analysis of the different possibilities, Lawrence ends with an extensive quiz. Experts don't lead singletons that often, and (almost) never into declarer's known side suit. Lawrence in-

cludes this deal as an example. If West leads his singleton club against four spades, East wins with the ace and gives his partner a ruff — a Pyrrhic victory. West continues with, say, the ace and another diamond, but declarer wins, draws trumps and claims, his club suit being high.

Now look what happens after a heart lead. Declarer will win with the ace, probably draw three rounds of trumps ending in hand and play a club to dummy's queen. After winning with the ace, East forces out South's last trump by leading the heart king. South cashes the club king, but when West discards a diamond, the contract is suddenly shot down in flames. West must win tricks with the diamond ace

and two top hearts for one down.
