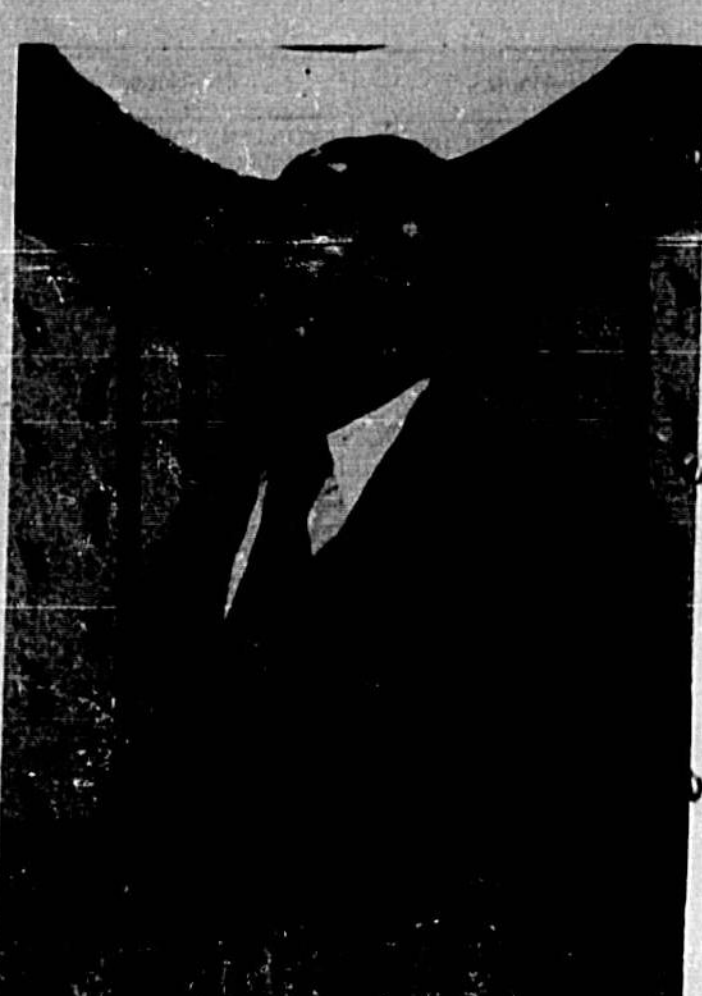




'Bully' Teddy Pays Visit To Lakeview Middle School, Charms Youthful 'Reporters'

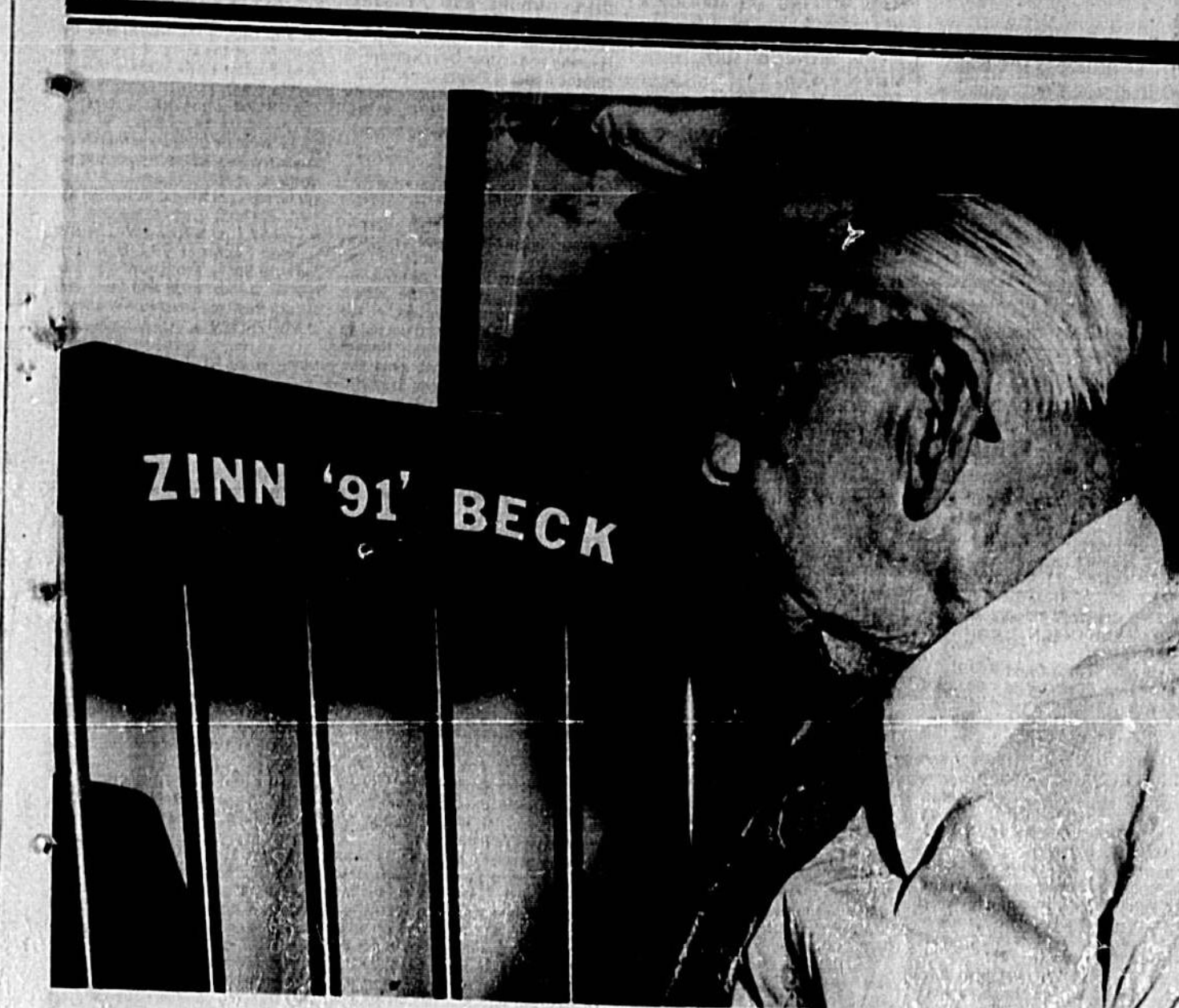

MILWAUKEE (AP) — This is a love story. Lew Morrison is in love with his wife, Estelle — and has been for 67 years — and nobody is going to split them up.

Morrison, 91, and his wife, 89, have shared a room at the Woodland Health Center in suburban Brookfield for the past two years.

But Morrison's health is failing, and nursing home officials suggested that he move from the couple's present room in the ambulatory wing of the home to another area for intensive care patients.

"I started out as an ultimatum," Morrison said. "They were going to move me away from Estelle, and that was it."

But Morrison, former outdoor sports writer for the Milwaukee Sentinel and a former world flycasting champion, wasn't going to leave his wife of nearly 67 years without a fight.

"I don't care how old I am. I'm not about to take a horsewhipping from anybody. I talked real plain and they started listening," said Morrison, whose language ranges from peppery to profane.

So he complained to the district attorney, the sheriff and the mayor.

"We're getting along in life, and we've spent all this time together," he said. "We should be left to have our last years together, too."

Nursing home officials have agreed, at least temporarily, to allow the couple to remain together despite a strain on staff members who have to give extra care to Morrison because of recent illness.

"It's a hell of a note," Morrison said. "I'm getting to the point where I'm losing my eyesight and my hearing and I can hardly walk, and they're trying to break up my home."

However, he said he is satisfied, at least for the moment, with the decision of nursing home officials to leave the couple together.

The bond, he said, is love.

"Sure, we love each other," he said. "Oh, we fight a lot, too. Always have. But after we fight for 67 years, this has to be the longest fight on record, and I'm not willing to end it."

Little Red Schoolhouse: Funds Cut, But Fighting

The Little Red Schoolhouse, which serves Seminole's poverty-level retarded preschoolers, is struggling to stay alive.

The school's federal funds were cut off today, but Executive Director Christine Jones has given up hopes of keeping the school open.

A search for private donors is underway, Mrs. Jones said. The school receives slightly less than \$300,000 a year in federal funds, and the program — which is now serving 56 youngsters — costs between \$672 and \$900 a day.

The school's capacity is 80 children, with 10 of 33 or less.

Enrollment is down now because the school's 5-year-olds recently transferred to public schools, and Mrs. Jones was reluctant to start new children in a program she wasn't sure could continue after Oct. 1.

Transferring a child to public school is a major victory for the Little Red Schoolhouse staff — but it's the very reason the federal funding was cut off.

Tighter federal regulations which went into effect today says schools are eligible for federal funds only if they serve development retardates — those with little hope of ever functioning on a "normal" level.

At 16 per cent of the Little Red Schoolhouse children are now classified as developmental retardates.

"The largest number who need our training are functioning as retarded but show indications that they may be capable of functioning at a much higher level," Mrs. Jones said. "However, if they do not receive special training before they enter public school they will be classified as retarded in the first grade and placed in the special education programs. This labels the child for life and is something to be avoided."

Mrs. Jones said the Little Red Schoolhouse staff has been dreaming of pulling away next government support by next October. "Infiltration of government controls over the last four years has been unbelievable," she said.

The problem with any gap in services is losing the staff. "It takes a 1/2 year to develop a capable staff," Mrs. Jones said. "Even if we're delayed a month, I'm worried about holding on to them."

The program's two schools — one at Sanford's airport and the other at Messian Lutheran Church in Casselberry — are now on a specially declared holiday.

"We have one remaining hope for help and we expect to hear this week or the early part of next week," Mrs. Jones said in a letter sent home to parents Wednesday. "We do not want to close school until we hear, one way or the other, from this source."

Mrs. Jones said the source is a private donor.

"Children are not being optimized in school. They are being standardized," Mrs. Jones said. "Moreover, in our opinion, all children are not receiving the same educational opportunity, nor is the quality of education adequate to uplift the borderline child."

"If a program like ours isn't a permanent addition to the area," Mrs. Jones said, "then these conditions will continue."

Lie Tests Clear SHA Workers In \$500 Theft

A preliminary report on the detective tests given to employees of the Sanford Housing Authority has cleared all who were questioned about the disappearance of \$500 from the authority's petty cash fund.

The missing money was discovered at the end of July when a bank statement revealed the petty cash fund had been overdrawn. The investigation was made public today.

Authority accountant Edmund Dabedath refused to take the test — a constitutional right under the Fifth Amendment, which protects Americans from self-incrimination — and has since resigned. Dabedath has said his resignation had nothing to do with the missing money or his refusal to take the test.

A source close to the housing authority's operations said Dabedath had recently complained that some changes were made in his account books without his knowledge or approval.

Dabedath's relationship with the housing authority board and Executive Director Thomas Wilson III has been deteriorating for some time.

In July, he publicly complained that he had not been involved in the preparation of the housing authority's budget for the 1976-77 fiscal year.

Dabedath said the housing authority commissioners had had not even seen Wilson's budget on how to spend the \$212,200 federal subsidy.

After Dabedath reviewed the budget proposal, he suggested several changes which were approved by the commissioners.

Commission Chairman Edward Blacksheare said this morning that Dabedath had "indicated some months ago there were some problems."

Blacksheare said there were no plans to continue the investigation beyond the final documented report on the lie detector tests — although the housing authority attorney will be consulted.

"In the long run," Blacksheare said, "further investigation could prove costly and non-productive."

Local law enforcement officials were not notified of the disappearance because "We concluded it was not done by a burglar and we felt it was better to do an inside investigation," Blacksheare said.

The lie detector tests were ordered as part of the internal investigation, Blacksheare said. Five housing authority employees, including Wilson, took the test last month.

Geneva Chimp Dies; Owner Eyes Lawsuit

Grieving over the death Thursday night of his impudent chimpanzee, Otto, a tearful Rudolf Alexander today vowed anew to fight new attempts by county officials to seize his remaining four chimpanzees at this Geneva home.

Five-year-old Otto, died Thursday night at the County Pounds near Five Points despite efforts to revive him following a two-day illness, officials said.

Alexander's attorney, Irving Gussow, said if an autopsy shows evidence that Otto had been negligently cared for since his impounding July 30 for running at large that it is possible a lawsuit may be filed against the county.

Alexander said he valued Otto, who was fully trained and performed in traveling shows, at \$7,000. He said he received an offer last year to buy Otto for that sum.

County Court Judge Wallace Hall on Sept. 21 dismissed a state attorney's petition seeking seizure of the four chimps remaining at Alexander's home but ruled the state had 10 days in which to file a "more specific" petition in the civil case.

The County Animal Control Board, after a public hearing, on Aug. 19 found the chimps in the civil case.

Today — the last day under the court limit — Assistant State Atty. Rudy Kramer said a new petition was being filed and an evidentiary hearing sought in the case.

Ali Says He Quits

ISTANBUL, Turkey (AP) — World heavyweight boxing champion Muhammad Ali said today he is quitting fighting to devote himself to spreading the Moslem faith throughout the world.

"As of now," Ali told a crowd of reporters and photographers, "I am quitting boxing and will devote all my energy to the propagation of the Moslem faith."

All said his decision to end his boxing career came at the urging of Wallace Muhammad, leader of the Black Muslim community in the United States, who is also in Turkey at the invitation of the pro-Moslem National Salvation party.

Ali, who successfully defended his title Tuesday night in New York against Ken Norton, made his comments at a news conference in the Istanbul governor's office.

Exhausting Finale Looms For Senators

WASHINGTON (AP) — As the 94th Congress winds up its work, the Senate is facing the threat of a filibuster that could kill legislation extending the deadline for automakers to meet tough exhaust standards. Sen. Jake Garn's pledge to talk all night and into next week to prevent a vote on the bill could delay final congressional adjournment. Both the House and Senate hoped to conclude business today and adjourn for the year to allow time for some political campaigning. Garn, a Utah Republican, claims the auto industry needs a longer postponement.

Sleeves Rolled Up Today

America "rolled up its sleeves" today for the first swine flu shots, the largest immunization program in the nation's history. But some state health officials said they were uncertain when and where they would get all the vaccine they need. The National Center for Disease Control said the first shots would be given "officially" at a health fair in Indianapolis, but they were scheduled also for at least one other state: Massachusetts. An Associated Press survey of state health officials showed that most of them said they had initial shipments of vaccine. Some complained that their allocations arrived piecemeal, and many were worried about possible future irregular shipments.

CIA Eyed Oswald As Source

WASHINGTON (AP) — Contrary to sworn testimony, the CIA once considered using presidential assassin Lee Harvey Oswald as a source of intelligence information about the Soviet Union, according to a newly released CIA document. In sworn testimony before the Warren Commission, former CIA director Richard Helms said the agency never had "or even contemplated" any contacts with Oswald. The newly released document, written by an unidentified CIA officer three years after President John F. Kennedy was slain in Dallas on Nov. 22, 1963, says that "we viewed intelligence interest" in Oswald as "discussed" in the laying on of interviews.

Producers Led Astray?

WASHINGTON (AP) — A controversy over an alleged multimillion-dollar error in a vital statistical indicator of economic strength is stirring the U.S. Census Bureau. The error, alleged to have been covered up for nearly four years, conceivably could have led to faulty government and business decisions by badly understating the backlog of unfilled orders at the nation's factories. As a consequence of the nation's policy, manufacturers may have cut production and hastened the descent into the recession of late 1973 and 1974.

WORLD IN BRIEF

Diplomats Urge Caution In Talks On Africa

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — African and other Third World diplomats have counseled U.S. Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger to be firm and cautious in negotiations with white leaders of South Africa and Rhodesia. Commenting on Kissinger's policy assembly Thursday before the General Assembly, Foreign Minister Frederick R. Williams of Guyana said he sees "potential" in the secretary's shuttle diplomacy to southern Africa.

Pound Crisis Aids Tourists

LONDON (AP) — The plunge in the value of British money heralds a period of austerity for most Britons but is a boon for bargain-hunting American tourists with dollars to spend on tweeds, silver and cashmere sweaters. The steady decrease in the value of the pound sterling against the dollar and other West European currencies has made Britain one of the cheapest vacation spots in Europe. For an American it means British goods — such as cars, shoes and clothing — are cheaper, and will continue to be so until prices go up, as everyone expects them to.

were "neglected" and State Atty. Abbott Herring's office recommended that the County Court order them seized and given to the Central Florida Zoo.

"I can't believe they would neglect it," Alexander said, "especially with the new case." He said he has spent \$8,000 in constructing new cages at his rural Geneva home for his performing chimps. Alexander said he feels the new cages meet state specifications but they are yet to be inspected by officials from the state Game and Fish Commission.

Alexander, a native of Austria who says he bought 56 acres near Geneva seven years ago so he could breed and raise his "Hollywood Chimps," said today that he arrived last Thursday night at the county pound near Five Points to see Otto alive. "They wouldn't even let me see his body," Alexander said.

"They accuse me of neglect," he said, "but I feel that Otto got cruel treatment" at the pound. J. A. Whittington, chief investigator for the Humane Society of Seminole County, said today that he observed Otto on Sept. 5 and 23 "sitting out in the hot sun with no shade and no water" in the pound cage.

"I definitely consider this inhumane treatment and place the blame on a series of circumstances and a deaf ear turned towards the way Alexander fed about his animals and lack of understanding of how to take care of a primate," Whittington said. "This is borne out by the fact that the chimp died in the custody of Bruce Clarke (county animal control) before I don't believe he would have died in the care of Alexander."

Whittington is a member of the County Animal Control Board and voted in the minority against labeling Alexander's other chimps "Otto released."

"We did not demand to get that chimp (Otto) released, but we discussed the laying on of interviews," Whittington said.

SCOPA Idea Rapped

Jim Ryan, the administrator at the Port of Sanford, said today the notion of selling the port to a private industry "is a little bit stupid."

Ryan made the comment after the Seminole County Industrial Development Authority (SIDA) asked the county commission for a study to look into the possibility of selling the port and using funds to create a more aggressive industry-seeking entity.

"It's totally misleading and lacks a proper perspective," Ryan said. On Thursday, SIDA directors voted for the study after a motion by Georges St. Laurent.

St. Laurent said the study will determine if it's feasible to sell the port and turn the proceeds back to the taxpayers. In addition, SIDA officials say \$60,000 a year in race track funds could be turned back to the community, land taxes could be eliminated and costs of running the port could be decreased.

Ryan pointed out the port still owes a \$500,000 federal loan. "That's not the \$60,000 I used," Ryan said. He says Seminole is "unique" in that \$200,000 of bonds is diverted to pay back the federal loan. The last is scheduled for payoff in 1987.

The port has about \$5-million in cash and federal grant money on interest-free loans at the port. "Let me see going to — turn the grant over to provide industry by a freebie?" "It is inconceivable that any responsible person would sell the port authority," Ryan declared.

SIDA Chairman Jim Daniel said the study, headed by an unnamed consultant, is expected to be completed by Oct. 15.

New Law May Reduce Auto Insurance Premiums

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Floridians may now take advantage of an auto-insurance law which industry officials predict can save some motorists up to 27 per cent on the cost of premiums.

The law, passed by the 1976 Legislature to revise no-fault auto insurance, goes into effect today and in general lowers the insurance coverage a motorist has to carry.

Motorists can contact their insurance agents and request a reduction on current policies or can seek lower rates on new policies.

The Insurance Department says the law also has other benefits.

The law also sets up for the first time a Division of Prudential Claims, which will check on questionable or suspicious claims pointed out by insurance companies.

"We expect a vigorous effort to track down fraud will have a measurable effect on reducing auto rates," said George Tillman, a 21-year veteran of the Insurance Department who will head the division.

The new unit was requested by Insurance Commissioner Phil Ashler to give his department a new capability in its attempt to halt fraudulent payments, which insurance companies claim are costing them millions of dollars. The work will be supported by a tax on the industry.

Tillman said such an agency would be more effective against fraud than individual companies since the state should be able to track cases that might involve several companies.

He said he hoped the division can start hiring people next week. While the legislature provided for 25 positions, he said only 12 would be filled in the early months. They would include a staff in Miami, where charges of fraud have been particularly rampant.

Insurance industry officials say motorists across the state will be able to save 26 to 27 per cent of the current cost of their policies if they take advantage of all the reductions.

They point out that the cuts are not automatic and will only occur if the motorist requests certain reductions in current coverage.

Over half the projected savings are in areas of coverage all motorists are now required to have. The rest is in optional coverages.

One reduction available to all cars in both injury liability insurance, which is being reduced from a required minimum of \$15,000-\$30,000 to the minimum in effect until 1975, \$10,000-\$20,000.

The other reduction available in required coverage is adding a \$2,000 deductible in personal injury protection.

Other savings would come from lowered coverage for uninsured motorists and upping the \$100 deductible for collision insurance to \$500.

An average adult driver in Miami, now paying \$604 for full protection, could save \$166 by lowering his coverage in all four areas.

Savings in other parts of the state would range from \$84 in Orlando, \$59 in Tallahassee, \$60 in St. Petersburg, \$65 in Jacksonville and \$89 in Fort Lauderdale.

About half the motorists in Florida now carry \$15,000-\$30,000 in liability coverage. Some insurance officials say motorists should consider whether they want to lower that protection to \$10,000-\$20,000, considering the skyrocketing medical costs and the growing number of lawsuits over accidents.

The lower minimum will mean that the insurance company will pay medical bills up to \$10,000 for any one person injured in an accident, with a \$20,000 limit for all persons in an accident.

But Rep. Paul Steinberg, D-Miami Beach and one of the legislature's experts on insurance, said that 80 per cent of all auto insurance cases are settled for less than the new \$10,000 minimum.

Steinberg also said the insurance company has a legal obligation to try to settle the case within the liability limits you carry.

If the court judgment is higher, officials said, your home and personal property up to \$1,000 are exempt from seizure to pay for the settlement.

A breadwinner's wages also can not be garnished, although up to 25 per cent of his spouse's earnings can be, they point out.
