The researchers studied the prices Soviet citizens pay for goods in the state stores and lated thear to 1999 and we... arrived at these citizens' "real wages." The conditions obtained in various periods, beginning with 1926, were compared Here is a summation of what was learned: "According to our calculations, the Soviet worker after the five-year plans has never been as well off in terms of real wages as he was In 1928. One of our calculations, perhaps theoretically the more defensible, shows be is still far worse off than in 1928."

Many reasons can be advanced why this should be so. One of the most important, certainly, lies in the sery nature of the communist economic unlosomy. The state owns or controls all the agencies of modus. tion and distribution it sets by but the price the shopper must pay and it normally includes a large profit in order to alphon off purchasing power. There is no competition in any reasonable sense of the word.

That is a sure way to hold down living standards. By contrast, the highest living standards exist here in America where all enterprise starting with produceds and windup with retailers, is in everts ting competition for consumer favor.

Small Chinese Isles May Be Important In Fight With Reds

TAIPEH, Formosa, Grathe eyes of Chinese Nationalists look anxiously northward today to two tiny dots off the bulking mainland of Communist China.

These are the Tachen Islands, northern anchor of a string of bases the Nationalists hold within a few minutes MIG flying time from the mainland.

Small as they are—the larger of the two islands is L-shaped with each leg no more than four to five miles long—the Tachens may one day prove highly strategic in the global struggle with communism.

They could serve as jumping off points for an invasion of Red China—or they could serve as stepping stoate for a Communist attack on

-or they could serve as stepping stole for a Communist attack on Formosa.

Lying about 200 miles north of Formosa, and about the same distance from Shanghai, the Tachens are bases for Nationalist guerrilla forces.

With the northernmost point of their island defense system in such a sensitive position, Nationalists are gravely concerned about a recent series of small air and sea clashes with the Communists off Chekiang Province coast, close to the Tachens.

the Tachens.

As a result, Nationalist officials here hope the U. S. 7th Fleet, which stands ready to defend Formosa against Red invasion, soon will extend its protective arm to the Tachens.

Foreign press reports of the re-

Foreign press reports of the recent engagements exaggerated the imminent danger of invasion. But Nationalists feel far from secure about the islands.

The problem of what to do about the Tachens crops up in most discussions of the Far East mission of Gen. James A. Van Fleet, who has made a special tour of Formosa for President Eisenhower. The former 8th Army commander in Korea has a high opinion of Nationalist forces and Chlang Kaishek's leadership.

It's no secret that Van Fleet and Maj. Gen. William C. Chase, head of the U. S. military assistance advisory group on Formosa, see eye to eye on the necessity of strengthening Chiang's forces. In any such buildup, the Tachen Islands are expected to play a major role.

It's possible the tempo of H. S.

lands are expected to play a major role.

It's possible the tempo of U. S. military aid will be increased to bolster Nationalist defenses in the Tachens. If this includes the 7th Fleet, it increases the chances for a direct clash between the U. S. Navy and Chinese Communists.

The Communists could attack the islands at any time, or they could remain content with challenging Nationalist air and navalunits in the area.

Nationalist officers make it clear the only way the Reds will get the islands is to fight for them.

There was time, on the mainland before the Nationalists were driven out by the Communists, when such boasts meant little.

But U. S. military men in Formosa are convinced the Chinese Nationalist forces are made of different stuff today.

USFS Statistics Show Florida Has **Most Woods Fires**

TALLAHASSEE (A)— Nation-wide statistics just released by the United States Forest Bervice, indicate that Florida hald more woods fires and more agree burned in 1963 than any other state. This had record resulted from more than 20,000 wild fires that burned over 4,300,000 acres of Florida's unprotected land.

Only 7,610 wild fires occurred on protected woodlands and burned only 217,964 acres. Judging from the statistics, fire protection saved about eight million acres from fire. Fire burned only 1,44 percent of the acreage under protection. But a staggering 58 per cent of Florida's unprotected woodlands felt the scourge of fire during the past year.

Two-thirds of Florida's woodlands are under protection. But 55 per cent of the acreage burned was on unprotected woodlands.

The exclusion of fire from Florida's protected woodlands has made possible a dramatic change, Millions of seedlings, that would have been killed by uncontrolled fire-are restocking forest acreage. Fire protection has made the planting of trees a sound investment, and the management of forest lands for sustained yield economically feasible.


