

Congress winds up its work, the Senate is facing the threat of a filibuster that could kill legislation extending the deadline for automakers to meet tough exhaust standards. Sen. Jake Garn's pledge to talk all night and into next week to prevent a vote on the bill could delay final congressional adjournment. Both the House and Senate hoped to conclude business today and adjourn for the year to allow time for some political campaigning. Garn, a Utah Republican, claims the auto industry needs a longer postponement.

Sleeves Rolled Up Today

America "rolled up its sleeves" today for the first swine flu shots, the largest immunization program in the nation's history. But some state health officials said they were uncertain when and whether they would get all the vaccine they need. The national Center for Disease Control said the first shots would be given "officially" at a health fair in Indianapolis, but they were scheduled also for at least one other state: Massachusetts. An Associated Press survey of state health officials showed that most of them said they had initial shipments of vaccine. Some complained that their allocations arrived piecemeal, and many were worried about possible future irregular shipments.

CIA Eyed Oswald As Source

WASHINGTON (AP) - Contrary to sworn testimony, the CIA once considered using presidential assassin Lee Harvey Oswald as a source of intelligence information about the Soviet Union, according to a newly released CIA document. In sworn testimony before the Warren Commission, former CIA director Richard Helms said the agency never had "or lated any contacts with Oswald. Producers Led Astray?

WASHINGTON (AP) - A controversy over an alleged multibillion-dollar error in a vital statistical indicator of economic strength is stirring the U.S. Census Bureau. The error, alleged to have been covered up for nearly four years, conceivably could have led to faulty government and business decisions by badly understating the backlog of unfilled orders at the nation's factories. As a consequence of believing orders were weaker than they really were, manufacturers may have cut production and hastened the descent into the recession of late 1973 and 1974.

Medical Programs Need Treatment

The exposure of fraud and abuse in the Medicaid program by a Senate subcommittee is troubling. It is obvious that many patients are getting less benefit from the 10-year-old program of health care for the needy than they should, and a few doctors are getting more benefit from the program than they should. It must be emphasized at the outset that most

physicians caring for Medicaid patients are honest. More than half the total amount of Medicaid funds received by all physicians goes to a mere 7 per cent of these doctors and it is this small group that either practices in or operates the Medicaid mills where the fraud and abuse were found.

Medicaid went into operation in 1966 at the same time as Medicare. Medicaid is for citizens too poor to pay for health care. It is administered by the state and local governments in much the same way that many welfare programs are administered

Medicare is available to all citizens 65 or older. regardless of income level. It is administered by the federal government. Doctors' fees are controlled under Medicare, as they are under Medicaid, but there is nothing to stop a doctor from charging more than the formula permits and collecting the difference from the patient.

In the case of Medicaid, the patients can't afford to pay any more. Many doctors refuse to accept Medicaid patients because the fees are too low. That tends to funnel them into the Medicaid mills, where services are often overprovided in order to compensate for the low fees and increase income, and where the quality of care suffers on account of the rush to handle as many patients as

It is obvious that for many poor peo fedicaid has failed to make available to them what it promised when it was launched - that is, the kind of "mainstream" health care given middle-class Americans by doctors and hospitals.

This failure results from defects which are fundamental to the Medicaid system as presently organized. It is unlikely that they will be cured by mere tinkering with the system. Fundamental reform is probably going to be necessary.

The next Congress is going to have to take a long and thoughtful look at such reform.

New Model

The Swedish "model" of socialism has been written and talked about for so long that it will be stimulating to follow the remodeling that may now be in store. The recent election which turned the Social Democrats out of office after 40 years has revealed that the taxes and bureaucracy of the most wellintentioned welfare state can finally inspire rebellion in the people it is supposed to serve.

The socialism of the Western European democracies has never been as radical as those systems which are called socialism in Communist countries. Sweden's Social Democrats under Olof Palme appear to have drifted so far toward the complete submergence of the individual in their policies that a majority of Swedes could see that what was emerging was not so much socialism as collectivization.

Defeated leftists in Sweden are saying that the election is part of a conservative trend throughout the Western world. Maybe it is, although the recent gains by Communist parties in France and Itlay suggest otherwise. One thing is reasonably certain - that relations between Sweden and the United States should improve. Quite apart from any social or economic philosophies different from ours, Palme's government had gone out of its way to side with Cuba, North Vietnam and others in villifying the United States. Thorejoern Faelldin, leader of the renter coalition and No. 1 prospect for premier, is believed to be fairminded enough to reject that aspect of Mr. Palme's foreign

politics in America that the criminal trial of the governor of Maryland is ho hum. Marvin Mandel is charged with 21 counts of fraud and racketeering, he is accused of misusing his office and of accepting bribes, but so what? We've seen it all before, many times before.

The official remains calm in the face of extreme adversity; the official denies all suspicions. The official smiles broadly and talks of vindication. The official holds hands with his wife as he walks from the courtroom and surrounds himself with friends and employes who swear by God he never did a dishonest thing in his life

In this case, however, the unshockable public is witnessing something novel in the matter of indicted politicians. Mandel's trial may go on for three or four months, but he is refusing to give up his executive authority. He says he will go to court Monday through Thursday, then run the affairs of state on the weekends. Fraud counts aside, he's still governor - and he'll do as he pleases, thank you.

It is, for sure, not the first time an office holder has clung to power in spite of legal mortifications. Legions of public men have been defendants and officials at the same time. Dale Anderson, the former county executive of Baltimore, heid f" power through a trial here for extortion and tax evasion. More recently the governor of West Virginia, Arch Moore, held power while being acquited of extortion. Yet the Anderson trial lasted six weeks, and Moore's was over in 11 days. The novelty of Mandel's situation is that he will be in control and in court from early autumn into winter, the busiest season in Maryland government. Budget work is due to begin next month, for example, which means that priorities for spending some \$3 billion state tax dollars will be established by a suspected crook.

The unacceptability of the development is obvious. Citizens are entitled to have their affairs directed by officers who do not spend most of their time defending themselves in court. Besides, there is the humiliation of it. Mandel himself suspended a government officer last year when the man was charged with embezzling state funds; Mandel said the suspension was for the good of Maryland, and it was.

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - G. Harrold Carswell, a one-time Supreme Court nominee who was accused of making homosexual advances to an undercover police officer, has been convicted of a battery charge.

Officials said Thursday that Carswell had apprired before Leon County Judge Hal McClamma the day before, pleaded no contest, was adjudicated guilty and was fined \$100

A second charge of attempting a lewd and lascivious act was dropped. State Atty. Harry Morrison said it's standard procedure to drop a lesser offense when a defendant is convicted of a more serious charge.

Black Police Squad Formed

ST. PETERSBURG (AP) - A special squad of black undercover police officers has been created in St. Petersburg in an effort to fight what Police Chief Mack Vines calls "black on black" crime.

"I think that is one of the finest things that could happen" said Rev. Enoch D. Davis, pastor of the Bethel Community Baptist Church. "I'm sorry that I cannot say that it's not true blacks are committing crimes against blacks," 'The Rev. Davis added. "Whatever way that can be stopped, he (Vines) will have the cooperation of the ministers and the citizens."

Shevin Seeks Suit Dismissal

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - Atty. Gen Robert Shevin has urged a judge to dismiss a former state senator's suit aimed at knocking Gov. Reubin Askew's proposed Sunshine Amendment off the Nov. 2 ballot. Circuit Judge James Joanos was expected

to rule today on Shevin's motion to dismiss the suit by Charles Weber of Fort Lauderdale. Askew said at a news conference Thursday that he was confident his amendment will be upheld by the courts.

Orlando Men Are Charged

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - Four Orlando men have been charged with fraud and improper securities sales in what Comptroller Gerald Lewis says is another part of a massive land securities fraud.

State Atty. Robert Eagan filed the charges in Orlando Thursday. The four men were accused of bilking investors through the sales of securities on an Orlando development. Castle Hills Estates.

"The NCAA was born in turmoil," Walter Byers says in response, "and has lived in crisis. We've met and dealt with difficult situations before. We will again."

The son of a Missouri cattleman, Byers this week passes the quarter-century mark as executive director of the NCAA, ruling body of collegiate athletics. He was 29 in 1951 when he was named the first full time head of the organization. The next year he moved the national staff. consisting of himself and one secretary, from Chicago to Kansas City.

Today, with a staff of 57, he presides over a sprawling, complex organization of 829 members. With growth and expansion has come added problems and controversies, and, in recent years, a vast upsurge in legal problems. The NCAA has never lost a lawsuit, but in the past three years, a staff member estimates, its legal fees have averaged \$1,000 a day. But Byers, now 54, with a shock of thick, gray hair and a

waistline nearly as trim as an All-American's, maintains an optimistic enthusiasm for his job and his organization. And he accepts with a goodnatured, confident tolerance the barbs and critisims hurled at the NCAA from various segments of its membership.

"When we adopted the 'Sanity Code' in 1947, t strictions on recruiting and financial aid to student athletes, there were eight-column scare headlines all over the country," he recalled in an interview this week. "In 1951, when we adopted the first rules governing televised games, it was the same thing all over again. It seems like we've had a crisis every year.

The most frequent and caustic criticisms in recent years have come from the major football schools, many of whom say that what began as a service organization has become a regulatory agency. "To an extent, that is true," Byers said. "But if there

hadn't been a need for greater and greater regulation there would have been none. We've simply responded to the needs of the membership.

"I wonder how they would like it if we dropped all rules, and there was no limit on postseason football games, the number of scholarships, and no limits on recruiting." Byers is unquestionably the most powerful man in college athletics. And he views the future with the same optimism he felt the day he took the job 25 years ago. "The immense popularity of college athletics in attributable to two things," he says. "One is the importance this country places on education. The other is that college athletics gives us a continuous flow of youth. Americans

value education and youth. "This will never change. And knowing that, I cannot help but be optimistic."
