Peace Or War?

Somehow or other Europe managed to survive the mu-
nicipal elections in Czechoslovakia the past weekend with-
out any explosive incident setting off another world war.
The British cabinet was called together in extraordinary
session, the chancelleries in other European coun-
tries buzzed with excitement and expectation of war, Ger-
many rushed troops to the border, and Czechoslovakia
called out thousands of reserves, but the weekend
passed without a single shot being fired.

Just why was it that Hitler failed to march into
Czechoslovakia on the eve of these elections as he did into
Austria when that country was prepared to vote on union
with Germany? That he had every intention of doing so
is fairly evident. Preparations had been under way for
weeks in both Germany and Italy for Hitler to seize this
opportunity for settling the Sudeten German problem in
typical Nazi fashion.

But at the last minute something deterred him. Was
it the fact that Premier Hodza called out the reserves and
massed troops on the border showing that the Czechs were
ready to fight for their independence? Was it the fact
that Premier Daladier, in spite of Mussolini's militaristic
gestures in northern Africa, announced that France was
ready to fight and would come to the aid of Czechoslo-
vakia? Or was it something that Prime Minister Cham-
berlain told Konrad Henlein on his recent visit to London?

It seems likely that the firm stand taken by Czechoslo-
vakia and France might have had something to do with it.
It is the first time that Hitler in all his long climb
to the top has been met by any determined show of re-
sistance. It may be that all it takes to stop his continued
aggression is to call his bluff. It is certain that he under-
stands no other language than the mailed fist.

But we doubt if even the threat of war would have
been sufficient to have delayed Hitler if he were
sure his opponents would be only France and Czechoslo-
vakia. The future of the Hitler and the Nazi political
party is so inextricably woven into a policy of foreign con-
quest that he is not likely to have delayed his march be-
cause of two armies which his own conceit causes him to
underestimate.

Was it something that Chamberlain communicated to
him? Did the British Prime Minister convince Hitler that
England too would fight for Czech independence? Or did
he sell him on some simpler peaceful plan by which the
Nazi aims in Central Europe could be realized without the
risks involved in war?

Only time can tell, but it is safe to say that
the future of Czechoslovakia is no less uncertain today
than it was a week ago, and that Hitler's goal for a Pan-
German union has not been changed, though the
method of achieving it may have undergone some slight
modification.

Reward For Careful Driving

A group of 38 insurance companies have adopted a
plan to allow a 15 percent deduction in annual insurance
premiums by automobile drivers who have not had any
auto accidents involving damage claims during the year.
The idea is to reward the careful driver in addition to
whatever punishment the police courts provide for the
reckless driver.

Earnest Elmo Calkins, writing in the American Maga-
zine, suggests that this plan might be carried even fur-
ther providing some system of awards from the govern-
ment to its citizens who successfully negotiate the high-
ways each year without accident. Cash prizes, he says,
could be paid through receipts from gasoline and other
motor taxes.

Anyone who drives a car without having an accident
for one year might be awarded a prize of, say, \$100. When
he has driven two years without an accident, the prize
should be increased to \$200, and so on. A person with a ten
year perfect record, would be given \$10,000; and 25 years,
\$25,000. Such substantial rewards would make them
worth working for.

Mr. Calkins also suggests that in addition to the cash
awards which might have no particular appeal for wealthy
persons, something in the nature of a gold medal, or a gold
star to be attached to the license plate might also be
awarded. "The award of the higher prizes should be at-
tended with some ceremony, possibly a banquet or public
meeting," he writes.

While there is much to be said in favor of Mr. Calkins'
plan as it would certainly provide automobile drivers with
some inducement for driving carefully, we would like to
see some estimate as to the probable cost of such a pro-
gram.

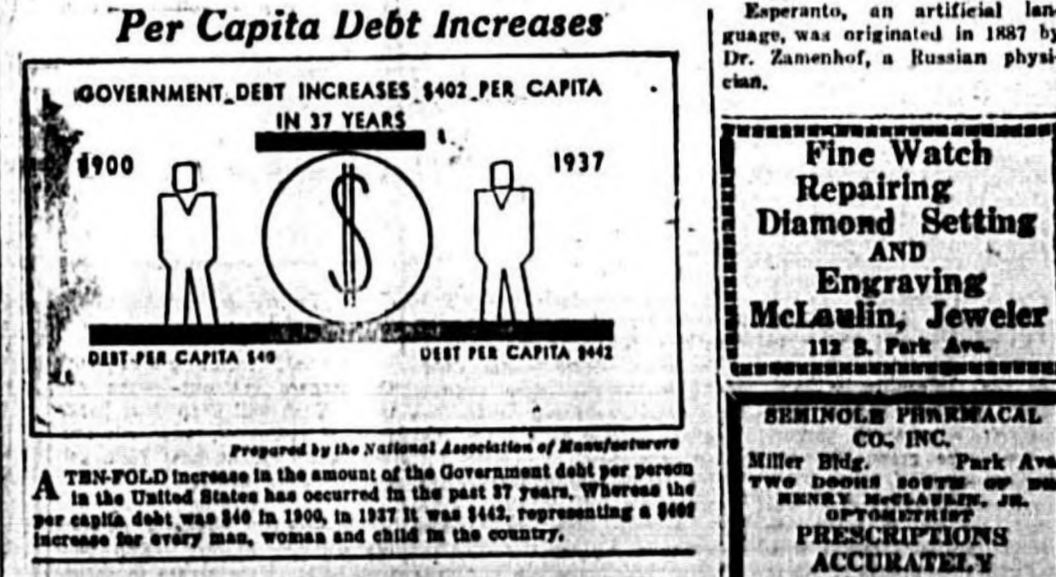

STANLEY IN AMERICA . . . Sir Henry M. Stanley, African explorer—every schoolboy has read of this man and his thrilling adventures on the Dark Continent. Just as thrilling is the story of Stanley in America, the story of a young man who found adventures wherever he wanted it. Although born in England, Stanley grew up amid the turbulent strife of America's Civil War.

Stanley was captured in a Union prison camp near Chicago. There he contracted dysentery and malaria fever, so unsanitary were the prisoners' quarters. On June 4, 1862, Stanley was given his release on promise that he would enlist in the U. S. Artillery Service. Free, he traveled to Harper's Ferry, but was placed in a military hospital as soon as he arrived. Then, on June 22, Stanley was discharged from the Union army as being unfit for service.

After the war Stanley traveled across the western plains of the United States and wrote vivid descriptions of the new country. In 1867 he was sent by the New York Journal to accompany the British forces in their expedition into Abyssinia. In 1871 he made his famous journey into Africa to find the lost Dr. David Livingstone. New Difficulties Confront WPA In Relief Projects

10,000 names.
Dill said the increase had been made necessary by the closing of many lumber mills because of the recession, the closing out of the citrus fruit season, the end of the tourist season and the completion of the Miami-Key West overseas highway.
The Administrator said his estimate of 140,000 unemployed was based on a WPA survey made about a year ago. The figure includes those employed by the WPA and other governmental emergency relief agencies.
The WPA now spends about \$1,250,000 of federal funds monthly. U. S. Age Assistance checks aggregating \$445,450 will be distributed by the welfare board to 30,091 persons this month. The board estimates about 33,000 are eligible for this assistance. Aid to the blind payments for May will total \$18,183 with 1,214 persons receiving checks.
Since the inception of the WPA program in Florida, Dill said, about \$40,000,000 of federal money has been spent. The State, counties and cities sponsoring projects have contributed about \$7,000,000, mostly for materials.
The State's principal contribution to relief has been a \$1,400,000 appropriation to match dollar-for-dollar, federal expenditures for old age assistance and blind aid.
The 1937 Legislature voted to raise the appropriation from beer and liquor taxes and from the one cent of the seven-cent tobacco tax, going into the General Revenue Fund.
Forty-eight of Florida's 67 counties have no public or private relief agencies.

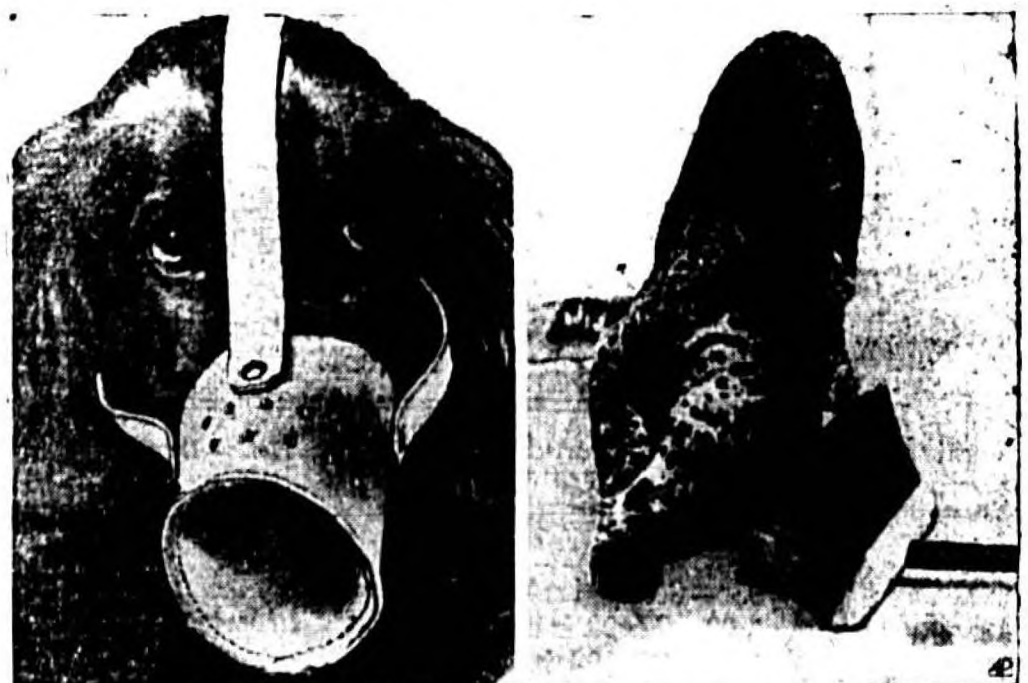

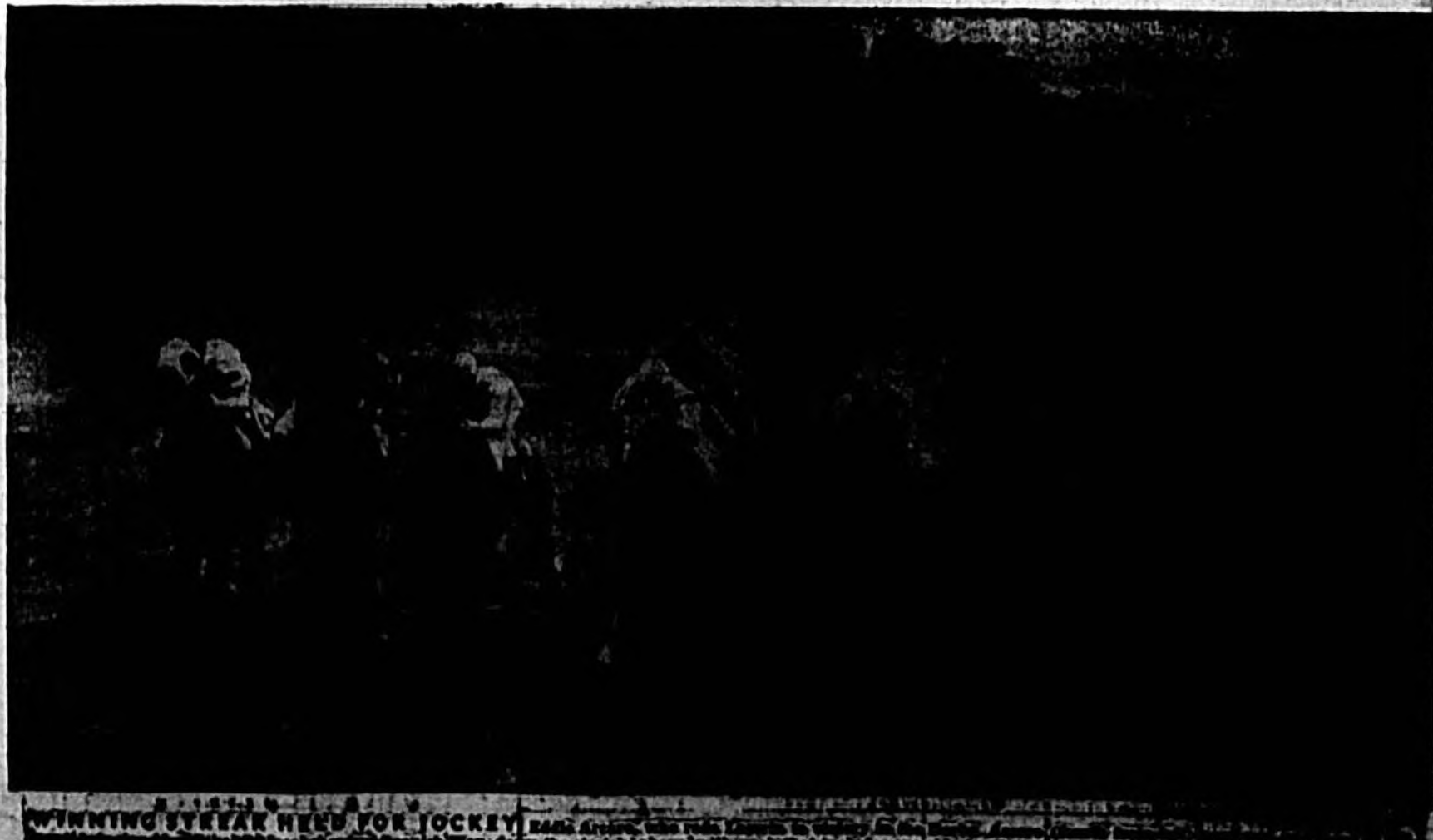

Smith had a perfect night on the mound as he fanned a total of eight Lookouts while he allowed no free passes to the local side. Smith was in trouble in the first frame, for the only

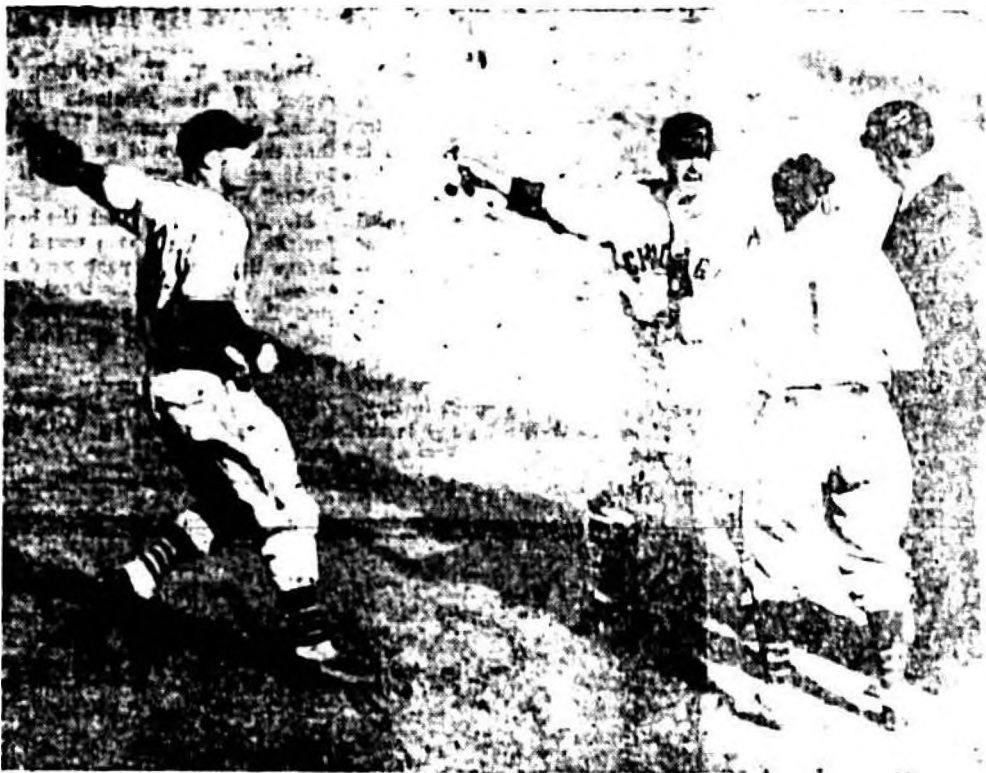

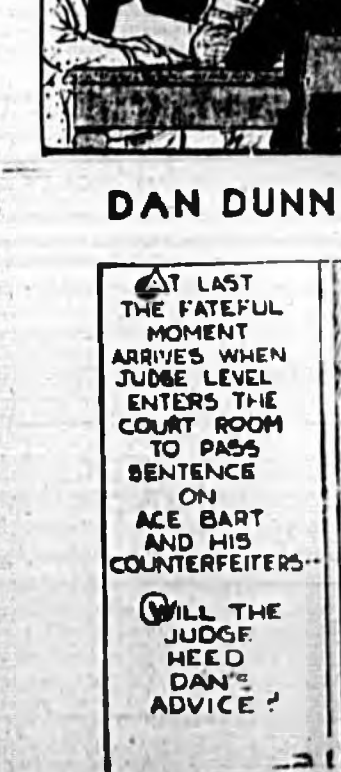

Gibbs Points Out Potentialities Of St. Johns River

JACKSONVILLE, May 25.—Jack Gibb points out that Jacksonville can be a great commercial city and "that is your heritage." George W. Gibb, ship builder and prominent civic leader, said yesterday to members of the Twelve-Fifteen Club of the Junior Chamber of Commerce in a luncheon talk in the Seminole Hotel.

Calling attention to the vast potentialities of the St. Johns River, Mr. Gibb said Jacksonville has grown to its present size and importance in spite of ourselves and not because of ourselves.

The speaker's especial plea was to concentrate on building Jacksonville as a great commercial center utilizing the river but also for drawing the wealthy pleasure seeker in yachts and other pleasure craft.

"We don't have to kid ourselves," he said, "we have here in our river a potentiality that is worth developing to the greatest extent."

Mr. Gibb envisioned the Florida canal as a great boon to Jacksonville's commercial possibilities and a canal linking the St. Johns with the Indian River, as a project which would bring wealthy yachtsmen to Jacksonville for the beginning of a trip down the state by one of the most beautiful scenic water trips in the world.

"Our very future is wrapped up in the river and we should not be careless in developing its potentialities," he asserted.

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State Distilleries Are Not Feasible For Citrus Brandy

ALTOONA, May 25.—(A)—Dr. Charles Dumko, Altoona citrus grower and canner, said today it would not be feasible for the state to go into the distillation of orange brandy.

T. H. Prevatt of Seville recently suggested the state establish distilleries and charge growers 11 a gallon for distillation. He estimated the brandy could be sold for 75 a gallon.

Quoting the United States citrus products station at Winter Haven, Dr. Dumko said "it would not be economical to purchase fruit, however cheap, extract the juice and then ferment it to make brandy."

Henry W. von Loosche, citrus products station wacker, said the yield from citrus is only 6.5 to 7 gallons of 100 brand brandy per ton of fruit as compared with 27 gallons for apples, 22 gallons for peaches and pears and 50 gallons from California grapes.

The citrus brandy yield is low, von Loosche said, because regulations do not permit addition of sugar prior to fermentation.

Prevatt said he had been told a box of fruit would make a gallon of brandy. This would mean 10 to 15 million dollars for the state each season, he said.

 100 votes. Mr. Partin carried the county precincts, while Mr. Williams carried the city. Mr. Williams also carried their home precinct of Oviedo.

In the race for the Legislature Mr. Leonardy, a pioneer resident of this county and former practicing attorney, piled up a total of 1688 votes to his opponent's 1483. Mr. Leonardy was out in front in both the city and county precincts by approximately 200 votes. Mr. Bridge, who is mayor of Longwood, carried his home precinct, while Mr. Leonardy carried Precinct 3 in the city where he is registered.

In the race for County Commissioner in District 1, Mr. Pope received 1765 votes to 1374 for Mr. Thrasher. While the vote in the city was substantially in Mr. Pope's favor, the county precincts voted 661 to 691 for Mr. Thrasher. Precinct 3 where both candidates reside gave 628 votes to Mr. Pope and 415 votes to Mr. Thrasher.

Judge Thomas called the entire county by 1873 votes to 1077. His vote in the city was 1126 to 639 and in the county precincts 747 to 438. Associated Press returns indicated that he also carried the state by substantially the same proportion.

Mr. Partin's total vote was 1634 and Mr. Williams' was 1529. In the city Mr. Partin received 929 to 934 for Mr. Williams while the county precincts piled up a total of 705 for Mr. Partin as compared with 591 for Mr. Williams.

Charges Ousted Chairman Conducted Campaign Of "Dissent And Obstruction"

Lilienthal Also Gives Testimony

Directors Reply To Charges Hurlled By Arthur E. Morgan

WASHINGTON, May 26. (AP)—Hearings by the House Committee on Public Works today charged ousted TVA chairman Arthur E. Morgan, conductor of a campaign of "dissent and obstruction" to discredit the TVA program.

Testimony before a joint congressional committee, including H. A. Morgan, now TVA chairman, testified that A. E. Morgan had gone beyond the "proper limits" in disagreeing with the other members of TVA board and had "obviously obstructed" work of this agency of the federal government.

Lilienthal testified before the committee today, making lengthy charges of "efficiency, competence and management" against H. A. Morgan and David L. Lilienthal, the other TVA directors.

Lilienthal testified that Arthur E. Morgan tried to "defeat and obstruct the authority" in attempting to "undo its constitutional duty."

Testimony by Dr. Arthur E. Morgan in the committee that H. A. Morgan, now chairman, and David L. Lilienthal have been guilty of "efficiency, competence and management" to discredit the TVA program.

Because of the many technicalities involved, he proposed that a board of engineers determine what constituted mismanagement. He would, he said, point out specific instances of mismanagement which had cost the government many millions of dollars when he had been chairman of TVA's staff.
